Mitchams' spring show herd -not this group - won more than \$600 in Fat Stock Show judging last March. The ranch's current show selections are considered superior to the spring showing.



VERDICT BE CROSS RHINE RIVER AND RUSH HEARD SOON TO AID OF ENCIRCLED BORNE TROOPS 10 MI. DISTANT

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS, AEF, Sept. 21.—Tankriding American paratroopers shot their way through a Nazi death battalion in the streets of Nijmegen today, broke across the Rhine river and sped northward with a British armored column to relieve an encircled airborne force holding out 10

Only a few narrow canals between Nijmegen and Arnnem barred the way to the broad German plains sweeping eastward 260 miles beyond the Dutch border to Berlin, and it appeared that the Germans had little left in the immediate area to halt the American and British thrust

First word of the dramatic crossing came in a front dispatch from BBC Correspondent Stewart McPherson, who reported that the Americans made an assault crossing near the main highway bridge late last night and cut in behind the

Under the front and rear attack, the Germans broke and led, leaving the key bridge intact for a flood of British armor to stream northward to the rescue of the airborne troop-

At the same time, headquarters revealed that the American 1st Army to the south drove another spearhead into Germany at Scharpenseel. 11 miles north of Aachen, after a swift advance across the narrow neck of Dutch soil separating Belgium from the Reich.

Other First Army troops were locked in a violent battle for Stolberg, 612 miles east of Aachen, while Lt. Gen. George S. Patton's 3rd Army closed to within six miles of Metz and ground slowly forward against fierce armored counter-attacks northeast of Nancy.

Gen. Ivan C. Bagramian stormed the suburbs of Riga. Gen. Ivan Maslennikov deepened his thrust toward the sea northwest of Valga. Gen. Andrei I. Yeremenko pushed against Riga from the east.

Writing against that backdrop in sarcastic vein, Izvestia's military commentator said that "the Germans soon will be compelled to announce the 'successful' conclusion of the Baltic campaign."

Front dispatches indicated that main barriers in the path of Govorov's two-way thrust through Estonia already had been hurdled, leaving before him a relatively clear coastal plain stretching to the capital city of Tallinn.

Soviet Premier Josef Stalin revealed last night that his Leningrad Army, freed for action by the capitulation of Finland had been thrown into the battle for the Baltic States, joining the offensive opened by the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Baltic

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, SOUTH PACIFIC - Landbased Liberator bombers, intensifying the two-way drive on the Philippines, battered the big port of Davao without opposition in daylight Monday, it was disclosed today as American forces virtually completed their conquest of the steppingstone islands east and south of the Philippines.

Tokyo Radio indicated that the Japanese feared an American landing in the Philippines was imminent. More than 50 Liberators of the Far Eastern Air Force carried out the attack on Davao, showering 120 tons of bombs on airdromes, supply and personnel instalations.

The heavy raid, first large-scale operation since carrier planes from Admiral William F. Halsey's Third Fleet hit Mindanao nearly two weeks ago, came as soldiers and Marines were cleaning up enemy forces on Morotai, 250 miles south of the Philippines, and in the southern Palau Islands to the

Admiral Chester W. Nimitz announced that the Marines killed a total of 7045 Japanese, approximately three-fourths of Peleliu's garrison, in less than one week of bitter fighting on the strategic island, 560 miles east of the Philippines.

UNUSED LAND.

Governor Dewey, who never before had occasion to pay much attention to the West, has been learning some important things on his present tour. They are things that should interest the American people generally, no matter who makes the discoveries or spreads the information.

One of them is the tremendous amount of unused land in the West which might be used profitably. Americans from eastern states who have never been west would be amazed at the comparative emptiness of many vast areas, even in regions where water is available and the climate is reasonably good. Wyoming and other north-western states, as well as regions farther south, afford good examples.

Gov. Dewey points to the problem created by the acquisition of land in such regions on a vast scale, by investers who make little or no use of it, but hold it as an investment or a sort of Gargantuan playground. But still more important is the vast amount of land which, for one reason or another, is going back into the hands of the federal government. He finds that this kind of property now totals nearly 400,000,000 acres. It means not only an enormous withdrawal of land from possible use, but deprivation of the potential taxes which settlement would provide.

NAZI BRAVERY.

Some Nazis have one redeeming quality, stubbornness in the face of defeat. Examples are the "mad colonel" of St. Malo, and the Germans besieged in Brest, who refused to accept failure.

This is a quality that Americans can appreciate. It was possessed by Col. Charles W. Whittlesey of the "lost battalion" in the last war, and his famous reply (which he later denied making) to a call to surrender: "Go to hell!" It has been shown in this war by the last-ditch fighters of Bataan

Some people may call the St. Malo colonel mad, but the American soldiers who faced him will call him super-brave. What a pity that this one fine quality has, in the Nazis, been so often marred by treachery and cruelty!

LIQUOR PROSPECTS.

Washington says that distillers may soon be allowed to make beverage alcohol again. Since the war began, nearly all such production has been put to military use. Alcohol is one of the most important war materials, and is used in the

The chances for a moderate "return to normal" in this line depends largely on the current corn production. If it proves to be a bumper crop, as is expected, a lot of it will be turned into bourbon whisky. That would make a "production holiday" in more than one sense. But the benefits-if they may properly be called such-will not be immediate. Corn takes more time to ripen in liquid form than it does on
