

Here's What the New Grade School Building Will Look Like When Completed



The new grade school building will look something like the above artists' conception. The school building was designed by C. R. Walker, Lubbock architect. Purpose of the building program is to furnish Dimmitt school children of the lower grades a place to go to school and study in a more modern and efficient atmosphere. The grade school is now housed in an old building constructed back in 1909.

A bond election will be held Saturday, July 1. The Board of Trustees of the Dimmitt Independent School District urges everyone to favor the new building in the election. The bond election will be for \$375,000 to mature completely in 1980 or thirty years from now.

The gymnasium will be located to the right and slightly behind the building as shown in the picture. The rest of the building will be composed mostly of classrooms.

Playground equipment will also be furnished.

The program has been under consideration for several years but until recently nothing has been done. Lately, however, civic activity in that direction has caused concrete plans to be made for the actual construction of the new facilities. Trustee members hope to let construction contract about August.

grossly overestimated their town's population.

In Dimmitt the figures had run for some time in the neighborhood of 2,000 to 2,500. This would not have been wrong several years ago. Time was when a housing unit contained 4.6 members per family. Now it only contains 3.1 taken as a national whole. Families in Dimmitt won't miss this figure too much. Based on the number of houses in Dimmitt which, by old standards would contain 4.6 people apiece, we would have had a population somewhere around 2,250.

But like some of the ill-fated opinion polls conducted in this country, things many times don't run as smoothly and stereotyped as they should. Just a certain amount of people should live in a residence at a given time figures out on paper by no means guarantees its accuracy.

With a few exceptions, the census count was undisputed. hough bitterly disappointed, most cities merely gritted their teeth, made a few feeble excuses and began asking their Chamber of Commerce embarrassing questions or getting to work and make sure that they really did triple their population by the next count.

People shouldn't feel too bad, though. Small towns don't grow much. We did not want, or expect, boom towns in this area-If the population had been much more, we would have had com towns. As it is, Panhandle towns are passing through a stage of good and solid growth. Its citizens now are likely to be here many years from now and will be interested in civic welfare movements. We couldn't have been better off in Dimmitt. Everyone works, it's clean, and it's a darn good place to raise a family.



Three major powers are designed to insure a continuing abundance of water: The right to prevent waste, by court injunction if necessary; the power to regulate spacing of wells; and the power to put more water underground in re-charging pro-

The law limits the districts' powers in that they cannot prorate or allocate water and they cannot deny a permit to drill a new irrigation well, so long as the applicant complies with spacing regulations.
