1,611 People Entered Texas Prisons During 1944

HUNTSVILLE, June 21. - A total of 1,611 new inmates, 44 of them women, were received in the Texas prison system in 1944, according to the annual report of J. C. Roberts, chief of the bureau of records and identification, who said the average daily count in the system last year was 3,461.

There were 1,579 new inmates received in 1943.

The report shows approximately 66 per cent of the average daily population was released on parole or conditional pardon, or left the system by reason of discharge, escape or death.

The report said that 673 more inmates were released than were received as new prisoners during the year. The highest population during the year was 3,666, the lowest 3,344.






