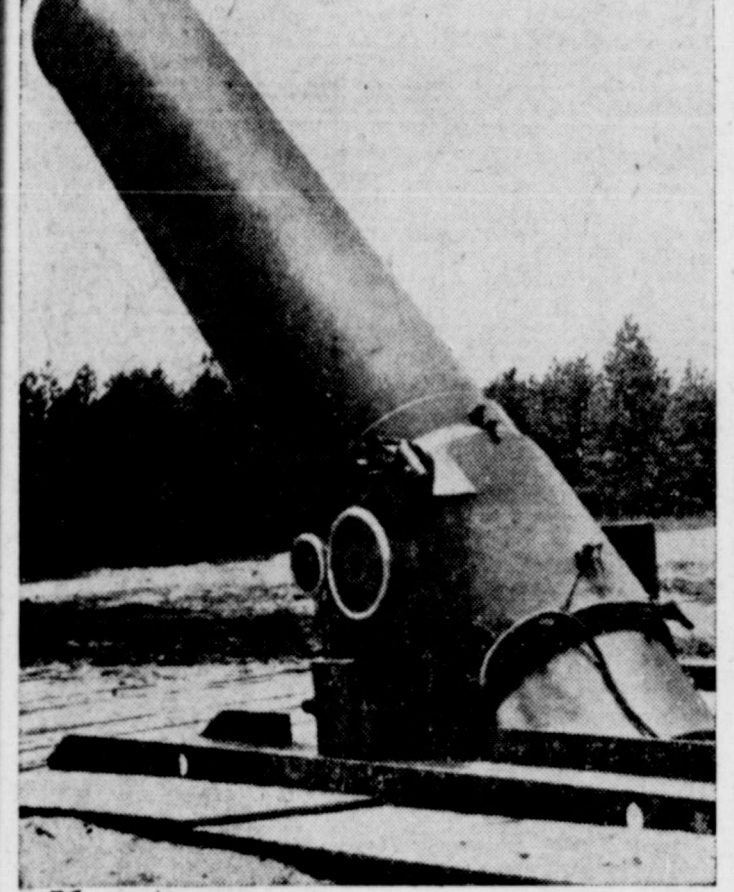

### Albert Munn, Cisco Citizen Since 1875, Died Monday

Albert L. Munn, a resident of Cisco since 1875, died suddenly about 3:30 Monday afternoon, while visiting with friends in the shoe shop of Abe Notgrass on D avenue.

There was hardly a second's warning before death struck — he was conversing pleasantly with long-time acquaintances one moment and the next moment life had departed from the physical shell that had housed the spirit of a good and valuable man for almost 87 years.

Funeral will be held at Twelfth-st. Methodist church at 2 p. m. tomorrow, with Rev. C. A. Warren as the officiating minister. Burial will be in Oakwood cemetery by Thomas Funeral Home. Pallbearers selected include Henry Stubblefield, Abe Notgrass, W. R. Huestis Ed Townsend, Billy Notgrass, J. W. Anderson.

Mr. Munn was born in Yale county, Ark., Jan. 5, 1858, and first settled in Johnson county, Texas, in 1871, coming to Cisco four years later. There were but six families here at that time. He was a carpenter and helped build houses, churches and school buildings, and saw the first courthouse built in Eastland county. He also saw the railroads come to Cisco. His parents, Major and Lovy Munn established and named the first postoffice at Nimrod, Tex. Mr. Munn was married to Anna Townsend, Nov. 20, 1877; she died in December, 1943. He was well represented in both world wars, having two sons in the first and nine grandsons in the one just terminated.

Survivors are five daughters and three sons — Mrs. Ira May Taylor, Cisco; Mrs. L. C. Meadows, Tipton, Okla.; Mrs. Frank Oakley, Odessa; Mrs. Grace Hoecker, Galveston; Mrs. A. H. Porterfield, Lamesa; R. L. Munn, Cisco; P. M. Munn, Woodson; J. T. Munn, Rising Star.

### REPUBLICAN CONGRESSMEN ALLEGE WASHINGTON KNEW JAP INTENT DAYS BEFORE ATTACK

(By United Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6. —Rep. Bertrand W. Gearhart, R., Calif., asserted in the House today that a broken Japanese code message told top officials here three days before Pearl Harbor that Japan had decided to fight the United States.

The ominous words were — East Wind Rain — and Gearhart said their meaning was fully understood in Washington.

The Japanese government, he asserted, sent the message to its envoys throughout the world on Dec. 4 and 5, 1941. The Pearl Harbor attack was on Dec. 7.

Gearhart and Rep. Frank R. Keefe, R., Wis., both members of the congressional Pearl Harbor investigating committee, accused the Army and Navy of sending emissaries throughout the world to break down the testimony of witnesses before service boards studying the Pearl Harbor defeat.

They also declared that the Navy was keeping a "Capt. Kramer," described as an essential Pearl Harbor witness, in a psychopathic ward at Bethesda Naval Hospital and that committee members were not permitted to see him.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6. (U.P.) — The senate military affairs committee today approved the nomination of Brig. Gen. Kenneth C. Rypal of North Carolina to be undersecretary of war.

### Today's Municipal Elections Might Indicate Trend

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6. — Politicians looked to today's first postwar elections for possible clues on what portends in the 1946 congressional races and even in the 1948 presidential contest.

Most of the elections were municipal, but some had national overtones.

The situation in brief:  
New York — William O'Dwyer, backed by some members of the Democratic and American Labor tickets two opponents. They are Judge Jonah Goldstein, Republican-Liberal-Fusion candidate endorsed by Gov. Thomas E. Dewey; and Newbold Morris, Republican independent bearing a "No Deal" label and supported by the retiring incumbent, Fiorello LaGuardia.

James A. Farley, former national Democratic chairman, Senator Robert Wagner (D-NY), Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt and Secretary of Commerce Henry A. Wallace stumped for O'Dwyer. Mrs. Wendell Willkie and her late husband's 1940 campaign manager, Russell Davenport, worked for Morris.

Detroit — Prestige of the CIO Political Action committee was involved in an acrimonious mayoralty contest between Mayor Edward J. Jeffries, Jr., running for a fourth term, and Richard T. Frankensteen, vice president of the CIO United Automobile Workers. Their candidacies are non-partisan.

### Have Right To Chest Solicitors Strike, But Not to Block Work 45 Are at Work

WINDSOR, Ont., Nov. 6. — City officials today threatened to use troops to remove a 1,500-vehicle barricade thrown up Monday near the strike-bound Ford Motor company plant by an estimated 6,500 union pickets.

Mayor Arthur J. Reaume, in a blunt warning to union leaders to break up the makeshift barricade, declared, "troops will be called in if the union does not accede to my request."

The mayor's ultimatum came at the end of a hectic day that saw approximately 8,500 Windsor-area workers strike in sympathy with the 10,000 Ford workers, who have been idle since Sept. 12 in a contract dispute.

Reaume's action was disclosed as Canadian Labor Minister Humphrey Mitchell strove for an early settlement of the dispute, which observers said might result in a complete tieup of Windsor's industry.

**IDLE FOR SECOND DAY.**  
DALLAS, Nov. 6. — Greyhound buses were idle in the Southwest for the second straight day today although both union and management have expressed a willingness to negotiate. Drivers are seeking a one-cent a mile increase in pay.

### Forty-five workers met at breakfast in First Christian church dining room this morning and set out with the object of raising \$5,210 needed in the combined War Chest and Community Chest campaign in Cisco this year.

At the conclusion of breakfast, lists were distributed to teams of two workers each, each team was assigned a territory of the city and given literature which will assist them in explaining the needs of the funds to prospective contributors.

Individual contributors will be asked to contribute as much as they gave to both the War Chest and the Community Chest last year, or at least one day's pay. Stated amounts will be requested of business firms.
