## Sugar Rationing Won't Start For Several Weeks

Amended regulations governing the issuance of canning sugar, just announced by the OPA, limits the maximum amount of sugar which can be issued to one person for canning purposes to 15 pounds, the Eastland county war price and rationing board made known this week. This does not mean that the maximum will be issued to every person, nor indeed, to any person, since the total which may be issued in the county is limited to an overall average of 10 pounds per person.

Unlike the policy followed last year when a flat 25 pounds per person was issued for canning, the sugar available for this purpose in 1945 will be rationed according to need and the demonstrated custom of families to can fruit.

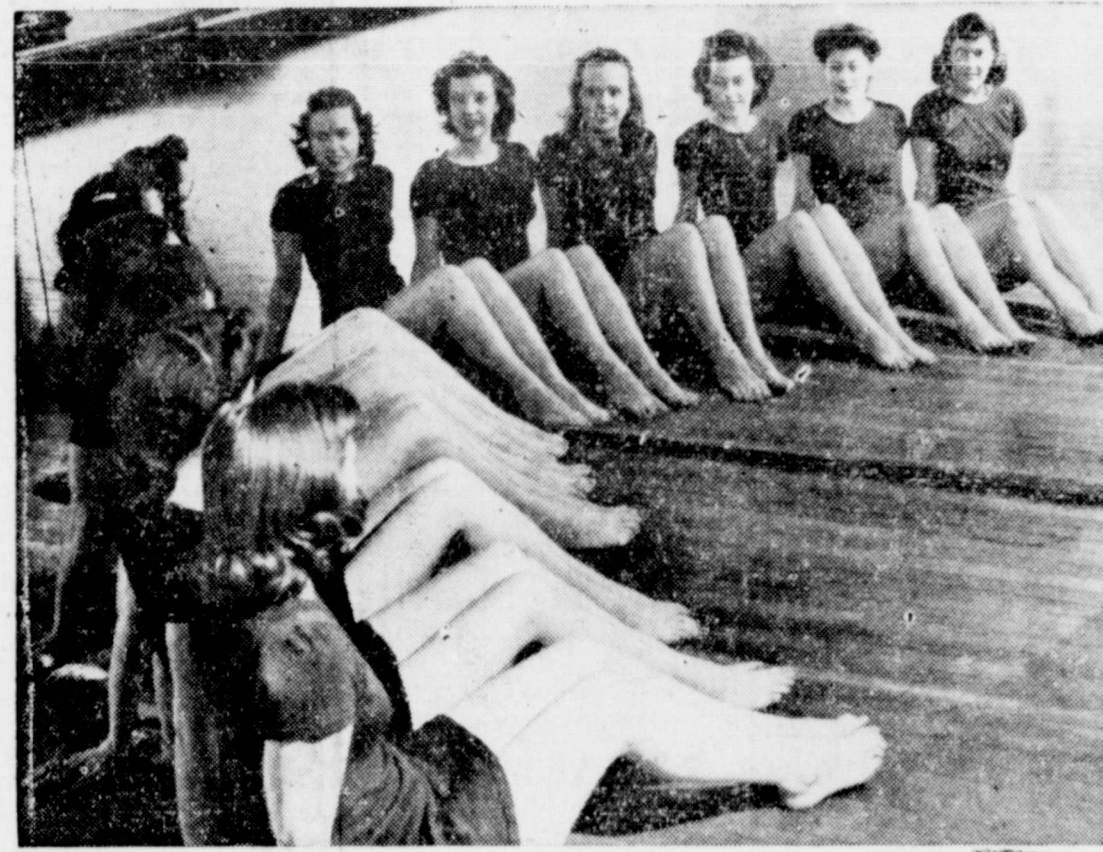
There is plenty of time for obtaining sugar in the county. Applications may be made now but it is unlikely that rations will be issued for two or three weeks, except in cases where strawberries or other early ripening fruits must be preserved. Caution against too free use of sugar for strawberries, which require exceptional amounts of the sugar, was advised, since only one ration of canning sugar will be issued. The plea that "fruit is spoiling" cannot be allowed, the OPA has made clear.

The period for the issuance of canning sugar will extend until October 31 next fall, so that there will be ample opportunity for everyone to obtain a ration. Reports that a time limit has been set for applications are untrue.

Cisco chamber of commerce will be the Cisco ration sub-office, but it has been necessary for the chamber to employ another clerk to handle such applications and this clerk will not be on duty until about the close of school. Those not in immediate need of canning sugar are requested to delay their applications until the clerk is on duty. Present facilities at the chamber are not sufficient to handle the press of sugar ration applications in addition to other rationing services, such as applications for gasoline, shoes, food points and so forth.

However, there are application blanks at the chamber and those wishing them may secure these blanks, take them home and fill them out, attaching spare stamp No. 13 from each of their ration books No. 4 to the form. After the blank is properly filled out it may be deposited in a box at the chamber of commerce.

Those wishing sugar for strawberries should so note on their applications and hand them to the chamber of commerce personnel for quicker action. Caution against using sugar for this type of canning is again suggested, however.

## LATEST FIGHT LED BY MOLOTOV HAS TO DO WITH CONTROL OF CONFERENCE COMMISSIONS

**SAN FRANCISCO, May 1.**—The sting of a whiplash fight over Argentina and Poland drove the United Nations toward a new controversy today over who should control the critical commissions and committees of the world security conference.

This organizational problem normally might have gone through with unity and good feeling on all sides. It appeared likely however, to intensify the struggle for leadership between the United States and Russia, which yesterday cost the Soviet union a defeat on both Argentina and Poland.

Delegates generally seemed to feel that Russia would not pull out of the conference for this or similar reasons. But pessimism about the prospects for unity among the big powers was at a new low.

The situation was dramatically spotlighted late yesterday. Foreign Commissar Molotov marched sternly to the speakers platform at a public session of the full conference to demand a delay in inviting Argentina. Secretary Stettinius mounted to the same rostrum a short time later to insist on immediate and favorable action on the Argentine bid.

Stettinius won for the United States on two counts: the conference voted 28 to 7 against delaying action on inviting Argentina and 31 to 4 that the invitation be extended immediately.

On the first question, Norway, New Zealand, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia and Greece voted with Russia for postponement.

On the second, only Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia and Greece voted with Russia against extending the invitation.

## Group of Abilene Students Protest Trustees' Ruling

**ABILENE, May 1.**—Abilene school trustees last night heard members of high school fraternities and sororities defend their organizations and protest the board's recent move to ban such groups among high school students.

Some 150 students and 50 parents were at the open session called by the board at the request of the fraternities and fraternities.

In its April 16 session the board voted unanimously to adopt the basic principles of a resolution submitted by Parent-Teachers associations of the senior and junior high schools banning all fraternities and fraternities since it was thought "they are a bad influence."

"I don't think the moral issue exists in Abilene," L. E. Dudley, superintendent of city schools, emphasized this morning. "It has not been brought up in board meetings."

**WANT NEW GOVERNMENT.**  
ROME, May 1.—A huge crowd staged a May Day demonstration today in the Piazza del Popolo and cheered the speakers who called for reorganization of the Italian government, nationalization of industry and breaking up of the land estate. Police estimated 100,000 persons attended.

**YANKS INVADE BORNEO.**  
SAN FRANCISCO, May 1.—Allied assault forces swinging southward into the oil producing areas of the Dutch East Indies are invading Borneo, Tokio radio reported today in an unconfirmed broadcast.

## Russ Flags Float Over Berlin and End Draws Near

**LONDON, May 1.**—Victory-flushed Soviet troops made a supreme bid to deal the death blow to flaming Berlin on this May Day. In the words of Marshal Stalin it was the "final assault."

A red victory banner floated over the smoking ruins of the Reichstag, where Hitler rose to power from the ashes of the Reichstag fire of 1933. Heinrich Himmler's ministry of the interior was in Russian hands. Red army troops laid siege to the Fuehrer's underground fortress in the Tiergarten. The Russians were at the Brandenburger gate, Berlin's triumphal arch, and across the Spree river from Berlin's cathedral.

Die-hard German remnants were compressed in the center of the blazing inferno that is Berlin, stubbornly keeping street crossings under a murderous cross fire and "killing in the process the civilian population of the city," a supplementary Moscow communique declared.

Marshal Stalin in a special order of the day said the Russian people were celebrating May Day "under conditions of the victorious termination of the great patriotic war."

His triumphant announcement declared that Soviet troops had "hoisted the banner of victory over Berlin," said the Germans had lost 1,000,000 men killed and 800,000 captured on the eastern front in the last three or four months. He said the Nazis also lost 6,000 planes, 12,000 tanks and 23,000 cannon.

These latest figures raised German casualties announced by Moscow in less than four years of war to a total of 11,540,000.

**MEXICO JOINS U. S.**  
MANILA, May 1.—Col. Antonio Cardenas, commander of the Mexican Expeditionary Airforce here to aid in the fight against the Japanese, was closeted with General MacArthur and Lt. Gen. George C. Kenney for a half hour today. A force of 298 men has arrived, including 31 fighter pilots, is the first Mexican Army unit to fight in the Pacific.

**THIRD MOVES ON.**  
PARIS, May 1.—The 3rd Army crashed southward to within 58 miles of Berchtesgaden today as the 7th Army marched from captured Munich against Innsbruck and the Brenner Pass.

**NEW SUGAR STAMP.**  
FT. WORTH, May 1.—To soften the blow of threatened reduction in canning sugar allotments, housewives today had a new regular sugar stamp, good for five pounds. Sugar stamp No. 36 became valid today and will remain good until August 31. Other stamps validated today are meat stamps Q-2, R-2, S2, T-2, and processed foods stamps Y-2, Z2, A-1, B-1 and C-1.

**VALUABLE WOMAN DEAD.**  
BRYAN, May 1.—Mrs. Maggie Wilkins Hill Barry, 82, who had served Texas A&M College in various capacities since 1918 died here Monday night. She was known for her success as an organizer, for her work among rural women, for her unusual ability at briefing legislation and governmental documents, and as a specialist for the college's extension service. Mrs. Barry organized Texas Rural Women.

## WOMAN'S ROLE.

Women have a role to play in securing and preserving world peace which, according to Miss Fannie Hurst, they have not yet quite grasped. Miss Hurst in a recent talk explains it as follows:

"Enduring peace, based on our own moral and intellectual convictions, must be expressed politically — a ward to which we as women are slightly allergic. Political action is an instrument to be used in active resistance to war. Collectively, you become a vast political power never yet realized. Organization represents a means to an end, an instrument to be used in achieving lasting peace.

"Scientific development indicates that the next war, should it come, will be merely a matter of push-button annihilation. This fact alone would prove that the time is now for women to realize their power in the blueprint of the world ahead of us."

She has put her finger upon the deterring factor. Women, who know to the full the anguish of war, the tragic cost of failure, hesitate to speak out in full because to do so means organization and participation in the political field. Yet, surely no cooperative action which might ensure permanent freedom from fear of attack could ever cost too much in time, effort or determination.

## PROOF.

There are good reasons for let-

ting Berlin fall to the Russians rather than to the Americans or British. Not the least is its mental effect upon the Germans. Great Britain and the United States are not part of the European continent. Germany could lose its capital to either and still think itself the greatest power in Europe, but to lose Berlin to the Russians is definitely to take second place.

The Germans have talked so much of themselves as the master race that they may profit from one searing proof that they are not.

## UNIONS.

Labor unions are doing something new. They are buying wholesale lots of books which they think their members should read, and giving them away to the rank and file. These are not necessarily pro-labor books. Of Wendell Willkie's "One World" the unions bought nearly 60,000 copies because they thought it the kind of book any good citizen should read.

Last year a Labor Book Club was established by the United Automobile Workers of America. The club buys important books at a wholesaler's discount and distributes them to its members. When the paper shortage lifts, the membership will be thrown open to the whole C. I. O.

The American workingman will be none the worse for reading serious books about domestic and foreign problems. Neither would any other American.

## June, 1925.

Former Governor Charles W. Bryan of Nebraska, who spoke at the Cisco chautauqua Saturday, was so impressed with Cisco that he remained over until this morning before proceeding to Ranger, where he speaks tonight. Accompanied by Mayor J. M. Williamson and others, the ex-governor visited Lake Cisco and the dam Sunday afternoon and was greatly pleased by what he saw. Sunday night Mr. Bryan attended services at the First Presbyterian church and heard Dr. Gaines B. Hall deliver a most interesting sermon. Mr. Bryan, however, is a member of the Baptist church, although his famous brother William Jennings Bryan, is a devout member of the Presbyterian church.

At a meeting of the school board at the business office Thursday night, (June 4) several matters of importance were transacted, including the election of Miss Louise Snoddy of the Scranton community, as a teacher in the Cisco school at a salary of \$90 per month. The salary of G. H. Wells as principal of the high school, was increased from \$2,250 to \$2,650 for ten months service. This is the salary agreed upon by Mr. Wells and the school board, contingent upon which hung his decision to remain here. The board also agreed to the terms of Coach W. B. Chapman, whose salary was officially placed at \$185 per month, plus \$835 per year to be paid by the athletic association. Mr. Chapman has not been seen, but it is understood that he has accepted and will remain with the Cisco high school another year. The action of the board in retaining both Principal Wells and Coach Chapman meets with the approval of a large percentage of the patrons of the school. Other matters transacted by the board was the employment of B. E. Pyron as janitor of the high school for the remainder of the year at a salary of \$125 per month. The

board appropriated \$50 to defray the expenses of Dr. P. W. Horn, president of Texas Technological college, who came here to deliver the graduating address; also \$15 was appropriated to Rev. Gaines B. Hall, who preached the bacca-

laureate sermon. The application to use the auditorium was granted to a musical aggregation provided the president of the board found it unobjectionable, the rental being \$10. The meeting was attended by both J. J.

Godbey and J. H. Morgan, the retiring and incoming school superintendents. Members of the board present were J. S. Stockard, president, presiding; Wm. Reagan, J. T. Berry, Dr. C. C. Jones and Dr. E. L. Graham.

During two years of fighting with the Philippine guerrillas, the Army made this Marine an officer, gave him the Distinguished Service Cross. He left death's province finally, escaping to the United States. But he didn't want safety. One day at Iwo, odds and death caught up with him. They rode one of the three bullets a sniper fired from a cave.
