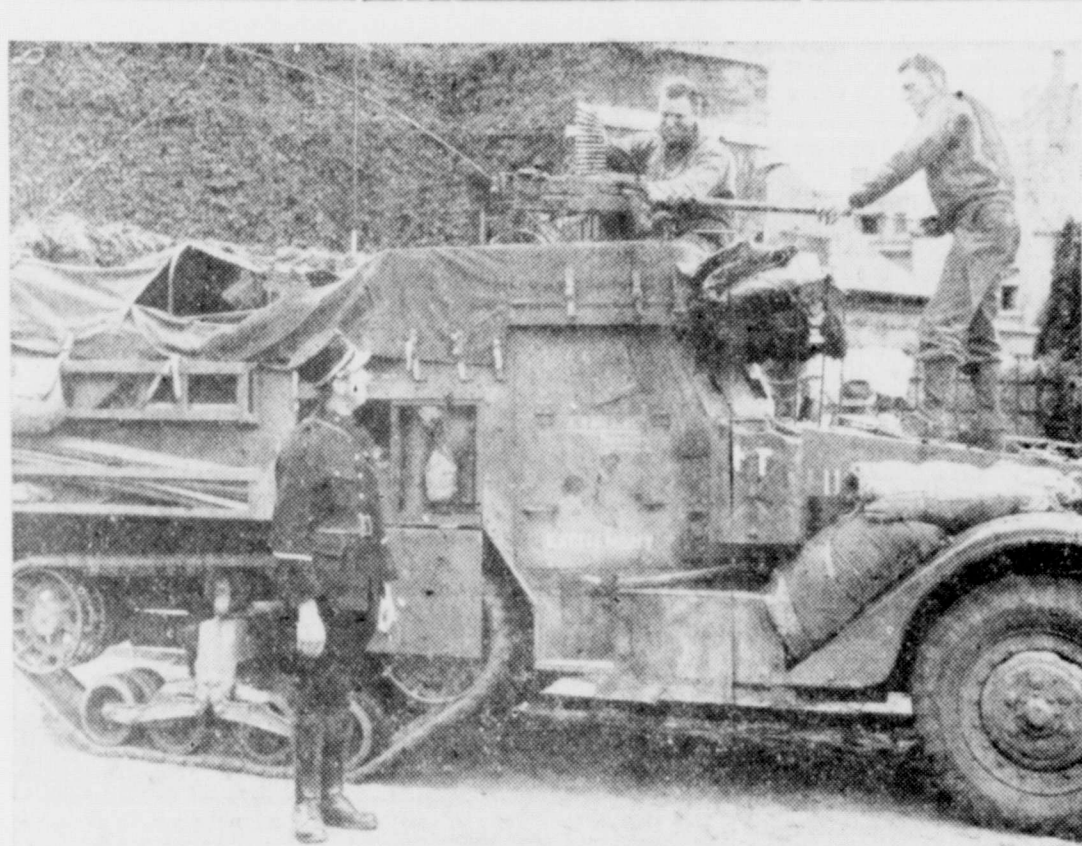

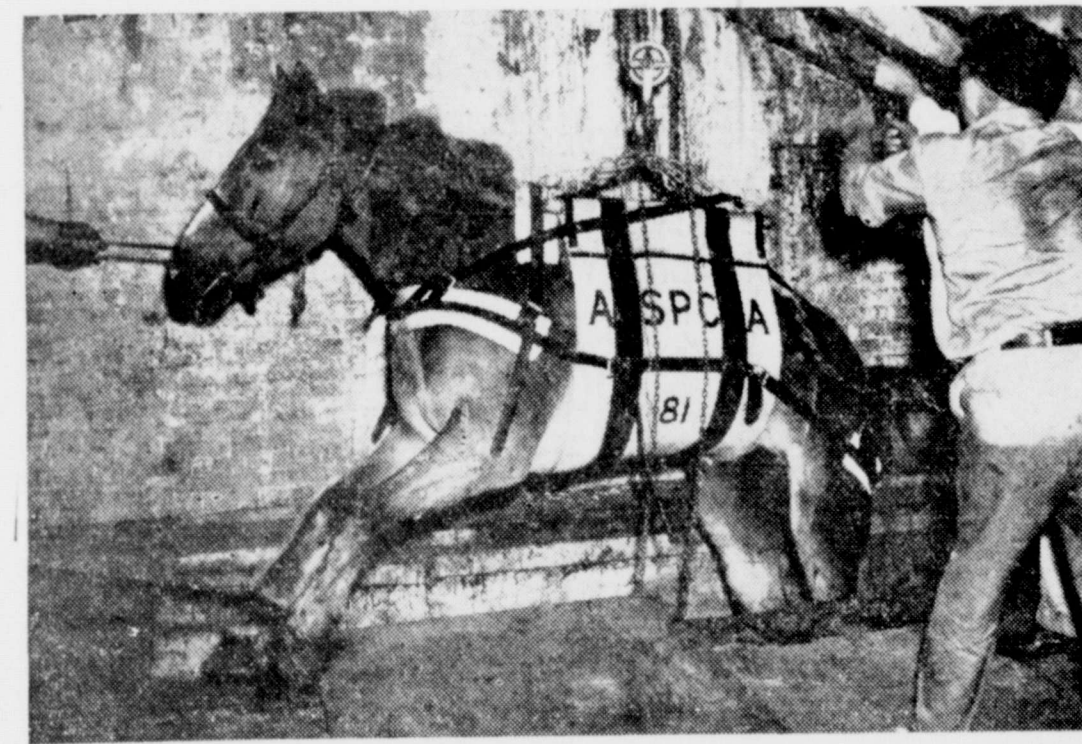

BYE BYE, BLUES.

Marketing will be simpler for the housewife, come the first of the month. She will be able to enjoy "October's bright blue weather" without thinking distastefully of that color. She will be quite sure that

O, sun and skies and clouds of June
And flowers of June together,
Ye can not rival for one hour
October's bright blue weather.

From now on, blue points will refer only to oysters, and blue tokens will be as useless as last week's theater pass. The announcement from the War Food Administration that most canned goods will be point free is music to her ear. She smiles, she sings, she looks with condescending tolerance on her last blue token. Life does, in truth, seem to her "best of all the year" in October.

Who knows? Probably the War Food Administration is just as glad for the end of September as the housewife. Rationing, useful and necessary as it is, must be a tremendous headache to the men responsible for its setup and efficiency. They deserve great credit as faithful stewards of the nation's goods in the face of much typical American grouching. But nobody ever really meant anything by it, and now we are all friends again. Bye bye, blues!

FIGHTING - WOMEN.

German manpower is being drained away more rapidly than many people have realized. Increasingly, young boys are found to be replacing men. And lately there are some indications that even woman-power is used on the fighting front. An American paratrooper, wounded in Normandy and now back home recovering, tells how he was shot in the back by a woman in a German machine gun position.

He speaks German, and heard her clearly saying in that language: "I hit that kid. I'm going to see whether he is dead." The American lay on his stomach, pretending death, and when the fighting woman appeared, he shot and killed her. "I don't like to shoot a woman," he says, "but it was her life or mine."

This is getting down to basic realities, in the worst war of modern times. Will Hitler yet assemble squads of Amazons on the fighting front to hold the line for him?

FUNDAMENTALLY AMERICAN.

"Hit them where they ain't." That was the explanation given by Willie Keeler, old time baseball star, for his phenomenally high batting average. Willie excelled at poking the ball through the spot just vacated by an infielder.

Isn't that Gen. Eisenhower's strategy? Repeatedly, from Cherbourg to the present time, the American troops have managed to find the spots where the Germans weren't, and break through. Evidently Eisenhower's strategy is as fundamentally American as he is himself.



Curb on Power.

Authority turns men's heads. Human nature changes very little if at all. Bigots and despots are guided by no rule but expedience. They govern for their own advantage, to grab and hold power. I saw it at its worst during eleven years under the war lords of South China. The rule applies to mortals of every race and station. It applied to King Saul, the Lord's Anointed; no less to the modern heathen, Hirohito. We are protected from it in America, not by mere luck.

Framers of the American Constitution laid a foundation solid enough to support a government by the people, a representative government in which the representatives are accountable directly to the people who elect them. They were wise pioneers. They knew human nature as well as theory of government. They knew how soon power runs to tyranny when not held in check.

Pillars of Freedom

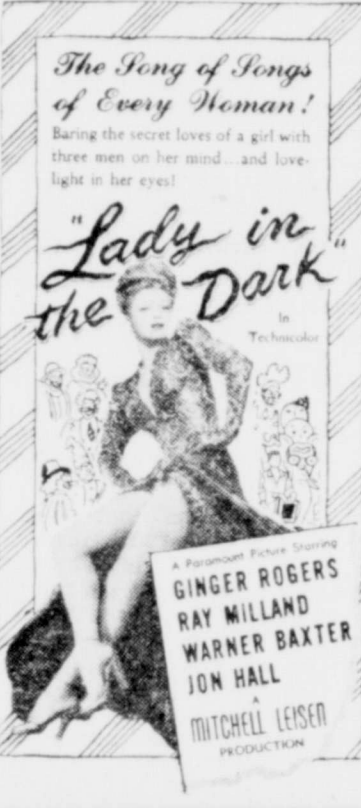

I do not trust; you have to convert me. You can't make me buy something I don't want; you have to sell me. You can't make anybody shut-up until you prove that he is lying.

No system was ever devised by mortal mind that had no flaws. Many a falsehood has been proclaimed under the cloak of free speech. Many a crime has been committed in the name of religion. Many a pirate has sailed the open seas of free trade. Nevertheless, for all their abuses, religious liberty, free speech and open competition are still essential parts of human freedom.

Integral Liberties.

"Why," someone has asked, "do you defend free faith and free speech when only free enterprise is under attack?" Here's why: They are all one. Take from a common man his right to own something and before long he will be ready to kiss a gangster's hand for a loaf of bread to feed his hungry children. Too soon then will people be hiding in caves to pray as they did in the dark ages.

There is a danger. Rulings by appointed bureaus and commissions, having no constitutional stability, may be greatly prejudiced by the local interests or personal whims of the bureau. They may be as dictatorial as any edict from the lips of an African chief or proclamation sealed in perfumed wax with the signet ring of a Sultan. Written laws made by the representatives of the entire nation, however unwise they might occasionally appear, are on a far more substantial basis.

America's Secret.

Several foreign countries have more natural resources than have been found in America. But they are poor countries because they have never been developed. It is not a matter of ignorance. They have intelligent people and shrewd technicians. But many of their best minds come to live in America. Why? Under our Constitution they can use their talents and be well paid for their work.

In America, rulers are actually public servants. Their records are checked regularly by the people who choose them. On election day they are re-engaged or dismissed. Scoundrels hold office sometimes but no tyrant has ever ruled us. But mark this: Our freedom is not some mysterious acid in American soil. Without representative, constitutional government, anything can happen here. Let us be sure that rule by bureaus ends when the war ends.

was one of the best examples of unconscious humor in the whole campaign.

The friends of the old maestro never heard him in better form. Of course none of the Old Guard GOP-sters or the Roosevelt-hating democrats would agree with this conclusion.

However, elections are decided not by bitter partisans on one side or the other, but by the great mass of voters who are neither blinded by hate nor bemused by adulation.

And by any standard of calculation, this great mass must have been favorably impressed by the Old Man's performance. America always has and always will love a fighter—especially a good-natured fighter who has himself a perfectly good time while skinning the opposition alive.



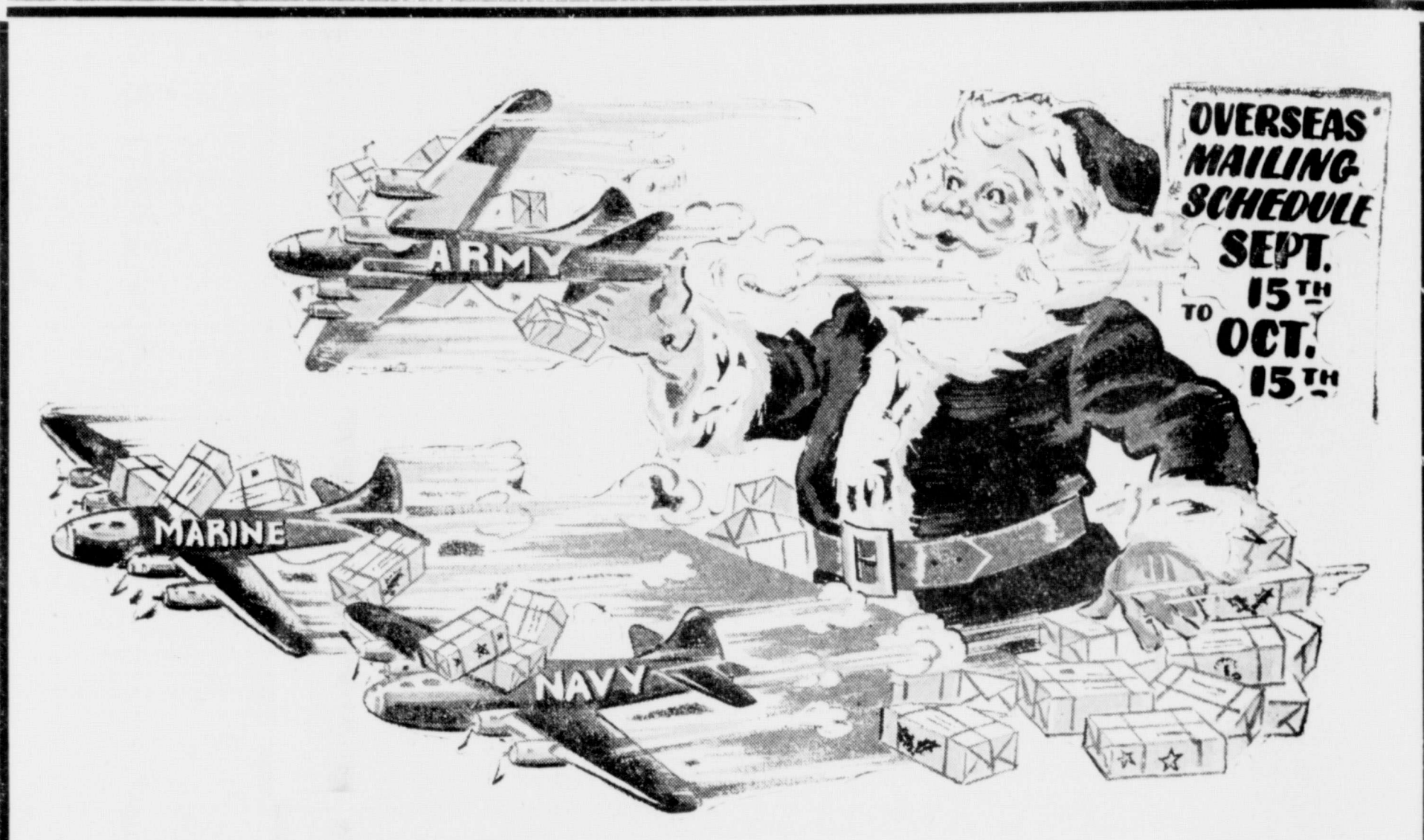

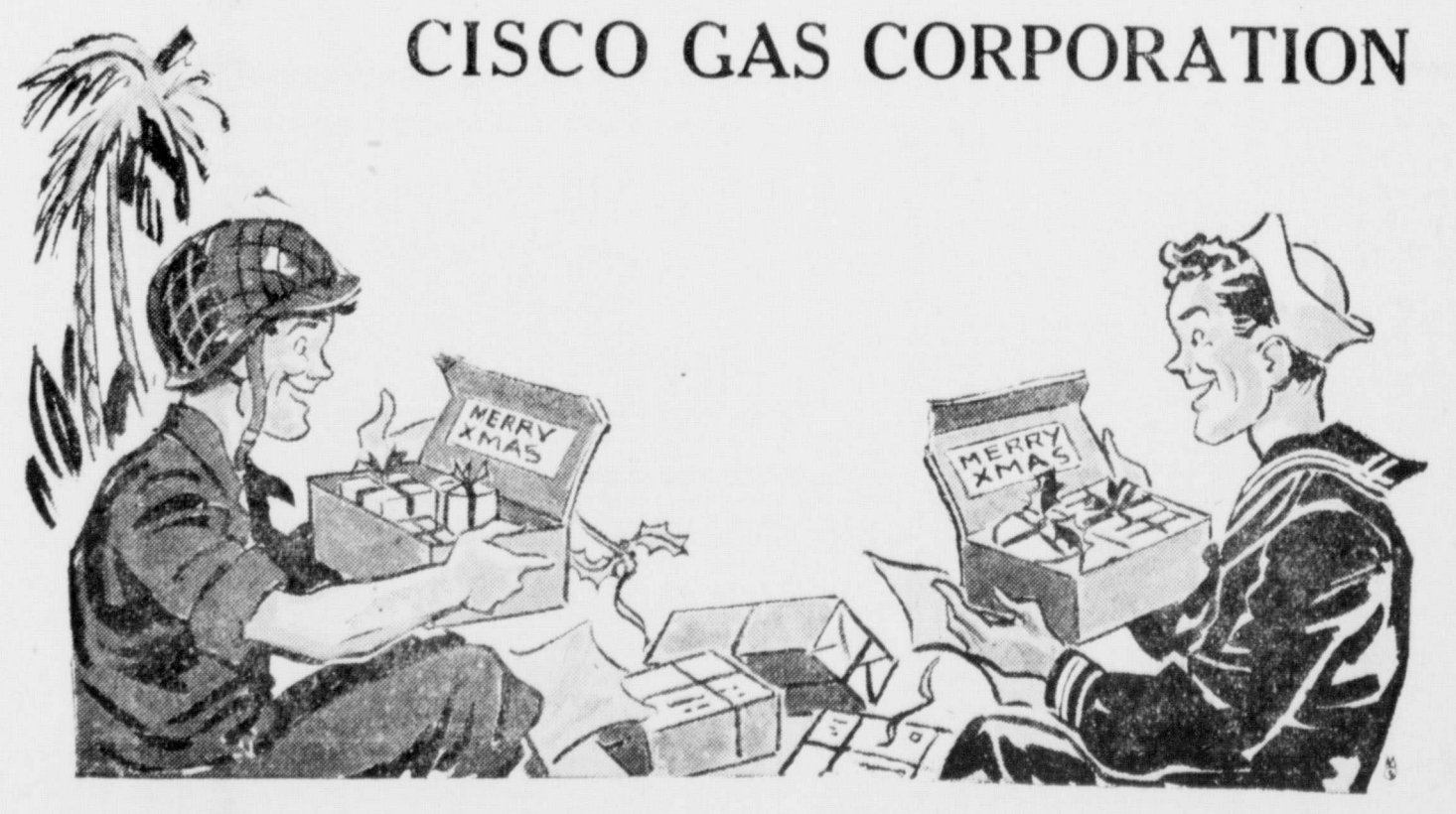
