HOUSE MILITARY AFFAIRS COMMITTEE WILL HOLD A HEARING ON THE PROPOSAL, TOMORROW

Snyder Calls on Business to Increase Wages

BOSTON, Oct. 16 (AP)—Reconversion Director John W. Snyder called on business today to raise wages in order to keep up purchasing power of workers. But at the same time, he said labor "must not" ask for too much lest it lead to runaway inflation.

He stressed two factors bearing on the wage situation — one, the need to keep up consumer purchasing power to balance the cost of living, and the other the increased profits of business, which he felt should be shared with labor.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (AP)—Chairman Andrew J. May, D. Ky., announced today that the house military affairs committee will hold a hearing tomorrow on a proposal to repeal the War Labor Disputes act.

This law, also known as the Smith-Connally Act, provides for government-supervised strike votes and provides the authority for seizure of plants and mines where strikes interfere with the war effort.

May said the group would hear Rep. Howard W. Smith, D. Va., and possibly a representative of the National Labor Relations Board. Smith, author of part of the act, has offered a bill to repeal it.

May did not say why he had decided to give Smith a hearing. Last week he said that the committee's agenda was crowded and that the Smith bill would not come up at this time.

STRIKERS SIT DOWN.

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 16 (AP)—Five hundred pickets defied a police attempt to break their line today by sitting down in front of gates at Warner Brothers when a flying wedge of 45 officers attempted to clear the besieged studio's entrance.

GOVT. REORGANIZATION.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (AP)—The senate judiciary committee today approved a government reorganization bill. It would exempt 13 independent agencies and would give either house of congress alone veto power over any proposed presidential reorganization plan. The bill now goes to the senate for action, expected within the next few weeks.

DOOLITTLE TO RETIRE.

WRIGHT FIELD, O., Oct. 16 (AP)—Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle disclosed today that he plans to retire from the army soon. Doolittle made the disclosure when he arrived here to attend the army air forces fair. He was asked what his postwar plans were and replied with a grin — "I got plans."

Annual Anti-rat Campaign Always Wise Procedure

AUSTIN, Oct. 16 (AP)—If you want to get in on a job of rat killing, see the state health department.

The rodent eradication program now being conducted in about 50 Texas counties is the largest in the nation, says Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer.

Purpose of the campaign, for which most funds are furnished by the federal government, is to reduce the prevalence of typhus fever, as well as protecting property.

All told, this year about \$100,000 will be spent in Texas to get rid of rats and the fleas which they carry. Not only that, the research laboratory which the state operates at Hallettsville, Lavaca county, in connection with the rat killing program is also the largest of its kind in the United States, Dr. Cox says.

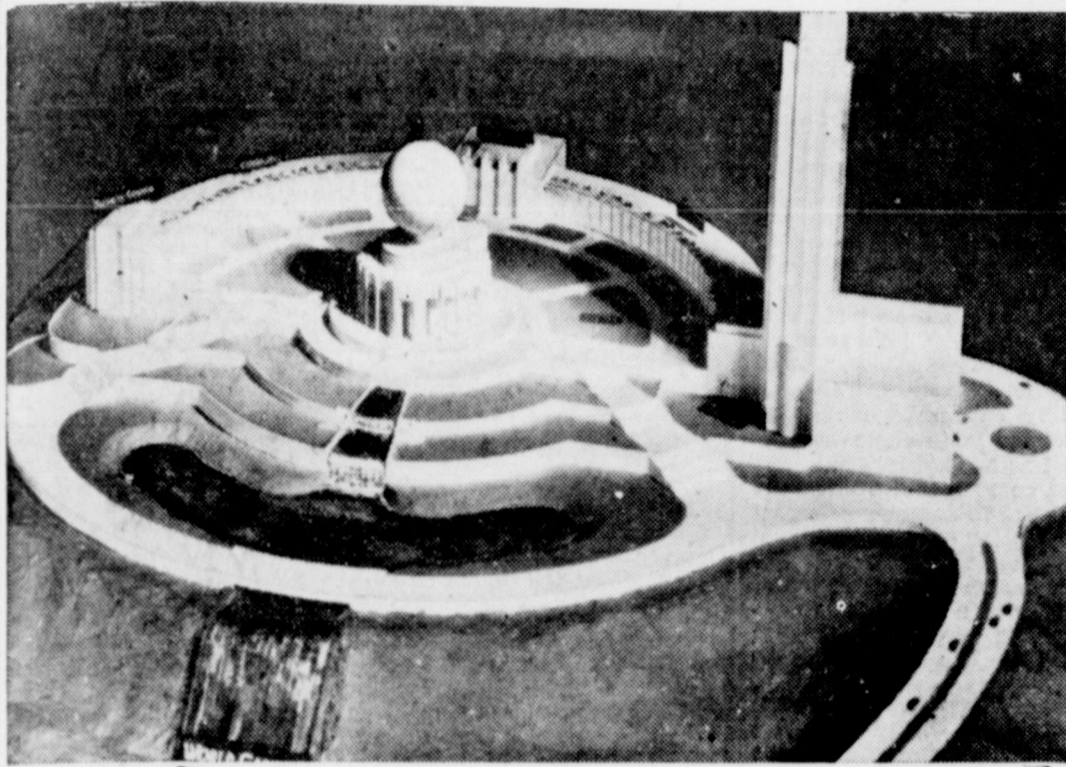
The use of two new powerful poisons, "1080" and "DDT," has proven so effective that workers can cover more territory in less time.

In the 50 campaign counties — most of which are along the Gulf Coast and in South Texas — workers first start looking for "rat runs," or where the rodents scurry to and fro. After this the two poisons are used. The "1080" is fatal to the rats, and "DDT" is the death knell for the fleas.

In one county, the workers used only "1080," failing to put out the "DDT." Rats fell thick and fast, but not the fleas. In a very short time, Dr. Cox says, there were nearly 200 typhus cases in the area.

FISHER AT EASTLAND.

Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Social Security Board field office in Abilene, will be at the postoffice in Eastland Thursday, at 1 p. m. Mr. Fisher visits Eastland the third Thursday of each month for the purpose of assisting eligible persons with their retirement or death claims under the Social Security Act, and also to give general information on social security.

Virgil L. Pruitt of Carlsbad, N. M., has purchased the Litchfield service station and storage property at the corner of Fourth street and D avenue and is now in charge. Mr. Pruitt will continue to handle Texaco products. Mrs. Pruitt and their three children will move to Cisco within the next few weeks. The three children are of school age and the family affiliates with the Baptist church. The family will live in the well-appointed quarters above the station.

The Litchfields, long-time residents of Cisco, will continue to make their home here and he will open an auto parts store in the former Coca Cola building next door to the service station, which he has also owned for several years and which was not included in the sale to Mr. Pruitt. He is negotiating for an automobile agency and also expects to handle used cars.

OIL EXECUTIVE WARNS.

TULSA, Oct. 16 (AP)—Ralph T. Zook, retiring president of the Independent Petroleum Association of America, warned today in the annual president's message that a "chaotic world oil situation" would result unless the war-increased production was properly controlled.

Jewish System of Juvenile Control Seems a Good One

DALLAS, Oct. 16. — The successful Jewish system of controlling juvenile delinquency should be studied by Christians, the Rev. Robert Raible asserted Sunday morning in his sermon to members of the First Unitarian Church.

He said information to the effect that not one Jewish child has come to the attention of the juvenile court here in several years was contained in a recent survey on children's services made by the American Public Welfare Association.

"If Jews have solved the juvenile delinquency problem, it would be well for Christians to study the Jewish methods," he declared.

He charged that Dallas uses an antiquated system of arresting children instead of summoning them to appear for trial.

Expressing a fear that the recommendations of the study would be pigeonholed, he said that an aroused citizenry could achieve an improvement of disgraceful local conditions.

"The entry of Christian children in the Dallas jail has increased 300 per cent in three years," he said.

"We are planning to spend millions on the Master Plan when we should be concerned with the gravest community problem that faces our city, the fate of our children."

Lawrence Hayes to Texas Wages Shot Open Revival in Upward 170.0 Per Cisco on Sunday Cent Through '44

Rev. Lawrence Hayes, pastor of First Baptist church at Gatesville, will begin a revival at Cisco First

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 — Income from salaries and wages in Texas shot upward 170.9 percent from 1939 through 1944 against a national average of 146.6 for five other southwestern states.

The figures made public by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, showed salaries and wages paid in Texas in 1944 amounted to \$3,915,000,000 against \$1,445,000,000 in 1939. The total income from the state reached \$6,080,000,000 in 1944, an increase of 138.1 percent from the \$2,554,000,000 of total income in 1939.

The total income figure, aside from wages and salaries, included: Proprietors' income — net income from unincorporated businesses including farms — \$1,196,000,000 in 1944, up 104.8 percent from the \$584,000,000 of 1939.

Property income — dividends, interest, net rents, royalties — \$493,000,000 in 1944 against \$394,000,000 in 1939, an increase of 21.1 percent.

Other income — relief payments, pensions, military allowances, mitering out pay, etc. — \$176,000,000 in 1944, an increase of 263.4 percent over the \$131,000,000 of 1939.

While no reason was assigned for the tremendous increase in wage and salary income in Texas as compared with the national average, it probably reflects the higher wages paid by war industry compared with peacetime industry wages in Texas.

WOULD HIKE WAGE LEVELS.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (AP)—Secretary of Commerce Henry Wallace told the House Labor committee today that he expects basic wage rates generally to increase in the next few months "as a result of collective bargaining." He said he thought, therefore, that an accompanying rise in minimum wage levels was necessary as "protection against future competitive wage-cutting."

WANTS ARMY-NAVY MERGED.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 16 (AP)—Lt. Gen. Ennis Whitehead, commander of the Fifth Air Force, declared today that unification of the nation's military might under a single department of national defense was a necessary postwar move.

Only US. Equipped to Make the Atom Bomb at This Time

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (AP)—Not even Great Britain, which shares our scientific and industrial secrets about the atomic bomb, could manufacture a bomb at this time, a naval expert on the new weapon asserted today.

Rear Adm. William R. Purnell told a joint senate committee on commerce and military affairs that no nation other than the United States is now industrially equipped to make the bomb.

2½ Years Spent in Sinking Shaft to Reach Gold

LEAD, S. D. (AP)—Approximately \$3,000,000 was "poured down" a hole the Homestake Mining Company dug into a mountain here—but it was not wasted.

The 4,250-foot hole, known as the Yates shaft, was sunk into the 5,310-foot mountain to reach gold ore bodies.

Sinking the shaft, 27 feet 8 inches by 15 feet and equipped with five elevators which operate at a maximum speed of 2,500 feet a minute, required about two and a half years. As many as 125 men worked on the project at a time, and the cost, including the surface plant, was approximately \$3,000,000.

Waste rock — approximately 185,000 tons — was drawn off at lower levels.

The shaft, which eventually will be down 5,000 feet, is one of the deepest in the world. Deeper shafts are in the Michigan copper country, Canada, Brazil and South Africa. The deepest South African shaft is down 8,600 feet, and one Canadian gold mine has a 6,800-foot shaft.

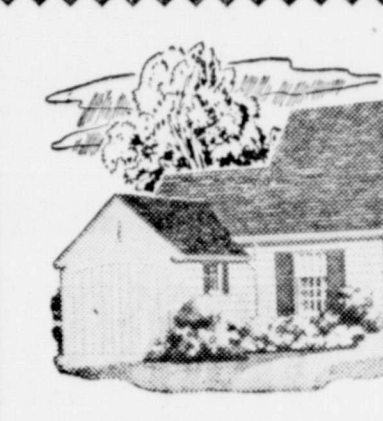


