Irrigation Well Survey Slated In County Soon

Field men of the Hi-Plains Un- VOLUME XXVI District will be in Castro county at an early date to make a sur vey on the spacing of irrigation wells that have been drilled since February 1 of this year. They will check files at the local farm bureau office and select wells at random to be inspected.

Castro is listed among 13 counties participating in the water conservation program that the inspection team will visit. They reportedly were to start their spacing survey this week.

Over 1500 permits to drill wells of which about 175 were applied for in Castro county, have been issued in the 13-county area. small percentage of the permits issued have been for municipal and industrial use—with the larger part being for irrigation wells.

In emphasizing the survey, district officials point out in a recent article that it has been shown by men of long experience in water well development that one of the first problems in water conservation is the proper spacing of the wells within a reservoir. By proper spacing, they contend, a well can be made to produce longer from a higher water table, thereby enabling the producer to pump water at a much cheaper cost than in areas of overlapping well inpractice of spacing should have been started years age in the Hi-Plains District.

The Texas Farm Bureau Federation made the following recommendations:

(1) That the drouht-stricken portion of the state be declared a disaster area.

(2) Provide through existing channels, or otherwise, a system of credit to enable livestock producers to maintain possession of foundation herds.
(3) Provide necessary long-term

credit for essential feed. (4) Make available surplus CCC feedstuffs at prices as low as

those offered to foreign countries. (5) That the United States Department of Agriculture initiate a beef-purchase and promotion program that will restore confilence, strengthen the market and tide the industry over this emer-

A recommendation by the Texas Wheat Producers Association, of which Leo Witkowski is a director from Castro county, was that in drouth stricken areas where wheat was a principal crop and if moisture failed to come in time to plant forage crops that the Secretary of Agriculture permit the seeding of the entire acreage to wheat and if wheat allotments were in force that farmers would be permitted all wheat acreage in excess of allotments by a date set by the secretary.


