A FEW BAIRD RESIDENTS stand to have to begin hauling their cwn trash in a very few weeks -- unless they decide to cooperate with a request from city officials.

Those few who continue to use barrels instead of regulation covered trash cans are, city officials tell us, costing the City of Baird about \$300 a month which could be saved.

Having to pick up the big barrels requires an extra employe on the trash truck, which could be eliminated if everyone used the 20 to 32 gallon cans specified.

It is to save this \$300 a month that the city has decreed that after Aug. 15 trash will be collected only from 20 to 32 gallon cans. Refuse placed in barrels will be left where it is by city crews.

But if those who persist in using barrels will stop to think that to collect their trash would cost the city \$300 a month more than it should, plus the fact that uncovered cans are breeding places for flies, perhaps they will join the rest of us in going along with the city's re-

WHILE THE NEXT election is still a relatively long way off, political question marks are already beginning to arise over some key spots which will be up for grabs in Texas.

Biggest political plums, of course, will be the state's governorship and the senatorial seat now held by John Tower.

And key to the situation is Gov. John Connally. It is no secret that both Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and Attorney General Waggoner Carr would like to be governor, but if Connally elects to try for another term in the state capitol, it is unlikely that, either would run against him.

If, however, Connally decides to run against Tower, then it would seem almost certain Carr and Smith would both run for governor.

Connally is playing it safe by giving no indication of which way he leans. We think that, despite his wife's objections, he will wind up in the race for U. S. Senator.

CALLAHAN JAILBREAKERS

The search for two men who escaped from the Callahan County jail last Wednesday has turned up few clues during the past week, but it did have a lighter moment early this week.

Deputy Sheriff N. L. Long received a picture post card this week which, across one side, boldly declares "Greetings from the Ozarks" and carries a mountain scene.

On the reverse side it carries the names Ray Waters and Tom Murry -- for Weldon Ray Waters, 23, and Thomas Wesley Murry, 45, the pair who escaped.

But officers didn't exactly rush off to search the Ozarks for the two. To make the card's authenticity even more suspect, the postmark is unreadable, making it impossible to tell where it was mailed.

Waters and Murry broke out of the Callahan County jail shortly after 8 p. m. last Wednesday and eluded road blocks which were quicky thrown up in the area.

Waters received a 35-year prison term and Murry a 40year term in district court at Baird recently on charges of possession of illegal durgs.

They were arrested April 14 on Interstate 20 in Callahan County near the Taylor County line by highway patrolmen. Narcotics fould in their car had an estimated worth of \$15,000 on the underworld market.

During the men's trials, stringent security measures were taken to prevent an escape attempt. Before their trials, they had been held in the Taylor County jail, and had been placed in separate cells when officers got wind of an escape plan.




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
