# 87,343 OKINAWA JAPS KILLED

## Cisco Lacks \$9,000 of Its Overall Bond Quota of \$138,000

## Visitor Spoke on Aims of San Francisco Conference

The San Francisco Peace Conference was the subject of Rev. Durwood Fleming, pastor of Eastland First Methodist church, today at Cisco Rotary club. He was introduced by Rotarian Jesse Proctor, in charge of the program. Lt. James Johnston and Dave Franklin were also guests.

At the business session J. E. Hays said the club had accomplished seven straight perfect attendance meetings, with two absent today who would almost surely make up.

The speaker talked along the line he did to the Lions club recently telling of the frame work of the conference, which took for its basis the Dumbarton Oaks charter of last August. He told of the setup of the charter, outlining its mechanics as well as the aims it expected to achieve. Of course, the speaker said, there has been many compromises — no nation getting everything it wanted — but, just like the framing of our own early constitution of the United States, it set up a workable framework which can and will be changed and added to as time goes on.

Answering the question as to whether it has been a success, Mr. Fleming said he thought it was a mastery achievement and should lead to a closer alignment of the nations toward lasting peace which would sooner or later come, even though we might still have to do some fighting to secure it.

The speaker said that an unconditional surrender took with it the obligation of caring for the people whom it took over. It brought problems that the allies must solve, since the very nature of the surrender voided the conquered people having much to say about their future.

He then went on to show the framework of the charter — the general assembly — in which all nations could have complete freedom of talk without legislative power more than to elect the six members of the permanent security council who, added to the five permanent members, make up the eleven members of that council. He then told how this body would go about accomplishing this security through its various powers of restraint, economic pressure and various other means, including actual military force.

The economic council was then taken up with its eighteen members who would be more or less experts and technicians, telling how they would work to restrain nations through a number of means which he named, to secure liberty and justice to all nations and all people subscribing to this charter.

The international court of justice, composed of fifteen members, five of whom are to be elected each three years, was then discussed showing that it would be much like our own supreme judiciary.

Those present spoke their appreciation of the program, wishing they had longer to listen to a more detailed analysis of the charter. Mr. Fleming was invited to return at a later date and bring them to an up-to-date understanding of the subject.

TAYLOR COUNTY OVER. ABILENE, June 21. — With a total sales of \$1,309,328.75 in Series E bonds, Taylor county has soared \$19,328.75 over its Seventh war loan quota. The goal in the Series E bonds had been set at \$1,290,000. When C. M. Caldwell, county war bond chairman, made the announcement last night, total overall sales had reached \$2,877,962.25, which is \$352,962.25 over the total quota of \$3,525,000.

LATE CASUALTIES. WASHINGTON, June 21. — American casualties today reached a total of 1,023,453 dead, wounded, missing and prisoners of war. This was an increase of 6,356 over last week's total for the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard.

WOUNDED RETURNING. NEW YORK, June 21. — The S. S. Santa Rosa docked today at Staten Island — a Purple Heart ship. Almost two-thirds of the 1,420 returning veterans aboard headed for Halloran hospital. In addition to the wounded, the former Caribbean cruise liner carried 38 liberated American prisoners of war and 461 troops for re-assignment.

## 885 NIPS SURRENDERED FIRST 3 DAYS OF THIS WEEK, PROBABLY A PACIFIC WAR RECORD

GUAM, June 21. — End of the Okinawa campaign was announced today by Fleet Adm. Chester W. Nimitz 82 days after U. S. Tenth Army troops invaded the island 325 miles south of Japan. Admiral Nimitz' special communique announcing successful completion of the campaign in which more than 90,000 enemy troops were killed or captured, came within an hour after Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell was named to take over command of the Tenth Army in future operations. The text of Nimitz' brief communique read:

"After 82 days of fighting the battle of Okinawa has been won. Organized resistance ceased 21 June. Stilwell will succeed Lt. Gen. Simon Bolivar Buckner, Jr., who was killed in action on Okinawa only Monday as he watched his forces carve up the Japanese remnants in the final phase of the campaign. With the battle of Okinawa now officially concluded, Stilwell can concentrate on readying the combat-tested 10th army for the next stage.

Last Friday, Buckner told Associated Press Correspondent, Al Dopping: "I can't see this battle lasting more than a week longer. Eight hundred eighty-five Nipponese surrendered the first three days of this week — probably a Pacific war record — but there was no weakening of their comrades' determination to live up to the command to kill 10 Yarka before being conquered. Lt. Harry Hartman, Cairo, Ill., Army medical officer at the front, told Associated Press Correspondent Robert Geiger there was evidence some Nipponese were "filled" with narcotics. Other medicines supported his statement.

Fleet Adm. Chester W. Nimitz reported today that total Japanese casualties from the April 1 invasion through Tuesday were 89,908, of whom 87,343 were killed and 2,565 taken prisoners. ## Union Men Hurt War Effort For Selfish Reasons

WASHINGTON, June 21. — Disputes kept some 50,000 employees on the sidelines along the nation's labor front today.

The work stoppage curtailed production in war plants; hampered transportation of some 60,000 passengers in a nine-state area and slowed truck movement of foods and war materials in parts of the Midwest.

The biggest single strike was in Akron, Ohio, where 16,700 CIO United Rubber Workers at the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company stayed away from their jobs. Hopes faded for a prompt settlement as union members voted to defy a WLB back-to-work order and there was a possibility the government would take possession.

In Sixth Day. The strike was in its sixth day and a naval official said it has halted shipments of tires for almost all types of Navy vehicles. Agreement has been reached on most of the 30 issues involved in the dispute, but C. V. Wheeler, local head of the union in Akron, said the strikers would not be sent back to work "under present working conditions."

SEIZURE AGAIN HALTED. INGLESDALE, June 21. — Seizure of Humble Oil's war-vital Ingleside refinery by the Petroleum Administration for war was stalled again today under renewal of a temporary restraining order granted by Federal District Judge T. M. Kennerly.

F. D. McMahon, general superintendent of the Humble Pipe Line company, and C. C. Moore, assistant secretary of the company, were here today from Houston to attend a meeting of supervisors from this district. Both men are former residents of Cisco and have many friends here.

## 1,611 People Entered Texas Prisons During 1944

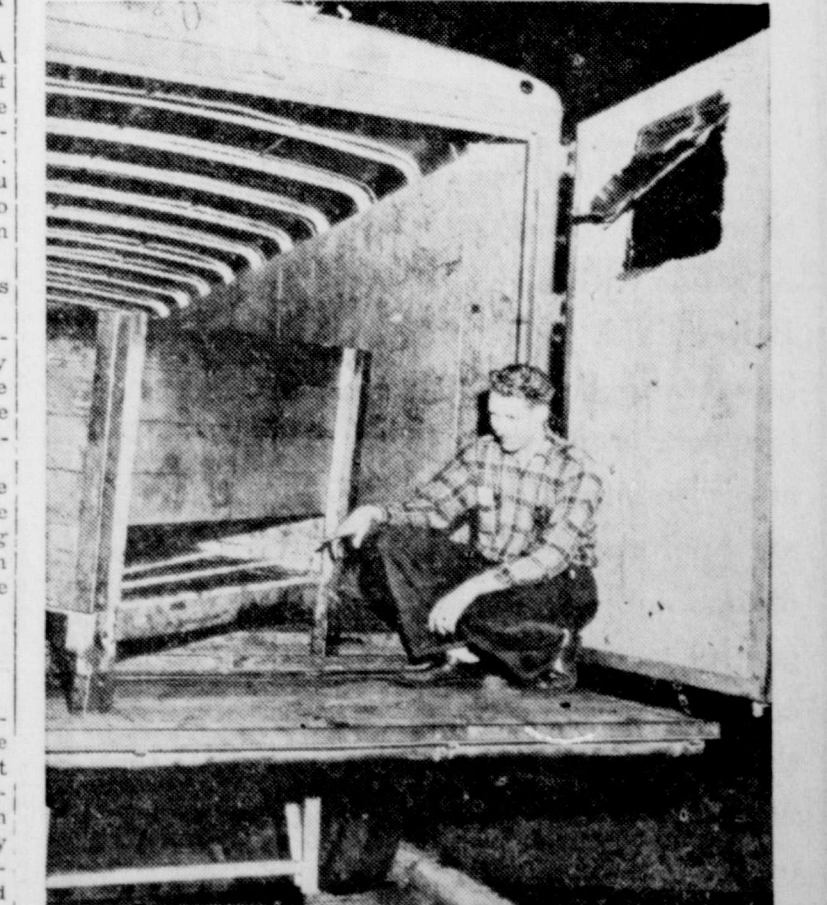
HUNTSVILLE, June 21. — A total of 1,611 new inmates, 44 of them women, were received in the Texas prison system in 1944, according to the annual report of J. C. Roberts, chief of the bureau of records and identification, who said the average daily count in the system last year was 3,461.

There were 1,579 new inmates received in 1943. The report shows approximately 66 per cent of the average daily population was released on parole or conditional pardon, or left the system by reason of discharge, escape or death.

The report said that 673 more inmates were released than were received as new prisoners during the year. The highest population during the year was 3,666, the lowest 3,344.

## ARSON ATTEMPT.

FT. WORTH, June 21. — An attempt to burn the "Y" package store, which was operated west of Fort Worth by Gordon W. Gilbreath, 30, before he was slain two weeks ago, was made today when it was discovered that several cases of expensive whiskey had been removed from the place. An arson suspect, 28, was detained by officers. Since Gilbreath was shot to death by his 25-year-old wife, Velma, the package store has been closed.

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## ANTI-NAZI GERMAN.

From concentration camp to president. This 1945 success story is the career of Frederick Schaeffer, whom the American military government has just appointed to the new post of president of Bavaria. Before Hitler, Schaeffer headed the Bavarian People's party, composed of conservative anti-Nazis. Naturally this did not recommend him to Hitler, and of late he has been in the Dachau concentration camp. The Nazi downfall has just released him.

It is worth remembering that when Germany had free elections, Hitler never got a majority. In the last poll, that of 1932, he got only 13,400,000 votes to Field Marshal Von Hindenburg's 19,400,000, and 3,700,000 for the Communist candidate. While most anti-Nazis later swallowed their convictions to save their skins, some did not. Otherwise there would have been no need for concentration camps.

If Schaeffer is a sincere anti-Nazi, he is running a risk in taking this post. The American-appointed mayor of Aachen, murdered by Hitlerite gangsters, was not the first decent German to learn that in his country murder has been for a quarter of a cen-

## NEWS FREEDOM.

The ideal of a free press, which was a novelty in most countries when it was put into the United States Constitution, has almost swept around the world. The one first-class nation for which this cannot yet be truly said is Russia.

There is some reassurance in the moderate loosening up of Nazi war information lately, and the somewhat freer behavior of Russians in general toward the Allies—when conditions are favorable. Individually the "Russkys" give an impression of friendliness and good will. But there has been little contact permitted from the Russian side, and thus the two great allies have had very little chance to get acquainted.

The Russians, of course, have a defense against complaints of coldness on their part. They can say that we have seemed no less cold toward them than they were toward us. Both sides are wary of each other ideologically. Yet these two great nations, which together are capable of controlling the world and creating a new and better civilization, should be able somehow to cooperate fruitfully without quarreling.

# NIPS AND BOMBERS LOST

## 450 B-29S TODAY STRUCK LAST LARGE NAVAL ARSENAL OF NIPS AND FIVE AIRCRAFT FACTORIES

GUAM, June 22. — Four hundred and fifty B-29s today struck Japan's last large naval arsenal and five big aircraft factories with 3,000 tons of demolition bombs in a precision raid made visually from medium altitude in clear weather. Seven other small industrial targets were fire-raided Monday and Wednesday. A Japanese communique claimed 26 of the giant raiders were shot down or damaged. Japan's two largest arsenals, Osaka and Hiro, previously were virtually destroyed. The Kure plant blasted today, manufacturing guns up to 16 inches projectiles, fuses, propellants and torpedoes. It covered approximately 11,000,000 square feet. The other five targets were the Mitsubishi and Kawasaki aircraft plants at Kagamigahara, 20 miles north of Nagoya; Kawanishi aircraft plant at Himeji and the Kawasaki aircraft plant at Akashi, both in the Kobe area, and the Mitsubishi-Mishima aircraft factory at Tamashima, 90 miles west of Kobe. B-29s already have destroyed or damaged 112 square miles of Japanese urban industrial areas. 1st Bomber command headquarters announced while today's raids were in progress. Three smaller cities — Shizuoka, Yokkaichi and Toyohashi — each was more than 50 percent destroyed in incendiary raids Monday and Wednesday. Reconnaissance photographs revealed the damage was Shizuoka 2.28 square miles, Yokkaichi, 1.23 and Toyohashi, 1.72. They further showed 1.28 square miles burned out in Hamamatsu. Today's six-target demolition strikes were the first with high explosives in the B-29s new program of destroying secondary industrial areas — a program necessitated by the virtual elimination of original primary targets in Tokyo, Yokohama, Osaka, Nagoya and Kobe. ## U.S. WANTS MASS TRIAL FOR GUILTY

LONDON, June 22. — Justice Robert H. Jackson announced today a United States plan to prosecute Germany's arch war criminals in one collective trial and expressed the hope that it might start "before the end of the summer." Justice Jackson, chief United States prosecutor, emphasized at a press conference that he could not speak for the three other major western powers, but said no objection to the proposal had yet been lodged by Britain, Russia or France. The British foreign office announced that representatives of the United States, Britain, France and Russia would open discussions in London next week to draw up a list of the major criminals and settle plans for their trial. Jackson elaborated upon information of the collective trial plan obtained earlier in the day from a responsible American source. The United States plan envisions trial by a military tribunal with each of the four major powers represented by "one or two judges," Jackson said. Jackson emphasized that "no man will be given immunity because he has held a high military position if there is evidence to prove that he is a war criminal. In the first exposition of plans for the trial of war criminals given to newspapermen here, the Supreme court justice said the trials would start "at the earliest possible moment — just as soon as we have a reasonably complete case." HOUSTON, June 22.—Protesting their inability to buy meat at OPA ceiling prices, some 700 Houston retail grocers voted last night to close their meat departments next Monday and keep them closed until wholesalers are forced to comply with price regulations. The meat blackout vote came in a mass meeting following suggestion of such action by District OPA Director Stephen J. Tully, who agreed the markets should close if the operators are unable to buy meat at official ceiling prices.

WITH SIXTH ARMY ON LUZON. — Corp. Billy R. Graves, son of Ben Graves, Rising Star, Texas, and husband of Dorothy Graves, Cisco, Texas, a lineman with the 293rd Joint Assault Signal Company, has been awarded the presidential unit citation. All members of the company who participated in the invasion of Normandy won the coveted ribbon for setting up and maintaining communications on the French beach-head. This highly trained combined operations group, made up of both army and navy men, were the first combat unit to move from the European theater and take part in operations in the Pacific. They directed the shattering naval and air bombardment of the Normandy coast and shortly after the fall of Paris they moved directly to the Pacific. Here they joined Gen. Walter Krueger's Sixth army which was preparing for the Luzon landing. At Lingayen Gulf they went ashore with a special assault team and directed naval and air fire at Japanese positions, making possible the swift advance of American troops.

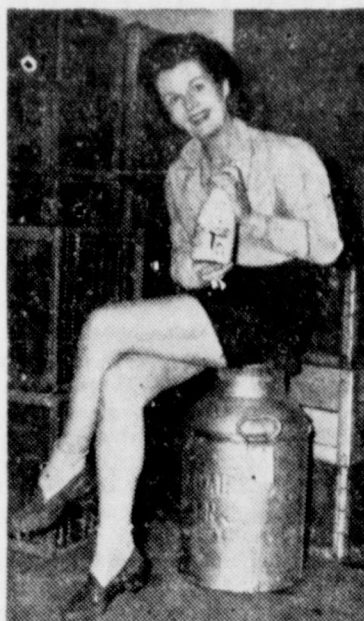

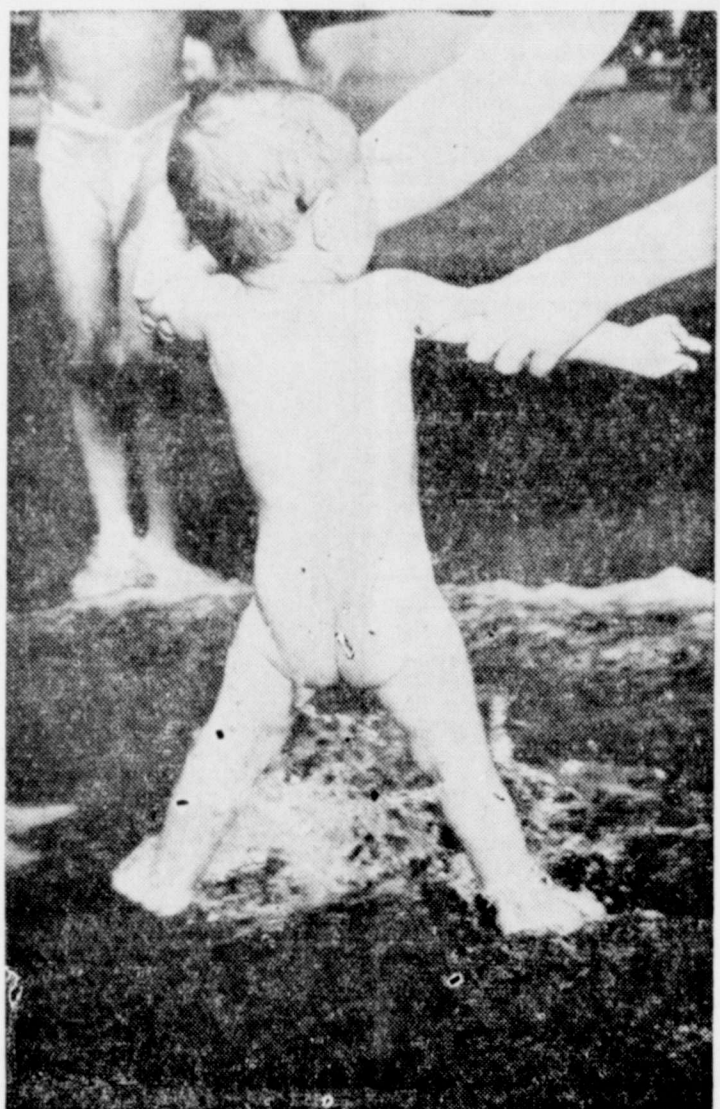

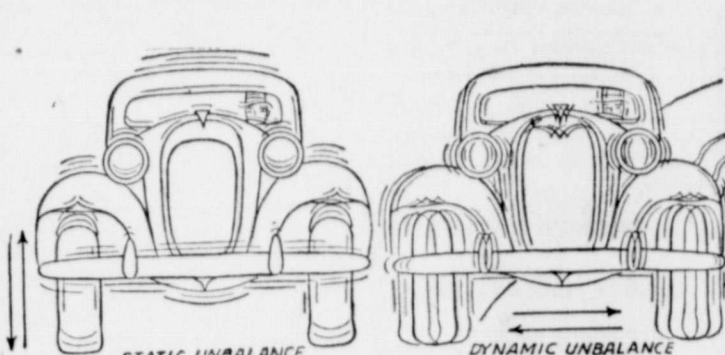
