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FOREIGN POLICY

Alfred M. Landon, speaking in the role of "elder statesman," is warning his party against a united stand with the Democrats on foreign policy. He tells "freshmen Republicans" that such a position should be avoided because nobody has a clear idea of what the nation's foreign policy really is now.

His remark brings up the familiar fact that the United States, contrary to most foreign countries, seems never to have had a permanent and consistent set of foreign policies. They have been mostly improvised from time to time, to meet changing conditions or public moods. There has seldom been any basic set of principles on which foreign nations might safely assume that our government, regardless of changes in domestic politics, would continue to stand.

This situation developed rather naturally, because the American people and government were so long engaged primarily in their own domestic affairs, having almost in a world of their own, and suspicious of foreign connections. But the old isolation is rapidly vanishing, as Americans everywhere from Washington to the rural crossroads, find themselves deeply engaged in two foreign wars, with a maze of complications throughout the world.

ON THE WAY.

It takes all kinds of people, with all kinds of background and outlook, to make an expeditionary force. A correspondent crossing the Atlantic in a troop ship tells of the bewilderment of some who had never traveled and never seen the ocean before. One soldier stood a long, long time looking blankly at the sea, and then asked: "Say, buddy, when is this place going to get wherever it is that it's going to?" The ship and the sea, seemed to be one place of incalculable and preposterous extent, and as strange as the flying continent that Dean Swift described in his Gulliver's Travels.

But that ship, and countless other ships, with reasonable luck, will get where they're going to in due time, and do the job that is to be done. In the traveling and talking and fighting and seeing strange people and places, millions of Americans will begin to grasp the bigness of this globe and the greatness of its problems. From that may grow a better understanding of the world and its people, and stronger devotion to things that make for peace.

ISLANDS.

The Japs, being islanders themselves, naturally developed a taste for islands as the British did. The latter seem to have been the first to operate in that field on a big scale, but the Japs, when once they got their case for territorial expansion, carried it farther than any nation ever did before. They put their trademark on hundreds of coral islands that nobody had ever thought worth while annexing. Their operations have spread to the larger and richer islands of the south Pacific and Indian Oceans, owned by the British, Dutch, Filipinos and others.

It was a grand enterprise—while it lasted. But the tide has turned. One by one the intruders are being kicked out of those rich tropical islands, that suited so well their own purposes and inclinations. Where there has been definite ownership by decent and cooperative nations, the islands of course return to them. Where they were annexed for the first time by the Japs, to serve as part of their vast Pacific network, out go the Japs.

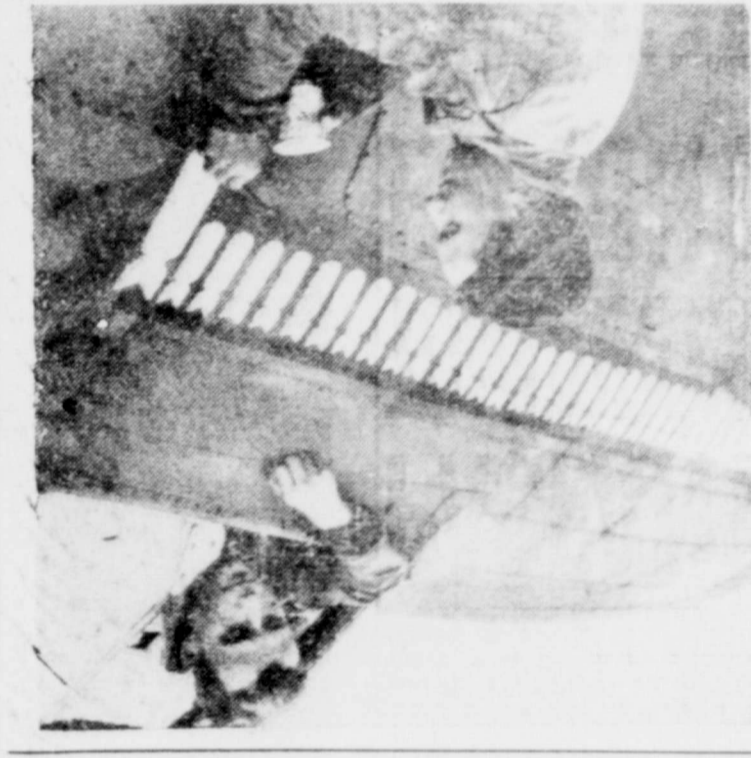

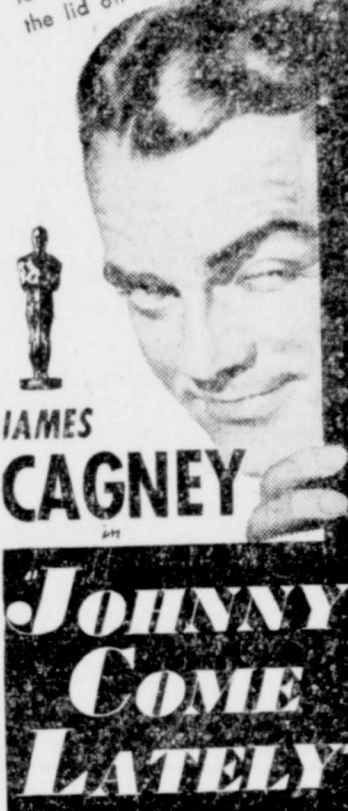

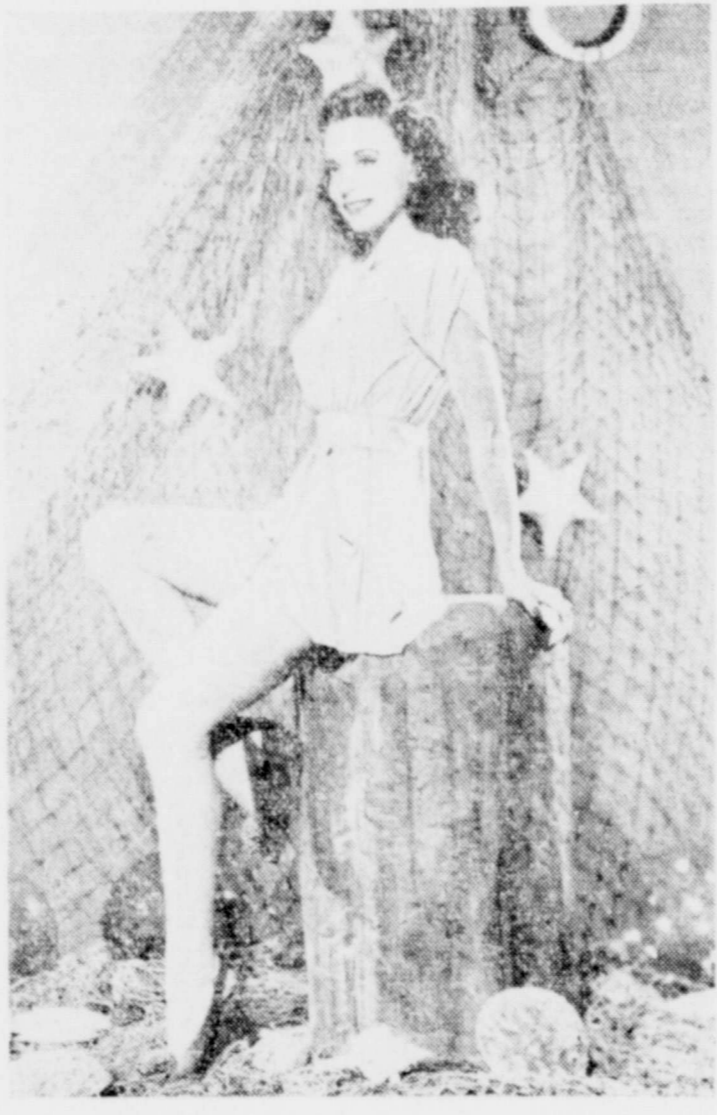
