Truman Appointee Strong Against a "Brittle" Peace

WASHINGTON, April 28. --America's new representative on the Anglo-American-Soviet Reparations Commission, Edwin W. Pauley, is determined to prevent the making of a "brittle" peace.

Appointed yesterday in a swift, unheralded move by President Truman in place of Dr. Isador Lubin, Pauley, 42-year-old treasurer of the Democratic National Committee, said he was not a 'soft-peace" man.

Whether the peace is hard or soft, he declared, depended on all the United Nations.

"What I can promise in my new position," he said, "is that once the peace is made, I shall do everything in my power to prevent it from becoming a "brittle" peace-that is, one that may be hard in the making but will not hold together under the strain of post-war economics."

POPS AND MOMS.

NEW YORK, April 28-"Moms" are largely responsible for the psychoneurotic cases arising from the war, declares Dr. Edward A. Strecker, psychiatic consultant for the Army and Navy. "Moms" are doting mothers who keep their children from learning how to meet conditions of living, he said Friday in a lecture at the New York University College of Medicine. Sometimes, he added, "Pop is the Mom."
