# NAZI BUTCHERS SPREAD DEATH

## REUNION AT HEYSER HOME NEAR PUTNAM

The ranch home of Mrs. John Heyser near Putnam was the scene of a happy family reunion Sunday, when some 18 relatives assembled to spend the day with the aged hostess, who has passed her 80th birthday and has resided in that area since childhood. She is the mother of Virgil Heyser of Cisco and her father was the first county judge of Callahan county. Before her marriage at the age of 15 she was Miss Sicily Tanner. She was left an orphan when 12 years of age.

Among those present was J. W. Tanner of Winters, a brother, who is some older than Mrs. Heyser. Outstanding ranch and cattlemen of Runnels county. He is especially distinguished as a patriotic citizen in that some time ago he received a letter from Henry Morgenthau, secretary of the treasury, stating two large bombing planes now carry the name "J. W. Tanner" because of his unusual generosity in the purchase of war bonds. Two sisters, Mrs. J. E. Gilliland of Baird and Mrs. Martha Conlee of Winters, were also present.

## BUCKLEY OF DESDEMONA IS LEARNING HOW

The following interesting facts concerning a Desdemona 4-H club member were furnished the Daily Press by Floyd Lynch, county agent:

Jerry Buckley, Desdemona 4-H club member, started in the registered Duroc business in January, 1943, with one gilt, for which he had paid \$15. August 5 this gilt farrowed eight pigs. Buckley has sold two boar pigs for \$52.50 and has three bred gilts and three barrows which he is feeding out. He plans to feed the barrows until they weigh 300 pounds each. At the present price they will then bring \$120. Buckley is using milk in addition to a balanced protein supplement. His grain consists of corn, barley and maize, all grown on his father's farm.

## CANNING DEMONSTRATION AT LAGUNA, MAY 5

Recipes and instructions on food preservation to offset possible home-front shortages due to the war's crucial year will be given by Miss Mary Sue Herndon, home economist, Lone Star Gas company, at a canning demonstration to be held at 2:30 p. m. Friday, May 5, on the Laguna Hotel roof, according to C. M. Nevill, district manager for the gas company.

Lone Star's entirely new and complete canning booklet is just off the press and those attending the demonstration will be among the first to receive free copies. Mr. Nevill said. The booklet contains 39 pages of canning instructions and recipes, charts and illustrations.

Sponsored by the Rural Home Demonstration clubs the canning demonstration is open to the public, no fees will be charged and advance registration is not required. By actual demonstration, Miss Herndon will show the pressure cooker, open kettle and water bath methods of canning. She will can fruits and vegetables and explain the correct methods of putting up meats, preserves, jellies, jams, butters, pickles, relishes and juices.

The pressure cooker method will be stressed as the most desirable for canning meats and non-acid vegetables, because it is the nearest approach to the method of commercial canners. She will use recipes calling for minimum sugar and those eliminating sugar. Miss Herndon will explain the different types of jar lids and show how to use them. "Our government has asked us to fill pantry shelves with home-canned goods," Miss Herndon said. "During this crucial year of the war, we must make every ounce of food count for victory. It has been estimated that two out of every ten acres of food produced are wasted somewhere down the line from harvesting to eating in the home. This is a tragic waste of vital war material which can be minimized by canning and preserving as much fresh and perishable food as possible," the trained home economist stated.

## FINE RAINS SOAKED CISCO COUNTRY

This city and the Cisco Country in general seems to have had plenty of rain for some time. Farmers and ranchmen are said to be feeling good about it, since practically all tanks and water holes of this area are thought to contain more water than for more than a year.

According to the official gauge at city hall the rain of Saturday morning measured one and three-tenths inches, while that of Monday totaled one and eight-tenths inches. Very little wind accompanied the rains, but the downpour of yesterday literally drowned out some telephone cables, with the result that numerous phone lines in Cisco are still out of commission, including that of the Daily Press.

## EDGAR ALTON CANDIDATE FOR DIST. CLERK

E. F. (Edgar) Alton today authorized the Daily Press to announce his candidacy for the office of district clerk, subject to the action of the Democratic voters at the July primaries. Mr. Alton, well known in Cisco and over the county, is qualified for the position he seeks. He has taught in the schools of the county and for the past seven years has been employed in the office of tax assessor-collector, where he is now serving as chief clerk.

The candidate is 48 years of age and has been a resident of the county for 39 years. He married Miss Ada Poe, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Poe of Cisco and they are the parents of two children. The son, Garner Alton, is in the army, and the daughter is Mrs. Donald Tow, whose husband is a member of the Marines and serving in the southwest Pacific. Mr. Alton said he would make a formal statement to the public at an early date.

Classes will be held June 19 to June 30, Monday through Friday of each week, from 4 to 6 p. m. First meeting will be held Saturday afternoon, June 17, for the purpose of registering pupils. A picnic supper will be enjoyed at this Saturday meeting. The Sunday school departments that will be included in the school will be the Beginners, the Primary, the Junior and the Intermediate departments.

The school will be open to all children of the city within these age groups. Mrs. J. R. Wright was selected as dean of the school for this summer.

**BREST-LITOVSK HIT.** MOSCOW, May 2.—Red Air Force bombers hit Brest Litovsk, five-way railway junction on the invasion route to Warsaw, 115 miles farther west, Sunday night in the latest of a series of raids softening up the central front for an anticipated Soviet offensive. Seventeen fires, four of them particularly large, were started at the strategic junction and a number of military trains loaded with troops, ammunition and other war supplies wrecked.

## TEXAS DELEGATES LIKELY BE LEFT FREE

FT. WORTH, May 2.—There seems to be a growing sentiment, both among pro-Roosevelt and anti-Roosevelt Democrats in Texas, in favor of sending a free and unincorporated delegation from this state to the national party convention in Chicago in June.

The machinery for nominating a candidate for president starts this Saturday at the precinct conventions held in the community voting places. Delegates named there will in turn attend a county convention the following Tuesday, and then the county delegation will attend the state convention in Austin May 23. The majority sentiment from the precincts will extend through the county and state to the national convention.

Charles E. Simons, executive secretary of the State Democratic committee at Austin, has come out for unincorporated delegations.

## FRANK YARGER AND OTHER AIR MEN GIVE AID

STROTHER FIELD, Kas., May 2.—"You can never tell what your enemy is going to be." That is the way Frank Yarger of Cisco, Tex., aviation student here, puts it.

Yarger was one of the soldiers from the air crew training detachment who responded to an urgent call for help Sunday from the neighboring towns of Arkansas City and Winfield, when flood waters invaded their confines and claimed seven lives.

Evacuating marooned people and their belongings and removing food stocks to safety, as well as "topping" weakened dikes, kept the men busy. City officials of Arkansas City credit Strother Field air crew with saving the dikes.

## CHARGED THAT ENTIRE VILLAGES IN FRANCE HAVE BEEN WIPED OUT LIKE AT LADICE

LONDON, May 2.—Germany, in an 11th-hour attempt to prevent any revolt timed to coincide with an Allied invasion, was reported today virtually to have quarantined 3,000,000 foreign workers in the Reich and begun an unparalleled reign of terror in France.

Dispatches from neutral countries said the German government had prohibited foreign workers, most of them already little more than slaves, to travel on railways without special permission, which would be granted "only if the journey were absolutely necessary."

Pierre Vioent, ambassador of the French National Committee to London, charged in an interview that the Germans were carrying out mass murders in France in a futile effort to stamp out growing patriot resistance on the eve of the opening of a Western Front.

More than 100,000 of the Vichy French militia were cooperating with the Gestapo and German military in the ruthless campaign of extermination, centering mainly in Northern France opposite England, Vioent said.

Whole villages were being wiped out in the manner of Lidice, he asserted. In one town, he said, a movie theater was set afire and all inside perished.

Nevertheless, sabotage was continuing to increase in France, he said. In March, 58 trains were derailed and 96 locomotives wrecked in one district alone. Some 500 Maquis, or members of the underground, resisted 5000 Germans for 11 days in one village and killed 700 of them.

Radio Brazzaville, official French station in Africa, said that Vichy admitted that the Germans had executed 43,000 French hostages, exclusive of patriots and members of the underground, since 1940.

LONDON.—American Liberators bombed German installations in northern France at midday today carrying the great pre-invasion air offensive into its 18th consecutive day after 1,000 or more heavy bombers assaulted enemy targets by night in France, Belgium, Italy and Germany.

Up to 750 heavy British and Canadian bombers flew from England through a cloudless night against the rail targets on which the enemy must depend to meet invasion, the British Air Ministry announced. The others rose from Italian bases.

About 400 American planes were estimated authoritatively to have made today's attack, half of them Liberators and half Thunderbolt and Mustang fighters.

Formations of Allied medium bombers and fighters crossed and recrossed the channel skies in the early afternoon, after the Liberators had returned from their mission. The Liberators encountered no German fighters and an unusually small amount of flak.

WASHINGTON.—The navy announced today that US submarines operating in the Pacific have sunk one Japanese cruiser, two destroyers and nine supply and cargo vessels.

In addition to the warships the vessels destroyed were one large tanker, one large naval auxiliary, two cargo transports and five cargo vessels.

CEYLON.—Allied airborne troops have decisively defeated a strong Japanese attempt to break a rail and road block 65 miles southwest of Mogaung in northern Burma after a three-day battle in which heavy casualties were inflicted upon an attacking enemy force of 2,000 men.

It was the fourth Japanese attempt to wipe out the road block, established on the enemy's main supply route from southern Burma to the Mogaung Valley front, where Lieutenant General Stilwell's Chinese-American forces are fighting their way toward Mogaung and Myitkyina.

## PATROL FIGHTS IN ITALY ARE WARMING UP

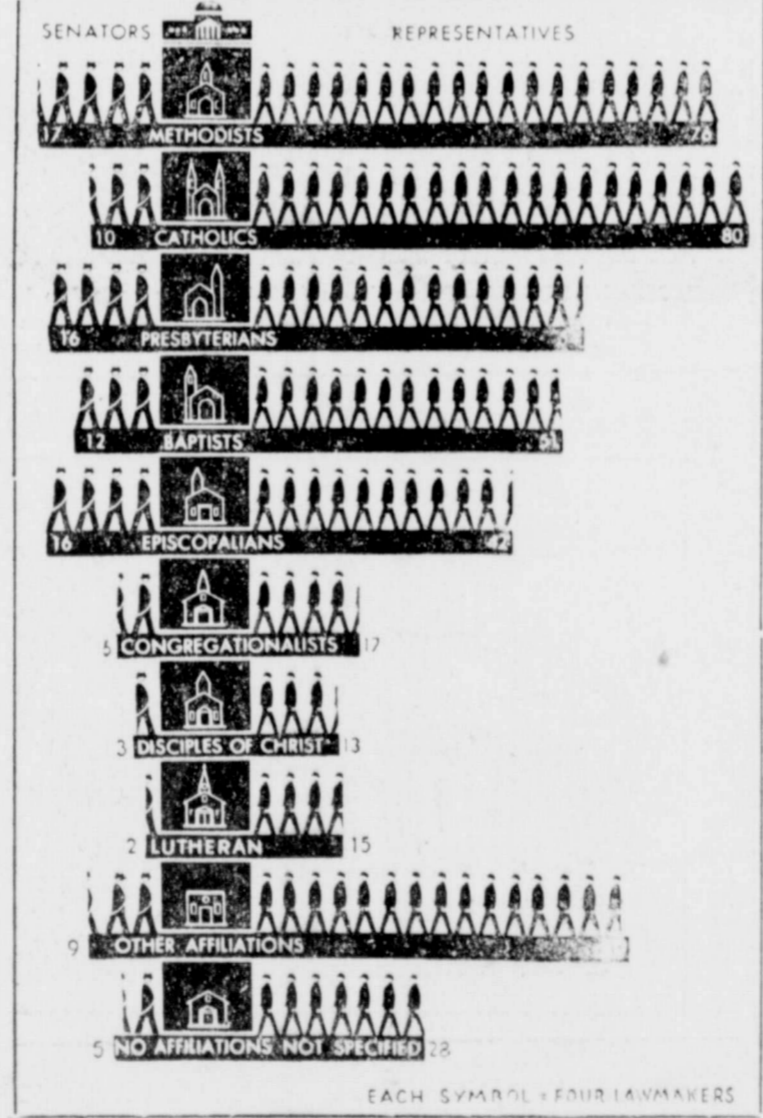
NAPLES, May 2.—Fierce patrol fighting broke out all along the main battlefield today, while Allied bombers maintained their day and night offensive against

enemy supply ports and rail lines in central and northern Italy.

German skirmishers cut into the 5th Army forward positions on the Anzio beachhead three miles southwest of Aprilia, and forced a slight Allied withdrawal, while Allied combat patrols were attacking the right flank of the beachhead.

One 5th Army unit launched an attack on Cerreto Alto with undisclosed results, and another raiding party probed the German lines two miles west of Littoria, withdrawing without casualties after a brief fight.

TEXAS VERSATILITY.

Texas has struck it rich again! After years of hopeful experiments and bitter disappointments, flax has come into its own as one of the major crops of the state, with yields this year averaging 20 bushels to the acre.

In 1933 only about 500 acres in the entire state were planted in flax, mostly scattered among small farms. By the next year, about 20,000 acres were harvested, but the yield was low—10 to 12 bushels per acre. Since then, due to the efforts of E. S. McFadden of Texas agricultural experiment station at College Station, in determining the proper type of flax to be grown and improving planting and harvesting methods, the state's average has been greatly increased. Many large farms are now devoted exclusively to flax.

In April, amid great rejoicing among the harried farmers, the first units of the Harvest Brigade rolled into the area around Kenedy, Texas. The first reeve to be cut was that of Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Turner. (See picture on page 1). On hand to witness the start of this great campaign were three of the largest flax operators in the state—J. J. Pogue, J. C. McCann, and G. E. Grady, who have between them 6,500 acres of flax.

The amazing popularity of flax among Texas farmers was revealed this year when the Massey-Harris Company of Racine, Wis., was surviving the ground in preparation for the arrival of the Self-Propelled Harvest Brigade to assist in the harvesting of small farms. The once great spinach fields around Crystal City, which had been abandoned because of the inability to cope with weeds, had become vast flax fields. Other farmers who formerly struggled to eke out a living with an uncertain cotton crop had turned to a sure money-maker—flax.

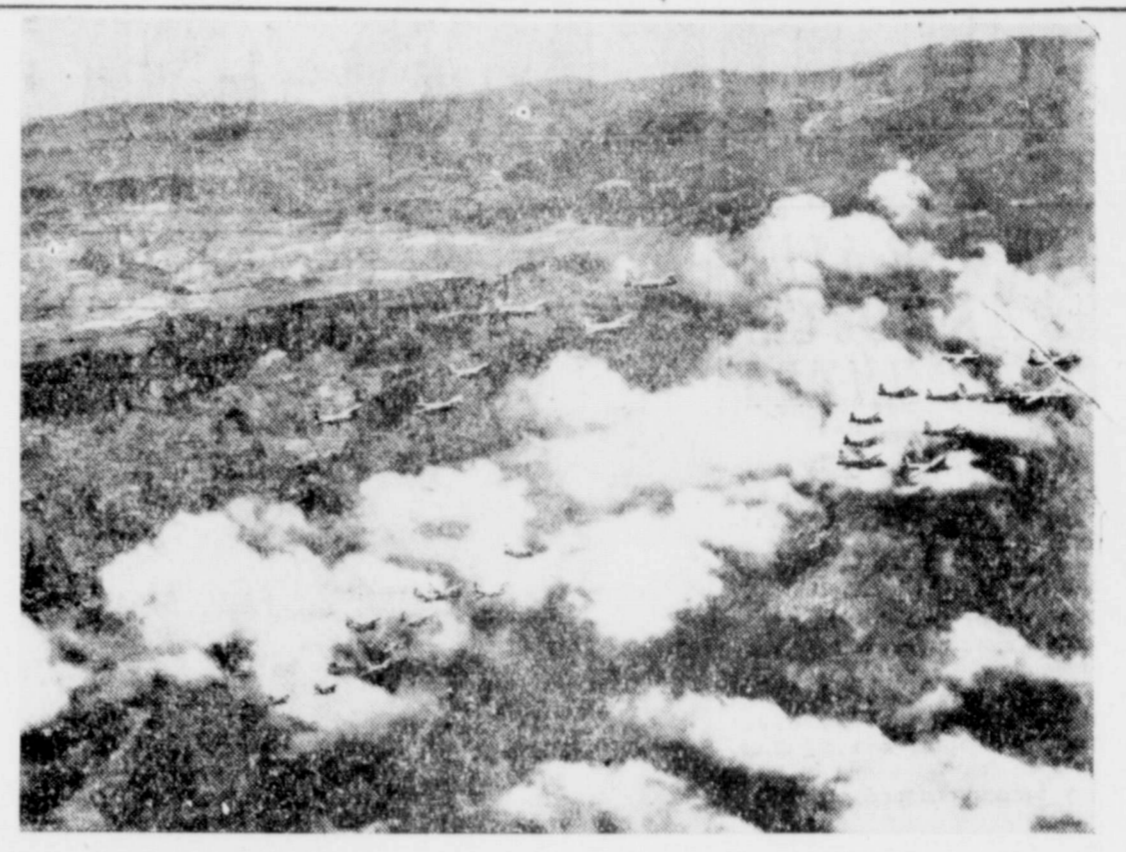

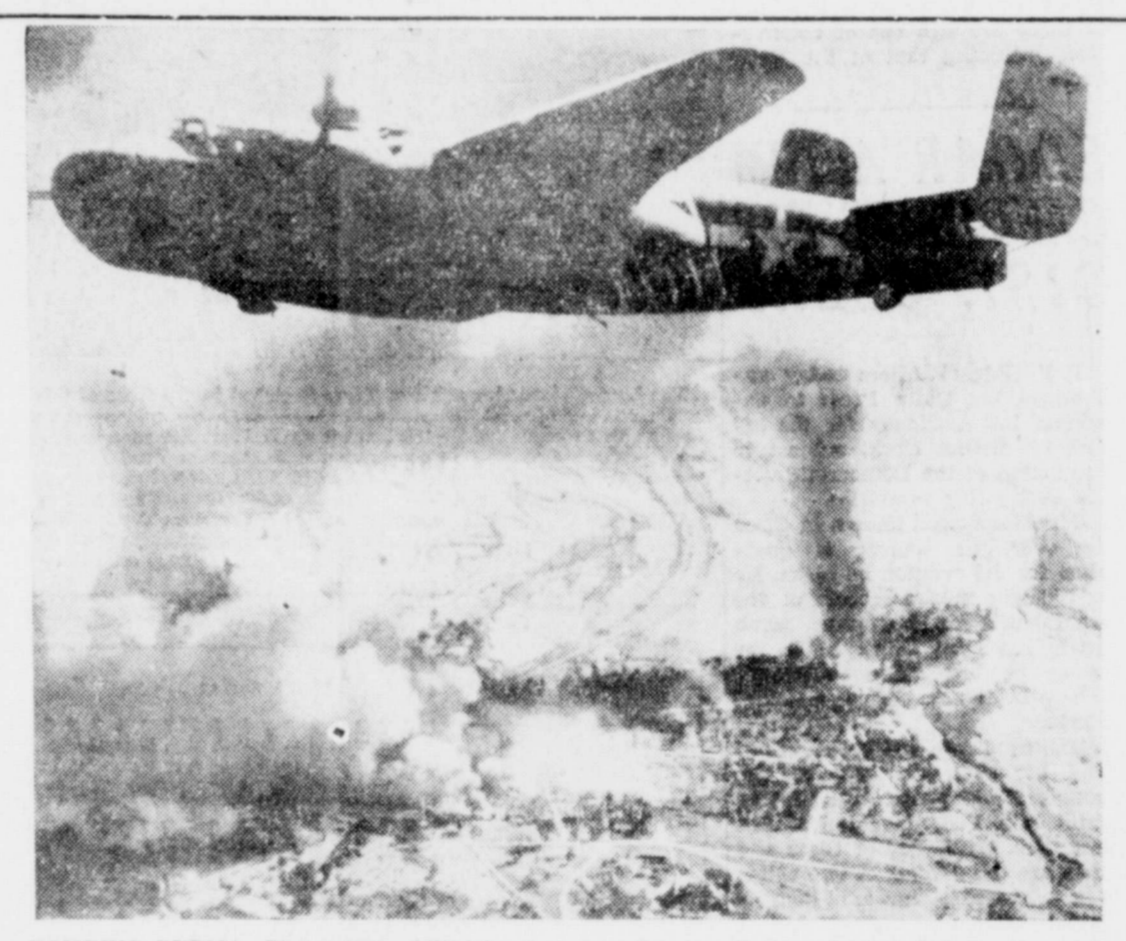
