#### WAVES OF ALLIED PARACHUT-ISTS AND MILES OF GLIDER TROOPS LAND ON FRENCH SOIL

LONDON, June 7 .- Five great waves of aerial troop carriers, including a sky-train 50 miles long, poured reinforcenight, and the invasion forces were reported pushing inland today against increasingly fierce German resistance.

Another fleet of tow planes and gliders ferried additional equipment to the Cherbourg peninsula. From the night and day operations 12 gliders and 12 C-47 transport planes

American, British and Canadian assault forces firmly held pockets of undisclosed size and location along a 60-mile stretch of the northwest coast of France between Cherbourg and the Seine, and were tightening their grip on them and expanding them in heavy fighting.

A spokesman at Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's headquarters said the fighting was very heavy in some sectors of the Normandy invasion zone, and Berlin claimed that the German reserves had massed around the Allied lines during the night and now were attracking with "terrific ferocity."

Communique No. 3 of Allied Supreme Headquarters anounced that "satisfactory progress has been made" and renforcements were moving steadily into the first Allied pockets carved out of the Nazi Atlantic wall, which was penerated in the first few hours of the invasion.

For good reasons the Allies were not telling anyone much about the invasion. If they did, it would be a godsend to the infantrymen who landed with invasion force on Wakde Island. > There still was no specific word fixing the extent of the Allied successes beyond Prime Minister Winston Churchill's word yesterday that fighting was going on in the town of Caen. 91/2 miles inland.

> British tanks and infantry were revealed to have taken a 25-mile stretch of the Normandy coast and pushed inland nearly 31/2 miles to cut a coast road vital to the Nazis move-

> Berlin acknowledged that the Allies had established one beachhead-possibly the one credited to the British armor troops-from Caen, 28 miles southwest of Le Havre, to Bayeux, 22 miles to the northwest.

> The German Transocean Agency said the Allies had occupied a circular area between Valognes and Carentan, on the eastern side of the Cherbourg peninsula, and opened a corridor to the coast. The forces holding the pocket were reinforced by sea and air. Transocean said, but claimed German forces were counter-attacking from three sides and narrowing the pocket.

American Thunderbolt pilots returning from flights over the invasion zone said they saw Allied tanks rolling into the outskirts of one town, which was in flames.

NAPLES.-Allied 5th Army columns drove more than 10 miles north and 12 miles west of Rome today, beating down disorganized Nazi rear guards in their path, and Gen. Alexander confidently declared that the strength of the German armies in central Italy has been broken.

British and American armored forces raced northward along highway 2 toward Lake Bracciano 15 miles above Rome, while infantry units swung out to the west over the Aurelian Way to within sight of the Tyrrhenian Sea, almost 15 miles north of the Tiber estuary.

#### INDUSTRIAL HUMILITY.

"We can be perfectly sure that everything we are doing is wrong," says the head of an electric company speaking on "the future of welding." And why this frank admission that an apparently successful concern is composed of mere babes in the wood? Because, he explains, industrial progress moves so fast nowadays, and it has been demonstrated so often that there is always a better technique, design or method than the one currently in use.

If all the occupations and professions had this spirit of humility, and were more interested in finding better ways than clinging to the old methods and traditions, this little old world and its people would be much farther along than they are now, in solving problems and improving life.

#### DO AMERICANS READ?

Are Americans a reading people? The popular idea is that they are, but Dr. George Gallup, out of his experience with polls, doubts it.

'Relatively few people, even college-educated people, read more than one book a month," he says. "It is important to bear in mind that this is the average. A few read as many as a dozen or 15 books in a month. Only one half of the college people in the country in any given week will spend any time reading a book, and for those who do, the average number of hours spent will be four.'

There are, of course, other forms of reading, such as magazines and newspapers. There are also other ways of getting information, like the radio. Still Dr. Gallup's figures are disturbing. Our American form of government depends on intelligence, and in a wise utterance, now current, " man's intelligence is no better than his information."

It is quite possible to read too much. Probably the man who reads ten books a month knows very little about what is in any of them when he gets through. But surely six or seven good books per year is not more than enough to keep the mind well-oiled and the information growing.

#### HELP THE SOLDIERS.

How many American citizens would be willing to sneak up to a neighbor's car after dark and siphon out his gasoline to use in their own cars? Not many, certainly, outside of a small group who make a living by stealing things and generally wind up receiving free board in the penitentiary. There may even be professional burglars and pick-pockets who wouldn't knowingly steal gasoline from a housewife who has to take her children to school, a doctor who has to visit patients, or a workingman who has to get to his job.

But a citizen who deals with the black market in gasoline actually is stealing gasoline from those who need it. The total gasoline supply for the United States is limited. The deficiency is natural and is no longer due to lack of transportation. War is drinking up petroleum products-and we dare not let our war machines get thirsty for gasoline for fear that the deficit will have to be made up in blood. The black market takes from the honest who need gasoline to give to the dishonest who don't need it. It takes the equivalent of about 45 miles' driving a month from the hardest-hit motoriststhose who have to depend on "A" rations.

The overwhelming majority of American motorists are honest and patriotic. So are the overwhelming majority of gasoline dealers. Neither group wants to see gasoline distribution turned into a racket. Whenever this truth is driven home, black market operations dwindle. Punishment of the guilty can help and is helping, but the real victory depends on the private and community conscience.

If every motorist limits himself to coupons lawfully issued by his Ration Board, doesn't buy gasoline without using such lawful coupons, and endorses every coupon with his license number the black market menace can be and will be killed .- Contributed by Writers' War Board.
