BILL WOULD LOWER INDIVIDUAL INCOME TAXES NEXT YEAR BY ROUND SUM OF \$2,627,000,000

Strike Situation Shows No Signs of Improvement

(By United Press)
Picketing spread to a second Hollywood film studio today and union and industry representatives met for the fifth day at Washington in an effort to end the coal strike.
Five hundred AFL machinists from the Lockheed Aircraft Corp. joined the picketing film workers already lined up before Warner Brothers studios. Then some 650 pickets moved over to the Universal studios. About 2,500 pickets remained at Warners.
Government officials warned that the strike in the soft coal fields, unless settled by the weekend, would reduce steel operations to 25 per cent of capacity.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11. — The House gave swift and overwhelming approval today to legislation proposing a \$5,350,000,000 cut in business and individual taxes next year.

The measure offered the first general tax reductions in 16 years. It was sent to the senate, where some changes were forecast.

The bill would lower individual income taxes next year by \$2,627,000,000 through increased exemptions from the three per cent normal tax and a four per cent cut in surtax rates.

Individuals also would benefit from repeal of the \$5 automobile use tax and sharp cuts in excise taxes, effective next July 1.

For corporations, the measure proposed a \$1,888,000 reduction in 1946 tax liabilities.

Only feeble protests were raised against specific provisions in the bill.

President Objects to Replacing MacArthur in Japan

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11. (AP)—The United States hasn't closed the door to a four-power control council for Japan in the future, but it is dead-set against replacing Gen. Douglas MacArthur with such a group.
President Truman and Secretary of State James F. Byrnes are determined not to repeat in Japan the unsatisfactory four-headed occupation machinery which exists in Germany.
Soviet Russia has again proposed that the German plan be duplicated in Japan.

MacArthur Plans to Send Million and Quarter Home

TOKYO, Oct. 11. (AP)— Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced today that 1,250,000 American troops will be sent home from the Pacific in the next six months, leaving an occupation army of only 200,000 in Japan and Korea.
At the same time, he directed Japan's new premier at a conference in his occupation headquarters to free the Japanese people from centuries of government bondage through adoption of a revolutionary five-point program.
MacArthur told the premier, Baron Kijuro Shidehara, to abolish all government monopolies, break up industrial inquisitions, encourage labor unions, institute women's suffrage and liberalize education.

Democrats Are Growing Stronger Says Big Chief

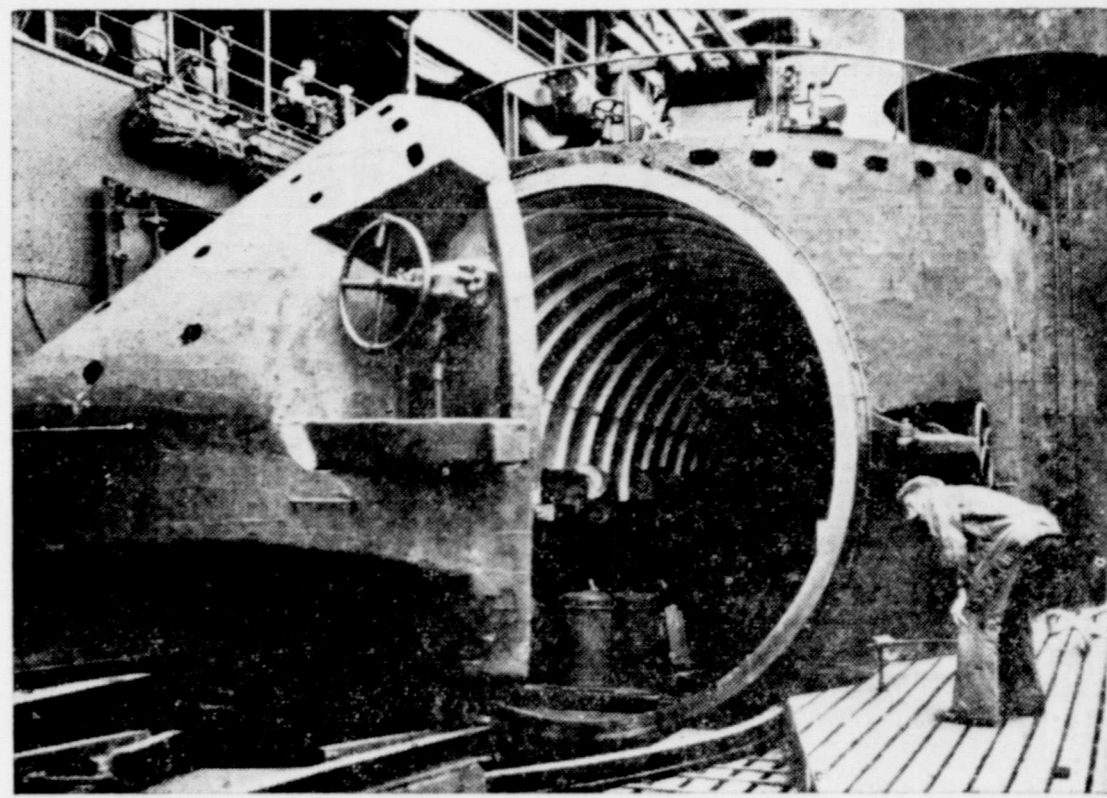
DALLAS, Oct. 11. — Democrats will increase their congressional majority in elections next year, Postmaster General Robert E. Hannegan predicted here yesterday.
"The old guard Republican leadership already has indicated that it wants old line reactionaries to continue to control their party," said Hannegan, who also is national Democratic chairman and probably one of the most popular men personally to occupy that position in many years.
"The statements of the Republican leadership clearly indicates that this is a course they will pursue."
Local and state Democratic leaders crowded the Hotel Adolphus Skyway Apartment for informal political caucuses with Hannegan. One of the first to call was Col. Myron Blalock of Marshall, national Democratic committeeman. Among other callers were J. K. Brim, Sulphur Springs; Lt. Col. Burriss Jackson, Hillsboro; Lt. Comdr. Warren Moore, Beaumont; E. L. Ashcroft, Sulphur Springs.

Hannegan shared the spacious apartment with two other officials who came to Dallas to help honor Atty. Gen. Tom Clark, Solicitor Gen. J. Howard McGrath and Edwin W. Pauley, American representative on the Allied Reparations Commission.
The first thing that caught Bob Hannegan's eye as he walked onto the sun porch of the apartment was a huge gift basket of fruit. McGrath pulled off his coat, produced a pocket knife and ripped off the basket's cover. Hannegan immediately attacked an apple.
"Just remember," joked C. Andrade II, "you wouldn't have all this if Dewey had been elected."

Two Republican Senators Want to Hold Loans Up

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11. (AP)—Two Republican senators demanded today that the United States deny financial aid to Britain unless empire preferences in international trade are abolished.
Their demands followed a preliminary report by a house post-war policy committee which strongly recommended, after two months of study abroad, that this country get tough in its international dealings and refuse loans to both Britain and Russia until they clarify doubtful phases of their foreign policy.

PRANGE DISCHARGED.
SHEPPARD FIELD, Tex. — Tech. Sgt. Ernest A. Prange, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. U. of T. Alumni Military Heads Cisco's Victory Pressure Group Seem Dead Set Drive Assignment Want More Power on Conscription Set at \$108,100

AUSTIN, Oct. 11. — A woman's organization which was formed, according to its chairman, "to protest actions of the board of regents of the University of Texas which are considered detrimental to the school," is starting a statewide poll to determine what Texans think about freedom of thought and speech in the public school system.
The Women's Committee for Educational Freedom launched the first step in a state-wide canvass Tuesday, polling persons in Austin on eleven questions.
Mrs. Jud Collier of Mumford said the committee already has members in every state senatorial district and that:
"We will expand our membership this winter to every county in the state so that for the 1946 elections people everywhere will look to candidates with the question: 'Will you free our educational institutions?'"
The organization was formed last January.
The questions being asked of citizens in all walks of life are:

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11. (AP)—Congress voiced general approval today of Gen. George C. Marshall's war summary, but there was considerable disagreement with his recommendations for compulsory military training as a future defense measure.
Marshall, in his biennial report, urged an unbroken year of military training for youth and an intensive program of scientific research to make our forces the best equipped in the world.
Reaction generally was that Congress will appropriate all the funds necessary for research and development of military weapons but it doesn't want to use conscription to get the men to use them.

R. L. Ponsler, city war bond chairman, announced this morning that Cisco's overall quota in the eighth drive, which begins October 29 and continues through 1945, has been set at \$108,100. Of the overall total, \$52,900 must be in bonds.
The county overall is \$470,000; Series E, \$230,000.
"Cisco made a thoroughly creditable response to each of the government's seven calls," said the chairman, "and I am confident our citizens will respond to the Victory drive in their usual generous and businesslike manner."

OKINAWA HURRICANE RAGED

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11. (AP)—A 120-mile-an-hour tropical hurricane ripped across Okinawa last night and early today, leveling practically every American installation on the southern half of the island and causing casualties among American personnel that may run into the hundreds.

MONTEVIDEO, Oct. 11. (AP)—Junior officers of the Argentine army were reported today to be insisting on the withdrawal of the presidential candidacy of Col. Juan D. Peron.

Cisco high school Lobos will leave here by bus tomorrow at 2 P. M. for Mineral Wells, where the second conference football game will be played with the Mineral Wells Mountaineers—8 p. m.

While the outcome of most of the games favored the local bowlers, a most excellent spirit of friendly rivalry has always existed and this was again in evidence last night, though both visiting teams lost all three games.

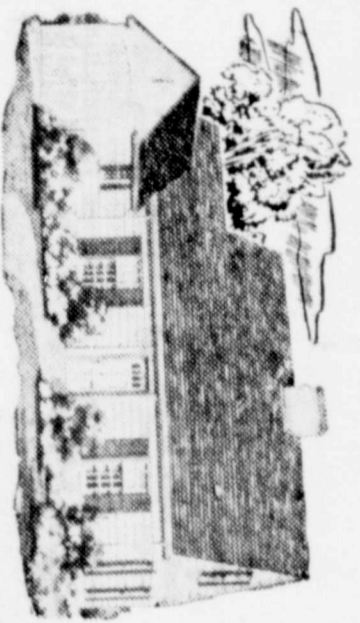

Building Restrictions Are Being Lifted...

Effective October 15, 1945, Title I home repair and improvement loans will be exempt from the credit restrictions of Regulation W. Also, effective the same date, Conservation Order L-41 of the War Production Board will be revoked so that it will no longer be necessary to obtain a priority to begin construction.

The following terms will govern porperty improvement loans under Title I:

To repair, improve or modernize an existing structure	3 years	\$2,500
To construct a new structure for other than residential use; i.e., garage or commercial buildings	3 years	\$3,000

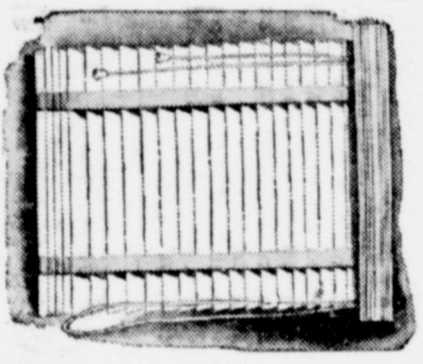

while labor is not required to carry any. Worst of all, it fails utterly to protect the general public.

Trial and error are the means by which the American people have hung on to their rights through all these years of the republic. So they try anything once. If a new piece of legislation succeeds, that's good. If it fails, after being given every chance, it is repealed, modified to make it work or ignored. It isn't any particular law which is sacred, but the rule of law in general. If one form does not do what it should, another is tried till something does succeed.

The Wagner Act meant well, perhaps. But it is failing in its main purpose of protecting workers without injuring anyone else. It is ending by doing injury to

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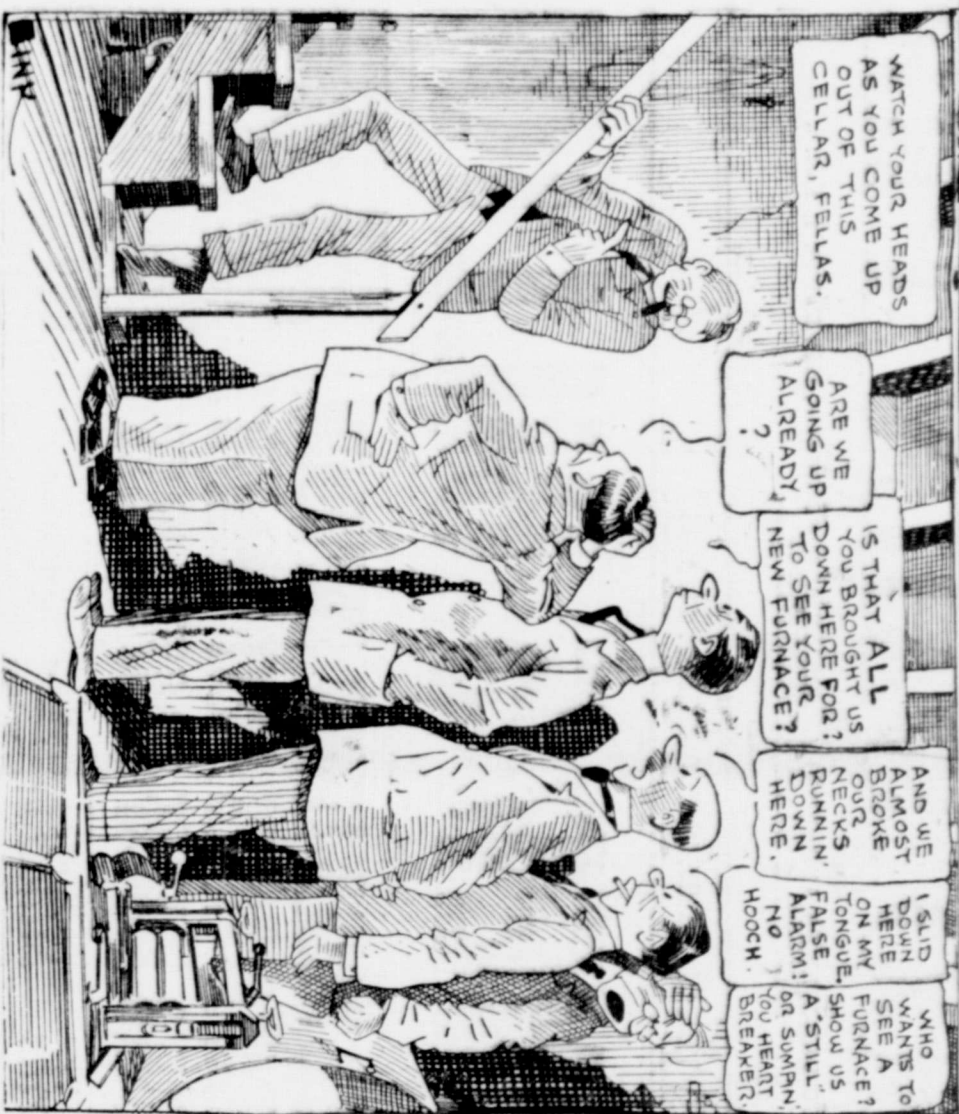

the whole body politic, including the workers themselves.

Surely, after this trial of years, some modification or new writing of a labor law can be brought out which will keep the strength of the present legislation, while eliminating its weaknesses.

Right labor legislation should protect labor's rights but also maintain labor's responsibilities, as well as those of management.
