AXIS-DESECRATED MONASTERY IS NOW TARGET FOR ALLIED BOMBS; REDS ARE MOPPING UP

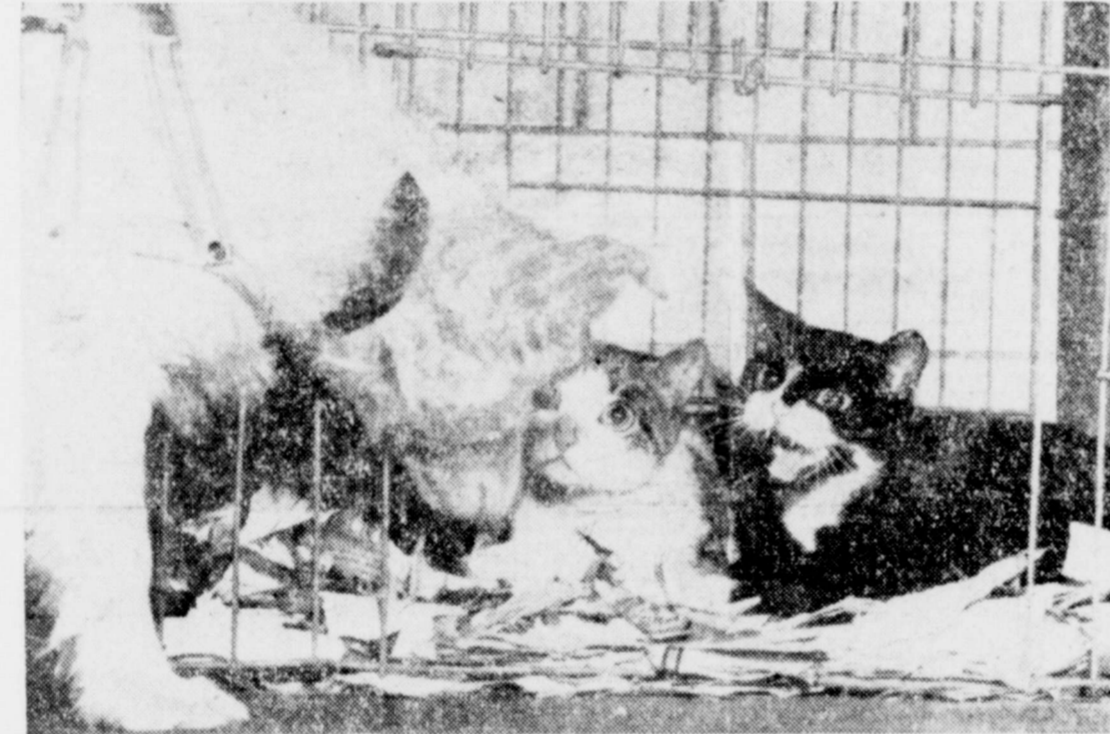

CISCO PRESBYTERIANS CALL O. L. SAVAGE

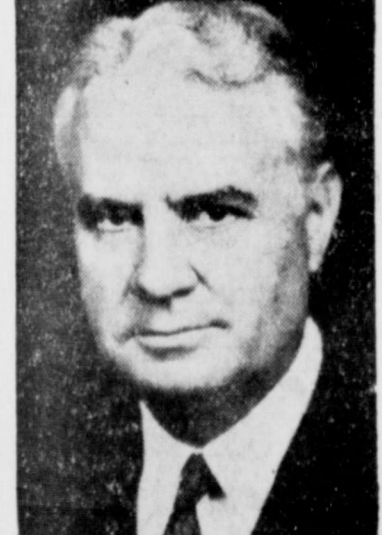

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SOLDIER VOTING.

Columnist Jay Franklin maintains that the dither in Washington about soldier voting arises because "the politicians are opposed to letting the soldiers and sailors vote in this election." The politicians are afraid of the service men's votes, he explains, because they believe those votes will not go to any candidate or party which practices "politics as usual."

Be that as it may, there is obviously too much politics about the whole voting problem this year. That is, too much party and group politics, too much jockeying for political position, too much forgetfulness of the value and sanctity of the American ballot, too much ignoring of the great issues at stake.

This is a time, more than any other for several decades, when political thought should be clear, when patriotism should be strong and its political expression should be regarded as a sacred duty. It is a troublesome task to manage such a national election, but more earnest zeal and less partisans juggling would make it easier.

If fairly and honestly interviewed, probably nine overseas soldiers out of ten would say something like this to their folks back home: "If you'll stop the damnable strikes, we'll gladly let you do the voting this year."

The more one ponders the hulabaloo over the RIGHT of soldiers to vote while on the front lines—even though they cannot possibly comply with the voting laws of the various states—the more one is convinced that the issue is wholly a political one and a smoke screen to divert the public mind from continued strikes in essential war industries.

WHAT MEN DON'T LIKE.

Women are generally supposed to be primarily interested in pleasing men—or at least in keeping well enough satisfied so that they won't start too much trouble. But somehow women seldom seem to make a thorough job of it. At any rate, this is the attitude of Paul Gallion, former sports writer and present literary man. He takes his life in his hand by mounting a platform and calmly lecturing a feminine audience on "Women and How to Improve Them." It stands to reason that a good many people of both sexes would like to know about that, so here is a little resume of the lecture.

Mr. Gallion starts out in a rather feminine way with the recognition that "all women are aneels and we wouldn't change them for the world," and then gently proposes changes. Men, he says, don't like permanent waves, eye make-up, badly painted mouths, and "hands with red stilettoes." Men think their women are well dressed in the daytime, but not at night. Men could write a book about slacks pro and con, but mostly con. He sadly states that trousers were not built for women, and doesn't seem convinced that it would be worth while trying to rebuild the women to fit the trousers. These, however, are deep matters, about which there can never be a last word on either side.

RED HERRING.

"Germany will try it again," writes Sigrid Schultz, who for 22 years has been Berlin correspondent for the Chicago Tribune. It is easy to believe. The infatuated dream of dominion with which that warlike nation has been cursed throughout its history will not change. Perhaps the best that can be expected in the present situation is that the severity of punishment for this last criminal assault on civilization will establish a longer peace than usual.

And what will Germany do meanwhile? The answer is already provided by German leaders. Again they are "drawing a red herring across the trail" by warning the outer world against Russia. The great menace to a free world, they subtly suggest, is not Nazism but Bolshevism.

It would be a great German victory if the free nations were to swallow that bait. And it is rather easy to make the anti-Russian warning seem plausible when Nazi propagandists dwell on some chapters of Russian history. But the trick should be obvious to intelligent people. Free Russia is not the Russia of the irresponsible czars, and what the Russians want today, above everything else, is peace to develop their vast and rich country.

TEXAS LIQUOR COLLECTIONS UP \$132,802

AUSTIN, Feb. 15.—The state liquor control board collected \$132,802 more in 1943 than in 1942, the agency's annual report

to Governor Stevenson showed today. The board noted an increase of 129.5 percent on taxes collected on liquor brought into the United States from Mexico. The three collecting stations at El Paso, Laredo and Hidalgo took in \$274,905.62, with El Paso's \$129,486.27 leading.

The law permits individuals to bring in one quart at a time. Inspectors affixed 1,075,638 stamps to individual containers.

Fines collected in cases made by liquor board inspectors increased \$50,000 over 1942.

FARMERS' INCOME.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—The agriculture department now estimates cash income from farm marketings for 1943 at \$19,009,000,000, compared with \$15,336,000,000 the previous year. Livestock and livestock products contributed the major factor in the rise. Hog sales made sharp advances and there were marked increases in poultry and eggs, at higher average prices. Receipts from peanuts in Texas were six times as great as in 1942 and income from soybeans was 12 times as great.

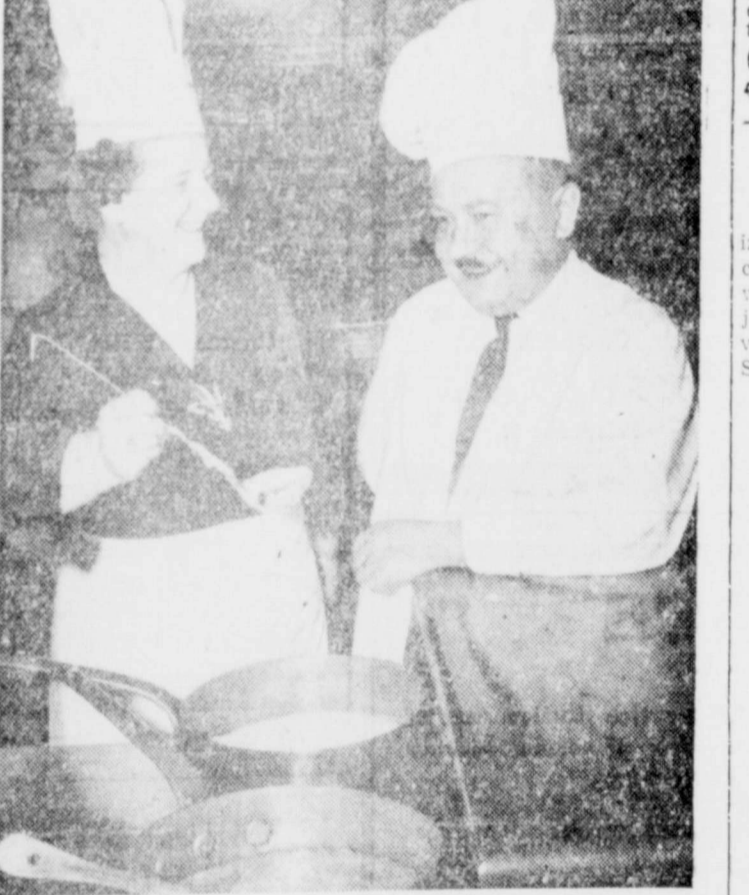

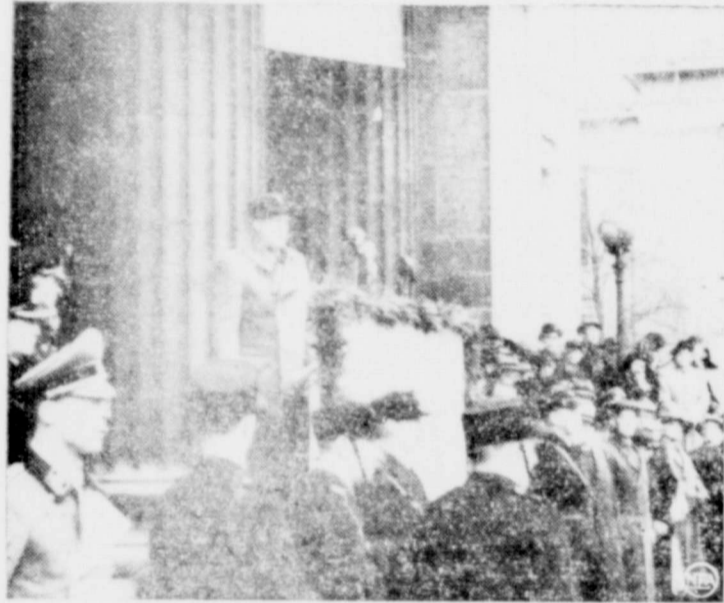

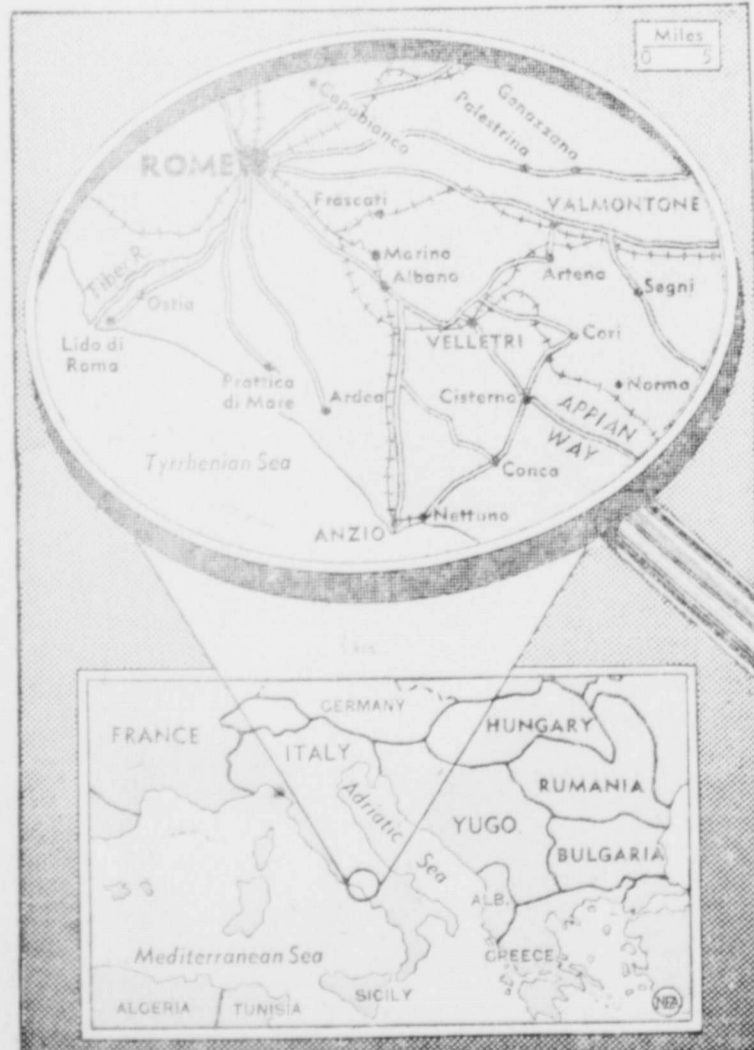
