HALSEY AGAIN HITS JAP COAST

KURE GETS NEW RAID AS THIRD FLEET CARRIER PLANES BORED IN THROUGH A ROLLING FOG

GUAM, July 25. — The Japanese home islands shuddered under tons of steel today as the tenacious Third Fleet sent great waves of carrier planes boring in through rolling fog and the flaming guns of warships pounded coastal invasion defenses.

Carrier planes smashed for the second consecutive day at smoking remnants of Japan's dazed navy in the huge Kure naval base after heavily damaging seven warships yesterday.

Adm. Nimitz did not reveal the strength of today's assault but it was presumed equal to yesterday's 1,200 plane strike.

Airfields and other military installations on the main home island of Honshu also were hit. Returning pilots reported destruction of Japanese planes on the ground. Associated Press Correspondent Richard O'Malley, aboard the carrier flagship, said a thick blanket of fog closed in late in the day.

Fifteen cruisers and destroyers moved boldly inshore early today and shelled another Japanese fighting air-seaplane base and airfield at Kushimoto on the southwestern tip of Honshu.

(Tokyo radio heard in London reported that still other warships bombarded Kanagawa prefecture on Honshu, just south of Tokyo bay.)

A Tokyo report that 200 American carrier-borne planes ranged north and were striking airfield and transportation facilities on Hokkaido island, north of Honshu, was monitored by the American Broadcasting company.

Planes and warships went into action again as tabulation showed this toll of Japanese fighting ships collected yesterday:

Two battleships, two carriers and three cruisers damaged. (British carrier planes accounted for one of the carriers at a Shikou port).

The incomplete score also showed 64 enemy planes destroyed or damaged. These results, plus other damage inflicted by British carrier planes and land-based navy bombers, increased to 563 the number of ships, and to 635 the number of planes, destroyed or heavily damaged by forces under Admiral Nimitz command in the 15 days beginning July 10.

Between the hours of yesterday's carrier-plane attack and today's night fighters slashed at the enemy to make this the first around-the-clock carrier strike against Nippon. In a broadcast from the scene, Admiral Halsey termed it "a new phase of naval warfare... the final plunge into the heart of Japan."

Combined with a 625-plane B-29 strike on Osaka and Nagoya — heaviest of the war — and other Army air raids, the blows of the past two days were the hardest ever struck against Japan. Some 2,000 planes, in all, participated.

Man Cleared of Forgery After Serving 3 Years

NEW YORK, July 25. — An innocent businessman who served three years and four months in Sing Sing prison stood cleared today of a crime committed by his "double," described as one of the nation's "smoothest bigtime crooks."

Assistant United States Attorney John J. Donovan disclosed that the victim in the cruel case of mistaken identity was Bertram M. Campbell, 57-year-old former securities dealer, who had continually protested his innocence when he was convicted of forgery in 1937.

Bank employes identified Campbell as the man who drew a \$3,150 forged check.

Donovan identified the actual forger Tuesday as Alexander D. L. Thiel, whom he described as one of the country's "smoothest crooks" and who was sentenced to four years' imprisonment for another offense — violation of the national stolen property act.

Donovan said Thiel had admitted the forgery for which Campbell was sent to prison, and had added that he tried to help the innocent man by committing another forgery which would prove that Campbell could not have committed the original crime.

This scheme failed, but netted Thiel \$15,000, Donovan said.

Ciscoan With Air Transport Group Stays in England

A NINTH AIR FORCE SERVICE COMMAND UNIT, England. — Corp. Harmon S. Elder of Cisco, Texas, is one of the men remaining in Europe as part of the air transport program established by the Ninth air force service command.

The 31st air transport group, to which he is assigned, has its headquarters near Oxford, England. Flying a scheduled operational route to Germany and the liberated countries, the C-7 transports of the group carry supplies, government officials, and provide transport for men returning to England on leave, or to take advantage of academic courses provided at English colleges through the army program for information and education of officers and men.

Corporal Elder came to the European theater in December, 1943, for assignment to the 31st transport group, 302nd wing, as a post exchange clerk. It is his job to sell rations at non-profit prices to men of his group through the field exchange service.

Prior to entering the army in July, 1942, he was a student at Cisco high school. His father, Jesse B. Elder, lives at 2101 D avenue, Cisco.

Morgenthau in Office 12 Years But Not Ready to Quit

NEW YORK, July 25. — Former Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau told a New York state war finance committee luncheon that "this departure from the treasury was not one of my own choosing."

Later, he said at a press conference that his resignation had been requested by President Truman and that he submitted it immediately. Morgenthau also told the luncheon:

"My twelve years under President Roosevelt's magnificent leadership I felt ended when he died."

Asked by reporters to elaborate, he declared, "It all happened the fifth of July. I would have liked to stay to V-J day. It didn't work out that way." He added that President Truman had requested his resignation by letter.

BURT PLEADS GUILTY.

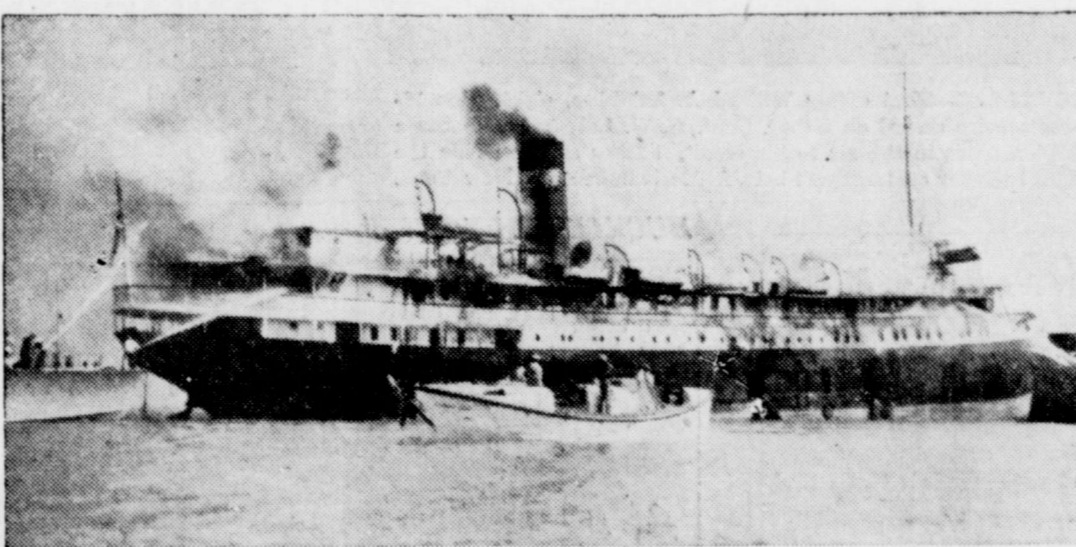

Fleming of Cisco Risked Life For Wounded Comrade

WITH FIFTH ARMY, Italy. — Private First Class L. J. Fleming, 20, of Cisco, Texas, recently was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service in action on the Fifth Army front in the Italian campaign. He is an aid man with the 85th mountain infantry regiment of the 10th mountain division. The citation stated:

"Fleming distinguished himself by his courage and steadfast devotion to his humane duties in braving artillery and small arms fire to go to the aid of the wounded."

"Once he risked his life during a terrific barrage to evacuate a wounded soldier located in an exposed area. When mounting casualties left him the only aid man in the company, he stayed on duty tag washing machines. We have day and night to alleviate the suffering of the wounded man and to Dunn's Hatchery & Feed Store, save lives by his prompt and effective treatment."

He entered military service on May 19, 1943. His mother, Mrs. Frances A. Fleming, lives on route 4, Cisco.

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HALSEY AGAIN HITS JAP COAST

Death of Frank Harrell Took Good Man and Valuable Citizen

Funeral ceremonies for Frank Harrell, who died Tuesday afternoon after a long illness, will be held at First Presbyterian church at 4 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, with Rev. O. L. Savage officiating. Following the church services the body will be laid to rest in Oakwood cemetery by Thomas funeral home.

Even before the oil boom of 1919, Frank Harrell was active in the business and civic life of Cisco. He was a member of the city commission when the present city hall was built in 1915 and a charter member of the Volunteer fire department. He was always busy and always interested in whatever the business men and progressive citizens of the community were interested in. Along with other determined citizens he fought for the location of Cisco high school at its present admirable site. He was a charter member of Cisco Rotary club, which was organized in February of 1921, later serving as its president. Active in chamber of commerce circles through the years, he was also an influential member of the directorate of Brazos River Conservation and Reclamation district at the time of his death.

Immediate survivors of Mr. Harrell include the wife and his son Wesley Harrell; Mrs. W. L. Harrell, his aged mother; two sisters, Mrs. G. E. Berry and Mrs. Opal Hawkins; daughter-in-law, Mrs. Wesley Harrell and their two children, Frank and Alice Harrell, and the following nephews and nieces — Capt. Harrell Reagan, overseas; Horace Stevens and Don Hawkins, coast guards; Mrs. Gladys Reagan Bray, Norman, Okla.; Mrs. Claire Allison, Sonora, Tex.; Mrs. Katherine Lindholm, El Dorado.

Mr. Harrell was married to Miss Lucie Etheldia Rush of Amarillo on February 15, 1911. The ceremony was performed in the Rush home at Amarillo.

In the passing of Frank E. Harrell, Cisco lost one of its most constructive citizens and his family a devoted husband, father, son and brother. Before ill health set in, he was always ready to go his full length for his home town and he will long be remembered for his initiative and tireless energy in any civic proposal that seemed practical and worthwhile.

Born at Roby, now Fisher county, Texas, April 25, 1884, Mr. Harrell's parents moved to Cisco in July, 1894, when he was about ten years of age. When about 20 years of age he entered the employ of Rockwell Brothers, who owned lumber yards here and at several points in west Texas, as well as at Houston. The Rockwell interests continued to expand and Mr. Harrell eventually became superintendent and general manager of a number of lumber yards and scattered over this area and the confidant of Jim Rockwell, head of Rockwell Brothers. At the time of his death he was general manager of the Cisco yards and was "rounding out" his 41st year with the Rockwell company.



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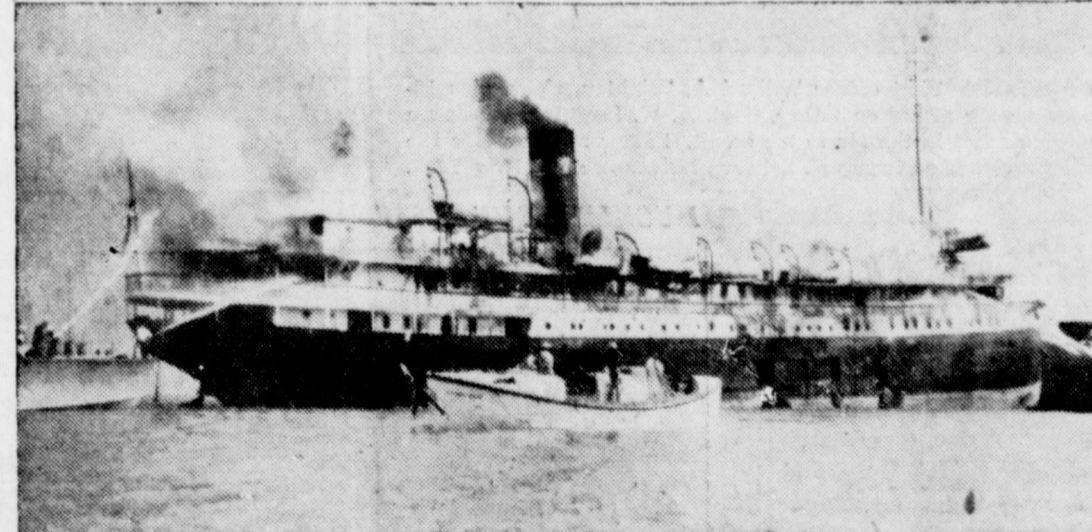

Carrier planes smashed for the second consecutive day at smoldering remnants of Japan's dazed navy in the huge Kure naval base after heavily damaging seven warships yesterday.

Adm. Nimitz did not reveal the strength of today's assault but it was presumed equal to yesterday's 1,200 plane strike.

Airfields and other military installations on the main home island of Honshu also were hit. Returning pilots reported destruction of Japanese planes on the ground.

Associated Press Correspondent Richard O'Malley, aboard the carrier flagship, said a thick blanket of fog closed in late in the day.

Fifteen cruisers and destroyers moved boldly inshore early today and shelled another Japanese fighting lair—the seaplane base and airfield at Kushimoto on the southwestern tip of Honshu.

(Tokyo radio heard in London reported that still other warships of Japanese planes on the ground on Honshu, just south of Tokyo bay.)

(A Tokyo report that 200 American carrier-borne planes ranged north and were striking airfield and transportation facilities on Hokkaido island, north of Honshu, was monitored by the American Broadcasting company.)

Planes and warships went into action again as tabulation showed this toll of Japanese fighting ships collected yesterday: Two battleships, two carriers and three cruisers damaged. (British carrier planes accounted for one of the carriers at a Shikou port.)

The incomplete score also showed 64 enemy planes destroyed or damaged. These results, plus other damage inflicted by British carrier planes and land-based navy bombers, increased to 563 the number of ships, and to 635 the number of planes, destroyed or heavily damaged by forces under Admiral Nimitz command in the 15 days beginning July 10.

Between the hours of yesterday's carrier-plane attack and today's night fighters slashed at the enemy to make this the first around-the-clock carrier strike against Nippon. In a broadcast from the scene, Admiral Halsey termed it "a new phase of naval warfare... the final plunge into the heart of Japan."

Combined with a 625-plane B-29 strike on Osaka and Nagoya — heaviest of the war — and other Army air raids, the blows of the past two days were the hardest ever struck against Japan. Some 2,000 planes, in all, participated.

Thiel, whom he described as one of the country's "smoothest crooks" and who was sentenced to four years' imprisonment for an earlier offense — violation of the national stolen property act.

Donovan said Thiel had admitted the forgery for which Campbell was sent to prison, and had added that he tried to help the innocent man by committing another forgery which would prove that Campbell could not have committed the original crime.

This scheme failed, but netted Thiel \$15,000, Donovan said.

Ciscoan With Air Transport Group Stays in England

A NINTH AIR FORCE SERVICE COMMAND UNIT, England. — Corp. Harmon S. Elder of Cisco, Texas, is one of the men remaining in Europe as part of the air transport program established by the Ninth air force service command.

The 31st air transport group, to which he is assigned, has its headquarters near Oxford, England. Flying a scheduled operational route to Germany and the liberated countries, the C-47 transports of the group carry supplies, government officials, and provide transport for men returning to England on leave, or to take advantage of academic courses provided at English colleges through the army program for information and education of officers and men.

Corporal Elder came to the European theater in December, 1943, for assignment to the 31st transport group, 302nd wing, as a post exchange clerk. It is his job to sell rations at non-profit prices to men of his group through the field exchange service.

Prior to entering the army in July, 1942, he was a student at Cisco high school. His father, Jesse B. Elder, lives at 2101 D avenue, Cisco.

Morgenthau in Office 12 Years But Not Ready to Quit

NEW YORK, July 25. — Former Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau told a New York state war finance committee luncheon that "this departure from the treasury was not one of my own choosing."

Later, he said at a press conference that his resignation had been requested by President Truman and that he submitted it immediately. Morgenthau also told the luncheon: "My twelve years under President Roosevelt's magnificent leadership I felt ended when he died."

Asked by reporters to elaborate, he declared, "It all happened the fifth of July. I would have liked to stay to V-J day. It didn't work out that way." He added that President Truman had requested his resignation by letter.

Man Cleared of Forgery After Serving 3 Years

NEW YORK, July 25. — An innocent businessman, who served three years and four months in Sing Sing prison stood cleared today of a crime committed by his "double," described as one of the nation's "smoothest bigtime crooks."

Assistant United States Attorney John J. Donovan disclosed that the victim in the cruel case of mistaken identity was Bertram M. Campbell, 57-year-old former securities dealer, who had continually protested his innocence when he was convicted of forgery in 1937.

Bank employes identified Campbell as the man who drew a \$3,150 forged check.

POST-WAR TREK.

It is a well known fact that wars have usually been followed by waves of migration, wherever such outlets were possible. Our own wars have been notable examples of the westward trek which is natural procedure in this country. Most Americans, perhaps, have assumed that this tendency has now become weak and unimportant, but they may be wrong about it. The East is still somewhat overpopulated, in comparison with most other national areas, and there are still large areas for settlement in the West.

One expert who has been studying this situation, Dr. Frank E. August of Cleveland, serving as city commissioner of veterans' assistance, gives some surprising figures on the present pressure westward, indicated by a recent army survey. It indicates that 39 per cent of enlisted men from the northern states expect to migrate to the Far West after demobilization. And why should they do so? He explains the matter rather simply.

as largely a matter of housing. Most of our cities at present are growing over-crowded. If men who ordinarily would expect to return where they came from, at the start of the war, find on their return home that their cities have failed to provide adequate housing and other facilities, they may go elsewhere. But better living facilities will tend to keep them at home. Cisco, like all other cities, large and small, must face this fact.

FOREST LOSSES

There has been a great and continuous battle in Oregon lately. Thousands of men have fought fires to save forests of great value. Millions of trees have died, and countless animals, mostly valuable themselves, have perished. Buzzards are described as hanging over the bodies of burned deer and other wild life, awaiting their feast.

The worst thing about such fires is their tragic repetition. One of the greatest of human blessings is allowed to become a destructive peril. It may be conquered to a far greater extent than it has been, but victory is still far off.

It should be remembered that trees in the forests are almost as valuable as buildings in the cities, and man depends on them more than he usually realizes. The Age of Steel, with all its triumphs, is still far from replacing the Age of Wood and this great natural resource still demands more care than it receives.

Employment First. People who work in the fields, in mills, mines and shops, on railroads and in industry generally are to be congratulated upon President Truman's choice of Fred M. Vinson, the new Secretary of the Treasury of the United States. His undertaking is enormous, delicate and vital. But it is my belief that nobody else in government is quite as well qualified to handle the job as Vinson.

The new cabinet member knows taxes. Things he has said already prove that he is keenly aware of two things that are currently the most important facts about taxes. (1) High taxes are necessary, now and for some time to come. (2) Wrongly devised taxes in the United States can wreck the financial structure of the entire world in a few months. Dark Ages might visit the earth again.

A Dependable Thing.

The "yankee dollar" is one of few known quantities left in the financial world. While this condition lasts, there is a way for weak and depleted countries to gain industrial and then financial strength. The dollar will remain good so long as Uncle Sam keeps meeting his obligations promptly, fulfilling promises and paying the interest on his stupendous national debt.

Our debt is so big and America's moral obligations are so exacting that taxes must be high after the war, much higher than they have ever been in peaceful years before. Government has no way to get money except by taxing its citizens. Consequently the citizens have to be prosperous. There must be full employment, plenty of jobs at good wages — otherwise not enough taxes.

Holding Our Ground.

The world is relying on the solvency of America, on the soundness of the dollar, and it all depends on jobs. Mr. Vinson said: "Taxes should be leveled in such a way that they have the least harmful effect on the expansion of business investment and the creation of jobs because productive employment is the source of revenue which the government collects from taxes."

The Secretary's eye was not on taxes alone. In a recent published report he made it clear that productive employment is the

foundation of America's living standard (highest in the world), the source of all income and the basis of prosperity for business and agriculture. We may be assured that Vinson will always do his best to prevent ruination of jobs by taxing business to a standstill.

A Rational Economy.

Here is a powerful and rational sentence from Vinson's pen: "The sooner uncertainties in the post-war tax structure are removed, the sooner business management will be inclined to make firm commitments for expansion and the faster men can be put back to work following the wholesale cancellation of contracts that will occur with the unconditional surrender of Japan."

Persons who would like to see America in chaos, people who would like to see a dictator climb to power over America's wasted estates, may call the new Treasury head a friend of big business. He apparently is, to whatever extent such a friendship means jobs for workers, prosperity on the farm, customers in the store and food on the table for America's plain people.

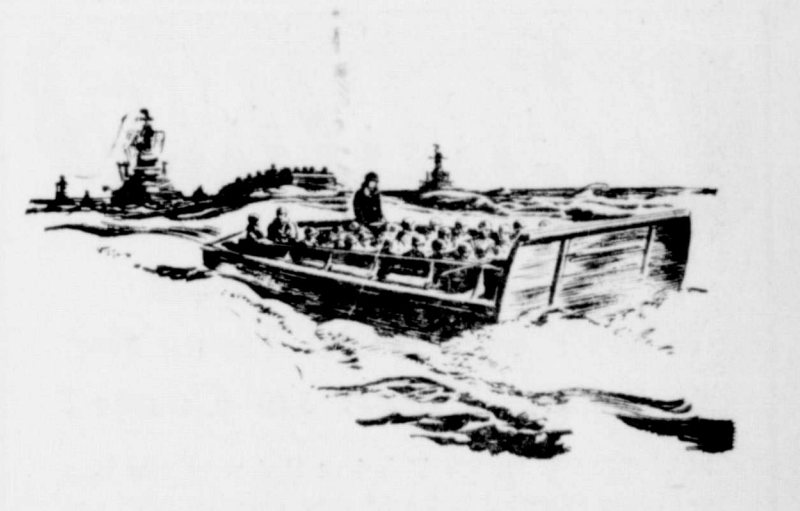



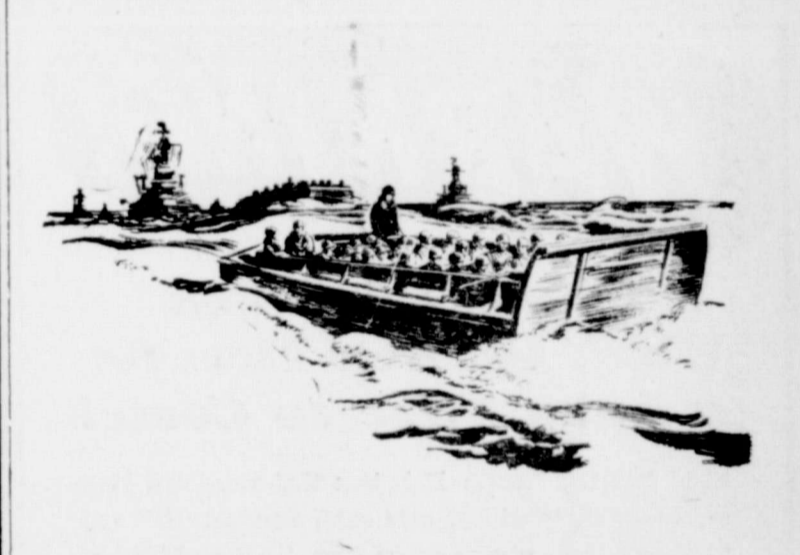
