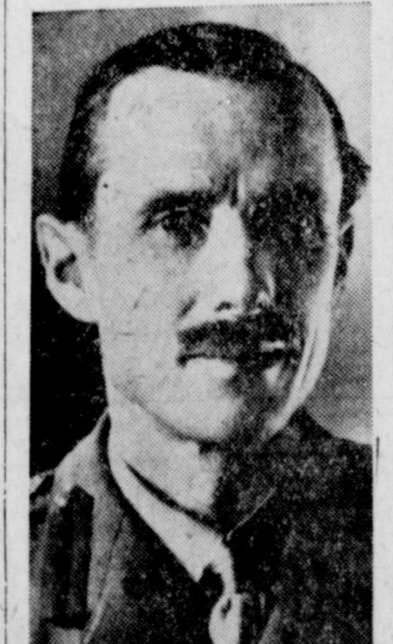

OUR CIVILIZATION

This is the Age of Invention, especially in America. It might be called the "flowering of invention," except that the products don't seem so fine lately, when one considers the purpose for which they are used.

In fact, when people sit down and start making a mental survey, just now, of the gadgeteering results of this generation, it may give them a bad taste in the mouth and a sick feeling around the heart.

For what has this generation done with its marvelous inventions? Much that is fine, good and useful, without a doubt. But over the whole picture are marks of futility and misdirection.

What are the proper aims of human life? According to old and tested standards, they are the true, the good and the beautiful. For the pursuit and development of these, if for any definite purpose, it may be assumed that man came into the world. But a general and honest look around at our civilization is not very reassuring as to the product and the finish.

There are, to be sure, good people and kind hearts everywhere, and much nobility and sacrifice. But these are not organized or logically pursued and sustained, so that vast futility, selfishness and crime are mingled with the finer traits. It is not surprising that so many people regard our world, with all its gadgets and activities, as a failure.

If there is any salvation for such a world, it is probably to be found in religion, with the development of a strong, honest, frank development of religious life woven through all our activities.

If the newly appointed University of Texas regents are to permit pro-Rainey pressure groups to influence them in the slightest, it would be much better for the University and for the state of Texas if they resigned immediately.

A YEAR FOR COURAGE.

Standing before his congregation on New Year's Eve, a minister discussed, as all have done, the problems of the years gone by and of the new ones now in sight.

He spoke of the Allied advance across France and the sudden vicious German attack, of progress in the Pacific, of the long road still ahead, and the even more difficult job of maintaining future peace. He talked of the necessity for faith and action both, if we are to gain and keep world security, and he uttered one sentence of prophecy which should be taken to heart by Americans of all creeds and of none. He said, "It will be a bad year for cowards."

"A bad year for cowards," indeed. A year of work and grief, of harder living conditions and longer casualty lists, of painful progress and occasional set-backs. But with patience, intelligence and faith it can be a glorious year of achievement. It is up to every individual American to make it so.

A GIANT INDUSTRY Gears to War



"Where did the butter go?" is quickly answered by a study of this chart by the National Dairy Council. Eight billion pounds of fluid milk are necessary to make the extra cheese, dry whole milk, evaporated milk, and ice cream for America's fighting forces and for Lend-Lease. An additional 10 1/2 billion pounds of milk are being consumed to maintain the efficiency of war workers and the physical stamina of American civilians. This represents total increased requirements of 18 1/2 billion pounds of milk.

Milk production since the prewar period has increased over 14 billion pounds. This leaves a deficit of about 4 1/2 billion pounds of milk which has been shifted from butter production to other concentrated milk products also needed on the fighting fronts. That shift accounts for a reduction of 215 million pounds of butter, which, in addition to about 370 million pounds of butter a year taken by the government for fighters and for Lend-Lease accounts for a reduction of nearly five pounds per capita for civilians.

Most of the amount of milk sacrificed by civilians is going to the fighting forces in the form of their favorite spread—butter. The balance is helping to win the war by keeping workers and fighters properly nourished with other concentrated milk products.
