CIO THREATENS U. S. GOVERNMENT

Rev. W. A. Flynn Transferred To Church at Temple

In the closing hours of the Central Texas Methodist conference Friday at Fort Worth, Rev. W. A. Flynn, pastor of Cisco First Methodist church, was transferred to the pastorate of Seventh-street Methodist church at Temple and Rev. Allen A. Peacock, pastor of that Temple church, was named successor to Mr. Flynn. The flynn will depart for their new home Monday afternoon and Mr. Peacock is expected here Wednesday to assume his new charge.

Rev. C. A. Warden, pastor of Cisco Twelfth-st. Methodist church, was reassigned to Cisco, while Rev. W. H. Cole, district superintendent here for the past three years, was again assigned to the Cisco district.

Rev. and Mrs. Flynn, who have five boys — one with the armed forces in Tokyo and the other four in school here — have made many friends during their year's residence in Cisco, both in and out of the church, and their departure after such a short stay is sincerely and deeply regretted by a large number of people.

At the request of the Daily Press, Mr. Flynn summed up the past year's work of the First church as follows:

"There have been 35 additions to the church and all financial obligations have been paid in full. The total amount of money raised was \$14,000. This is said to be the best financial report in many years. In every respect we had a great year."

"It is with deep regret that we go for we feel that there is much to be done here. Mistakes have been made that need correction, for we are only human and therefore subject to error; but, all in all, we have greatly enjoyed the year. Cisco is a lovely place in which to live and we shall long remember the many friendly and very helpful associations. May God richly bless you all. It is under His direction that we move on. We know that by His guidance you will have a great year under the leadership of another of His ministers."

The pastor will preach at the 11 o'clock hour at First church this morning, but there will be no evening service.

Presbyterians to Hold Faith and Action Meeting

Presbyterians will hold what is termed a "Faith and Action Conference" at Abilene First Presbyterian church, November 8-9. Dr. T. S. Knox is pastor of the host church. Dr. W. B. Sullivan of Dallas will preside.

The conference is sponsored by the executive committee of religious education and publication and the religious education committees of the synods of Texas and Oklahoma, in cooperation with the general assembly's committee on woman's work.

Purpose of the conference, says Rev. O. L. Savage, pastor of Cisco First Presbyterian church, is threefold, as follows:

1. Stir anew in the consciousness of church teachers and leaders a realization that their Christian service to their local church has experience, but not by the score of 27 to 7.
2. Supply church workers with information regarding the program of the church, the government (including international cooperation), and other agencies and individuals whose purpose it is to make a constructive contribution to achieving world order.
3. To challenge church workers with the supreme importance of rallying the Christian forces of the world behind every constructive effort to meet the demands for a just and righteous peace.

Hastings Home From 29 Months Service, Africa

Corp. Buster J. Hastings, 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. Grover C. Hastings of Carbon, and husband of the former Charlotte McKinney of Cisco, has been awarded an honorable discharge from the army air force.

Sergeant Hastings has been in the army 39 months, 29 of which he spent with the ATC in Africa as aircraft mechanic. During this time he was decorated with the European theater of operations ribbon, good conduct medal and the expert rifleman medal.

Since returning to this country he was stationed at the ferrying division's fourth operational training unit in Greenwood, Miss., an air transport command installation. Before entering the service he was a farmer and is planning to resume that work.

JOHN DALY DISCHARGED. Pfc. John Daly of 1109 Ninth street, Cisco, has received his discharge from the army at the Camp Cook, Calif., separation center. He was a member of the 13th armored division (Black Cat) which fought under General Patton in Germany. Black Cat tankmen captured more than 20,000 German prisoners in the Ruhr and took an additional 10,000 during its spearhead drive through Bavaria and Austria. In the closing days of the European melee, the 13th captured Hitler's birthplace city of Braunau, Austria, liberating 15,000 allied prisoners of war.

MILK SALES PERMITS. Dr. W. P. Lee, city health officer, issues the following statement regarding those who sell milk: "No person may sell milk in Cisco without a permit issued by the city health department. No milk may be sold as Grade A unless the barns have been inspected and approved by a representative of the state health department. Any person failing to observe these regulations is subject to a fine for each violation."

SHACKELFORD AT HOME. Ocie L. Shackelford, 23, grandson of W. P. Stephens of Cisco, has been discharged from the army and is now at home. He spent three years in the service and was head cook with General Patton's army in Europe. He was wounded at Metz. The young man was born at Putnam and operated caterpillars before entering the service.

Community Chest Finance Campaign Starts Tuesday

The "kick-off" of the combined War Chest and Community drive in Cisco, aimed at raising a budget of \$5,200 this year, will take place at a breakfast at First Christian church Tuesday morning, 9 o'clock, Drive Chairman Austin Flint announces.

More than 25 teams of workers will set out from this meeting with the purpose of putting over in one short, quick effort what in the past have been two campaigns.

Results of this single drive will determine how much money there will be available in Cisco next year to finance local charity, boy scout, girl scout and other community activities, as well as what will be Cisco's quota in the last of the national war chest campaigns.

Included in the community chest budget are the following figures: Boy Scouts, \$550; Girl Scouts, \$500; Cisco Welfare association, \$750; Bible class instruction, \$360 — a total of \$2,160.

Cisco's quota in the War Chest campaign is \$2,750. No definite amount will be asked from individuals contacted by the teams, but each will be requested to contribute as much as he gave to both last year, or one day's pay. Firms will be requested to give specific amounts.

It was thought best after considering the problem of making the two drives for these purposes to combine the campaigns into one effort and thus relieve manpower problems and avoid the necessity of making two separate contacts. Citizens are urged to be ready to make their contributions when contacted and to be as generous as possible, since the size of the budget necessary makes it imperative that as many as can give do so, liberally.

Lions Defeated Loboes, 27 to 7, at Brownwood

Cisco Loboes played the Brownwood Lions for three quarters of the football game at Brownwood Friday night and for the remaining quarter they played the most persistent series of breaks that ever beset a battling underdog eleven. Brownwood deserved the win on the basis of more manpower and experience, but not by the score of 27 to 7.

It was a football game for the book during the first half when Cisco, trading power on equal terms with their heavier opponents, took a one-touchdown decision at the half in a 77-yard drive. Each side gained eight first downs in that half. The play of the Loboes line, led by Melvin Noble, tackle, was brilliant.

It was a disastrous third period which told the story of Cisco's loss. Three times the Loboes entered the second half with a seven point lead and, in spite of a bungled kick-off reception, started off with the form they showed in the first half. They took the kick-off on their 12, definitely in the hole, but Tipton slanted for five yards and Harrelson cut loose in a brilliant run to the Lions 39. The run was nullified by a 15-yard penalty for holding, and there the Loboes' troubles began.

The penalty pushed them back to their three, Harrelson's kick was partially blocked and covered by Brownwood on Cisco's 12. The Lions, rejuvenated, scored in three plays and kicked goal to tie the score.

Tipton returned the next kick-off to Cisco's 27, but a pass interception gave the Lions the ball at the same spot and Brownwood quickly scored again in three plays. The score stood at 13 to 7.

Again Tipton returned the kick-off to Cisco's 27. Harrelson cracked out four yards and it looked as if the Loboes would finally get out of the well, but on the very next play Brownwood recovered a fumble on the 30 and in six plays had manufactured a third touchdown, making the score 20 to 7.

Cisco put the ball in play from its 19 on the next kick-off but their offense bogged down in futile passing attempts as the quarter ended and Harrelson kicked to Brownwood's 42 from which point the Lions, definitely in the groove, ripped through the stunned Lobo defense for another touchdown.

The Cisco team recovered its poise in the fourth period, however, and twice more drove within Brownwood's 20-yard line. William's catching, with Harrelson and Johnson throwing, were the highlights of this final offensive rally.

Alert Cisco line play held the Brownwood offense, led by the brilliant Dickenson, in check during the first half. Hill and Randall at guards, Fields at center and Penn at left tackle, performed nobly. Randall, subbing for Baum, gets credit for exceptional performance, while Noble at left tackle, was in championship form. The Lobo backfield equaled the play of the line, with Harrelson and Tipton carrying for the most part and Farley and Sauls doing excellent blocking and defensive work. Williams at left end and Pence at right were in high form.

Cisco made 11 first downs to 15 for Brownwood. The Loboes meet Ranger, here, next Friday night.

HOUSTON, Nov. 3. — A spokesman for the National Maritime Union today announced its members would strike on Dec. 1 on all ships not involved in the movement of troops or supply, "to force the government to put every available ship into service to get soldiers home by Christmas."

Howard McKenzie, NMU vice president in charge of the Political Action Committee of the CIO, in announcing the strike, charged that there were at least 1,000 ships which could be moved into troop-ship service.

"At least 600 ships are being used for other purposes and could be put into troop movement almost immediately," he charged. "and 400 others are in graveyards around the coasts and could be used."

He characterized the strike as "strictly a political strike," said the NMU knows "we are in the right," and invited the Veterans of Foreign Wars organizations to serve as arbitrator.

He estimated the strike would affect 90,000 NMU members.

"We want this situation called to the attention of the public," the union spokesman said, "and for that reason we have given ample time before calling the strike."

"We have made a number of attempts to get the government to put all possible ships into troop transport, but there has been a policy of buck passing."

McKenzie asserted "the G. I. is led to believe that he isn't getting home because labor strikes are tying up the facilities to bring him home."

First Negro Member Fed Judiciary Sworn in Saturday

NEW YORK, Nov. 3. (AP)—Irvin C. Mollison, 47-year-old Chicago attorney, became the first Negro member of the federal judiciary within the Continental United States today when he was sworn in as a judge of the United States customs court.

"I do not regard this appointment as any particular recognition of an individual, but as recognition of the race to which I belong," Mollison said.

WLB Commission Denies 3 Pleas of Andy Higgins

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3. (AP)—The War Labor Board's shipbuilding commission today recommended that all three demands by Andrew J. Higgins, New Orleans industrialist, be denied.

Higgins had asked the board to restrict the right of unions to discipline certain employees in his three closed plants, that war veterans be exempted from the union shop provision of his contracts, and that the employer have unlimited right to transfer employees from one craft to another.

The commission denied the metal trades department — AFL — demand that foremen be included in the bargaining unit, but approved the union request for one week's vacation after one year's service and two weeks after five years, effective for the vacation season of 1945.

The recommendations were made to the National WLB by the commission on the basis of its hearing held here Oct. 20. Higgins walked out of that hearing with the announcement that he would not be bound any longer by WLB orders. Then this week he closed down three of his plants in New Orleans.

Anti-Jewish Riots Flared Saturday in Cairo's Center

CAIRO, Nov. 3. (AP)—Anti-Jewish rioting flared in the center of Cairo today in a renewal of yesterday's wild demonstration in which 10 persons were killed and 430 injured.

Today's disturbance broke out on Solimpasha street in the center of Cairo when a band of about 100 looters began smashing Jewish shop windows and carrying off goods.

Jap Massacre Order Related In Yamashita Trial

MANILA, Nov. 3. (AP)—A former Filipino collaborator told a military tribunal today that the Japanese command issued an official order for the destruction of Manila and the massacre of its inhabitants when American liberation forces approached.

Although the witness did not specify who signed the massacre order he testified that Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita Japanese commander in the Philippines in 1944 and 1945 rejected all pleas for its retraction with:

"The order already has been given. I'm sorry but war is war."

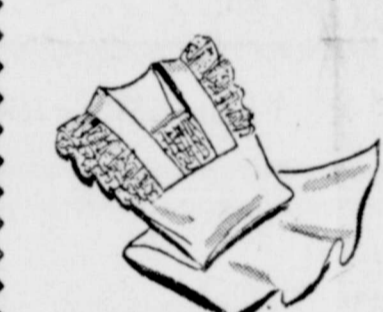

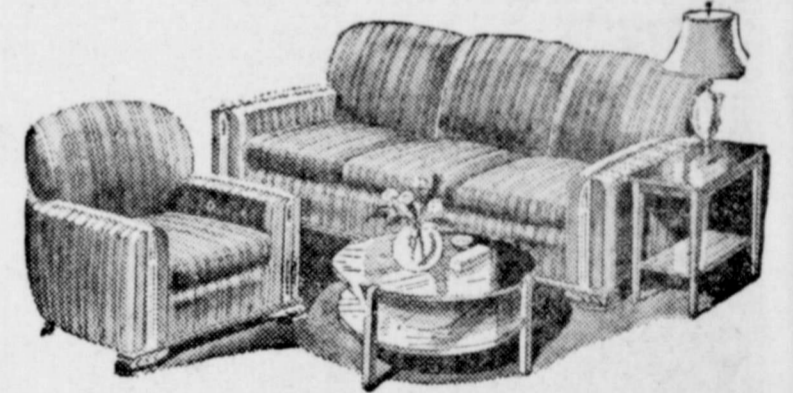
