WHERE JOBS COME FROM.

The job producing possibilities of foreign trade and a larger merchant marine are not as yet fully understood by the people of the United States.

Robert H. Patchin, vice president of W. R. Grace & company, gives figures which are of interest to workers everywhere. They show that automobile exports accounted for 1 2-3 months of the total annual employment in that industry.

"The United States cannot produce all the things it needs. Nor can it consume all the things it must grow and make in order to provide a high level of employment.

"But the jobs are not merely those in field or factory. Every item of export and import trade requires an infinite variety of labor and service before, during and after the article takes form.

"American exports create employment from the time a hoe is stuck in the ground, or a ton of iron ore is taken from the earth, until loaded aboard ship and delivered in a foreign market.

"It is well for our citizens who may live and work and produce a thousand or more miles from our seaports, and who have never seen the ocean, to realize that their jobs or their businesses may well depend on our future foreign trade.

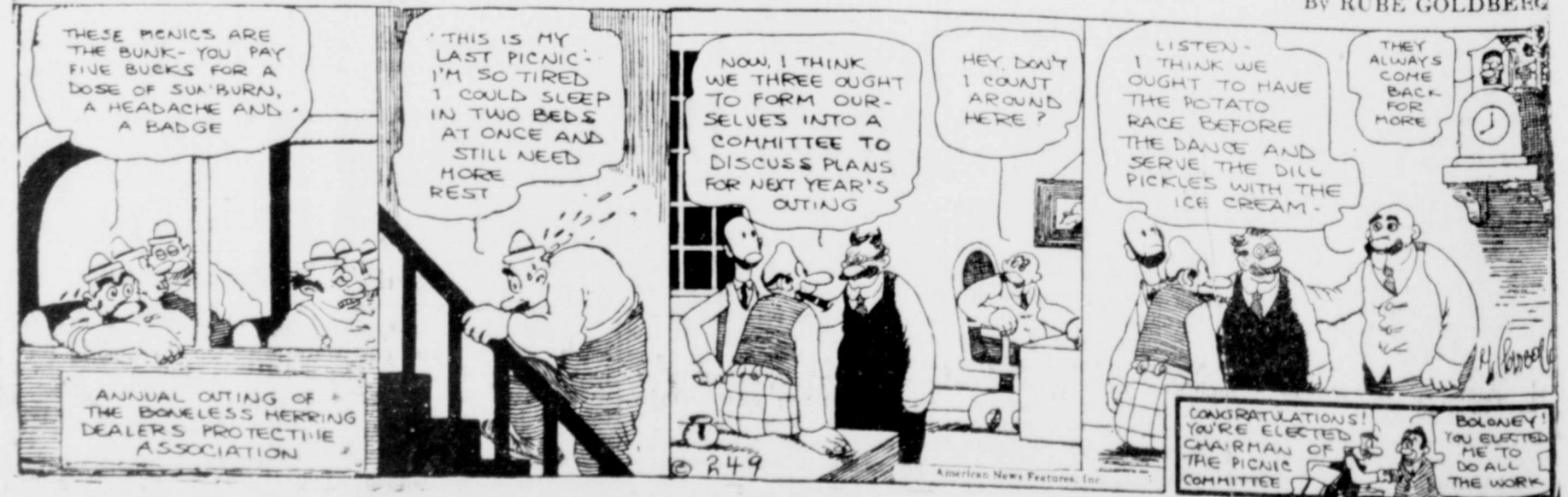

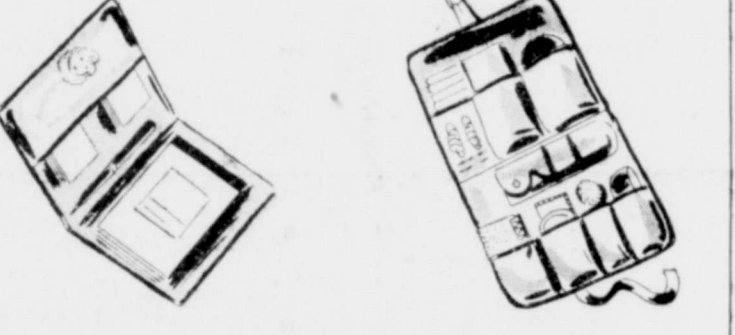

Paste doily border around edge of glass sherbets. Arrange fruit and cheryls in sherbets. Dress with Fluffy Mayonnaise or Appetizer Mayonnaise.
