 The school board would not release any figures on the proposed remodeling, but Supperintendent Paul Hilburn said "there would be plenty with a little contingency fund left over". The school board had been disappointed at the bids received and had waited until this week to see if there was enough money to go ahead. Estimated building time by the contractor is 485 days.



Older Workers Eligible Hill Urges Farmers For Social Security **To Make Designation** Benefits Under New Law Of Diverted Acreage




security law has made additional older workers in the Panhandle eligible for benefits, said Hal Gel-don, District Manager of the Ama-rillo Social Security Office. This change, he said, reduces the amount of time a person needs to work to qualify for benefits. To illustrate, Geldon pointed out that men reaching 65 or women reaching 62 in 1962 need only 24, years of social security work. Those who are older may need as little as 1½ years of work under social security to qualify for pay-ments.

ments. This change in the law also affects those who have been turned down before because they didn't have enough work to qualify at the time they applied. These workers should write to their social security office right away, Geldon said. The Amarillo Social Security Office is located at 1006 Adams Street.

Do you know your President? John Fitzgerald Kennedy was born on May 29, 1917 in Brookline, Massachusetts. He was the second child and second son of the nine children of Joseph Patrick and Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy. President Kennedy is a descen-dent of Lrish immigrants who fied their homeland because of the di-sasterous potato famine of 1840. John Kennedy, or "Jack" as his family calls him, grew up in Brook line, and later in Riverdale and Bronxville, N. Y. Even though Joseph Kennedy was a millionaire, he gave his children limited allowances. and the children of ten tailed po-litics with their parents. Jack Kennedy attended elemen-tary school in Brookline and Ri-verdale. At thirteen years of age, his father sent him to the Canter-bury School in New Milford, Con-

In 1935, Kennedy enrolled at Princeton University, However, he was forced to enroll a few weeks late because of an attack of jaun-dice which again forced him to drop out of school after the Christ-mas vacation.
In 1936 he entered Harvard and majored in government and inter-national relations. During his sen-ior year, he wrote an honors thesis in which he tried to explain why Great Britain had not prepared for war with Nazi Germany. His The-sis was published under the title "Why England Slept," and became a best seller in the United States and Great Britain.
Kennedy graduated from Har-vard in 1940 and entered Stanford University graduate business school instead. He dropped out six months later, took a trip through South America and then he came home and enlisted as a seaman in the U. S. Navy.
Kennedy was stationed in Wash-futor to perate the small craft and was commissioned as an en-ing.

learning to operate the small crait and was commissioned as an en-sign. His P. T. boat was assigned to patrol duty off the Solomon Is-lands in the South Pacific. One night in August, 1943, a Japanese destroyer cut his boat in two and killed two crew members. Kennedy and the other eleven men clung all night to the wreckage of the boat. The next morning Kennedy ordered his men to swim to a near-by island, and disregarding an in-jured back, he spent five hours towing one of the disabled crew-men to shore. He spent most of the next four days in the water, searching for help. On the fifth day, he and another crew member swam to Nauru Island. Here he persuaded friendly natives to go for help to a nearby island where Americans were stationed. For his heroism and leadership, Kennedy won the Navy and Marine Corps Medal in addition to the purple heart. In December 1943, the navy re-



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


