

SAN FRANCISCO, May 12 .-Kuzma B. Kiselev, foreign commissar of Soviet White Russia, said today that the German people must be forced to rebuild with their own hands the towns and o'clock tonight his subject will during the war. cities destroyed by their armies

Just how this is to be done, Kiselev said in his first interview with any foreign correspondent is something to be determined by the final European peace conference which should be called "as soon as possible" after the conclusion of the United Nations assembly here.

"Mind you," he said in his native tongue, "we are not very keen on German help in rebuilding our country. They have not proved to be good workers when used as war prisoners. But we believe this to be a matter of supreme justice."




