### 208,000 MEN WILL RESUME LABOR ON ORDERS OF LEWIS; NEW THREAT BOBS UP IN MICHIGAN

(By United Press)

United Mine Workers' President John L. Lewis today called off the soft coal strike which had cut to the bone fuel supplies for the nation's steel mills.

Lewis said the miners would return to work Monday.

The coal strike, with 208,000 miners out and at least 30,000 steel workers laid off, had accounted for more than half the nation's 365,000 strike-idle workers.

A new threat to industry was posed, however, when the CIO Utility Workers' Council ordered a strike against the Consumers Power Company serving 2,200 Michigan communities with gas and electricity. The strike would not affect Detroit.

Meanwhile, about 8,000 longshoremen reported for work as limited operations were resumed along the New York waterfront, and police cleared pickets away from a Hollywood movie studio for the second day.

The pickets were unrelenting and officers simply carried them away from the gates of Warner Brothers studio.

### CITY MANAGER PLAN IS FAVORED

A recommendation of the Cisco Planning Board that the city manager plan be adopted in the administration of Cisco's municipal government was presented to a large group of associate members of the chamber of commerce at the regular meeting of the chamber last night. The meeting was called at the suggestion of the Planning Board, in order to promote discussion of the matter and secure community thought on its advisability.

After a discussion of whether or not the proposition should be laid before the voters in the form of an election to amend the city charter, a motion prevailed that the group recommend to the city commission that it take such steps as might be found necessary to secure a city manager for Cisco.

There was much argument in favor of submitting the matter to the voters in the form of an amendment to the charter, but it was pointed out that the commission form of city government, under the home rule provision of state law, can institute the city manager plan by ordinance.

Those in favor of a charter amendment, argued, however, that by amending the charter the plan would be made mandatory and prevent "switching about" from the manager plan to the non-manager plan by succeeding commissions. Members of the city commission present indicated that they preferred an election on the question.

Others argued that to go into a charter amendment might bring up confusion and result in changes later found undesirable, and that the best course would be for the commission to establish the city manager plan by ordinance, with the way left open to later amend the charter if found advisable.

The motion, made by F. D. Wright, seconded by N. D. Gallagher, in effect approved the manager plan, but left responsibility up to the city commission to determine the steps necessary for instituting it, either by ordinance or charter amendment. It carried unanimously.

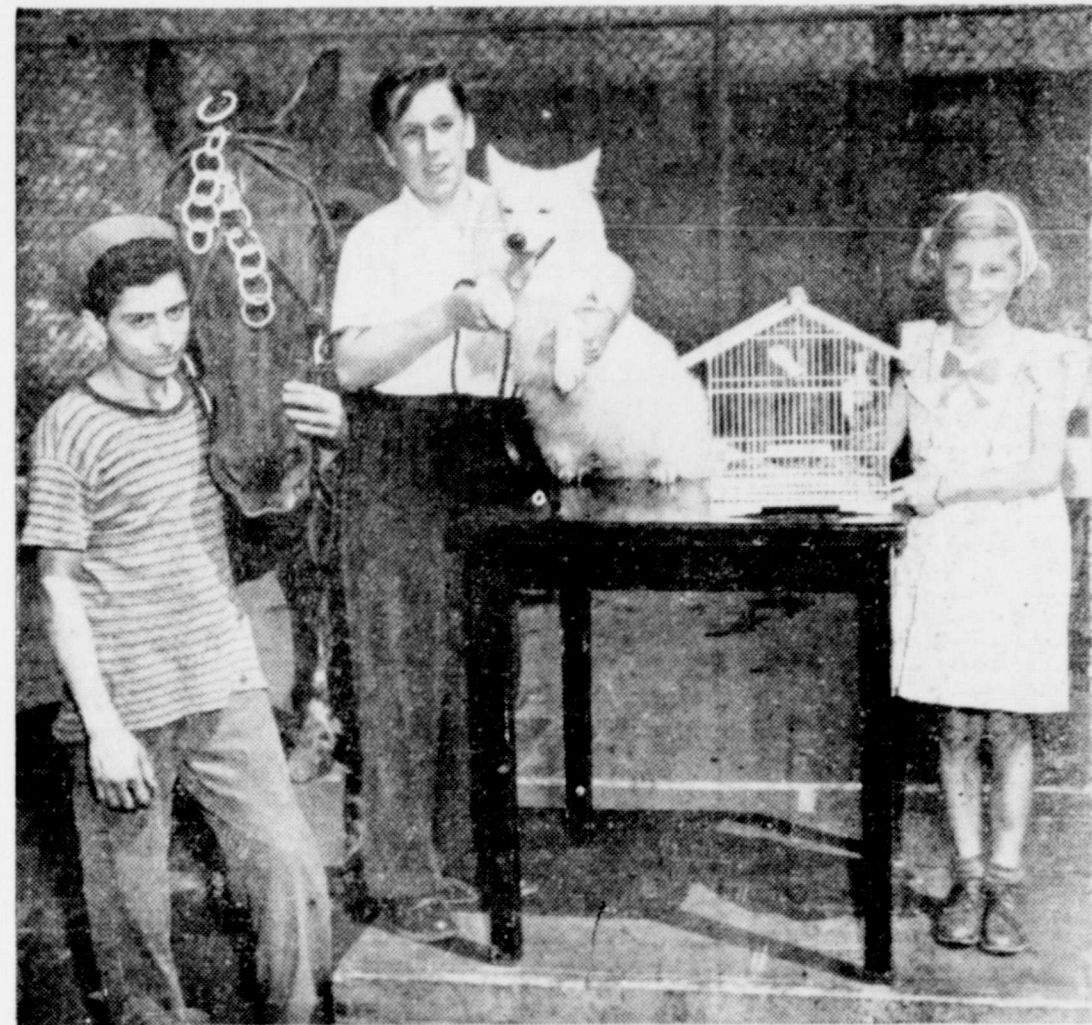
It was explained that if the commission determines that a vote is necessary, the group would be willing to assist in circulating the required petitions.

George Boyd, chairman of the Planning Board and a city commissioner, presented the recommendation of the Planning Board and its reasons for suggesting the plan.

He read an explanation of the plan by the League of Texas municipalities in which it was stated that under city manager operations all administrative functions of the city are placed in the hands of a trained executive, who is responsible to the city commission for his conduct of city affairs and enforcement of city ordinances.

A more effective and economical form of government is possible, Boyd said, when such an administrator is employed to give full time to the job.

Under the commission form, without such a manager, members of the commission are men who have their own businesses and

### Truman Will Give Patterson Joins Andersons Attend His Ideas on Uni-Group Demanding Chevrolet Pre-Universal Training Army-Navy Merge view, In Dallas

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17. (UP)—President Truman will present his ideas on universal military training to congress next Tuesday. He will deliver the message in person.

Mr. Truman's plan was announced today by Congressional leaders. They conferred with him about the message this morning.

Speaker Sam Rayburn told reporters: "I think he will recommend some kind of training program, but I do not know what form it will take."

Mr. Truman had indicated in the past that he was working on some ideas of his own which might differ from war department proposals.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24. (UP)—Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson today called for unification of the armed forces as the best means of maintaining national peace and promoting world peace.

"In my opinion," he told the senate military affairs committee, "the unification of our armed forces is an essential step in the development of a sound program for the future security of the American people."

RUSSIA INSISTENT.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17. (UP)—Secretary of State James F. Byrnes revealed today that Soviet Russia has reiterated its suggestion that four-power control machinery for Japan be set up before the formation of a Far Eastern Advisory Commission.

A. D. and Jack Anderson, local Chevrolet dealers, have returned from Dallas where they attended a preview of the new 1946 Chevrolet at the company's zone headquarters.

Mr. Anderson said he and other dealers in the area are confident the 1946 Chevrolet will maintain the record of top volume sales, which Chevrolet reached in 10 of the last 11 prewar years of automobile production, to meet the unprecedented pent-up demand for new cars.

Following the same policy as in former years, the new Chevrolet will be displayed simultaneously in dealers' showrooms throughout the country, Anderson said.

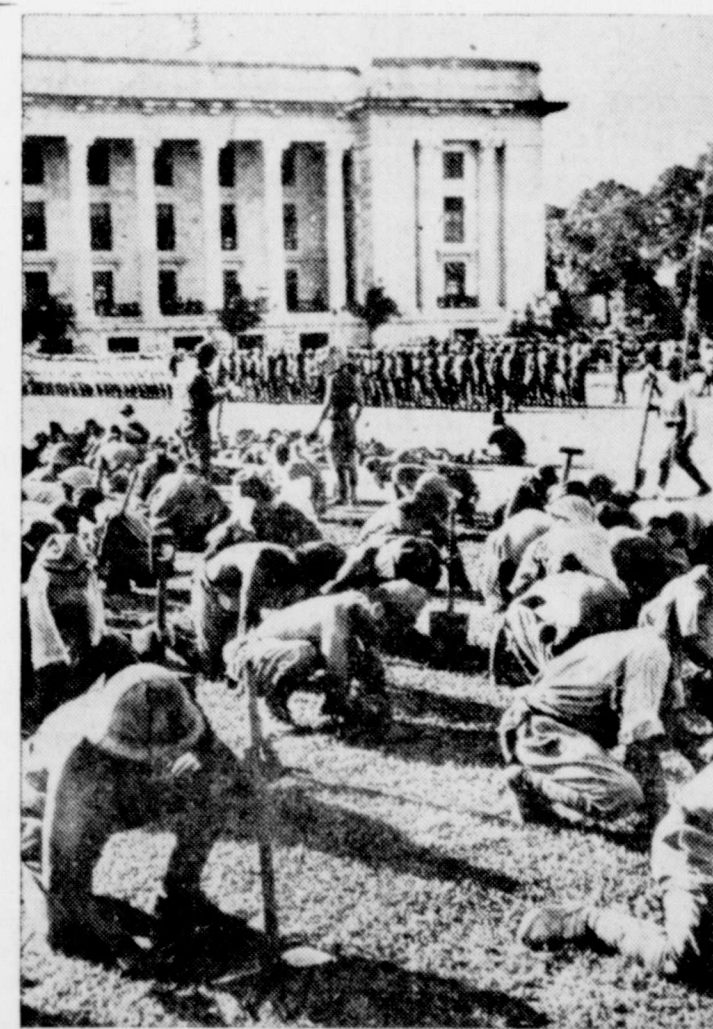
Radio and local newspaper announcements will be made, telling when customers may see the new car for the first time. These announcements are expected to be good news to motorists and to dealers alike.

Throughout the war period, car owners have been forced to get along with their old cars. At the same time dealers have expended every effort to service these cars, and to keep them rolling.

Mr. Anderson stressed car care, with the warning that motorists should not expect the 1946 Chevrolet to be available in great quantities immediately. The supply to dealers will increase as production in the Chevrolet plants permits.
