



REDS CUT INTO NAZI BULGE BELOW LENINGRAD CLOSING TRAP ON GERMANS

ALGIERS, Jan. 27.—American and British troops have smashed the first serious German thrust at their expanding beachhead, defeating units of the Hermann Goering Panzer Division in a brisk clash southwest of Littoria, 35 miles be-

To the southeast on the main Fifth Army front, Ameri can forces hammered out limited gains against stiff German opposition in the Cassino sector, French units seized strategic heights above that bastion of the Gustav line, and Allied warships pounded the coast road behind the Nazi lines.

General Alphonse Juin's French forces scored the most aportant advances, dashing across the Secco river valley and cutting the north-south road between Cassino and Belnonte. (A Swiss broadcast quoted a German report that the Nazi forces had evacuated Aprilia, 22 miles south of Rome.)

American troops on the main front were reported to ave made local advances against stiff opposition in the Cassino area, where Lt. Gen. Jacob Devers, deputy supreme commander in the Mediterranean, reported the Fifth Army had massed the largest concentration of guns he ever had seen on any front.

However, there was no confirmation that the Americans had crossed the Rapido river in force or had entered Cassino, main bastion of the Gustav line. A patrol two days ago reported the Germans had evacuated Cassino and taken up strong positions in the surrounding heights. (The Italian government radio at Bari reported last night that the Americans had captured Cassino.)

French elements of the Fifth Army seized "important high ground" north of Cassino, headquarters announced.

On the Adriatic flank, action was limited to intensive patrol activity. Alied warships continued to support British troops on the Tyrrhenian Sea end of the Fifth Army front with bombardments of highways in the Formia area Tues-

The German counter-attack against the beachhead south regarded it as of only local significance as the invaders steadily fanned out against generally stiffening opposition.

The counter-attack occurred about 13 miles due east of the invasion port of Nettuno and about four and one-half miles inland at the northern end of the Pontine Marshes. Littoria is about five miles from the Appian Way, coastal highway to Rome.

The reinforcement of the invasion forces with troops, supplies and armament, was "ahead of schedule," an announcement said, but weather was worsening, and delays may be encountered.

MOSCOW-Red armies slashed almost at will into the hrinking Nazi bulge below Leningrad today, rapidly closing a trap on upwards of 250,000 Germans.

In a powerful frontal assault, Gen. Meretskov's forces were battling their way through the outskirts of both Tosno and Chudovo, northeastern and southeastern anchors respectively of the Nazi salient.

Other armies tearing apart the northern flank surged to within 42 miles of Estonia and poured through newly-captured Krasnogvardeisk, five-way railway junction 25 miles southwest of Leningrad, in pursuit of fleeing German units.

The fourteenth day of the offensive on the northwestern front found the Germans rolled back 32 miles southwest. 26 miles south and 28 miles southeast of Leningrad, with the enemy siege broken beyond repair. In the first 12 days alone, the Soviet High Command reported, 40,000 Germans had been killed and 3000 captured. Ten enemy divisions-150,000 men-were dispersed, and heavy losses inflicted on


