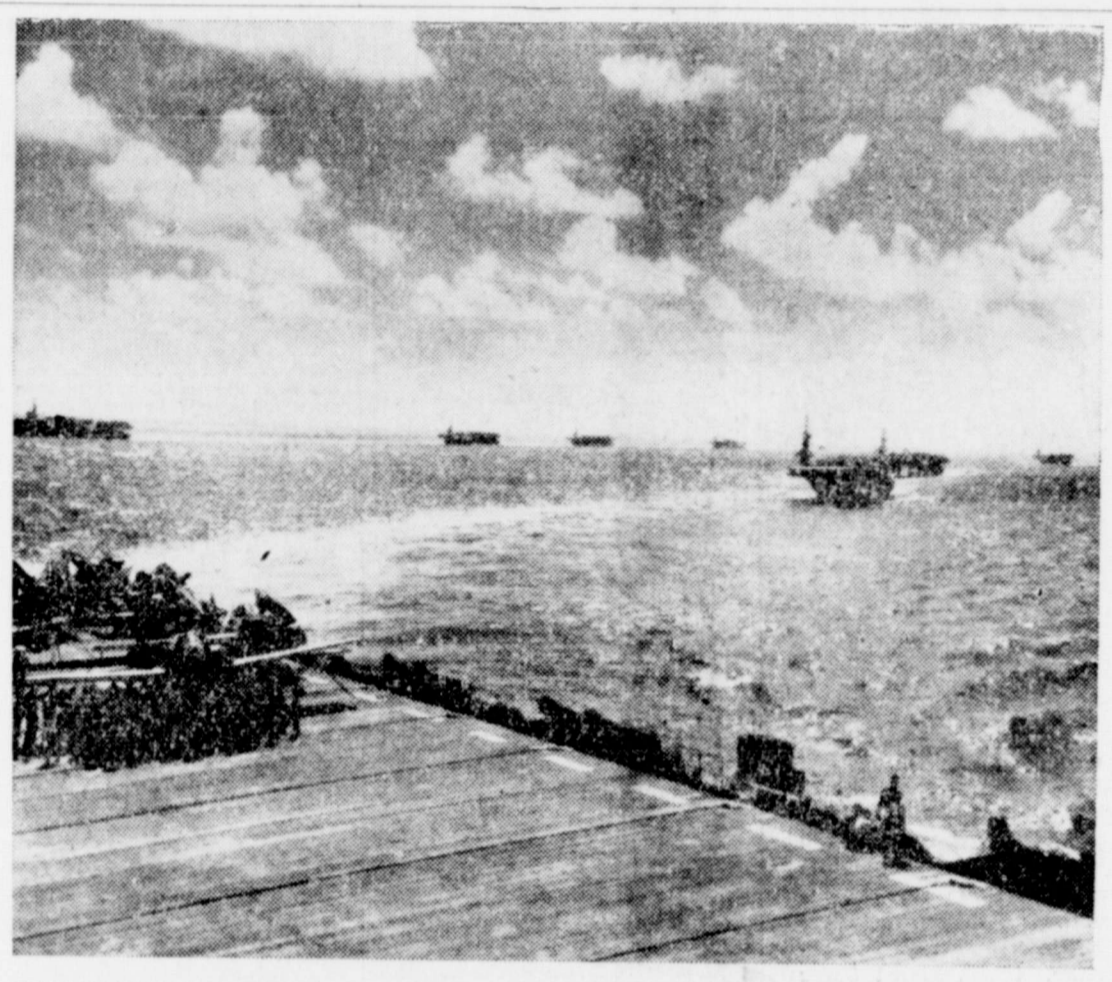
MARINES TAKE VOLCANIC PEAK

OPA Says Auto Repair Charges Often Too High

DALLAS, Feb. 23.—OPA, trying to remedy loose enforcement of automobile repair ceiling charges, soon will move to set a maximum time charge on fifty-four

service jobs. Claud D. Moody, national head of the general repair service section, made this announcement here yesterday. Moody was one of four Washington OPA officials who discussed price adjustment policies with district representatives. The session was closed to the press. 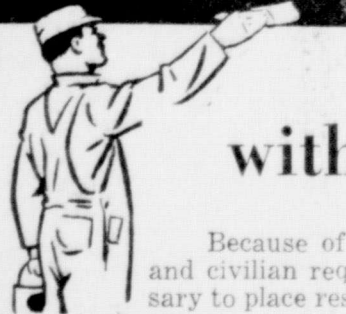

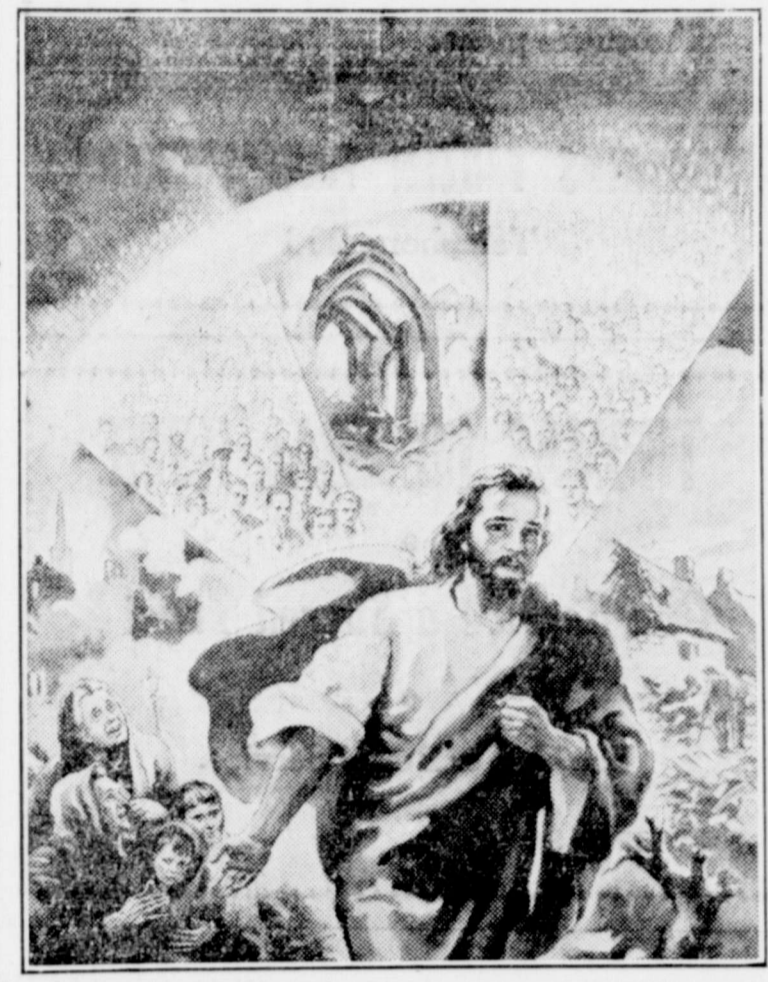
