## REDS REACH BERLIN PROVINCE

### WE HAVE NOW REACHED THE ROAD WE'VE DREAMED OF FOR 3 YEARS, RUSS PAPER SAID

#### U. S. and British Clear West Bank Roer for 40 Miles

PARIS, Jan. 26. — American Ninth and British Second army troops cleared the entire west bank of the Roer river for 40 air-line miles from Holland to below Duren today, achieving a strategic springboard for attacks against the industrial Ruhr and the Rhineland.

Flame-throwing infantry of the Ninth army advanced more than a mile in a limited night attack, capturing Brachelen, 27 miles southwest of Dusseldorf, and 97 Siegfried line pillboxes. The German survivors withdrew completely to the east bank of the river.

#### Yanks 40 Miles From Manila and 20 From Bataan

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 26. — Mobile American columns annihilated ineffective Japanese resistance, seized the Philippines' finest airfield and Clark field and swept on today to a highway junction approximately 40 miles from Manila and 20 from Bataan.

Tokyo broadcasts reported ships, assault forces and airborne troops were massing in the Philippines, apparently for a new offensive. The enemy Domei news agency predicted new airborne invasion of Luzon from Leyte. Other broadcasts mentioned Manila bay, and oft-bombed Formosa and Okinawa islands as possible objectives.

China-based Mustang fighters wiped out 40 or 46 Japanese planes in a sweep over Peiping airfield in North China and wrecked four locomotives. Japanese columns consolidating their hold on southeast China captured Luchong and Pinghsieh, narrowing the Chinese hold on the Canton-Hankow railway to less than 100 miles.

#### TOO HOT FOR JAPS.

PEARL HARBOR, Jan. 26. — Unconfirmed Chinese reports said today that 50 American and Japanese ships battled for nine hours in the east China sea within 300 miles of Shanghai Tuesday in the biggest naval engagement since last October. Japanese forces broke off the battle at noon and fled toward their homeland, some 650 miles to the northeast, the Chinese army newspaper at Chungking said.

#### FHA HOUSING UNITS.

BIG SPRING, Jan. 26. — Construction of 35 three-room FHA housing units, was to begin here this week with the arrival of lumber and other material.

#### SALARY RAISE CERTAIN.

AUSTIN, Jan. 26. — Quick passage was expected today in the Texas senate for the emergency appropriation to give rural school teachers \$300 additional for their work this school year, and to pay an additional \$1 a pupil a month for school buses. The amended bill goes back to the house next week.

### United Support in Polio Fight Will Be Asked

DALLAS, Jan. 26.—Gen. Richard Donovan, commanding officer of the Eighth Service Command, will call for united support of the Fight Infantile Paralysis campaign in a state-wide radio program over the Texas Quality Network Sunday, Jan. 28, from 9:30 to 10 p. m. Appearing with him on the program will be the Eighth Service Command band and George Waverly Briggs, vice-chairman of the Texas state committee for the President's Birthday celebrations.

The armed forces are giving strong support to the current fund-raising appeal because many of last summer's polio victims were children of servicemen, it was announced.

With 241 counties of the state organized to date for participation in the campaign, Texas people are setting a new record in their support of the effort to stamp out infantile paralysis, Mr. Briggs announced. Last year 230 counties took part. State director of organization is Daniel G. Ruggles, widely known Texas newspaperman and an overseas veteran of World War I. He has served in the state headquarters of the annual campaign for seven consecutive years.

### Farm Agent Will Aid Houston Fat Stock Show, Feb.

BRYAN, Jan. 26.—B. J. Baskin, Texas Farm Products Agent for Tennessee Coal, Iron & Railroad company, U. S. Steel subsidiary, will serve as assistant general superintendent of the 1945 Houston Fat Stock Show and Livestock Exposition, starting February 2.

The industrial farm agent is a veteran stock show official, serving at most of the expositions and sales throughout the Southwest.

Baskin for a number of years was a county agent in Texas before becoming farm products agent for T. C. I. As Texas farm agent for T. C. I. he assists farmers and ranchers in finding the best markets for crops and livestock. Born on a farm near Cameron, Baskin is a graduate of Texas A. & M. College.

Mr. Warden will preach Sunday morning and evening at Romney and in the afternoon at Barnes chapel.

Rev. W. H. Cole, district superintendent, says there is much interest at Romney to rebuild the church and create a community center for all the people.

#### PENDERGAST VERY SICK.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 26.—T. J. Pendergast, 72, whose powerful political dynasty ended in a federal prison cell five years ago, was described by his physician today as "a very sick man." Friends feared the man who once made governors and senators, might not live until his federal court probation expires in May.

The buildings were erected by Mr. and Mrs. Harrell in 1920 and they moved to the property in 1921, living there continuously until recently, when they moved to their town home at 609 west Sixth street.

All of Mr. Harrell's registered Hereford cattle, as well as other live stock, was purchased by Mr. Slaughter.

The Slaughters are members of the First Baptist church at Big Spring and Mr. Slaughter was sheriff and tax collector of Howard county for twelve years.

### Second 50-Ton Lot of Cisco Clay Has Been Purchased

The second 50-ton car of Cisco clay enroute to the Harbison-Refractories at Athens, Ga. for testing of its properties as bonding agent in the manufacture of refractories. The clay, from the Eppler farm, two miles east of Cisco, was loaded on the M. K. & T. railway yard shipped out today under the supervision of S. Clark, mining engineer with the company.

The first car was shipped last week. It went to the company's plant at Hayes, Pa. Headquarters of the Harbison-Walker company is at Pittsburgh, Pa.

The Cisco clay is mixed with content silica or flint clays mined from other regions in manufacture of fire brick used in steel and iron plants and other plants in which high temperatures are applied to the melting of metals. Such brick must withstand high-temperatures and the strength obtained here seems to be of great value in bonding the clays for the purpose.

S. Clark suggested that the clay would be very satisfactory for making the brick used in plants which carry molten metal and that tests of this purpose have been promised.

The fact that the company has leased clay deposits here and already taken two cars from the local material, Guy Eastland pottery manufacturer, points out. Quinn inspirations of the clay by the company after he had located the clay and purchased the rights to the same. He has found it very satisfactory for his own uses in making pottery in the kilns of his own factory.

### Kring Discussed Post-War Feeder Airline Service

Presenting Sidney Kring, vice-president of Boeing Airways, one of the applicants for a certificate to operate feeder airline service in the southwest, to the Eastland Chamber of Commerce was host Thursday evening to more than 100 people, including guests from Cisco and Ranger.

Mr. Kring spoke with optimism of the future of air traffic, but emphasized a cautionary note in that he declared that feeder airlines will be developed only as sound business principles are applied to the visions of the dreamers. He told Eastland Chamber men that it will develop from the communities served to the air service a success and that the mere location of airline routes will not guarantee that it will continue.

It is wise to secure facilities for future airline service, and it is wise to develop these only as progress affords," he said in substance. "Feeder airline service involves great investments and there is no telling how long it will take after the war to get into operation. At any rate, we may discount heavily the idea that the air will be full of planes and parking space at a premium on the landing fields of small cities."

## GERMANS AND AMERICANS.

It is a tragic fact that ever since the United States entered the war, our people on the whole have underrated the Germans. Millions of us seem to have taken it for granted that whenever and wherever we took the field against the Hitler gang, it would vanish into thin air, or throw itself on our mercy.

But there is a breed of Germans now at large from whom no such weakness need be expected. It is the breed that was first spawned in the Franco-Prussian war of 1870 and 1871, when Bismarck, the "Iron Chancellor," began shaping a future in which German power would step upon the neck of Europe—and after that, the world.

The first great move in that program during the present century came in 1914. America stopped that move, and the Germans lost the war, but not the purpose.

The second step, far more powerful and vengeful, is the one in which Germany has sought to crush and absorb Europe and America, and almost succeeded in half of the operation. This time Americans were more wide-awake, yet still slow to action in the face of the biggest crisis this world has ever faced. At last there is unanimity among the free and enlightened nations, but even
