## Grace Lutheran Roy George Goes Parochial School Back to Ship After Will Open Monday After a Visit Home

Grace Lutheran parochial school of Cisco will open Monday with the registration of pupils, says Rev. G. T. Naumann, principal. All eight grades will be taught. Besides the required subjects, Grace Lutheran also offers a thorough-going course in Biblical teachings. A record enrollment is expected this year. Continuing, Principal Naumann said. "Contrary to the erroneous opinion of many people, this school does not teach German. In fact, in the history of this school no German has ever been taught. Although some of the members of the congregation still understand the German language, no German services are held in this church. "While we are not ashamed of the German ancestry of some of our people, we do not think it fair to be labeled the 'German church or school.' Those who enroll at Grace Lutheran pay an entrance fee of \$1.50 and \$2 tuition per month.

## State's General Fund May Stay in Black for Year

AUSTIN, Sept. 7.—Texas may end the current fiscal year with a balance of \$7,626,653 in its once deficit loaded general fund. The new year began Sept. 1 and will end Aug. 31. The general fund balance Sept. 1 was \$13,412,275 (about \$740,000 more than earlier estimates) and based on estimates of comptroller it will receive about \$42,619,222 additional revenue during the current year. In all that makes \$56,031,497 available against anticipated maximum expenditures of \$48,404,844 from the general fund this year. Depending upon the exactness of the estimates the state may end the year with a balance of \$7,626,653. Estimates considered declines in oil production tax revenues and other changing factors in the post-war business picture. The general fund, barometer of the state's financial condition, has been as deep as \$38,000,000 in the red. It began swinging toward the balance side during war years and came out of the red late last year.

## Union Fanatics Demo Party Heads Mission Festival Slow Truman Reconversion Plans Left of Center Camp on Sunday

DETROIT, Sept. 7.—The Ford Motor company announced today all its passenger car and truck production in eight cities was being halted — idling more than 30,000 workers — because of the continuing Kelsey-Hayes Wheel company strike in Detroit. Strikers at Kelsey-Hayes where 4,500 have been off the job since Aug. 23 over a demand for reinstatement of three fired employees, voted last night to continue their walkout. Approximately 45,000 industrial workers are currently idle in Detroit strikes. A Ford company spokesman said truck and passenger car production had been closed down "100 percent" in Detroit and Highland Park, Mich., as well as at plants in Buffalo, N. Y.; Chester, Pa.; Dallas, Louisville, Edgewater, N. J.; and Richmond, Calif.

## Truman Admits Right of Public to All the Facts

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—President Truman is stepping nimbly away today from the shower of political mud expected to splatter when congress begins its investigation of Pearl Harbor. The investigation was approved in the senate yesterday, with the president's endorsement. It will be agreed to in the House next week. There will probably be a joint committee of five members from each house. Questioned at his press conference, Mr. Truman quickly aligned himself with the rest of the public by saying he knew nothing about the Pearl Harbor disaster except what he read in the newspapers. Congress, he said, would have the right to all testimony available. That means the white house will not intervene to prevent navy or army officials from testifying on grounds that national security might be jeopardized.

## 65-CENT MINIMUM

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—Labor spokesmen said today that President Truman's recommendation for a "substantial upward revision" of the minimum wage means at least a boost to 65 cents an hour in two years. The present level is 40 cents an hour.

## Sinclair Corporation Takes Over Huge Oil Empire

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—The whole Ethiopian empire, an area of 350,000 square miles and as large as the combined areas of Texas, Oklahoma, Massachusetts and Rhode Island, has become an exclusive oil concession of the Sinclair Oil Corporation. Granted by Emperor Haile Selassie, a 50-year lease was signed here Thursday by the Sinclair Corporation and Ato Akilou Wold, Ethiopian vice minister of foreign affairs and his country's chief delegate to the recent San Francisco security conference. In return for the right to explore for and ship oil out of Ethiopia, with its network of fine roads built by the Italians, the Sinclair company will pay royalties to the emperor in addition to building schools, hospitals, clinics and research foundations in that country. It will also pay for educating Ethiopians in the United States for 10 years.

## U.S. CAVALRY BAND WILL LEAD GEN. M'ARTHUR THROUGH THREE MILES OF BIG CITY'S STREETS

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 7.—A white-legged U. S. cavalry band will lead General MacArthur's triumphal parade through three miles of Tokyo streets Saturday morning, Japanese time. MacArthur will enter the city at 9 o'clock tonight (Cisco war time). In Nanking, Americans stood on the sidelines as Chinese prepared to accept surrender of 1,000,000 Japanese soldiers Sunday. In Washington President Truman said the United States would obtain by negotiation or otherwise whatever Pacific bases are necessary to American defense. In Japan, Foreign Minister Mamoru Shigenitsu — according to a Domei broadcast — said the Allies would allow "re-establishment on a wide scale" of Japan's "peaceful" industries, particularly food production. He added that there would be no military government, and that Allied "requests" would be carried out by the Japanese government. U. S. Third fleet rescue teams reported from Yokohama that by midnight tonight evacuation of all Allied prisoners from the Nagoya-Hamamatsu and Niiigata areas will have been completed. Thus far 2,000 prisoners have been cleared — two-thirds of the total. MacArthur's military parade through Tokyo to the U. S. embassy building will start from the railroad station in the Marunouchi business quarter, within sight of Emperor Hirohito's palace, headquarters dispatches said. The Seventh and Eighth regiments of the First cavalry division will participate in this first march of a conqueror through Japan's capital city. An honor guard from the Seventh regiment — the regiment which fell with Custer in frontier days — will escort MacArthur. ## Talkative Nazi Blond Caused Arrest of Forty

FRANKFURT, Sept. 7.—American Army intelligence agents, working with lightning speed, today completed the cracking of a German underground sabotage ring even before it had a chance to destroy one American installation. Quick-witted members of the counter-intelligence corps, helped by a 19-year-old German blond who talked too much for her lover's good, have captured 1200 pounds of dynamite and arrested over 40 saboteurs including the ringleader. The blond and her girl friend were first picked up by CIC for routine questioning. Frightened, they revealed the fact that a notorious Gestapo officer, after fleeing Cologne, was working as a baker in Weimar and planning with other Germans to disrupt American communications and transportation.

## State Rights and Natural Gas Be Stevenson Topic

AUSTIN, Sept. 7.—Gov. Coke Stevenson will head twenty-two witnesses who will present Texas' position regarding regulation of natural gas when the federal power commission holds its meeting in Dallas Nov. 27. Olin Culberson, chairman of the railroad commission and of an advisory committee on gas policy which the governor appointed, says principal testimony by Texans will be at Dallas. Members of the railroad commission plan to be present at Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 18, when the FPC opens its series of hearings on natural gas. "We intend to listen instead of talk until the Dallas hearing is held," Culberson said. Earlier sessions of FPC are scheduled for Kansas City, Sept. 18; Oklahoma City, Oct. 9, and New Orleans, Oct. 30. Charles I. Francis, Houston, is chairman of the Texas subcommittee legal staff, which will coordinate presentation of witnesses and evidence. Other subcommittee heads from the semi-official advisory committee are D. A. Hulcy of Dallas, economics and statistics, and Dr. E. L. DeGolyer of Dallas, engineering. Governor Stevenson will be the first witness for Texas, according to present plans. He will discuss state's rights when the natural gas industry Chairman Culberson will follow with testimony about the railroad commission's gas conservation policy and the state's position regarding federal regulation of production, processing and gathering of natural gas.

## MALONES ON VACATION

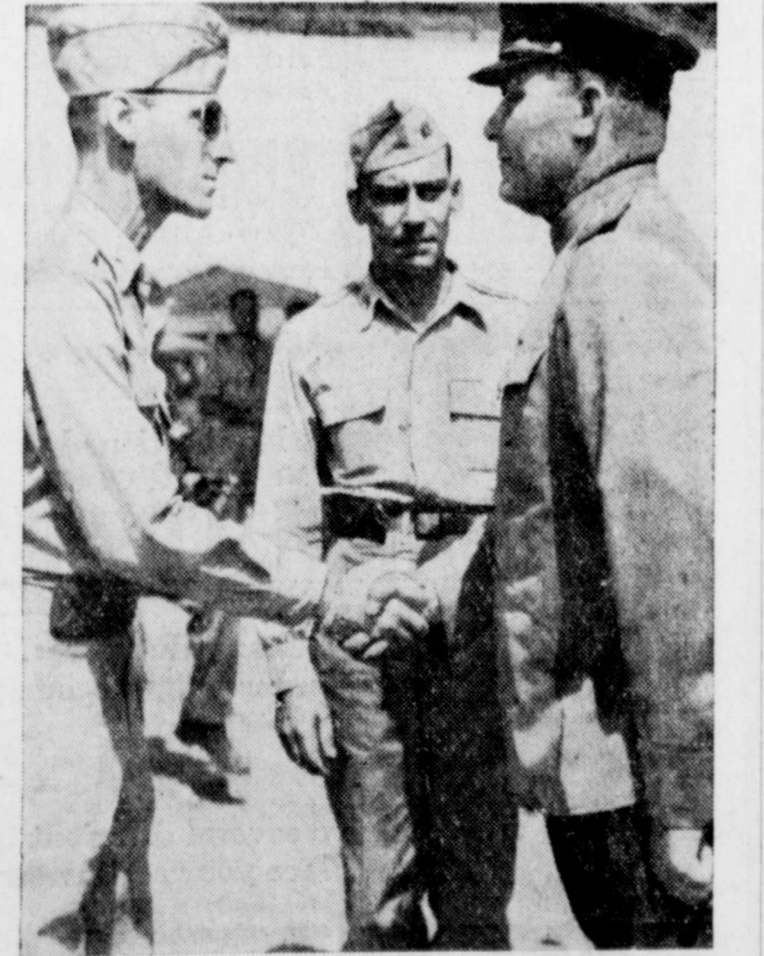
