



FIRST ARMY CHAPEL IN FRANCE



The first permanent United States Army Chapel in France in World War II was estabished by Chaplain Theodore P. Bornhoeft of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, only five days after his arrival in France on D-Day plus two. Services in the little canvas church are reminiscent of pioneer days when the forefathers of these soldiers took their guns to church too. But, rifles, the pews are long wooden boxes marked, "For Cannon Projectile," and "U. S. A." and steel helmets are ready beside the feet of the worshipers. Still there are flowers on the altar and ferns banked on either side of it. There


