YANKS SINK JAP DREADNAUGHT

Capt. Paschall Rollicking 3-Act Commended For Comedy, Cisco His Flying Skill School, April 13

NINTH AIR FORCE FIGHTER-BOMBER BASE, France. — The award of the Distinguished Flying Cross was conferred recently upon Cisco's Ninth Air Force P-47 Thunderbolt fighter-bomber pilot, Capt. James C. Paschall, for his "exceptional tactical skill" in leading a diving-bombing mission against a marshalling yard in Germany last December.

The award, presented to Capt. Paschall by Major General Hoyt S. Vendenberg, commanding general of the Ninth Air Force, stated that "Capt. Paschall distinguished himself by superior flying ability and tactical efficiency while leading his squadron on an armed reconnaissance mission against enemy railway systems. Observing a crowded marshalling yard, Capt. Paschall skillfully directed his attack, scoring 18 direct hits in the yard and destroying large amounts of rolling stock and other equipment. Capt. Paschall further demonstrated aggressiveness and determination when he attacked another enemy yard in the vicinity and due to his exceptional tactical skill, enemy resistance was minimized and a paralyzing blow was dealt to enemy communications and supply system."

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Crigger Paschall, Capt. Paschall attended Cisco high school and John Tarleton agricultural college, Stephenville, Tex. He received his wings and commission in October, 1943. 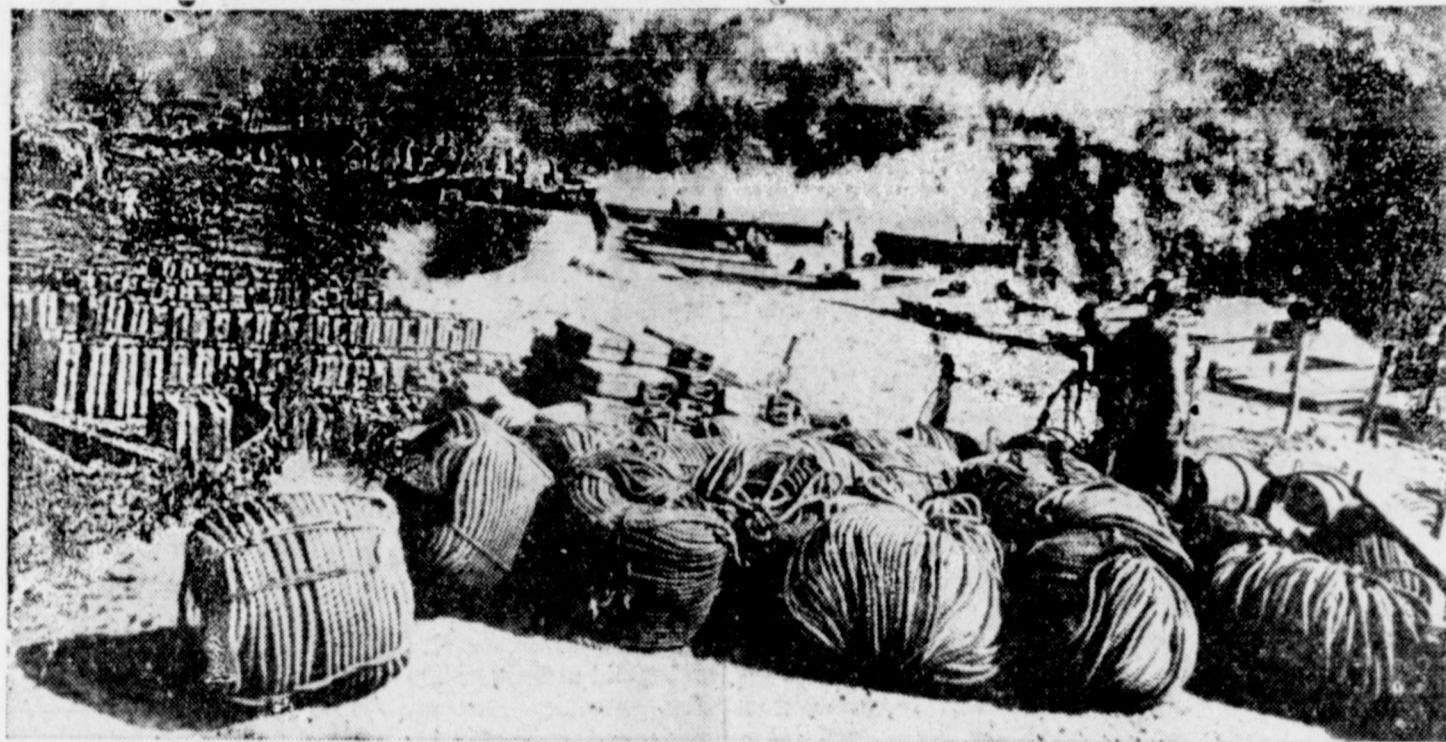

NO COAL FOR BERLIN.

LONDON, April 7.—All coal rations for domestic heating in Berlin have been canceled, the German Transocean news agency announced in a broadcast Saturday.

DESPERATE ENEMY LOST EIGHT OTHER SHIPS AND 400 PLANES IN VICIOUS FIGHT AT OKINAWA

GUAM, April 7.—Admiral Chester Nimitz today announced Japan had lost the most powerful dreadnaught left in her battered fleet—the 40,000-ton super-battleship Yamato—eight other warships sunk or damaged and 400 planes in a desperate air and sea attempt to stem the American invasion of Okinawa.

American losses were three destroyers sunk, several destroyers and smaller craft damaged, and seven planes shot down.

In addition to the Yamato, the Japanese lost a light cruiser of the 600-ton Agano class, a smaller cruiser and three destroyers. Three other destroyers were left burning.

Their air losses included: 116 planes lost to American fighters and anti-aircraft in a Japanese attack April 6 on shore installations and ships off Okinawa; 245 planes shot down by fleet carrier fighters in the same action; 30 Japanese planes shot down April 7, the day on which the Japanese losses were inflicted.

Early this morning, the communique said, Navy search aircraft sighted an enemy surface force which had headed into the East China Sea. The force included the Yamato, the Nagano class light cruiser, one other small light cruiser or large destroyer and a number of destroyers.

A fast carrier task force steamed toward the enemy "at high speed" and during the middle of the day brought the Japanese force under air attacks.

"At a point about 50 miles southwest of Kyushu, they sank the Yamato, the light Nagano class cruiser, the small cruiser and three three destroyers," the communique said.

The Yamato was hit by at least eight torpedoes and heavy bombs. Another announcement revealed that some major units of the British Pacific Fleet also suffered minor damage from air attacks during an earlier five-day bombardment of the Sakishima Islands, southwest of Okinawa. The British force was known to include the 35,000-ton battleship King George V and the 23,000-ton aircraft carrier Illustrious.

A Japanese communique claimed that 21 American warships were sunk or damaged off Okinawa between last Sunday and yesterday. Front dispatches said the Japanese air attacks on the fleet had not interfered with American progress ashore. Despite stiff resistance from Japanese entrenched in prepared defenses, 24th Army Corps troops and tanks rammed southward to within four miles or less from Naha, the island's burning capital, in heavy fighting.

It was decided that in addition to the boxes to be placed at various points in the business district for deposit of clothing and shoes, the Red Cross rooms in the Reynolds building would be opened Mondays and Thursdays from 10 until 11 a. m. to receive contributions. Mrs. A. D. Anderson will check and pack articles left there. Mrs. Hogue reminds that all clothing should be cleaned or washed before being placed in the boxes or left at the rooms.

Nazi Riflemen and Tanks Drive Yanks From German City

PARIS, April 7.—British tanks were reported advancing unopposed within 12 miles of Bremen today as American Ninth Army forces struck out from their Weser river bridgeheads in a powerful drive outflanking Hannover and the big aircraft center of Brunswick, 104 miles from Berlin.

German resistance was breaking up into little more than guerrilla warfare at many points on the Bremen-Hannover line and westward in Holland, where the Canadian First Army all but sealed off the last escape road for an estimated 50,000 Germans locked on the Dutch V-bomb coast.

While Patton's far-flung tank columns slowed down momentarily to regroup and bring up fresh supplies for the drive on Berlin, two strong bands of Nazi Elite Guards broke loose on a wild gun spree far behind his advanced spearheads.

A force of at least 400 German riflemen, backed up by four tanks struck suddenly at American infantrymen in Struth, five miles west of captured Muelhausen and drove the American garrison out of the town after a short, bitter street fight.

Russ Newspaper Condemns Treachery of the Japs

MOSCOW, April 7.—The government newspaper, Izvestia, today charged that "during the most difficult time for the Soviet Union" Japan strengthened her collaboration with Germany, giving the Reich "substantial aid against the Soviet Union."

Izvestia said that the Russo-Japanese neutrality pact had proved useful, especially during the period when "Germany sought new imperialistic conquests and the domination of Europe."

However, Izvestia said, Germany's initial successes in Russia "turned the heads of many Japanese politicians who were ready to gamble on Germany's cards."

Izvestia said that relations with Japan had been highly unsatisfactory for 20 years after the Communist revolution and that Soviet denunciation of the pact "is the direct consequence of the fact that Japan is the ally of Germany which is waging a bandit-like war against the Soviet Union and that Japan is waging war against the Soviet's allies, the United States and Britain."

STOCKS EDGE UPWARD.

NEW YORK, April 7.—Leading stocks, with scattered exceptions, made further recovery headway in Saturday's market. Best prices were recorded at a moderately active opening. While dealings slowed near the final hour, selected rails, steels, utilities and assorted industrials retained fractional advances.

SOVIET RED CROSS AIDED.

LONDON, April 7.—British aid to the Soviet Red Cross has exceeded \$36,000,000, the Moscow radio said Saturday. The figure was revealed when Mrs. Winston Churchill attended a meeting of officers of the Union of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies in Moscow.

City Federation to Sponsor Cisco Cleanup Drive

The City Federation of Women's clubs will sponsor a physical clean-up of Cisco and Mayor Edward Lee has agreed that the city will furnish the necessary trucks to pick up the trash, said Mrs. W. W. Fewell Saturday morning.

The pickup will start Tuesday, May 1, and the Federation suggests that in the meantime citizens place all grass, trimmings from trees, hedges or other accumulated trash in convenient piles, ready for the trucks.

It is especially desired that thorough attention be given to making all alleys in the business and residential districts clean and thoroughly sanitary.

Rotary—Business district off D avenue to C avenue on east and E on west and as far south as there are stores.

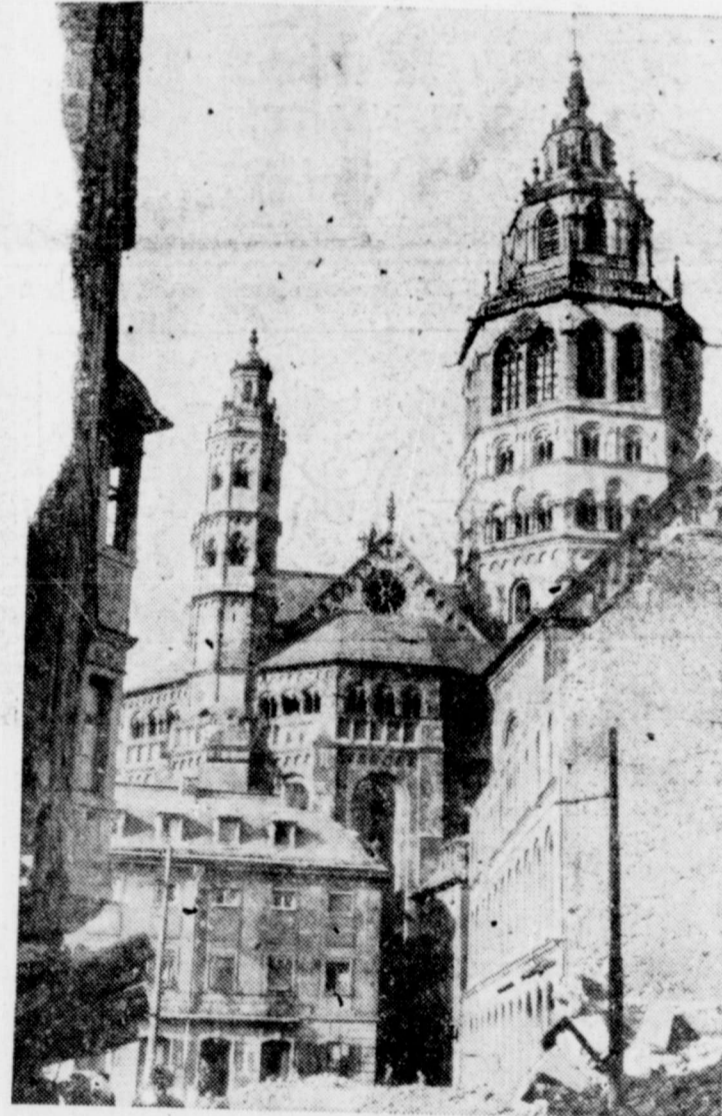
American Legion and Auxiliary—East of D avenue from Sixteenth to Breckenridge highway.

Launching a program aimed at making John William Butts Post of the American Legion a strong factor in aiding returning veterans of World War 2 to readjust themselves to civilian life, members of the post Saturday announced a meeting at the Laguna hotel Monday evening when Capt. Charles Nadeau, veteran of the Normandy beachhead, now at McCloskey hospital, Temple, will be the principal speaker.

The meeting, at which 100 to 125 veterans of both world wars are expected, will begin at 8 o'clock on the roof garden of the hotel. Haywood Cabaness will be toastmaster. A buffet supper will be served without charge.

Members of the various committees in charge of arrangements met at a supper at the Laguna Friday night and checked over details. All committees were represented. It was made clear that all veterans of both world wars, regardless of whether or not they are members of the post, are invited. F. D. Wright, general chairman of committees, presided.

Features of the entertainment will include music by the Ray Judia orchestra and performances by Sid Parks, 16-year-old magician of Abilene. Parks, although an amateur, has a professional rating in magical illusion.

Captain Nadeau, who was for a long while stationed at Abilene, served with the 90th division overseas for about eight months and who participated in the Normandy invasion, was wounded and returned to the states for hospitalization. He is now serving as judge advocate at McCloskey. He is represented as a brilliant speaker and a man thoroughly competent to speak on matters pertaining to the readjustment of veterans to civilian life, as well as competent to report on conditions with respect to American military participation in this war.

Legion committee members served a supper in the blue room of the hotel after which they engaged in an enthusiastic discussion of the program that is being inaugurated to rejuvenate the local post and to make it effective in post-war work. Every Cisco veteran, either of the current war or world war 2, was urged to attend the meeting Monday evening at 8 o'clock on the roof garden.

WEATHER.

"June 30 will be a good day for the church picnic. It's not going to rain then." Such long-range forecasts should be perfectly possible, according to Dr. Charles G. Abbott of the Smithsonian Institute at Washington, who has been forecasting the weather by observing the variations in the sun's heat. Not the heat received on earth, which anyone can measure, but what actually leaves the sun, which has variations too minute for anyone but Dr. Abbot to record.

Not only the weather of the next few months, but that of years to come, falls within his sphere of prophecy. The years 1975 and 2050 will, he says, bring

such intense drought as to lower materially the level of the great Lakes. Our grandchildren had better be prepared.

Weather has usually been something that caught the world unawares. It should be possible to be better prepared for it, and indeed meteorology has made immense gains in the last few years. If Dr. Abbot is on the right track, mankind will call him blessed.

EAST AND WEST.

There has been some material controversy lately as to whether Rudyard Kipling was right or wrong when he wrote the famous lines—

"East is East and West is West, and never the twain shall meet"

Till heaven and earth meet presently at God's great judgment seat."

Certainly things have happened lately in the outer world, and even in our own country, which lead many Americans to maintain as stoutly as ever that there can be no unity, and no complete understanding between people of the Orient and those of the Occident. The Japanese war naturally emphasizes this view.

On the other hand, when Americans who have been in this country for many generations look at some of our "Nisei" or American-born Japanese, and listen to their American slang and observe their progress in American public schools in some states, they begin to wonder whether the Scripture may be right after all, and "God has made of one blood all the nations of the earth."
