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GERMAN PRISONERS.

The reader of "Paris Underground" finds himself beset with many sharp reactions. One has to do with food. He looks with amazement at his own next meal. The cleanliness of the table, dishes, food itself. The warmth and good light of pleasant dining rooms or kitchen tables. The wonderful, unbelievable abundance. The meat portion is small, but good. There is clean, good bread. There is gravy, or a little clean, good butter or fruit spread. Life in America is wonderful!

It takes such an experience as following a quiet, matter-of-fact American woman into French prisons manned by Nazis to make one realize one's mercies, to be filled with a violent and persistent desire to help France.

Another reaction is consideration of prisons in general. They are not intended to be pleasant anywhere. They should be stern and austere, but surely they should be decent. Prisoners should have winter heat, enough plain, clean food to keep well on; enough water for drinking, washing themselves and their clothing. Prisoners should be required to keep cells clean and orderly, but given facilities for doing so.

How good are our own civilian prisons? Are prisoners treated with plain humanity? How good are our asylums for the insane, in Texas, particularly?

Our worst may be better managed than those of the Nazis in occupied countries. But how much better? Enough for American self-respect?

CALLING THEIR BLUFF.

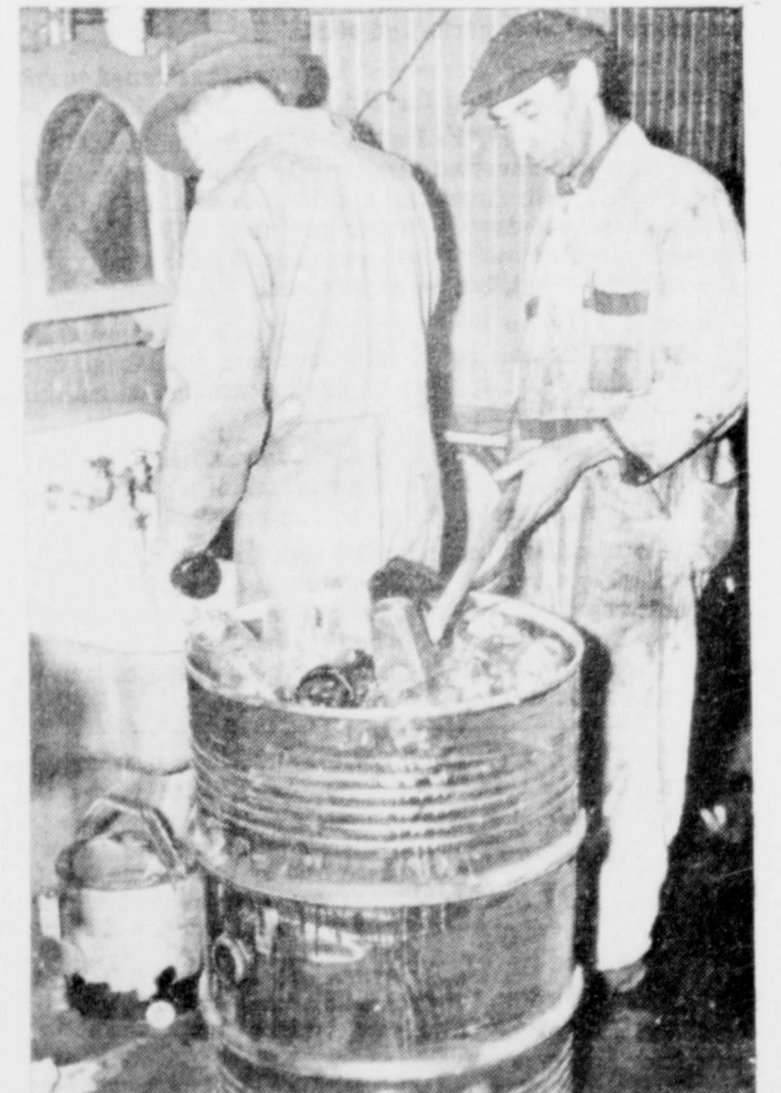
At last a practical plan for easing the demands on the taxpayers has been suggested.

S. W. Murphy, prominent utility executive, recommends that private capital (the savings of American citizens) be allowed to buy up publicly owned electric plants, thereby giving the government (1) billions of dollars for debt retirements and (2) a large annual tax revenue, as contrasted with the present policy of pouring out hundreds of millions of dollars for the federally-subsidized tax-exempt socialized power experiment.

This is a sound suggestion. The publicly-regulated private electric industry now produces 83 per cent of all the electric power serving this nation. It did produce all of it, and there is no reason why it couldn't do so again if granted the opportunity.

Government ownership of tax-exempt electric power plants is just a sorry excuse to fasten a socialistic form of government on this nation.

Murphy has called the bluff of the Washington crowd that cries, "Private industry must take up the employment slack after the war, or government will," while all the time that crowd is putting stumbling blocks in the way of private enterprise, as in the electric power field, in the hope that it can set the stage for the socialized state, on the charge that private capital has failed.

RATION POINT COSTS OF PORK PRODUCTS CUT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—With hogs moving to markets in heavy numbers, the government has slashed ration point costs of all pork products by two points.

At the same time, it intended price support to all hog markets. The reduction in ration point costs of pork, described by Administrator Hauke as temporary, is effective at 12:01 a. m. eastern war time, tomorrow.

Bowles noted that the cut will make some pork items point free. The higher-valued cuts will be reduced at least 20 per cent, or from 10 points to 8 points per

pound. Over the list as a whole the average point reduction will be one-third.

OPA emphasized that the reduction will be for a limited period and applies only to pork, and 100 per cent pork sausage. It does not change the present point value of lard, those sausages not made exclusively from pork or any other products rationed under the meat-fats order.

Canned meats, even though they are made from pork, remain unchanged.

Effective immediately, the support price at other markets will be that now in effect at Chicago—\$13.75 for good and choice 200 to 270 pound hogs—adjusted by the normal differential with Chicago prices.

Beginning Nov. 29, the support price at each market other than Chicago will be \$1 per 100 pounds below the OPA price ceiling at

that market. The Chicago support price will remain unchanged.

WFA said the announced prices will remain effective until War Food Administrator Marvin Jones determines the need for a more flexible support price at markets outside Chicago.

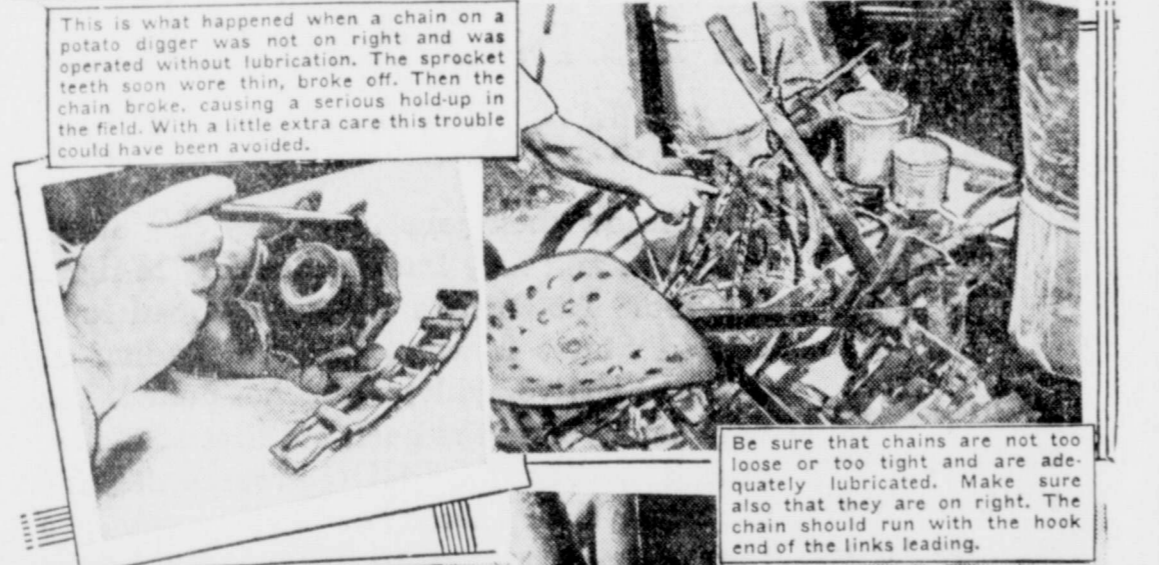

HIGHER MACHINE SPEEDS CALL FOR MORE FREQUENT LUBRICATION



This is what happened when a chain on a potato digger was not on right and was operated without lubrication. The sprocket teeth soon wore thin, broke off. Then the chain broke, causing a serious hold-up in the field...

Be sure that chains are not too loose or too tight and are adequately lubricated. Make sure also that they are on right. The chain should run with the hook end of the links leading.

Frequent lubrication of "open bearings" like that shown above is advisable because dust and dirt collecting around the edges form a "grinding compound" that can cause rapid wear.

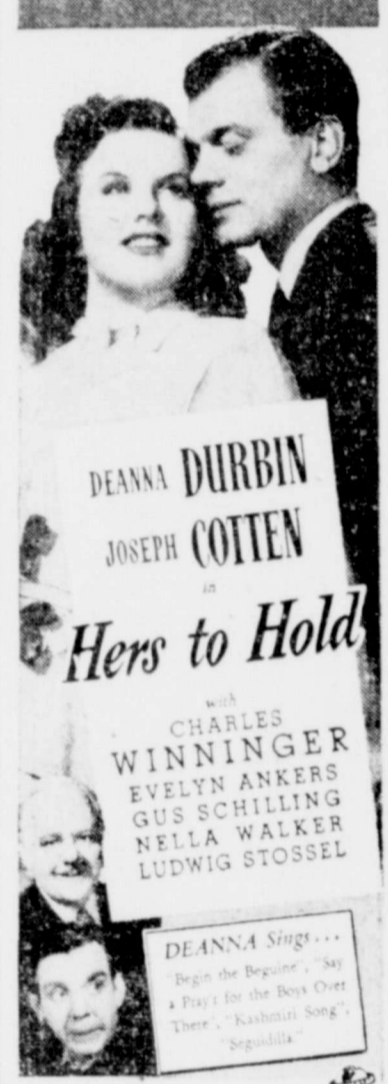
