4th War Loan Is Launched Tue.

With the launching of the 4th War Loan this week the people of Castro county are asked to purchase \$110,000 worth of war bonds as their share in Texas' quota of \$395,000,000. In a statement to a representative of the news this week, mayor Golden emphasized the necessity of purchasers specifying their community when they make bond purchases, so that their community will receive proper credit on its quota.

A window sticker will be given to purchasers of war bonds, during the 4th war loan, to be displayed so that the public will know that purchasers of series E bonds are whole heartedly "BACKING THE ATTACK" so that our fighting men can make good the 4th war loan slogan "Let 'em' Have It".

Baptists to Launch Huge Endowment Campaign Sunday

Belton, Jan. 20: A three million dollar campaign for the endowment of Baptist educational institutions, hospitals, nurses training centers, and seminaries will be launched Sunday, January 23, by the Baptist General convention of Texas as its 1944 project. There are 800,000 Baptists in Texas.

The convention's asking the Baptists to give or subscribe \$125,000 from this fund to Mary Hardin-Baylor college, the only private or protestant senior college for women in the 6 southwestern states west of the Mississippi having national recognition. The college which was organized under the Republic of Texas in 1845, is cosmopolitan rather than regional.

On January 23, Baptist ministers through-out Texas will preach on the endowment campaign. Pledge cards will be distributed for the designation of the amount and the institution or institutions to which the donor wishes to make a gift.

According to Dr. Gordon G. Singleton, president of Mary-Hardin-Baylor College, the students and faculty plan to raise \$5,000 to ward the endowment fund.

News From the Co. Agent's Office

Edwin Ramey and Raymond Anen report that their cattle others are getting the job done. This is a commercial product, so designed that when cattle rub against it that it releases a solution that will kill lice and cattle grubs. Go by and see what you think of one of these cattle scratchers or oilers.

The poultry flocks of Harry Rothwell, George Abbott, Clint Cox, and Will Wright were culled during the week and all have good flocks of chickens but report they are getting few eggs. Its plenty hard to make hens produce at this time of year, and to do so you must have a good house which you don't crowd, and feed your poultry a balanced feed which means a good laying mash along with grain.

Many people become discouraged in feeding mash to chickens as they expect them to start laying immediately when they start feeding the mash. This doesn't happen, and if all conditions are right it usually takes about a month for hens to respond to a good feeding program.

I attended a meeting at Farwell Tuesday of Bailey, Farmer, Lamb and Castro County agents. The meeting was attended by specialists from the A. & M. College who explained to the County Agents the new cotton program, as well as State 4-H Club contests. I was glad to learn that Castro County 4-H boys were outstanding in the state and congratulations are certainly due the boys for the fine work they are doing in producing food, collecting stamps, and buying bonds.

Emergency Crop Loans Available To Castro Farmers

Emergency crop loans, known generally as "the seed loans", are now available to farmers for the production of vitally important food crops and normal crops for 1944, according to announcement of W. E. Farwell, manager of the Dallas Emergency Crop Loan Office of the farm credit Administration.

Applications for the loans in this county are being taken at east side of basement of the county Court House, Wed. afternoon of each week under the direction of field supervisor, H. L. Kimsey.

Funds obtained under these loans may be used to cover the general expenses of crop production including the cost of preparing the land purchase of seed, fuel oil, fertilizer and supplies. A first mortgage on the crops to be financed is the security required.

These loans have been made in this county for a number of years and have proven of great benefit to farmers of limited collateral whose cash requirements are small. The maximum loan to an individual is \$400.00. Applicants who can secure loans from banks or other sources are not eligible for "the seed loans."

As in the past, borrowers will be required to plant a large garden for home use and a balanced crop program will be encouraged.

Texans Urged To Help Curb Flu Epidemic

Austin, Texas, Jan. 18. Commenting on the fact that there were approximately 25,000 cases of flu in Texas last week, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said today that there is no way to estimate the number of additional cases not attended by a physician, therefore not reported.

Dr. Cox urged every Texan to do the utmost to protect himself and his family from the dangers of influenza and its possible complications and stressed the fact that it is not a disease to be regarded lightly.

"It is a serious mistake to try to fight flu, on your feet. Complete bed rest, lots of liquids, a light diet, and treatment prescribed by a competent physician are the steps most necessary to early recovery," Dr. Cox said.

"Pneumonia is a frequent complication of influenza, and with vitality low from the effects of flu, pneumonia can be an unusually serious menace," Dr. Cox said.

The State Health Officer said that avoiding undue exposure to cold, wet weather, maintaining good ventilation, obtaining sufficient sleep and eating a nourishing, well-balanced diet will aid in building up physical resistance and may help to ward off influenza. If, in spite of these precautions, fever, headache, and other flu symptoms appear, the patient should go to bed immediately and consult the family physician.

Shoes—Stamp No. 10 in book is good for one pair. Stamp No. 10 on the airplane sheet is good for one pair.

Fuel oil—Period 2 coupons are good through Jan. 21. Period 3 coupons remain valid through Feb. 21.

Meats, Fats — Brown stamps R, S, T, and U are good through January 29. Brown stamp V becomes good January 30 and remains good through February 29.

Processed Foods—Green stamps D, E, and F in book four are good through January 20. Green stamps G, H, and J in book four are good through February 20.
