JAPS SCORN TERMS OF BIG 3

Cisco Athletic Association Was Formed Last Night

Cisco's two new high school athletic coaches — Harold Fisher and Buck Overall, both of whom are former all-Southwestern athletic stars — were introduced to an enthusiastic group of more than 30 Cisco business men and athletic supporters last night in a meeting at the city fire hall, when a Cisco Athletic association was formed.

Joe Eddy Hays was elected president of the association, Charles Burke vice president and Norman Huston secretary-treasurer. Directors to serve with the officers will be Simon Coplin, Karl Armstrong, Dr. C. E. Paul and L. A. Warren.

The first project of the association is to place Chesley Field in good repair, light the field and repaint it.

Lighting was assured when more than \$500 was contributed last night to purchase the 19 additional reflectors needed and officers and directors were instructed to order these immediately so they may be received and installed in plenty of time for the first game of the season.

Prospects for a good football team this fall are better than have faced a Cisco high school coaching staff at the start of the season in more than ten years, the association members were told. Now in prospect is a line of lettermen averaging around 175 pounds, and a backfield pool out of which some very capable performers should be developed. For a wonder, there are substitutes — line replacements as big and as potentially good as the lettermen.

The Cisco coaching staff is extremely well rounded. Head Coach Fisher, who was captain of the University of Texas team and an all-around performer thereon, also played at Southwestern University with the Marines, which he served until a badly broken arm caused his discharge. He comes to Cisco with one of the most unqualified recommendations that any Texas player ever received from his school.

Coach Overall's forte is basketball and track, although he is also a capable football coach. Like his college friend and Cisco co-worker, Coach Overall was designated an all-Southwestern star at Texas in basketball and track. Fisher was named on the conference mythical football team. Overall is also an ex-service man. Both are quiet, earnest young men, who have no illusions about the job they are undertaking, but are willing to work. As an evidence, both are anxious to grab weed cutters and attack the summer grass crop at the field, or to do their part in anything else that will improve the field. 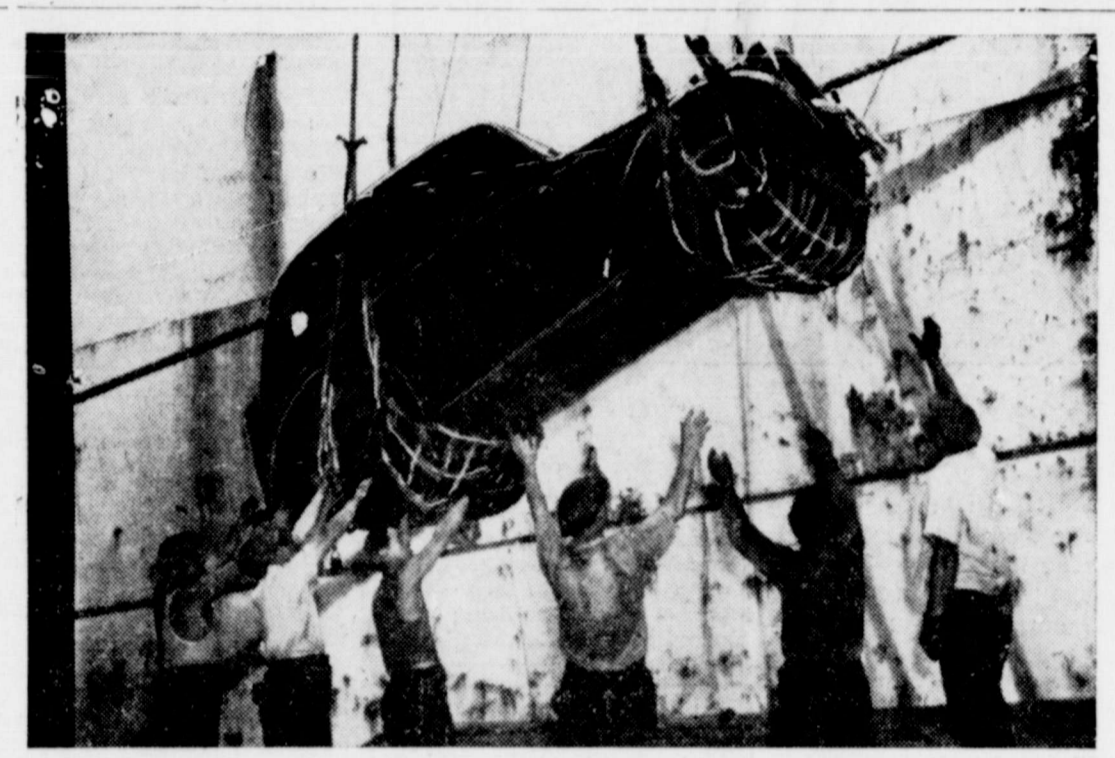

HEALTH DEPT. WARNING. AUSTIN, July 27. — Sixty-one new cases of poliomyelitis in Texas for the week ended July 21 sets a record for the year, the state health department said today. Incidence was more than seven times the seven-year median for the week. It brought to 418 the total cases reported in 1945. "In all probability the attack rate may increase and strict vigilance must be maintained," the department said in a bulletin.

THE JAP WAY OUT. NEW YORK, July 27. — A French press agency dispatch from Ankara said the Japanese ambassador to Turkey, who had been interned at the embassy in Ankara since Turkey broke off relations with Japan last winter, had killed his wife and shot himself to death yesterday on the embassy premises.

FIRST LABOR COMMONS IN ALL HISTORY

LONDON, July 27. — Clement R. Attlee plunged into work today as head of Britain's first Labor government in 14 years, which he has pledged to give top priority to finishing the war with Japan.

There was a general belief here that the new prime minister would return to the Big Three conference at Potsdam during the weekend. However, it seemed likely that he would fill at least the major cabinet offices before leaving.

A British correspondent said former Prime Minister Churchill probably would not return to the Potsdam talks, and added that Anthony Eden, foreign secretary in the Churchill government, "will not, of course, go back to Germany."

The triumphant Laborites, holding 390 of the 640 seats in the House of Commons, appeared to be settling down for a long term in office — possibly the full statutory five years.

Churchill and Eden both were re-elected to Commons — among the few Conservative ministers to survive the tide of Labor votes which repudiated the party and the philosophy of free private enterprise for which it stood.

For Churchill, since 1940 the empire's outstanding figure, there was left the relatively humble position of leader of the House of Commons minority — one so small it can wield but little influence in shaping Britain's immediate future.

The leftward tide of votes swamped his Conservative party in the worst political defeat the party has suffered in many years, and gave the Laborites the first clear Commons majority the party ever held in Britain.

NEW CATHOLIC SCHOOL. DALLAS, June 27. — Rev. Joseph P. Lynch, bishop of Dallas, will lay the cornerstone of the parochial school and residence of St. Alice Catholic church at Camp Bowie boulevard and Locke, at 11 Sunday morning. The school will accommodate 160 children.

MORE GOOD JAPS. CALCUTTA, July 27. — British and empire troops killed more than 3,000 Japanese and captured more than 400 in six days of fighting along a 77-mile stretch of territory between the Mandalay-Rangoon railroad and the Sittang river, Southeast Asia headquarters said today.

FIRST ARMY CHAPEL IN FRANCE
The first permanent United States Army Chapel in France in World War II was established by Chaplain Theodor F. Bornhoft of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, only five days after his arrival in France on D-Day plus two. Services in the little canvas church are reminiscent of pioneer days when the forefathers of these soldiers took their guns to church too. But these guns stacked in the aisle are Grand rifles, the pews are long wooden boxes marked "For Cannon Projectile," and "U. S. A." and steel helmets are ready beside the feet of the worshippers. Still, there are flowers on the altar and ferns banked on either side of it. There is a portable organ and the chaplain has for his fighting congregation the hymn books they have used to.

This is church for men who serve the Army overseas, and they attend as often as they can. For, they are the men whom Army Chief of Staff General George C. Marshall meant when he said, "It is morale—and I mean spiritual morale—which wins the victory, in the ultimate—and that type of morale can only come out of the religious nature of the soldier who knows God . . . I count heavily on that type of man and that kind of army."

MILITARY HEADS SAY THEY PREFER DESTRUCTION INSTEAD; CITE ABSENCE STALIN'S SIGNATURE

Tokyo said today Japan would choose "utter destruction" under admittedly superior Allied might rather than yield to the Potsdam unconditional surrender ultimatum. Other sources, not so sure of Nipponese determination, hinted Japan might fold up before invasion.

The Japanese cabinet, meeting in special session at the residence of Premier Suzuki, head of Foreign Minister Shigenori Togo on the eight point definition of unconditional surrender issued yesterday by President Truman, Churchill and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek.

Shortly thereafter the government-controlled Domei news agency said Japan wouldn't capitulate. "Japan will prosecute the war of greater East Asia to the bitter end," Domei said, "in accordance with her fixed policy."

This was a complete reversal of yesterday's unprecedented appeal by Tokyo for leniency. It ignored a recommendation that Japan surrender which was reportedly made by Gen. Hiroshi Oshima, one of Nippon's foremost military diplomats. As ambassador to Germany he saw Tokyo's Axis partner beaten into submission and was convinced of the futility of fighting further.

From Manila came a report that Japanese leaders were preparing the country for surrender before invasion. Washington buzzed with rumors and speculation of prompt surrender. Churchill commented the end of the Pacific war "may come much quicker than we have hitherto been entitled to expect."

Regardless of what Emperor Hirohito's advisers actually do, the Allies went ahead with plans to turn loose their full military might which the Potsdam declaration said "will mean the inevitable and complete destruction of the Japanese armed forces and the utter destruction of the Japanese homeland."

This, the Potsdam ultimatum said, is the only alternative to unconditional surrender of the Mikado's armed forces, elimination of the propagators of the Pacific war, and a return to democratic principles.

Tokyo noted the "conspicuous" absence of Stalin's signature on the ultimatum and interpreted the defeat of Churchill's government as a sign of Allied disunity. But Clement Attlee announced in his first statement as Britain's new prime minister that "the first thing we have to do is to finish the war with Japan."

The ultimatum included these terms and said "we shall not deviate from them: there are no alternatives: we shall brook no delay."

1. Japan must overthrow her militarist ruling clique.
2. Undesignated points of Japanese territory will be occupied.

until Japan's war power is convincingly destroyed.
3. Japanese sovereignty will be limited to the four main islands of Honshu, Hokkaido, Kyushu and Shikoku, and minor islands. This would strip Japan of all her conquests and other dominated areas including Manchuria, North China, Korea, the Bonins, Kuriles, Pescadores, Formosa, mandated islands, Netherlands East Indies, Malaya, French Indochina, Thailand.
4. Japan will be disarmed completely, but soldiers will be allowed to return to peaceful pursuits.
5. Japan will not be enslaved, but "stern justice shall be meted out to all war criminals," especially those responsible for cruelties on prisoners.
6. Japan must restore freedom of speech, religion and thought, and establish respect for fundamental rights.
7. All armament industries will be taken from Japan. Raw materials will be permitted for essential economy and to permit payment of reparations.
8. Occupation will end when Japan loses her warlike attitude and leadership.

Texas Produced 45 Percent Nation's June Oil
AUSTIN, July 27. — Texas huge oil production, increasing monthly, was headlined a story of business "bright spots" in a statewide survey made public by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

The survey covered the entire first half of 1945, and showed improvement in almost every point over last year.

Texas produced almost 45 percent of the nation's output of petroleum during June. A total of 2,180,450 barrels was produced daily — compared to the nation's total daily production of 4,855,764 barrels.

In May the daily production averaged 2,176,150 barrels.

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HOME NEWS FROM ABROAD.

Argentina has had no freedom of the press as Americans understand the term for a long time. Certainly it gets none under the Peron-Farrell regime. According to a story in Editor and Publisher, when U. S. Ambassador Spruille Braden arrived in Buenos Aires he asked why correspondents were required to submit all stories for censorship, since freedom of news transmission was guaranteed by the Acts of Chapultepec. Officials declared that "complete press freedom existed" and were "surprised" that censorship rules were in force. Braden got that in writing and promptly called in the correspondents and told them so. Then:

"Correspondents cleared stories within the next week dealing with torture of political prisoners, repressions, political squabbles, Nazi economic infiltration in Argentine industry and the growing

possibility of war in that country."

Then the Argentine papers, some of whom, notably La Prensa, have fought the present government steadily, printed these stories as coming from the U. S. and Argentine began getting her home news — true news — from abroad. Trouble ensued, for the government and for the correspondents, some of whose lives were definitely threatened. After 24 days, Argentine newspapers were barred from printing news about their own country coming from outside.

Soon elections were promised for "before the end of this year" as a sop to the strongest elements opposed to the Peron-Farrell gang. But to anyone recalling Hitler's famous plebiscite comes a question whether elections will mean anything when no news is available except government propaganda and threats.

Peron says he is ready for civil war. He may get it. But, like Hitler, he has the arms and the propaganda. Without a free press, any nation weakens.
