### Burns Proved Fatal to Aged Man; Funeral at 5 P. M.

Burt R. Moon, 89, died at 10 a. m. Saturday at a local hospital as a result of burns sustained Wednesday night when exploding gas set fire to his garage apartment at the J. T. Elliott home on west Ninth street. From the start, little or no hope was held for the aged man's recovery. He had lived in Cisco about 12 years and was formerly a cattleman.

The funeral will be held at 5 o'clock this afternoon at Thomas Funeral Home. Rev. J. R. Wright of First Christian church will officiate and burial will be in Oakwood cemetery.

Deceased was born May 14, 1857, in New York state, and was married to Miss Nellie Stone on December 25, 1878.

He is survived by two sons—M. B. Moon, Pasadena, Tex.; Lee F. Moon, The Dalles, Ore.; four grandchildren and four great grandchildren. The Pasadena son is here for the last rites to his father.

### Ford and Packard Are Rolling Cars From Lines Daily

DETROIT, Oct. 20 (AP)—Two of the country's major automobile producers have kicked the problems of reconversion, but they still face tough obstacles to full production.

These firms—the Ford Motor Co. and the Packard Motor Car Co.—are actually turning out cars. They've got the manpower it takes to do the job, and they're sure they can get more when needed.

But, their officials explained to a group of 17 correspondents making a reconversion tour of the nation's industry, the efforts of these companies to expand output has been hamstrung by strikes in the plants of component suppliers.

Despite this gloomy undertone, however, the automobile makers are confident of the future and are going ahead with expansion plans which will enable them to produce more cars than ever before in their history.

#### Soviet - Sponsored Austrian Government Recognized

LONDON, Oct. 20 (AP)—The four-power Allied control council for Austria tonight announced recognition of the government of Dr. Karl Renner and authorized nation-wide elections before the end of the year.

Austria's first post-war election was scheduled for November 25. Recognition was recommended two weeks ago in a report by the control council to the big-four powers. It followed weeks of bickering in the council concerning Austria's internal problems and her qualifications for recognition by the U. S., Britain and France.

There was never any doubt of Russian recognition, since the Renner government was Soviet-sponsored.

### 2,000 Warbreeding Plants May Be Eliminated

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—The U. S. military government in Germany urged tonight that all I. G. Farben industries cartels everywhere in the world be wiped out with a single Allied stroke, as a step toward "destroying forever" the huge warbreeding chemical and munitions combine.

The recommendation was contained in a report to the war department of action taken so far in the American zone of occupation against the Farben Corporation. The report said the corporation was of incalculable importance to the German war effort and accused it of plundering the industry of other nations in the wake of the wehrmacht. The report estimated that there are more than 2,000 I. G. cartels.

### President's Military Training Plan Leaks Out

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—President Truman's plan for universal military training goes like this, insiders say: Four months' training for each young man instead of one year. Training to be done in summer months only so that it will not interfere with schooling. Basic training only to be given in this required period, advanced training to be on more or less voluntary basis in National Guard, ROTC. Military men prefer year's continuous training but believe this compromise plan will be approved while original plan might not. It would cost much less (summer uniforms only, no heating of barracks, shorter term payroll). It would demand minimum sacrifices from youth; would eliminate controversial projects such as industrial training—it's backers insist.

Little has been written about Mary Stretcher, the Lewiston, Idaho, construction worker on Wake Island, whose arrest as a Japanese Lord Haw Haw was ordered by Gen. MacArthur soon after he reached Tokyo. High-placed navy and marine officers say privately that union leaders, who supplied all construction workers on Wake, have sought to hush up the Stretcher case out of embarrassment.

Americans in China are disturbed that both Ambassador Hurley and General Wedemeyer are absent from the theater at this time. In spite of the peace pact between the central government and Chinese Communists, the situation there is said to be still in a crucial state. General Stayer, commanding in Wedemeyer's absence, is an able air force officer, but lacks experience in handling delicate political situations. Civil war has been averted by peace pact but how long that will hold is still a question in the minds of many Americans in China.

### Humble Oil Gives 15 Pct. Raise to Production Men

AUSTIN, Oct. 20.—A 15 percent increase in base rate of pay for all production department employees of the Humble Oil & Refining company has been accepted, H. C. Bright has announced.

Bright is president of the southwestern Texas division of the Humble Employees Federation and also president of the Central Council.

He emphasized that the acceptance of the increase is to serve as a starting point, with the federation and company to keep negotiations open.

### QUITS JOB AT 81.

FT. WORTH, Oct. 20.—P. A. (Pink) Largent, 81-year-old peace officer who helped hang seven men and chased bad men in every state of the union during a long career, has turned in his resignation as county jailer. Largent, a native of Missouri, came to Texas at the age of 11. He served four years in Bridgeport as constable and deputy marshal before moving to Tarrant county 44 years ago.

CHICAGO, Oct. 20 (AP)—Union elevator operators went on strike and set up a picket line at the 25-story loop Palmer House Saturday, leaving 3,878 guests with crippled services.

ROME, Oct. 20 (AP)—The Italian high commissioner for public health said Saturday 11 persons had died and 13 others were ill in an outbreak of bubonic plague at Taranto.

### Fleet Shepard, 54, Killed By Auto at Plainview, Friday

Fleet Shepard, 54, was killed late Friday afternoon when struck by an automobile at Plainview, where he and his wife, the former Miss Mary Riddle of Cisco, have resided for several years.

The news came as a distinct shock to Mr. Shepard's large circle of friends here, where he made his home for many years, his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Shepard, having moved to Cisco from Gunsite, Stephens county, about 1906. His bereaved young brother, Floyd Shepard, is also a resident of Cisco.

Deceased was in the furniture business here with his father for several years, this business later being sold to J. T. McCarty. Still later, when it was purchased by the Barrow Furniture Co., Fleet Shepard became the manager. He left Cisco about 12 years ago to manage the Barrow furniture business at Stamford. He later located in Plainview as manager of the Ladd Furniture company, which he purchased a year or more ago and was operating at the time of his tragic death. He was a member of the Methodist church and was born October 6, 1891, at Gunsite.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at the Methodist church in Plainview, after which the body was conveyed to Cisco by ambulance and now rests at Thomas Funeral Home awaiting final services at Cisco First Baptist church at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon, at which Rev. Arthur Johnson will officiate. Burial will be made in Oakwood cemetery. Pallbearers will be K. H. Pittard, Fred Grist, W. W. Fewell, Homer Slicker, Bill McCall and Roy Huffmyer.

### CIO Oil Workers Face Texas Suit of Many Charges

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 20.—A suit against the Oil Workers International Union (CIO), alleging that the union is operating illegally in Texas and demanding that it be "injoined from organizing, operating and transacting any business in Texas" was filed here in 57th District Court by Fight for Free Enterprise, Inc.

The suit charges the union has conspired to hinder reconversion, halt veteran re-employment and to advance alleged communistic purposes in Texas, and asks a court order to dissolve the union.

### TYPHOON LOSS HEAVY.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—The Navy reported today that casualties in the Oct. 9 typhoon at Okinawa totaled 122, including 43 dead, 30 missing and 49 injured. Eight naval vessels were sunk and approximately 200, mostly small craft, were driven aground.
