Japs' Punishment For Sins Be Long, Bitter, Mac Says

TOKYO, Sept. 21 (U.P.)—Japan will never again become a world power, Gen. Douglas MacArthur said today in an exclusive interview with Hugh Baille, president of the United Press.

"Japan, industrially, commercially, militarily and every other way, is in a state of complete collapse," MacArthur declared. "Her food supplies are scarce and she faces conditions in this emergency that may well become catastrophic. Her punishment for her sins, which is just beginning, will be long and bitter."

State Highway Department Girls Smoke at Desks

AUSTIN, Sept. 21. — Many little things that never reached the stage of real news importance become gossip topics about the state offices and departments. Among them:

Girls employed in the state highway department now may smoke at their desks while they work. Permitting officials are watching the experiment, hoping it will cut down the time spent by women in the rest room.

For the first time in Texas history six men have been elected to state-wide office by identical vote. The six are the former judges serving on the commissions to assist the state supreme court. When the amendment to make them full judges of the court was voted upon the carrying of the amendment automatically elected the six.

The shooting of a former Kimble county commissioner held up appointment of J. B. Randolph to be new district judge in the 112th district, vacated by death of the late Judge W. C. Jackson. Judge Randolph was a close friend and official associate of the slain commissioner and as new judge the trial resulting would come before him. Randolph announced, however, that he would disqualify himself for the trial, so the appointment went through.

Free college tuition as a partial reward for military service is nothing new in Texas. Garland Adair, curator of history for the Texas Memorial Museum, discovered the practice in vogue 100 years ago. Adair was perusing files of the Texas Newspapers of a century ago in preparing for Texas "centennial of statehood." Among the items that caught his eye in a LaGrange, Fayette county, newspaper about the opening of the 12th term of Kutersville College was the announcement by its president, Rev. Chauncey Richardson, that orphans of deceased Texas soldiers would be given two years instruction free.

CISCO MAN CHARGED.
ABILENE, Sept. 21. — Complaint was filed by Chester Bowles, price administrator, in federal court in Abilene yesterday against Emory Moad of Cisco for alleged violation of Revised Maximum Price Regulation No. 130. The complaint stated that Moad had violated the regulation, which provides maximum prices for used household mechanical refrigerators, by selling a Frigidaire mechanical refrigerator above ceiling price.

MAY STOP STRIKES.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (U.P.)—Edgar L. Warren, new Federal Conciliation Service director, said today that oil company officials and the Oil Workers Union — CIO — had agreed to meet next week in a midwestern city to try to end the spreading refinery workers' strike.

REFINERY AND PIPELINE MEN IN SIX STATES HAVE QUIT TO FORCE UNION WAGE DEMANDS

(By United Press)

Dwindling oil supplies from the Calumet River Basin Refinery center in Northwestern Indiana forced the gigantic Carnegie-Illinois steel plant in Gary, Ind., to curtail production today.

More than 25,000 refinery and pipeline workers had left their jobs in six states to enforce the Oil Workers International Union—CIO—demand for a 30 percent hourly wage increase.

The OWIU served notice it was ready to fight to the finish to obtain the same pay for working a peacetime 40-hour week that workers had received in working a wartime 48 hours, with time and one-half for the extra eight hours.

More than 250,000 workers were idled by strikes throughout the nation.

Some 90,000 men were idled by labor disputes in Detroit, where a corps of seven Federal Labor Department conciliators were at work in an effort to iron out the trouble.

Hearings were ordered immediately in the strike of 4,500 Kelsey-Hayes Wheel Co. workers that had forced the layoff of 50,000 Ford Motor Co. employes.

The OWIU had called men out in Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, West Virginia and Texas.

In California, the union was prepared to join in, if necessary, to gain the pay demands.

GAS-COAL COSTS.
KANSAS CITY, Mo., Sept. 21 (U.P.)—Natural gas at four cents per 1,000 cubic feet at the well would be comparable to coal at \$1 at the mine, J. C. Hawthorne, witness before the federal power commission hearing into natural gas, testified at today's abbreviated session. Discussing the use of gas as an industrial raw material, Hawthorne told the commission that he figured gas was much cheaper than coal and cited that comparison to support his point.

ARMY ENLISTMENTS.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (U.P.)—The senate military affairs committee today endorsed a house-approved bill to encourage voluntary army enlistments but eliminated one-year enlistments for men already in service. As amended by the senate committee, the bill would provide that those already in service may re-enlist for 18 months. Others would be offered a choice of a two-year or three-year enlistment.

SOVIET PLANS ATTACKED.
LONDON, Sept. 21. — The Catholic Herald asserted yesterday that Slovakia "is being prepared for incorporation into the Soviet Union." "The Soviet new order" has come to Slovakia "in a maelstrom of murder, rape, robbery, famine and disease," the newspaper said. "All Catholic schools have been nationalized. Hundreds of priests have been imprisoned."

JONES TO COME HOME.
IWO JIMA — On the list of air force men scheduled for early return to the states from the Twentieth air force, combat staging center here is Technical Sergeant Willard J. Jones, Cisco, Texas. Sergeant Jones has served 43 months overseas and has an adjusted service rating score of 92 points qualifying him for discharge. He will depart from Iwo Jima for the Western Pacific base command personnel center in the Marianas in the near future and will be sent to the states for discharge as soon as transportation is available.

Henry Ford, 82, Retired Today For Second Time

DETROIT, Sept. 21 (U.P.) — Henry Ford II, 28, today succeeded his grandfather as president of the Ford Motor Co. and head of one of the world's greatest private fortunes.

Henry Ford, the 82-year-old founder of the sprawling automotive empire and vast other holdings, resigned the presidency for the second time. He turned over the presidency to his son, Edsel, in 1918, but returned to the helm in June, 1943, shortly after Edsel's death.

Too Little Known About Our Form of Government

AUSTIN, Sept. 21. — A select group of Texans interested in preserving our constitutional form of government through education in the school and out of it, met Wednesday, adopted declarations of principles and named a committee of five to plan future action in furtherance of the cause.

Dr. M. E. Sadler, president of Texas Christian University was elected temporary chairman and presided after the session was called to order by R. E. (Bob) Long, an assistant attorney general, both having signed the original call for the meeting.

Members of the committee are E. E. Townes, Houston; Roy Whitteburg, Amarillo; Joe Zeppa, Tyler; E. B. Pickett, Liberty, and James Shaw, Austin. The committee will have a full program and plan in the near future as the foundation for a state-wide organization.

L. W. Kemp, Houston, offered the resolution carrying the purposes of the organization. It provided that the committee prepare and file a charter, without capital stock, creating an educational corporation for encouraging and promoting the study of the history and Constitution of the United States and of Texas and the duties and responsibilities of citizenship to the American way of life. The committee is empowered to do all other things for the common cause.

There was continued criticism that our school children and our adults are not advised as to the Constitution and the history of our great form of government, but at no place was a charge made that it was deliberate. The theme was that a revival is badly needed to make the American people fully conscious of their great blessings under our glorious form of government.

State School Supt. Dr. L. A. Woods said, under state laws, the schools give the pupils-students three doses of constitutional government, once in the seventh grade, once in high school, and in college. However, he explained, the public schools take in about 150,000 pupils annually and graduate only about 45,000, meaning that many did not receive the instruction on constitutional government.

"KAISER" AUTOMOBILE.
NEW YORK, Sept. 21 (U.P.)—The Kaiser-Frazier Corporation announced today it had leased the \$100,000,000 Willow Run bomber plant for five years for the manufacture of a new low-cost automobile called the Kaiser.

Judicial Council U.S. Soldier Was Leones Rich In Meets Oct. 19 to Killed, 60 Hurt Brooks Convalescent Study Revision in Jap Explosion escent Hospital

AUSTIN, Sept. 21. — Reorganization of Texas court system will be an important subject for the Texas civil judicial council's annual meeting here Oct. 19, according to an agenda announced by President Randolph L. Carter of San Antonio.

A committee headed by W. N. Stokes, Associate Justice of the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals, Amarillo, has been studying the revision of Texas' judicial system. Last year it made a tentative recommendation to the council for a single court system. Headed by the Supreme Court and an advisory council of judges, lawyers, laymen and legislators.

The tentative proposal would give the Supreme Court authority to increase or decrease the number of judges or justices serving the lower state courts. It would continue in office all incumbent judges and justices, subject to popular elections upon the question of whether each shall be retained. An adverse vote would allow the judgeship to be filled by Supreme Court appointment until another election is held.

Retirement of state court judges at the age of 70 was proposed. Since the council last met, the legislature has wrestled unsuccessfully with the court reorganization problem. Gov. Coke Stevenson vetoed a bill to raise judges' salaries because, he said, the number of district courts should be reduced simultaneously.

Texas voters fulfilled part of the program tentatively recommended to the council when they approved the constitutional amendment for a Supreme Court of nine members, instead of three elective justices and six commission members. The six commission members were inducted as associate justices in a ceremony here today.

Another important report will come from the committee on methods of preventing or lessening litigation. Its chairman is George Waverly Briggs of Dallas.

The annual report on litigation in Texas courts will be made by a committee headed by Judge Max M. Rogers of Huntsville.

AMVETS MEET SUNDAY.

AUSTIN, Sept. 21. — Policies of the organization will be discussed at a meeting of the state executive committee of the American Veterans of World War II (AMVETS) here Sunday, says State Commander George R. Porter of Fort Worth.

TOKYO, Sept. 21 (U.P.) — One American soldier was killed and 60 injured yesterday in the explosion of a Japanese ammunition dump at the edge of Takeyama airfield in Chiba prefecture, Army authorities disclosed today.

An undetermined number of Japanese also were injured in a blast, which occurred when an American soldier accidentally dropped TNT or picric acid into the dump.

Violent explosions occurred for more than an hour and lesser blasts continued throughout the night.

Only three of the injured Americans were seriously hurt, Army officials said. The Army said there was no suspicion of Japanese sabotage.

BULL BROUGHT \$1,200.

AMARILLO, Sept. 21. — The 88 lots of Hereford cattle in the E. B. Meyer dispersion auction here yesterday sold for an average of \$204, making a total of \$17,955. The 78 females made an average of \$194 and the 10 bulls sold for an average of \$382. Blocky Principles was the top bull in the auction and sold for \$1,200.

RATTLESNAKE BOUNTY.

SWEETWATER, Sept. 21 (U.P.) — Nolan county has declared war on rattlesnakes. A special 50-cent bounty on every rattlesnake killed has been declared by county commissioners court. Hundreds of the deadly snakes have been seen in the Sweetwater area this summer.
