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## JEFFERSON ON THE PRESS.

"To your request of my opinion of the manner in which a newspaper should be conducted, so as to be most useful, I should answer, by restraining to true facts and sound principles only," wrote Thomas Jefferson. But he thought little of the papers of his time. "A man who never looks into a newspaper is better informed than he who reads them; inasmuch as he who knows nothing is nearer to truth than he whose mind is filled with falsehoods and errors."

This is sharp criticism. Perhaps it was deserved. Certainly the press of the time was hard enough on Thomas Jefferson, and careless enough in presenting facts to make him believe the criticism just. Nevertheless, there is no suggestion in his writings that freedom of the press be abandoned. Thus:

"No experiment can be more interesting than that we are now trying, and which we trust will end in establishing the fact that man may be governed by reason and truth. Our first object should therefore be, to leave open to him all the avenues of truth. The most effectual hitherto found is the freedom of the press. It is, therefore, the first shut up by those who fear the investigation of their actions. The firmness with which the people have withstood the late abuses of the press, the discernment they have manifested between truth and falsehood, show that they may safely be trusted to hear everything true and false, and to form a correct judgment between them. As little is it necessary to impose on their senses, or dazzle their minds by pomp, splendor, or forms. Instead of this artificial, how much surer is that real respect, which results from the use of their reason, and the habit of bringing everything to the test of common sense."

Americans may well ask themselves whether they justify this faith.

## WAKING UP.

A remarkable thing is happening. Businessmen, here and there, have decided that they don't know everything about economics. Instead of devoting all of their energy to producing and selling goods and making out government reports, they are going to spend time studying the system itself under which goods are made and sold. They know the system has got to be improved. With its able manager, Leonard E. Reed, acting as spark plug, the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce is leading this movement. If businessmen generally realized its importance it could become of nation-wide significance.

The United States Chamber of Commerce, with Eric Johnston as its president, is looking for the beam in the eye of business. Industrial statesmen are multiplying. Many will be startled when they hear chamber of commerce members talk about "chamber of commerce socialism." But the talk is a fact. Too many businessmen who cry socialism actually promote it. They want free enterprise for themselves but clamor for government handouts to promote socialism in transportation, electric power, government credit, etc.

The best thing about these discussions is that labor leaders, ministers, teachers, public officials are invited to attend. At Olympia, Wash., last summer such a group met for luncheon every day for three weeks. Businessmen were told what the faults of free enterprise were and what they must do to cure them.

These lectures expose the folly of businessmen throwing other businessmen to the socialistic wolves; they show that wealth is becoming more diffused, rather than concentrated; that capital and labor are, in fact, partners, not foes.

Respecting the outcry against vested interests, and human rights before property rights, they show that a man's right to change jobs is vested; that property has no rights, but only human beings have rights in property whether it is a movie ticket or a contract to buy a home.

They show that production of new wealth in greater quantity, better quality and lower price cures most economic and social ills. As the cost of living goes down, the standard of living goes up. Rather than strike for shorter hours, workers should agitate for more efficient production. Everybody should oppose taxes, monopoly, featherbedding and government competition which throttle production and raise prices.

If every businessman, stockholder and worker would do what they are doing in Los Angeles, Olympia and elsewhere we could look forward to better feeling and better times in postwar America.

There are seemingly thousands of citizens "joining up" not for patriotic military service, but for greed and graft. A large part of these same people are also sizable taxpayers. Prior to the days of radio, public speaking politicians could (and did) talk one way on political issues in one place and in one industry, and in other places to other industries, differently, trying to convince them all they could all be receivers in "subsidy" collections.

We once had the idea that this was hypocrisy on the part of the politicians, and that with current means of dissemination of news, it would cease. The attitude of many toward government, all getting "with seemingly no recognition that there must be paying, indicates a tremendous insurance on part of voters, or an erroneous idea that more can get

than are forced to pay. We don't understand it, but think taxpayers should arise and demand economies. F. G. SWANSON.

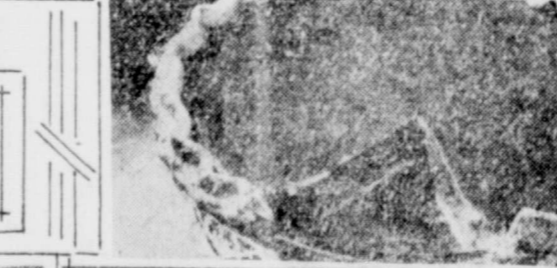

HERE'S A DELICIOUS SQUASH PIE that makes minimum demands on your time, for it's made of point-free quick-frozen squash, which comes from its carton all cooked and pureed, ready to mix into a toothsome filling for pies and tarts. To make one 9-inch pie, thaw a 16-ounce package of quick-frozen squash and combine with the following ingredients in the order given: 1/2 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed, 1/4 cup granulated sugar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 cup milk, 2 teaspoons melted butter. Strain and pour into a 9-inch pie plate lined with pastry. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 20 minutes; then decrease heat to moderate (350° F.) and make 20 minutes longer.

O. C. BARNHILL WRITES FROM ITALY

Staff Sgt. O. C. Barnhill, 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. O. Barnhill, Cisco, writes his mother an interesting letter from Italy. The letter was dated March 27.

Among other things the young man said he had completed his 19th successful flying mission and would be glad when he had 50

combat missions to his credit and could come home for a visit. He explained that trips over enemy targets are not as dangerous as generally thought, since a very large percentage of flyers bail out when such is necessary and usually make safe landings. Some become prisoners of war, of course, but many eventually make their way back to the home base. Continuing, he said:

"That which makes us sweat most is the flak, exploding shells shot at us from the ground—big, black puffs of smoke; some white, some pink. When they explode they throw out shrapnel. When

we drop our bombs, we head for home.

"I was sorry to hear of the Cleveland boy getting killed. Loy flying is very dangerous. Express my sympathy to his parents.

"I heard a wonderful sermon Sunday. It was delivered by our chaplain and made a fine impression on the fellows.

"I met a Cisco boy named Parks Bailey recently, who is now located at this base. He is a fine fellow and I think is a cousin of Whistler Bailey.

"Don't worry. Should I be reported as missing in action, chances are large that I am still alive and well. Keep your chin

up and, if God be with me, I'll be home for a big Christmas dinner. Your loving son."

A later letter from Barnhill briefly described a combat incident which might have proved fatal to the Ciscoan, but he fortunately came through safely.

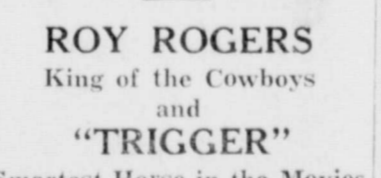
