Annual Style Show to Open Fair Week Program

Posey Cunningham County Advisor In Water District

Posey Cunningham of Dimmitt has been appointed advisor for Castro County to the temporary Board of Directors of the High Plains Underground Water District No. 1 by Jess Osborn, director for Precinct No. 3.

All of Castro County except a small area on the northeastern border is included in the proposed district, which embraces an underground water reservoir as defined by the State Board of Water Engineers. All or part of 21 Plains counties are in the District.

The temporary Board was appointed by the State Board to serve until permanent organization of the District. The temporary directors voted, said Osborn, to have each of the five name an advisory committee of one or more for each county in his Precinct.

Osborn said the advisory groups will assist in providing complete information on all matters pertaining to creation of the District and the provisions of the law under which it will operate. After its creation, it is intended that the county committees will advise the Directors on all matters pertaining to management of underground water.

Qualified voters who won property in the district and who also live within it will vote on Sept. 29 to decide whether it shall be made a political subdivision for underground water management. At that time the voters will decide whether the directors shall be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed five cents per \$100. They also will elect directors to serve until the second Tuesday of January, 1952. Directors elected at that time will draw straws to determine lengths of their terms—one, two or three years. Thereafter, an election will be held each year to fill vacancy or vacancies. Thus, the terms of all five directors will not expire at the same time.

Everyone is invited to the banquet to be held in the high school auditorium here and tickets may be purchased from Dimmitt Farm Bureau officials who are sponsoring the affair. Five counties have cooperated in securing the services of Mr. Arnold. According to Leo Witkowski, president, and E. L. Ivey, secretary, Rebekah Lodge will serve the guests.

Exhibitors Urged To Make Fair Entries by Tuesday

The dates for the Castro County Fair are drawing near and all those planning to exhibit livestock, agriculture products, poultry and rabbits, canned goods, culinary, needle craft, clothing and other articles listed in the 1951 Castro County Fair Catalogue should start making definite plans and have their entries in the County Agent's office by Sept. 11th, 1951.

Individual Agricultural products, Community Exhibits, clothing, and canned foods should be in place by Thursday night, Sept. 13th. Livestock, poultry and rabbits may be brought in Thursday afternoon, Sept. 13th. All livestock, poultry and rabbits must be in place and presentable for showing by 9 a. m., Friday, Sept. 14th.

Insofar as possible, stalls will be assigned prior to the time the animals are brought to the show. This makes it necessary that exhibitors make their entries early and all at one time if possible.

Bedding for livestock at the fair this year will be rather hard to secure so each livestock exhibitor, as far as possible should plan to bring his own bedding.

Livestock may not be removed from show barn until 4 p. m., Saturday, Sept. 15, unless the approval of the Division Superintendent is secured.

All persons showing individual agricultural products should collect their products early enough so that they are dry by the day of showing. When bundles of feed are being prepared, all bundles for forage should have the leaves intact. Bundles being shown for seed should have the forage stripped.

All persons desiring information concerning the fair that isn't explained in the Catalogue should contact the Division Superintendent, Chamber of Commerce, or the County Agent's office.

Conservation District Meet Held Thursday

County committees and the temporary board of directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District was to meet at 7:30 o'clock Thursday night in the Lamb County courthouse in Littlefield to discuss plans for an approval election September 29. The meeting was called by Tom McFarland of Hereford, chairman of the temporary committee.

The county committees were appointed this week with the cooperation of county agents in each of the counties included fully or partly in the proposed district. They are composed of three landowners and will serve in an advisory capacity if the district is established permanently, McFarland said.

The chairman pointed out the importance of the meeting was designed to correct some misinformation which has been circulated concerning the method in which the election is to be conducted. He said any confusion will be ironed out at the session.

Local Legion Post Host to Zone Meeting

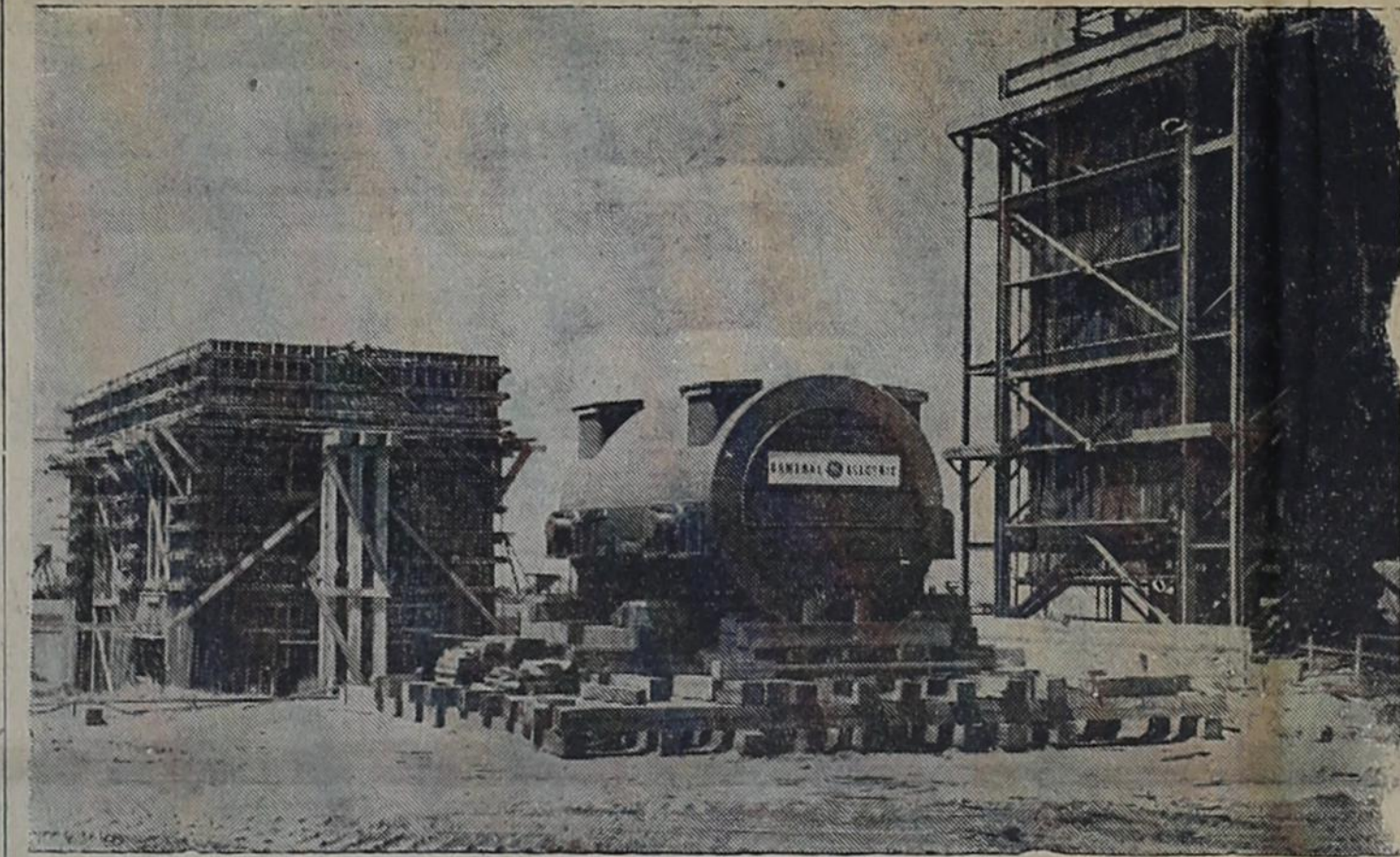

City Drug Store To Open Under New Ownership

A deal was completed recently whereby O. L. (Spec) Hunt of Hereford purchased the City Drug Store in Dimmitt from Robert Singer who had operated the business for the past several years. Mr. Singer had recently discontinued operation of the drug store in order that he might devote all of his time to his farming interests.

Mr. Hunt, a registered pharmacist, is remodeling and redecorating the drug store and plans to open for business during the latter part of next week. Generator Is Received For New Public Service Plant

Plant X, Southwestern Public Service Company's super-power plant, located 4 miles south of Earth and 9 miles north of Amherst, moved one step nearer completion recently with the arrival at the plant site of the huge 50,000 kilowatt turbo-generator.

The new unit, scheduled to go on the line sometime during the summer of 1952, is the first of two which are included in the present plans for the Plant X location. The second unit, a 100,000 kilowatt machine, is scheduled to be in operation in mid-1953.

The new 50,000 kilowatt machine will be the largest single unit installed on the Southwestern Public Service Company system. It will be, that is, until it is followed a year later by Plant X's second unit, the 100,000 kilowatt generator. When the two ma-

chines are both on the line, Plant X will be the largest single power plant on the integrated system, and its capacity alone will be greater than was the entire system capacity in 1943.

The new generator, manufactured by the General Electric Company at the Schenectady works, was shipped to Amherst, the nearest rail point to the power plant site. Because of its huge size, the turbo-generator was shipped "broken down."

The entire unit weighs 257,000 pounds, with the largest single piece weighing 199,000 pounds. When the machine is installed, it will be 53 feet in overall length, 14 feet wide and 15 feet high.

Plant X will be the Southwestern Public Service Company's 11th base-load power plant. It will be tied into the integrated

system by a 115,000 volt line, with the connections at the Tuco plant, near Abernathy, and the Clovis, New Mexico plant.

The system generating capacity will be more than 400,000 kilowatts when the first Plant X unit goes on the line. The entire system capacity in 1943 was 112,000 kilowatts.

The plant is located close to the geographic load center for Southwestern's 45,000 square mile service area. The load growth in the Plains division has been one of the largest in the entire system, another factor contributing to the plant's location.

Material delays have moved the completion date for the plant back one month, but it is anticipated that it will be in operation before peak loads are on the line next summer.

3-Row Legume Spreaders Are Available Now

Despite the fact that we are still having hot dry weather farmers should be making plans to plant winter legumes on their cotton and milo acreage.

The Running Water Soil Conservation District has recently purchased two 3-row legume seeders that can be used in any field of cotton and milo that cotton can be drawn through without damaging the crop. These two legume seeders are at the Barber Eubanks farm seven miles southeast of Dimmitt. A nominal fee will be charged for the use of these seeders, however Mr. Eubanks did not know at the present just what the fee per acre would be.

These seeders will plant any of the legumes such as Austrian Winter Peas, vetch, and clovers and any other that the farmer might want to try.

Recommended rates of seed per acre with these drills are as follows: 20 lbs. of Austrian Winter Peas, 12 to 15 lbs. of vetch, 2 to 5 lbs. of clovers.

All farmers planning on the planting of legumes this year are reminded that the P. M. A. makes a partial payment on the purchase price of legumes planted. Also all legumes planted should be inoculated with the proper inoculant.

To maintain the soil structure and fertility of our land legumes will have to be used. Make plans to maintain your soil now instead of having to rebuild it in a few years.

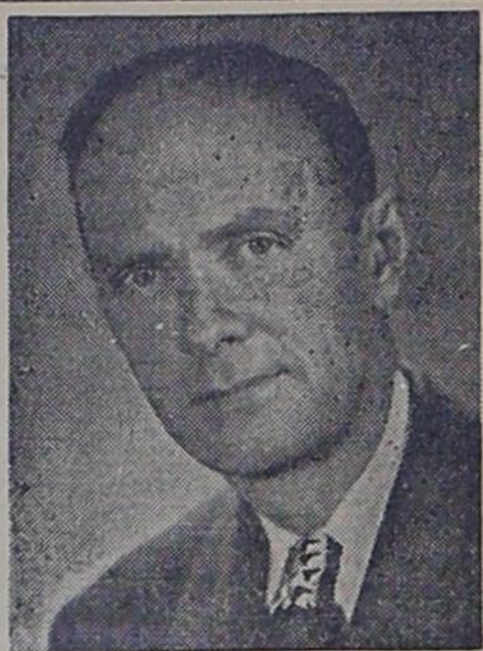

WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

FAITH OF OUR FATHERS: Mrs. Rogers and I took the four oldest children to the Carter Barron Memorial Amphitheater here in Washington the other night to see the play "Faith of Our Fathers." The amphitheater is a

beautiful open-air theater in Rock Creek Park that reminded me in many respects of the Red Rock Theater near Denver, Colorado. Of course, it can't compare with the Red Rock Theater from a natural standpoint. However it is

beautiful and the trees that form the backdrop on the stage could never be matched by man-made objects for beauty. The play portrays vividly the early events in our history, both pre-revolutionary days and post-revolutionary days. I wish that every man, woman and child in the United States could see it because it so clearly awakens one to the tremendous trials and tribulations that confronted the great patriots, the founders of this nation. Certainly faith in God and country was the moving force that carried these patriots forward, and without it, I wonder where we would be today. It behooves all of us to rededicate ourselves and to resubscribe to the deep and abiding faith displayed by George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Patrick Henry, and all of the first citizens of the United States of America, a nation that has grown from scattered bands of rebels, solidly united in faith and purpose, to the greatest nation in the history of mankind.

THE KANSAS AND MISSOURI FLOODS: The Army prepared a motion picture of the devastation in the flooded areas of Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma, and named the picture "The Great Flood of 1951." I had the opportunity of viewing this picture the other evening, and the damage wrought is inconceivable. It proves beyond doubt that there is no greater force than nature on a rampage. The destruction extended into every phase of American life in those communities—churches with four and five feet of striking mud, homes swept away or so badly damaged that they had to be condemned for human habitation, brick buildings crushed like egg shells, steel railroad bridges crushed away as if they were match sticks; tank

cars, boxcars and locomotives bowled over and swept away like tenpins, highways ripped apart, great slabs of concrete and steel tossed about as a wind would blow playing cards, section after section of farm lands covered in several feet of sand, gravel and silt, complete orchards covered with mud and silt to the extent that only the tops of the once productive fruit trees appear on the surface as sage brush, cattle, hogs, and other livestock drowned by the hundreds. People, thousands in number, were made homeless; great stocks of food were so damaged that they spoiled and rotted; sewer systems were clogged up and the danger of disease and epidemics was ever present. This devastation and the hardships occasioned by it will be felt for a long time in the economy of this nation.

THE LAW AND YOU

By Robert (Bob) Kirk

DO YOU KNOW what regulations the last session of the legislature made in regard to notices used by collection agencies?

Because certain collection agencies, and others in the collection business, have used forms which simulated court or legal forms, that is looked like official forms, in an effort to collect claims and frighten persons into paying indebtednesses, the Legislature at its last session passed a bill regulating the use of such simulated legal process.

The act passed by the Legislature made it unlawful "for any person, firm or corporation, to send or deliver, or cause to be sent or delivered any letter, paper, document, notice of intent to bring suit, or other notice or demand, which simulates a form of court or legal process, with the intent to lead the recipient or sendee to believe the same to be genuine, for the purpose of obtaining any money or thing of value whatsoever. The sending of such simulated documents shall be prima facie evidence of such intent, and it shall be no defense to show that the document bears any statement to the contrary, nor shall it be a defense to show that the money or thing of value sought to be obtained was to ap-

Prosecution for violation of this act may be had in the county where the simulated process was deposited in the mail, or the county where the same was received.

Any person or corporation violating this act shall be punished for the first offense by a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00, for the second and subsequent offenses not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$500.00.

A companion bill also makes it a violation of the law for any person or corporation to print or

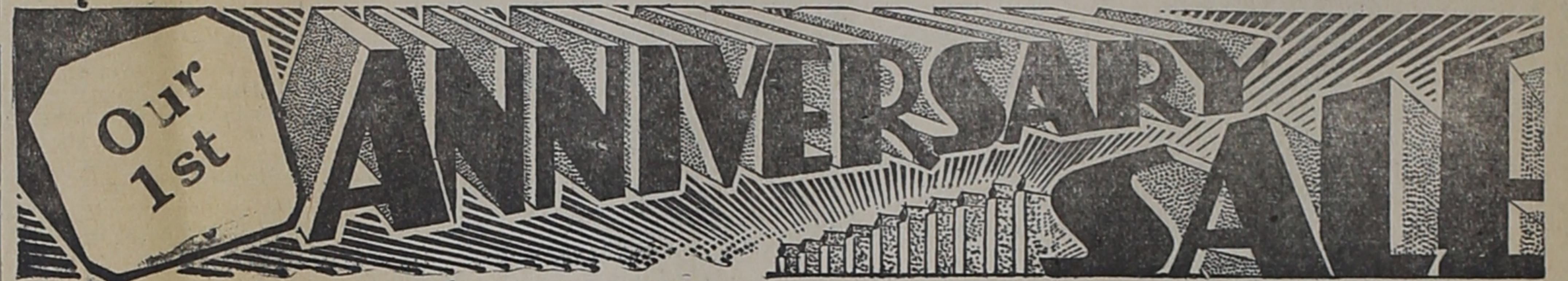

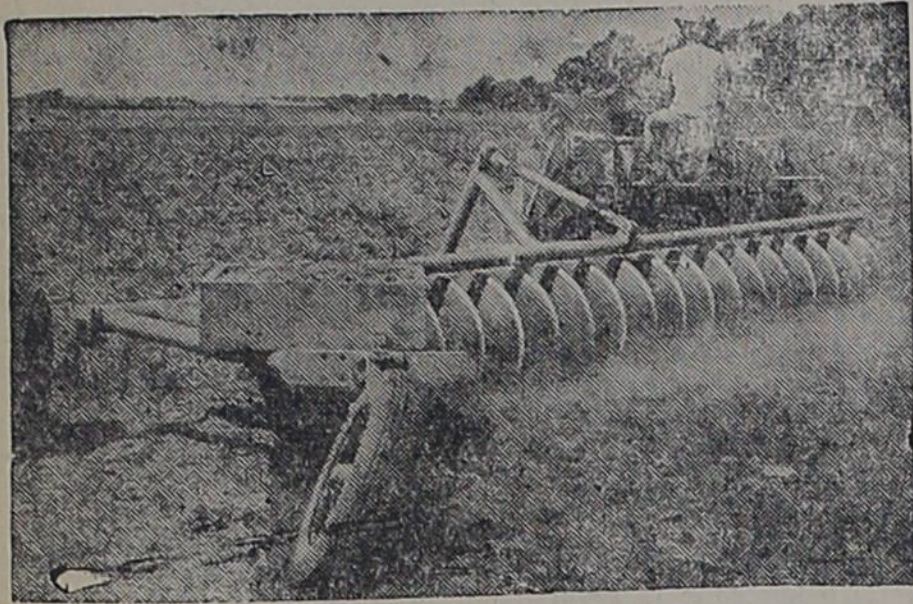

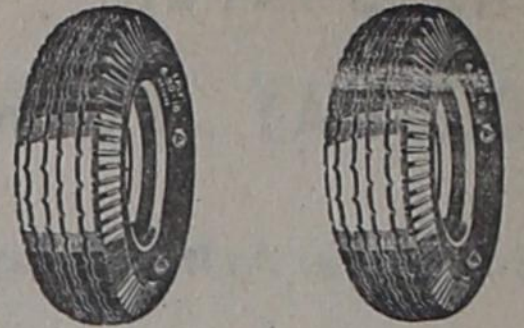

County Agent Urges Farmers To Plant Legumes

"Wheat planting time is right at hand and all wheat farmers should make a special effort to treat their wheat seed for smut and against the false vine worm," County Agent Edd McLeroy said Wednesday.

Ceresan or other approved materials should be used in treating for smut and 4 to 8 ozs. of Lindane per 100 lb. of seed for the false vine worm.

"The false vine worm and the white grub damaged the stands of hundreds of acres of wheat here on the plains this past year," he said, "and every precaution to control them should be used."
Westar, Wichita, Commanche, Triumph and Tenmarq are the leading hard wheat varieties grown in Texas and from all indication the most of the wheat seen in Castro County this fall will be one of the best in past years the County Agent said.
Mr. Kenneth Porter of the Ama-

rico Experiment Station will be carrying on a number of experiments on green bug control this fall and winter and farmers of this county are urged to drop by the station later in the season and see what is being done in regard to green bug control.
