Eastland Co. Needs More Speed if Bond **Quota Promptly Met**

Eastland, Texas.

At the end of this week only three more weeks will remain of to your postoffice or bank and the three months that were set aside to put over the Seventh War E quota for the Seventh War Loan. The amount of the Seventh Loan? War Loan for the nation is \$14,-000,000,000; \$7,000,000,000 of this is to be subscribed by the corporations and \$7,000,000,000 is to be subscribed by individuals. Of this science! Very kindly yours, last \$7,000,000,000, \$4,000,000,000 is to be subscribed in Series E Eastland County War Finance

Eastland county's part of this oan is \$680,000, \$405,000 of which is to be Series E Bonds, and the other \$275,000 is to be made up from any or all of the seven different issues offered for sale dur ing this loan. So it will be seen that on Thursday of last week Eastland county had subscribed only 48.48 percent of the Series E quota, as officially returned by the several postoffices and banks in Eastland

county on that day. However, at the close of business Saturday, June 2, 1945, the Series E sales in the county had reached a total of approximately \$250,000, leaving a balance of \$155,000 to be subscribed during the balance of June.

This will be no small task, and unless each individual in the county, each community in the county, each town in the county, each city in the county, and each and all of your official committees in the county do their full duty, we are liable to find on the last day of June that we have failed our quota, and if this be the case, we will not have failed our government in this great task, but even more important, we will have failed our boys and girls in the armed forces throughout the world.



This airport map of Texas shows how citizens of this state will participate in the nationwide airport expension program being sponsored by the Civil Aeronautics Administration and now under discussion in Congress. When completed Texas will have 532 airports, far more than any other state in the Union. The entire program is designed to encourage private flying and the development of commercial air transportation.

Exclusive of buildings, hangars and special facilities, the cost of the proposed State program is estimated at \$120,923,000 of which the Federal Government would pay half and local agencies the remainder. Buildings and equipment will add an estimated 25% to the total. This map was prepared by Cities Service Company from official records of the CAA.





ing menu long before that age.

Babies vary in the kind of growth they make and your physician recognizes what additional foods are necessary and when they should be started. However, there is a more or less general plan which is usually followed.

weeks of age, some form of vitamin D is given. The doctor may specify one of the concentrates, as viosterol, or he may say to give cod liver oil. Even though baby has learned to take crange juice and the cereal is thinned with milk, it is not liquid; it is the first solid food. It feels different in his mouth.
