The ground fertilized in October yielded 2,764 pounds per acre. That fertilized in November yielded 2,716 pounds. The December fertilized ground yielded 2,826 pounds, and the ground fertilized in January

produced 2,879 pounds of grain per acre. The largest differences was only 163 pounds, between November fertilized ground and January fertilized ground. This may have been caused by a number of other factors, pointed out Dr. Cook.

The primary colors are few, but think what beauty flashes from them. The musical notes are few, but think how love and life with all their emotions are expressed in them.</li> <li>Jesus had but one theme. All other themes led up to it. God as the Father, life lifted upon higher levels, sin conquered in the human heart, peace flowing like a river, joy rising to ecstacy, great hope for the future it is all one theme, and it was Jesus' theme every day of His life. It is my theme for this week of my life and of yours.</li> <li>Human life is still the same. Burdens are still heavy, Phantom lights still beckon to us, which if we follow, will lead us to a deep abyss, or over steep cliffs.
