## POUNDING OF JAPAN UNCEASING

### Wright OKS Compulsory Military Training For All

A talk by Forrest D. Wright on compulsory military training at the Rotary club today was pronounced by Rotarians as one of the best they had heard on the subject. Many expressed themselves as heartily in agreement with his views.

With all absentees for last week making up their attendance, J. E. Hays announced the eleventh consecutive perfect attendance for the club.

Other visitors and guests were Lt. Cecil Halbert, J. W. Shepard, and Harold Fisher, the latter being introduced by R. N. Cluck as the new head coach for the school next season.

Mr. Wright was presented by Lennie Shockley, program chairman for the day. The speaker prefaced his talk by making some quotations from Major Wolters of Camp Wolters, whom he had heard on the subject recently.

There were two main points in the argument for military training of the youth. One point was that it would provide our nation with a well trained adequate army and the other point stressed the value of this training to the individual himself.

Quoting from Major Wolters, the speaker said it was foolish to believe that all nations were going to be good when this war shall have passed or that selfish interests would not clash, or that some would not get too ambitious for a greater share of honor or power. People of the many nations cannot be trusted to remain friendly, and the only way to insure any kind of lasting peace is to be so well prepared that others would hesitate to pick a quarrel. This will always be true, he said, as long as men are human beings with all the frailties that come to such creatures. Despite the seemingly good will now existing among the allies, a few years may change the picture entirely. Even some of the most friendly nations may become avowed enemies in a short time if their interests should clash.

Mr. Wright stressed the value of military training for the man himself. He said he believed in this training for rich, poor, strong and weak, alike. He said he believed that the sickly or crippled would profit greatly by this training, though it might be necessary to vary some of the training to suit the latter condition.

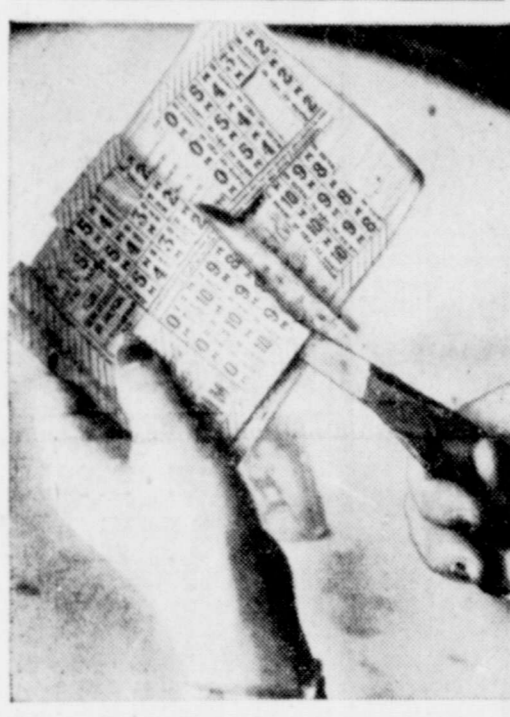
With that training from a physical standpoint, will always come a certain amount of education along the line of mental and practical efficiency. There will be the training that will fit men to act together as units and fit each to get along with others in future business life. Military discipline is well calculated to make young men into well-rounded citizens.

Speaking of some objections he had heard, Wright said he did not think soldiers differed materially from other citizens, except that it broadened them in their outlook on life. It did not make killers or bloodthirsty men of them. It does give them a greater appreciation of their own home and country.

Many soldiers returning from the present war have expressed themselves as wishing they had had more time for training before they were called into active service.

With compulsory military training, there will be more time to prepare an army for any eventualities, and this will lighten the cost by many millions, for every one knows that much money is wasted when vast armies must be trained with little warning.

### Ciscoan Will Get Merchants, Citizens Should Salvage More Paper

WITH 13TH ARMORED DIVISION IN ASSEMBLY AREA COMMAND. — Enroute to the United States from the European continent, Pfc. Ira Smith of 409 W. Seventh street, Cisco, Texas, is now being processed at Camp Atlanta in northeastern France, as a member of the first ETO armored division to be ordered to the Pacific.

Pfc. Smith is a member of C Company, 46th Tank Bn., and served with the 13th Armored Division in the Battle of the Ruhr Pocket and in the drive through Bavaria into Austria. He holds two battle stars.

The 13th, popularly known as the Black Cat Division, captured more than 20,000 German prisoners in the fighting in the Ruhr and took an additional 19,000 in Bavaria. In the closing days of the war in Europe, it captured Hitler's birthplace city of Braunau, Austria, and liberated 14,000 Allied prisoners of war.

Pfc. Smith is the husband of Mrs. Jewel M. Smith, Cisco, Texas. He will be given a furlough before the division begins its training for action in the Pacific.

### HALIFAX MENACED.

HALIFAX, July 19. — Fire spreading uncontrolled through the nearby Royal Canadian naval arsenal set off a continuous drum-fire of heavy ammunition today, driving thousands from their homes in Halifax and Dartmouth and pinning them against the sea. No trains were leaving or arriving and all boats had fled the harbor.

packing and shipping. In fact, about two-thirds of the paper is used that way. Since we should, according to present emergency needs, save one-third of all paper for reconversion into packing papers, we must turn more attention to the saving of corrugated boxes and heavy wrapping paper, in which shipments of merchandise are received.

"Paper is nothing more, generally speaking, than thin sheets of flexible wood. Its use once no more exhausts its usefulness than the wearing of our clothing justifies throwing away garments. Yet we ordinarily think only of burning wrapping paper and cereal boxes and soap boxes and so on.

"Then we think of paper as a terrible fire hazard. Well, what is in the state capitol at Austin? Paper records. What is in the court house? What is kept in banks, in libraries, in churches, in office buildings? Paper. So, just as its ONE USE theory proves extravagant, so the hazardous nature of paper loses its significance when we stop to think about it.

"Finally, without paper you would be completely lost. From the birth records and certificates, through school reports, marriage license, draft card, deeds, notes, mortgages, insurance policies, bonds, to the unconditional surrender and G. I. Joe's final discharge, it is a paper trail, all the way.

### ADVOCATES WAGE HIKE.

WASHINGTON, July 19. — Four house members introduced legislation today to raise minimum wages under the wage-hour law from 40 to 65 cents an hour. The bill called for lifting the minimum to 65 cents during the first year after its passage, to 70 cents the following year and 75 cents after two years.

### US. To Help Reds Only If They Aid Us In Jap Fight

POTSDAM, July 19. — President Truman carried into the third Big Three session today the most potent bargaining stock of the conference — billions of dollars of American aid to be balanced off against military help in the Pacific.

Premier Stalin and Prime Minister Churchill are learning that Mr. Truman's position in this conference is strictly give and take.

The President's policy is essentially this: The United States will not pour out its tremendous material wealth without something concrete in return. It will not undertake fresh economic burdens without some concessions from the other side.

And Mr. Truman is completely uninterested in concessions involving goods or cash — because there simply isn't any of either in Europe.

Instead, he intends to fit the United States' material wealth to the situation of the different United Nations, including Russia. And the best legal tender in his view is anything that will bring the war against Japan to a speedy end.

The horse-trading Missourian is known to be sympathetic to Europe's reconstruction needs, but he believes that the United States' economic structure will not stand too much additional strain without some form of cooperative compensation.

Meanwhile, all accounts filtering out through the close conference censorship indicated that startling developments are impending in the Japanese war. It was believed here that a definite connection exists between Stalin's recent conversations with Chinese Premier T. V. Soong in Moscow and Soong's earlier talks with Mr. Truman in Washington.

### FERGUSON MEMORIAL.

AUSTIN, July 19. — Ferguson Memorial Foundation of Austin is formally soliciting funds for the erection of a monument to the late James E. Ferguson, twice elected governor of Texas and whose wife, Miriam A. Ferguson, also was elected for two gubernatorial terms and who will be included in the testimonial. The recently adjourned legislature voted permission for the Ferguson monument to be erected in the state cemetery in Austin, where Ferguson is buried. Contributions of \$1 or more may be mailed to C. M. Spradley, Dallas, or Roy Sanderson, Belton, Texas.

RUSK, July 19. — The fate of a \$3,500,000 postwar project hangs in the balance as indignant East Texans protest a Washington order halting construction on a blast furnace and chemical plant near here.

More than \$2,000,000 already has been spent on the project, which was scheduled for completion within the next ninety days. Commitments had been received from foreign markets for the entire output of pig iron for the next two years and the anticipated pay roll of 500 was expected to take up much of the postwar unemployment slack in this area. But the unexpected order from the Defense Plant Corporation has cast a pall of uncertainty over the potential iron ore center.

Observed a local civic leader: "It looks as if we will have lots of jobless walking the streets even before our soldiers get home, and nothing but the framework of an idle furnace to show for our years of work."

Rusk, in the heart of one of the richest iron ore belts in the south, launched the blast furnace project in 1939, two years before Pearl Harbor. The war necessitated a review of the entire picture and for three years the WPB breathed hot, then cold on the venture. Progress was sporadic. Finally, less than a year ago, Chairman Donald Nelson gave his approval because, he asserted, of the project's wonderful postwar possibilities.

Local leaders, recalling the hostility of the East toward the ill-fated New Birmingham venture here some fifty years ago, wonder if history is repeating itself.

### VIGOR OF THREE-DAY AIR AND SEA ATTACK GROWS MORE VIOLENT; JAP CLAIMS UNVERIFIED

SAN FRANCISCO, July 19. — Bombarding American warships today carried the air-sea attack on the Tokyo area into the third consecutive day, shelling outer approaches to the Japanese capital within sight of the imperial palace.

Cruisers and destroyers turned their guns loose in a midnight attack on Nojima point, 28 miles from Yokosuka naval base where nine hours previously hundreds of carrier planes swarmed down on fighting but trapped Japanese warships.

These blows at both flanks of the entrance to Tokyo bay were the most daring sorties made by Adm. William F. (Bull) Halsey's powerful Third fleet. For ten days it has been roaring up and down the main island of Japan in what Tokyo described as "reconnaissance in force" to test Japanese air power, and to pick out a likely landing point for an invasion which may come sooner than expected.

The light, fast task force under Rear Adm. Carl Holden opened up on Nojima point at 11 p. m. last night (Japan time) and kept blazing away until early today. On a clear night the Mikado standing in his palace, 55 miles to the north, could see the flashes of their guns.

Targets were shore defenses around the point at the southern extremity of Boso peninsula forming the western arm of Tokyo bay. The bombing force included the new cruisers Topeka, Oklahoma City, Atlanta and Dayton, all built within the last two years, and the destroyers Ault and John W. Weeks. It was the fourth naval bombardment of the Japanese homeland within five days.

Across the entrance to Tokyo bay American carrier planes — Tokyo said there were 250 — streaked out of murky skies down on the Kokosuka naval yard and an unannounced number of warships.

These sequestered remnants of the Japanese fleet probably were cruisers and destroyers, perhaps camouflaged and already damaged from previous American assaults.

But they put up intense and accurate antiaircraft fire. Tokyo claimed 40 were shot down. Poor visibility prevented reconnaissance planes from finding out how much damage was done.

This attack on one of Japan's most important naval bases was probably the largest in day-long

American and British carrier raids. They centered bombs, rockets and machine-gun bullets on airbases and defense installations.

It was a duplication of Tuesday attacks, during which British planes swept across Honshu island (Japan's mainland) and ranged 200 miles north of Tokyo while Americans hit closer to and south of the capital.

### Wood Co. Gusher Is Making 10,000 Bbls. a Day

TYLER, July 19. — Spraying the countryside with oil, the No. 1-A C. L. Shamburger, a Bobby Manziel well in the Merigale field of Wood county, was running wild last night, after having blown in without warning earlier yesterday.

The well, about two miles east of Quitman, broke loose at 7:30 a. m. while operators were preparing to run tubing.

Manziel, an Independent oil operator who has given Wood County three fields in five years, said he expected his crew to have the well under control soon.

The well, fourth in the field, was making 31 gravity, asphalt-base oil in a quantity estimated by some as high as 10,000 barrels per day on open flow. Gas pressure was estimated at 2,500 pounds.

### RED ARROW DIVISION.

MANILA, July 19. — The U. S. 32nd "Red Arrow" Division marks its 600th day in combat Friday, July 20. This division lays claim to the highest total combat time amassed by any American division in any war. Men of its ranks are now in their fourth year overseas.

## SOME COUNTRY!

One of the smartest things in planning the recent United Nations conference was the decision to hold it in San Francisco. The long journey across the continent, over mountains and farm country and plains and mountains and desert and mountains again, brought home to the foreign delegates, particularly those from Europe and the Middle East, the vastness of the United States.

Few things could have driven home so successfully the concept of the United Nations as that example of immense territory administered by forty-eight states under a single central government. As one delegate put it, "Why, in Europe in that journey we would have crossed 15 countries, with a customs boundary at each." And this impression was reinforced when the delegates, at the end of the conference, took the long journey back.

It doesn't hurt a bit, either, to have the world know at first hand that Uncle Sam possesses a lot of territory.

## HITLER MISSED A BET.

Goering, believe it or not, says now that he vainly urged Nazi seizure of Gibraltar. What he expects to gain by advertising this is hard to tell, but the fact remains that it would have been a clever move.

While Gibraltar is almost impervious to a straight-out naval assault, as has several times been proved, modern artillery based on the African coast opposite would tax the defenders to the utmost. The straits here are only eight miles across, and from Gibraltar itself to Ceuta in Africa is a mere 13 miles. Such distances would be nothing to big guns, not to mention bombers.

Had the Nazis attacked Gibraltar, they could have counted on every possible assistance from Franco, whom they put into power. And capture of the Rock would have sealed the Mediterranean, rendering Allied invasion of North Africa and Sicily almost impossible.

Just another bet that Hitler missed.

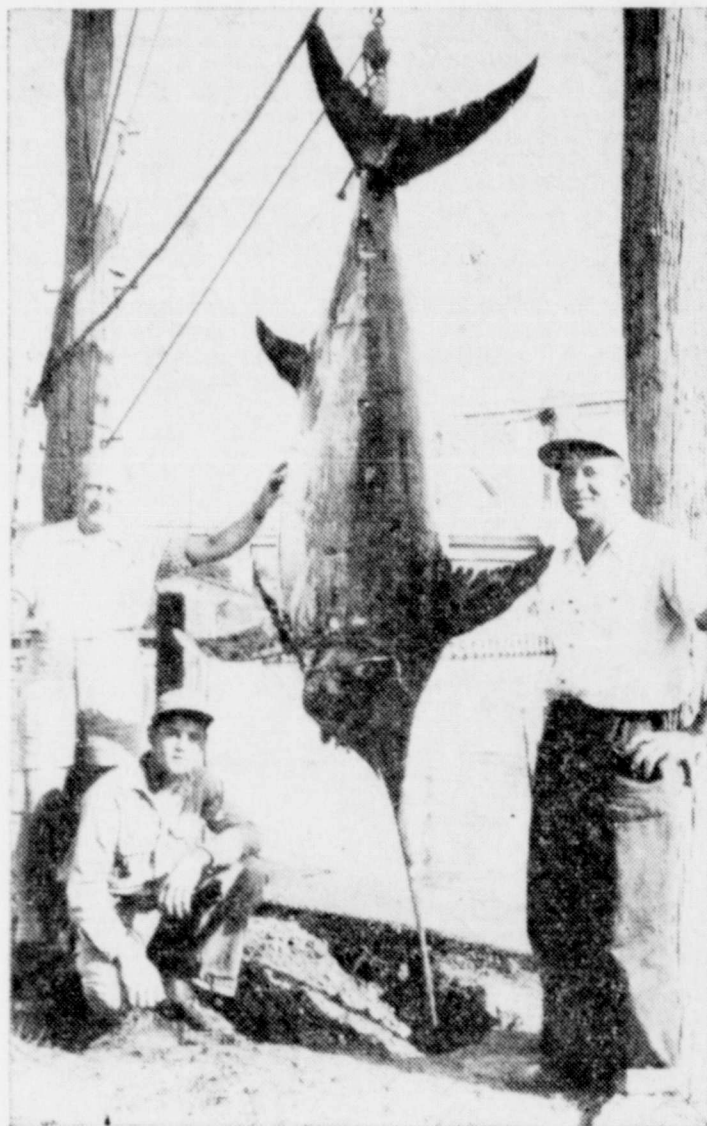
