THIRD ARMY'S BIG GUNS ARE POUNDING SEVERAL TOWNS 7 MILES INSIDE OF GERMANY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—U. S. First army infantry drove to the flooded Roer river today, captured Merode and fought yard by yard and house by house through a string of fortified German villages about two miles west of Duren.

The German army's defensive fight in stout and thick works before vital arsenals of the fatherland was reported in front dispatches to be weakening west of the Roer, inside the Siegfried line at Dillingen and Saarlautern and in northern Alsace under repeated batterings of three American armies.

Lt. Gen. Patch's Seventh army soon may join three other U. S. armies already on German soil. Lashing out on a 25-mile front in northern Alsace, these troops took Haguenau, last important French city in the Rhine valley invasion route leading to the Ludwigshafen and Mannheim areas, heart of the German chemical industry.

EASTLAND WAR CHEST QUOTA IN

Eastland county has maintained its reputation for never flinching on a war appeal, and the announcement that it has gone over the top on the annual War Chest appeal.

County War Chest Chairman Ed Brown of Eastland this week announced that slightly more than \$115,000 had been reported to him, with numbers of communities yet to be heard from. The quota for the county was \$12,898.

He urged that all solicitors who have not yet reported results of their solicitations, do so at once, sending these reports to County Treasurer W. F. Creager at Commercial State bank, Ranger.

Chairman Brown expressed his thanks and the thanks of his organization to all workers and contributors for the magnificent job that has been done in this campaign.

Of the total amount raised Cisco contributed above \$3,200. Cisco's quota was \$2,750. The local campaign was completed within a few days of its start several weeks ago, putting Cisco over the top well ahead of all other communities in the county.

Many Friends Attended Funeral Mrs. Joe Gentry

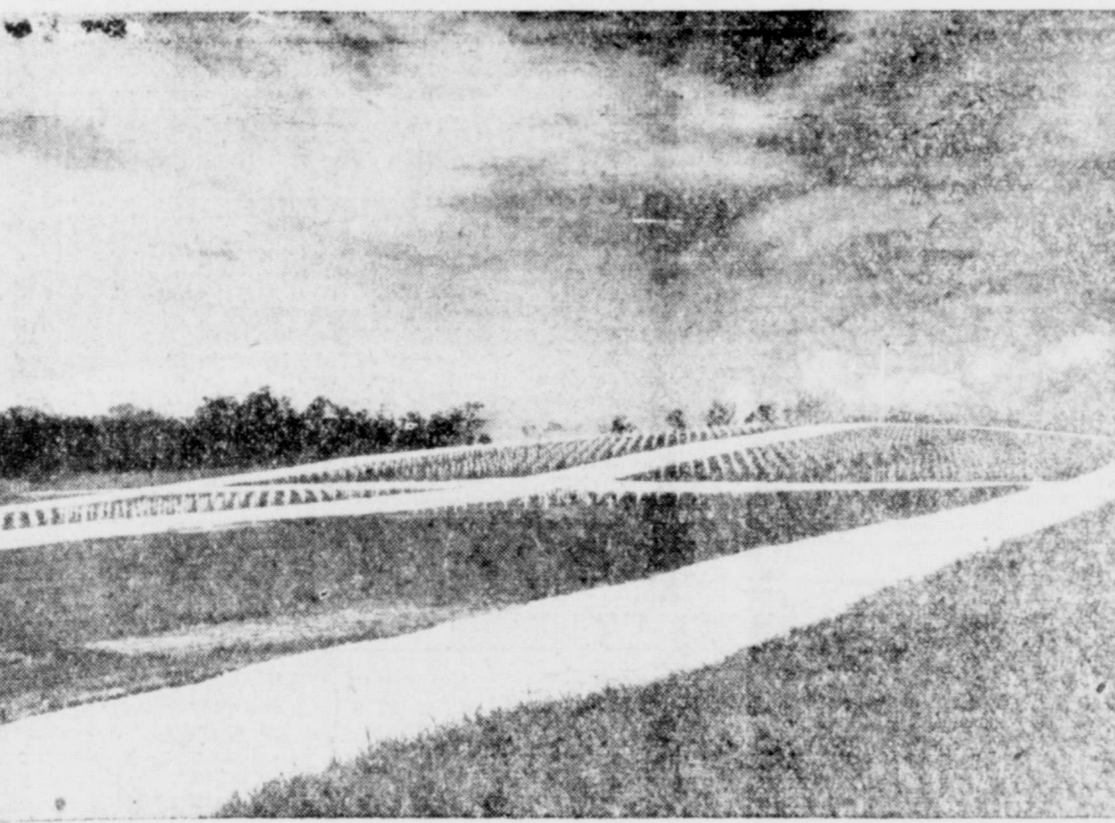

JAPS EVACUATE TOKYO

SAN FRANCISCO.—Tokyo, capital of Japan and the home of 7,000,000 people, harassed by continued raids by American Superfortresses, is being evacuated, the enemy radio said today.

Shortly after the Japanese radio announced several Superfortresses had flown over the capital without dropping bombs between midnight and 5 a. m. today (Japanese time) the Berlin radio, quoting a Transocean (German) news agency dispatch, said the city is being evacuated. Twenty thousand persons, mostly aged and infirm as well as children and expectant mothers, are leaving today.

Essential workers and the civil defense forces must stay behind, the radio asserted.

Bitter fighting still raged on bloody Leyte island in the Philippines today despite the slaughtering of thousands of Japanese caught in an American trap.

The promotion of Chief of Chaplains William R. Arnold to two-star rank has been announced by the War Department. In the Corps serving under him are 7,700 Army chaplains representing all leading religious faiths.

Chaplain Arnold was born in Wooster, Ohio, June 10, 1881. He was graduated from St. Joseph's College, Renassaler, Indiana, and from St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester, New York, where he completed his theological education. He was ordained a priest of the Roman Catholic Church in 1908. In 1913 he was appointed chaplain in the Army and promoted through the grades, attaining the rank of colonel with his appointment as Chief of Chaplains. In 1941 he was promoted to the rank of brigadier general.

REDS ENTER BUDAPEST

MOSCOW.—Russian tanks battled into the northern suburbs of Budapest today, while another powerful Soviet column drove westward past the great bend of the Danube above the city toward Bratislava and Vienna, Russian dispatches said.

The main body of motorized Russian infantry driving down the Danube upon Budapest was declared within full view of the capital, and tank units ranged on ahead.

CITY RIGHTS

State's rights are often heard from, but what about cities' rights? This question has just been asked by Clarence A. Dykstra, president of the University of Wisconsin, addressing a Cincinnati meeting devoted to the city manager plan of government. His point is that cities are under-represented in many state legislatures, and do not get a sympathetic hearing from them. Milwaukee and Washington are closer spiritually than Milwaukee and Madison. Senator Harold H. Burton of Ohio had this in mind when, in 1938, opposing the proposal to end the WPA, he said that, because of the commitments to rural constituents, "many a state government is unable to see the situation in as clear a perspective as is the federal government."

Unemployment and relief are largely city problems. Surplus labor in rural areas moves into the city, for the city is the home of industry and the great services.

This is why cities (and underpaid public school teachers) are apt to go to Washington for advice and help instead of their state capitals. More emphasis of "state rights" will not stop this practice. If the states want rights, they must earn them by settling the problems at their doorsteps.
