### ARMY MOVED INTO NEW YORK'S DOCK STRIKE TODAY; PICKETS FIGHT AT WARNER BROS. STUDIO

(By United Press)

The army moved into the New York dock workers' strike today and, across the nation, pickets fought with non-strikers outside the Warner Brothers movie studio.

Government mediators, meantime, sought to end the spreading soft coal strike in conference at Washington. The coal walkout was most serious of the scores of strikes which made about 475,000 American workers idle.

Soldiers began unloading the giant troop-carrying liner, the Queen Elizabeth, after longshoremen refused to do the work. At the same time, export freight shipments into New York were frozen because of the longshoremen's strike, which has tied up shipping in the harbor.

Workers who refused to unload the Queen Elizabeth protested at the size of sling loads being used in removing gear from the ship.

Stevedores lined the docks, booing and hissing the two platoons of soldiers who arrived to take over the job.

### Aged Oklahoman First Christian Died Here in the Church is Debt Home of Daughter Free and Happy

T. B. Strickland, 86, died Monday morning at 9 o'clock at the home of his daughter Mrs. D. I. Shelton, 508 west Nineteenth street.

The body, in charge of Thomas Funeral Home, here, will be returned to Winniewood for burial beside his wife, who preceded him in death in 1940.

The aged Oklahoma citizen was born November 7, 1858, in Pickens county, Ala. He is survived by one son T. M. Strickland, Celestia, Calif.; three daughters Mrs. M. E. Frost, Los Angeles, Calif.; Mrs. D. H. Hooford, Oakland, Calif.; and Mrs. D. I. Shelton of Cisco. There are also 17 grandchildren, 17 great-grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

The greatest financial victory in the history of Cisco First Christian church came Sunday when sufficient funds were raised at the morning service to cancel the church indebtedness in its entirety. The now extinct church property obligation totaled \$5,060.

Along with each and every member of the congregation, the pastor, Rev. J. R. Wright, who found the membership facing a church debt of approximately \$16,000 when he came here for Stuttgart, Ark., slightly more than five years ago, was all smiles today when he called at the Daily Press office and imparted the good news.

Classes and organizations within the church had worked hard to have a worthy contribution to make toward the total amount needed, and the cradle roll class made the first gift Sunday morning by bringing forward \$127. The Men's Bible class made the second highest gift, when that class presented \$425.

"The minister and officials of the church wish to express their deepest appreciation to members and friends for every contribution made, however large or small, for it was the total of both the large and the small gifts that made the victory possible," Mr. Wright stated.

### Million Honor Nimitz, Native Texan, in N. Y.

NEW YORK, Oct. 9. (AP)—Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz — a native son Texan — whose warships smashed across the Pacific to Japan, received a hero's welcome from millions of New Yorkers today and warned that the nation "must retain adequate sea power to ensure that we do not lose the peace."

### LAVAL GOT DEATH VERDICT TODAY

PARIS, Oct. 9. (AP)—Pierre Laval, France's arch-collaborator with the Nazis in World War II, was convicted of treason in the high court of justice today and sentenced to death.

The jury which heard Laval's five-day trial received the case at 4:05 p. m. and deliberated exactly an hour.

Laval, who refused to attend the last two sessions of his trial, was found guilty on both counts of the indictment — plotting against the security of the state and intelligence activities with the enemy.

The former chief of government at Vichy was not in court when his fate was announced. He sulked in his cell while his fate was being sealed.

Two months ago, in the same room, Marshal Henri Petain was convicted and sentenced to death, only to receive a commutation to life in prison.

Laval also was sentenced to "national indignity" and to confiscation of all his property. If an appeal to De Gaulle fails, Laval will be put to death by a firing squad.

#### THE ATOMIC PROBLEM.

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 9. (AP)—Col. Juan Peron, vice-president and "strong man" of the Argentine government, resigned today.

### Jap Hoard of 250 Million is in U. S. Hands

TOKYO, Oct. 9. (AP)—American occupation forces have seized \$251,800,000 worth of Japanese gold, silver and platinum — some of it probably stolen from other lands — in the past 36 hours, Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced today.

Financial experts immediately began a search of the army and navy bullion for clues that would confirm their suspicions it had been looted from China, the Philippines, the Dutch East Indies or other countries plundered by Japan.

### 40,000 Virtually Quarantined In Fight on Polio

BILLINGS, Mont., Oct. 9. — A virtual quarantine was imposed on more than 40,000 persons in the Billings area today as the result of an infantile paralysis epidemic which has taken a toll of eight lives.

Billings city authorities closed all places of public assembly in this city of 23,000 Monday and Dr. E. M. Farr, Yellowstone County health officer, Monday night issued an order placing the entire county under a similar quarantine.

#### HUGE BUTTER SURPLUS.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9. — The War Department declared 80,000,000 pounds of butter surplus Tuesday and turned it over to the Agriculture Department for disposal to civilian agencies.

#### 110 POLIO CASES.

FT. WORTH, Oct. 9. — Billy Wayne Girkland, 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Kirkland, 710 E. Elmwood, was under treatment today in City-County Hospital as a polio patient, bringing to 110 the total number of cases in homes and hospitals.

#### FIRST JUNIOR COLLEGE.

CASPER, Wyo. (AP)—The first junior college to be started in the state of Wyoming opened officially here recently with 56 students enrolled. The college was established under an enabling act passed by the 195 Wyoming legislature.

### C. J. and John Kleiner Killed Antelope Limit

Charles J. and John Kleiner returned late Saturday from a four-day antelope hunting trip to the Marfa area, approximately 425 miles from Cisco.

Armed with state permits, plus permits secured from the owners of the Hester Britz-Dunkle ranch, the Ciscoans were each permitted to kill a buck — the limit. This was the second time in forty years that antelope could be killed legally in Texas, similar permits having been issued last year.

The permits were originally issued for October 4 and 5, but due to the heavy rains in the Presidio county region, the dates were changed to the 5th and 6th by special permission from Austin. At night the Ciscoans found quarters in a Marfa hotel, there being no provision for housing hunters on the big ranch. Charles Kleiner estimated there were some 300 antelope hunters in Marfa while he and his brother were there.

Charles J. Kleiner now has 15 deer heads and one elk head, all mounted, with the antelope head yet to be added to his collection. He has been building up the collection yearly since 1918 — in Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Oklahoma and old Mexico. John Kleiner was with him on the trip to old Mexico.

### Most Vets Lose Insurance By Failure to Act

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9. (AP)—Veterans' Administration officials, alarmed at the failure of ex-servicemen to keep up their government insurance, took consolation today from commercial insurance men, who said young people were a headache to them too.

Gen. Omar N. Bradley, veterans' administrator, recently conferred with five top insurance executives in New York to learn what, if anything, was the matter with National Service Life Insurance. He had no comment on what they told him.

But it was learned that the natural improvidence of youth was a large factor in the insurance men's appraisal of these facts:

Of the estimated 2,500,000 men discharged from service, only 96,158 had converted their war policies to permanent form. And 1,483,949 policies had been allowed to lapse for failure to maintain premiums.

"Young men don't buy insurance — they have to be sold it," was the way one insurance man put it. Apparently Army, Navy and veterans' administration have not measured up as salesmen.

#### PRESSES ARE CHAINED.

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 9. —The Argentine military government has closed the Socialist newspaper Vanguardia and chained its presses.

### War Board Chairman Krug Killed Labor Forecast

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9. (AP)—War production chairman J. A. Krug predicted today that unemployment will decline by spring and that reconversion will be completed by the end of 1946 — unless strikes or other disturbing factors continue to interfere.

Krug's final report also forecast that the decline in industrial production and national income will be halted early in 1946, with the gross national output leveling off at a rate of around 155 billion dollars a year. The 1939 rate was \$8 billion.

### Wright is President of District 11 Church Group

A convention of district 11 of the Christian churches of Texas was held at Brownwood Monday, at which about 200 were present. District activities of past months were reviewed and plans for the future were announced by delegates from various churches.

The principal speaker was Dr. M. E. Sadler, president of TCU, Ft. Worth, who is also president of the International Convention of the Christian church. As usual, Dr. Sadler's talk was highly entertaining and of great factual interest.

Rev. J. R. Wright, Cisco pastor, was elected president of the district, succeeding Rev. J. S. Stockard of Monard, a former pastor of Cisco First Christian church.

### Crop Insurance May Reduce Loss For First Time

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9. (AP)—Federal crop insurance may run in the black financially this year for the first time since the government offered it to farmers in 1939, according to J. Carl Wright, manager of the program.

Insurance against weather, insects, disease and other hazards was revived on three crops — wheat, cotton and flax — after a two-year lay-off of federal insurance. Congress killed crop insurance in 1943 after early ventures, covering cotton and wheat, proved too costly, running in the red more than \$37,000,000 over a five-year period.

Wright said the 1945 insurance probably will come out on the profit side of the ledger unless flood or frost bring unforeseen losses during harvest. The Federal Crop Insurance Corp. expects to take a considerable loss on cotton policies, covering about eight per cent of the 1945 crop, but probably will take money on spring wheat and flax.

Policies were written for virtually all of 164,444 applicants. Cotton led the list of insured commodities with 95,756 applications. There were 14,390 applications for spring wheat insurance, 31,131 for flax, 10,603 for corn and 12,564 for tobacco.

Corn and tobacco insurance was on a trial basis. In 1947, insurance will be extended to citrus fruits, potatoes and peanuts, also on a trial basis.

Three new crops may be added experimentally each year, and after three years, with Congressional approval, continued permanently.

Rates offered by the revived FCIC are about 10 per cent higher than under the old money-losing program.
