DIAL PHONE CHANGE SET MONDAY NIGHT

After a long series of frustrations, problems, false starts and interruptions, West Texas Telephone Company officials this week announced their definite date for switching over to dial system as midnight Monday.

This date is almost exactly a year later than the telephone company first planned to switch over when it decided to go dial. However, a long series of frustrating technical difficulties made impossible an earlier completion date.

"We have now reached a position where we can guarantee the Monday changeover," Mr. Bob Novakowski of Henkels & McCoy of Philadelphia, Pa., said this week. Henkels & McCoy is the firm installing the equipment, and their employees worked about 7,000 man-hours on the job.

"We're going to have a certain amount of trouble," Mr. Novakowski said, "because it's almost impossible to do this much intricate and technical work without some sort of trouble developing right off. We hope trouble will be at a minimum, but we expect it and will make corrections as quickly as possible."

Mr. Novakowski went on to explain that the best dial systems are subject to a one percent rate of malfunction which includes traffic congestion. In other words, one of every one hundred dialings can reasonably be expected to foul up.

"It might be possible to install 100 percent efficient equipment," Novakowski explained, "but it would be economically prohibitive. The equipment here will be as good as anywhere when we finish and the people of Dimmitt will have as good a telephone system as anybody."

One of the problems arising from the long delay in switching over is due to the early printing of the telephone directory. It was published shortly before Christmas in anticipation of a hoped-for change-over on January 1. Since that time many things have changed and it will be necessary to print supplements to the directory. The directory will be distributed through the mail Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Patrons should—if they have the time—take a pencil and cross out all the names in the regular listings which appear in the supplement if they run into a crossed-out name or if they seek a name which does not appear in

the regular listings. There was not time enough to print a new directory so the supplement was decided upon as the best way to handle the situation.

Dialing is simple. In Dimmitt the person using the phone to call another Dimmitt resident first dials "MI", the first two letters of the word Mitchell which is the Dimmitt number prefix. If the dial is strange the same effect can be had by dialing 64 as the prefix, which is the same thing on the dial as "MI". The dialer simply puts a finger into the hole over the appropriate number and turns it clockwise to the stop and takes the finger out and lets the dial spin back to neutral. This process is repeated for every digit of the number called. When the first digit is dialed the person using the phone can hear the dial tone stop, and upon completion of dialing the telephone being called will start ringing. The receiver should be lifted from the cradle before dialing begins, otherwise the dial will not work. If the phone being called is busy, an intermittent buzzing will be heard.

Information, reporting a fire, emergencies or placing a long distance call can be done by dialing "0" for operator, which is the furthest hole around, counter-clockwise from the stop.

Bell Telephone Company, the company controlling virtually all prefix assignments in the United States has assigned different prefixes to Hart, Nazareth and Nazareth than those appearing in the directory. These changes were made after the directory was printed. Nazareth will be Whitehall 5 instead of Whitehall 2. Sunnyside will be Victoria 6 instead of Webster 3. Hart changes from Webster 7 to Webster 8. These changes were made to facilitate long-distance calls.

Telephone patrons on a party line who wish to call another person on the same party line should dial 119 plus the last single digit of the number of the person being called. Thus if their number is MI 7-4106, the caller would dial 1196 to get someone on their own party line. Anyone who calls who is not on the party line would dial the full number as indicated in the directory.

A certain amount of work must be done at Hart, Nazareth and Sunnyside before the new numbers in the directory will be in effect. The telephone company will inform its patrons as these changes are made.

The new system will handle 90 calls at any one time, which will make it much more efficient than the old switchboard system which can handle only 72. In addition to the difference in load-carrying capabilities, there is another important speed factor involved in the dial system. There is a certain amount of delay involved in the operator removing the connecting plug from the switchboard while all work of the dial mechanism is virtually instantaneous. To cause an overload of the present system, about twenty percent of the telephones in Dimmitt would have to be in use at one time, which is something that rarely, if ever, happens.

When the company switches over, there will be a stoppage of service for about 30 seconds. Jumper wires have been connected from the telephone lead-in wires to the switchboard. These will be cut with snips at the correct instant. Tooth-
