Public Accountants Must Have Pop. From Birth Permits, Jan. 1 and Death Route

Persons who plan to practice public accountancy after Jan. 1, 1946, were urged today to write now for application qualifying them under terms of a new law. Applications may be obtained from the Texas State Board of Public Accountancy, Littlefield Building, Austin, W. W. Fewell, local accountant, stated. Fee for the first annual permit is \$5. Renewal annual fees, which will be set later by the board, will not exceed \$5. All permits will expire Dec. 31 each year, and will be cancelled unless renewed by the following Jan. 1.

After payment of the fee, the state board automatically will issue permits to:

1. Persons holding certified public accountant certificates.
2. Texas citizens 21 years of age or older who on June 6, or three out of 10 years preceding June 6, practiced public accountancy in Texas as individuals. These persons must file application for permits with the board by Nov. 1, 1945.
3. Persons who on June 6 were employed by someone practicing public accountancy or who were employed by a governmental agency, provided the individual meets certain minimum experience and educational standards. These, too, must make application by Nov. 1, 1945.

The new board is authorized to give annual examinations for those seeking the certificate of "Certified Public Accountant." Notice of the examinations must be published three days in three daily newspapers at least 30 days prior to being conducted.

Examination fees will be \$25 for the original test and \$10 for subsequent examinations if the applicant fails to pass at first. The law authorizes the board to revoke or suspend permits or certificates for cause. This may be done if the board believes the permit or certificate was obtained by fraud or deceit, if the person is guilty of gross negligence or misconduct in practicing accountancy, or if the law or rules of the board are violated, Mr. Fewell added.

After Jan. 1, 1946, any person professing to be a public accountant, and not having a permit from the board, upon conviction may be fined up to \$500 or sentenced to jail for six months, or both.

DALLAS, Sept. 25. (AP)—Habitual drunkards should not be thrown in jail, but should have access to a specialized hospital ward constructed by the city.

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Texas Law Makers Talked Lots About Aid For Soldiers

AUSTIN, Sept. 25. (AP)—Texas legislators were offended by a national magazine's roundup of "soldier-aid" activity of states that put down Texas with none.

That was before the last session of the Texas legislature and maybe, though, erroneous, it stirred the legislators into extra activity on the topic. For some reason or other, the session almost overflowed with "soldier" matters.

There were proposals in the house for five constitutional amendments affecting them, and two in the senate.

The house had also seven concurrent resolutions and seven simple ones affecting soldiers or veterans. In the senate there were seven concurrent and six simple resolutions on such topics.

One of the constitutional amendments was made effective by voters' adoption of August 25. Under it the nonprofessional soldiers can vote through 1946 in Texas elections without having to pay a poll tax.

Another which proposed to insure war veterans the constitutional right to work regardless of membership in labor unions failed to be submitted.

The house passed a bill for the same purpose, but it died on the senate calendar.

Looking through the huge list of measures that were proposed it will be found that 21 passed and became effective.

Possible for Hay Fever Victims to Cease Sneezing

LANSING, Mich., Sept. 25. (AP)—Hay fever sufferers may never again sneeze convulsively or wear dark glasses to cover their watery, bloodshot eyes if a plan suggested by a Michigan State College professor is adopted on a nation-wide scale.

The professor, Dr. B. H. Grigsby of the college botany department, has completed an experiment which he believes has produced the answer to the hay fever victim's prayer.

The experiment consisted of spraying ragweed plants about to blossom with varying solutions of the chemical weed-killer 2-4-D.

From these tests Grigsby found that a solution of one part of the chemical to 3,000 parts of water would curb growth of the plants so they would not pollenate.

Although the plants were not killed, they were stunted to such an extent that their blossoms can not appear until after the first frosts.

Grigsby contends that if farmers and city residents would spray the ragweed on their property, pollen would not be given off and the midsummer sniffles which annually annoy thousands of Americans would virtually disappear.

THAT WAS THE WARNING OF US. LABOR SECRETARY AS COMPANY HEADS AND OIL WORKERS MET

65-ct. Wage Base in Line US. Price Control Policies

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25. (AP)—Secretary of Labor Lewis B. Schwellenbach today told a senate committee that raising the basic minimum wage to 65 cents an hour is consistent with government price control policies.

Schwellenbach appeared before an education and labor subcommittee to testify on the bill, which would raise the basic standard to 65 cents an hour in the first year of enactment, to 70 cents in the second year and to 75 cents in the third year.

Wagner Opens Debate For Truman Jobs-for-all Bill

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25. (AP)—Sen. Robert Wagner, New York, opening the senate debate on the administration jobs-for-all bill, countered Republican and conservative Democratic opposition today by quoting from a 1944 campaign speech by Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, the Republican presidential candidate.

The banking committee chairman, whose task it is to pilot the bill through the senate, said the measure would place "full financial resources of the government" behind the full employment goal.

He attacked opposition charges that it proposes large-scale federal spending which would "lead to inflation, followed by depression and unemployment."

RE-SET CLOCKS SUNDAY.

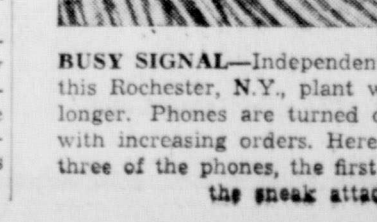

Appointment of Lt. Col. Van D. Dowda, son of Mrs. W. T. Dowda of Cisco, to the fourth ferrying group staff as director of operations, has been announced by Col. Wayne K. Richardson, commanding officer at Memphis, Tenn.

It will be much the same now with the Japs. As our army and air force take over in Japan, they must act to prevent inflation and starvation. And there is hope expressed in this case that the Japanese may develop "an appetite

for democracy." Our people are rather Missourian about it, but there may be some gain in spreading the principles of decency and freedom.

In the meantime, Americans should not worry for fear the yellow devils will not be made to walk the chalk line. The coils of justice will tighten about the savage Nips with each succeeding day. They have been completely unharsed, and will remain so.

TAX ANGLES

The proposal of Republican Leader Martin of Massachusetts, to cut next year's federal taxes "at least 20 per cent all along the board," including both individuals and corporations, naturally makes a hit with the public—especially fellows with heavy taxes to pay. Many paying little or nothing, directly, are not so well pleased—they like to see the big fellows shelling out.

Well, two factors in this situation ought to be clear enough. First, everybody is paying federal taxes, whether he knows it or not. It appears in the groceries and clothes he buys, and elsewhere. 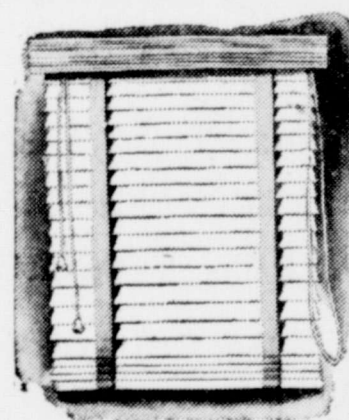

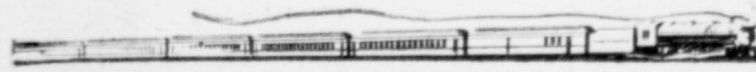

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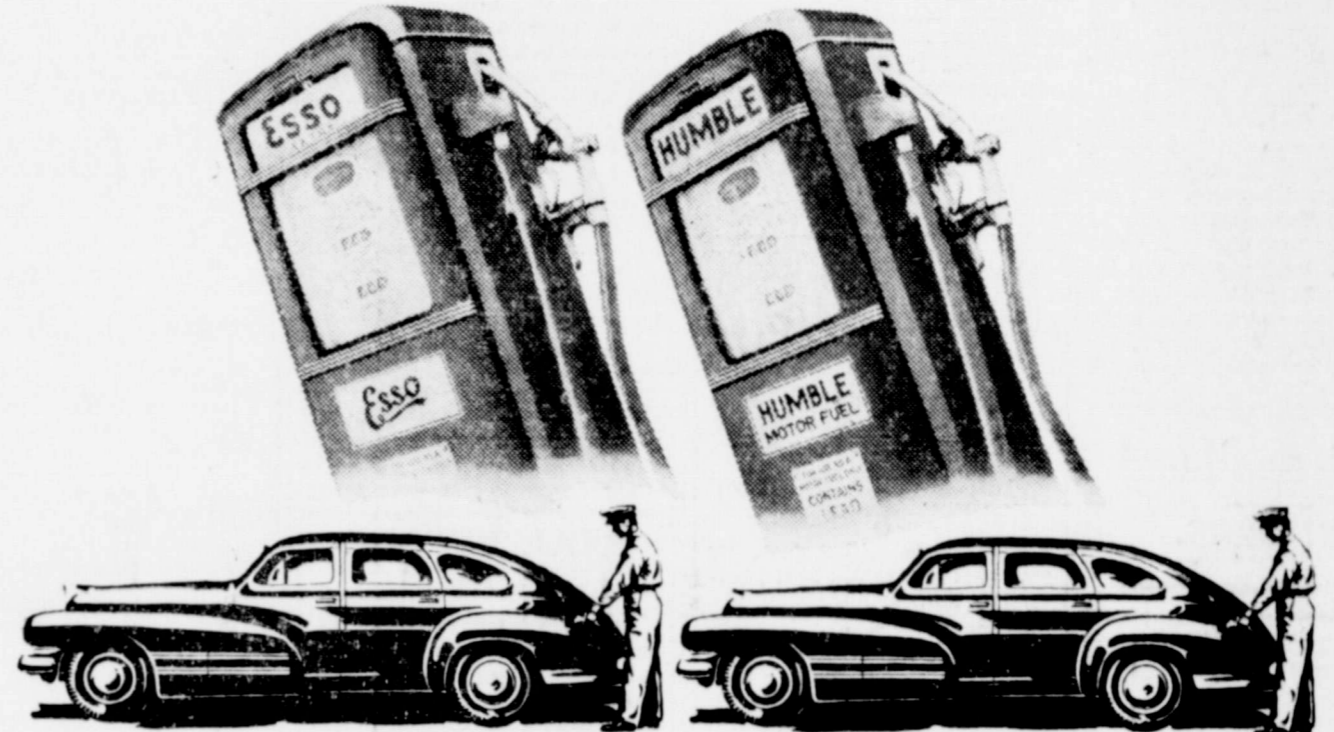
