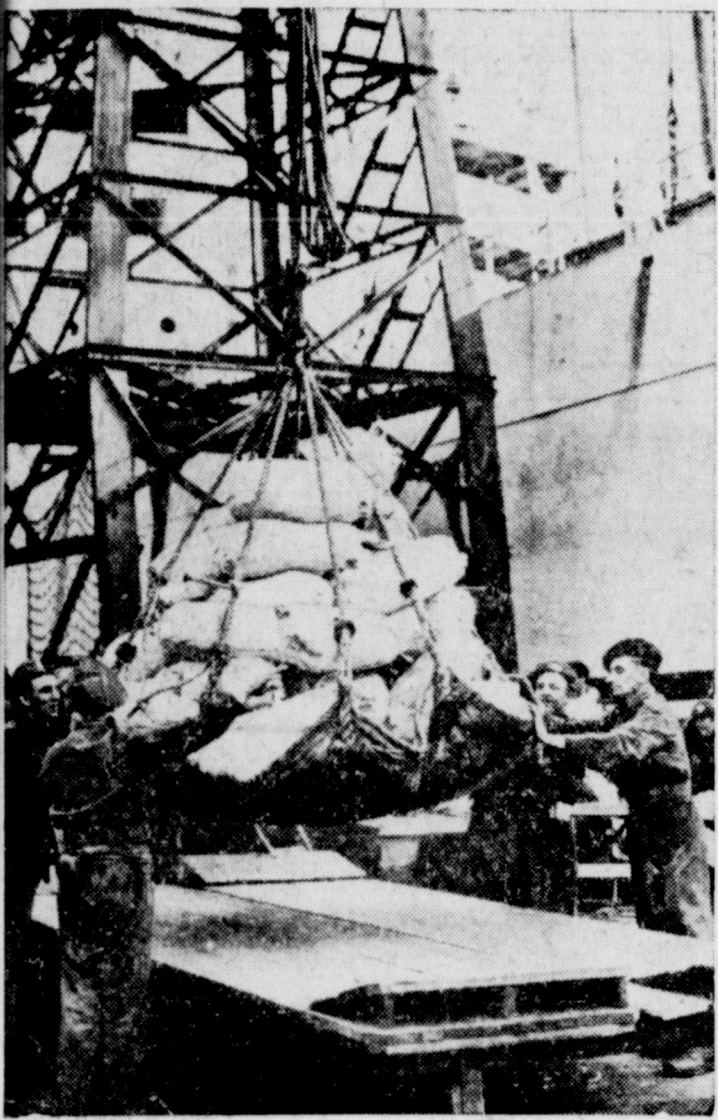

Taxpayers Benefitted by Tax Contract.

"The rapid and striking improvement in Eastland county's position is the result, and proves the worthiness of the Delinquent Tax Contract now in progress, which WILL BE carried on to completion.

"Many people are paying their delinquent taxes and are proud of the fact that they have not only performed their duty, but also that they have relieved themselves of this tax debt.

"It is hoped that all who owe delinquent taxes will pay NOW in order to avoid suit. However, it is not the desire of the tax authorities to SUE ANYONE.

"They will cooperate with anyone who will make an honest, sincere effort to pay their taxes.

"You can be assured that if you pay your taxes the others will also, because this program WILL NOT cease until the delinquent taxes of this county are collected.

"The taxpayers are reaping the benefits of this now, in that it was the means by which the Commissioners' Court did reduce the tax rate 26 cents for this year.

"Last year's (1944) rate was \$1.16; this year's rate is \$0.90.

"They were also in a position to allow a 3% discount on all taxes paid during the month of October. This discount will be 2% in November and 1% in December.

"A careful survey indicates with reasonable certainty that your tax bill for next year (1946) will be based upon an UNPRECEDENTED low tax rate of not more than 60 cents on the \$100 of taxable values.

"A reduction of ALMOST ONE-HALF of the tax rate within ONE YEAR means a saving to the people of the county of about \$125,000 per year.

"A careful survey of income for debt purposes clearly indicates that sufficient funds will be on hand by December 31, 1945, to meet our sinking fund, bond and interest requirements for NEXT YEAR, 1946.

"A comparison of tax collections for October, 1944, with October, 1945, reveals some interesting facts, bearing in mind the reduction of tax rate and discount allowed.

"Total current taxes collected during October, 1944, were \$146,872. Current collections during October, 1945, were \$193,190, or an increase of more than \$46,000. This is CURRENT taxes which were paid when due.

"THE DELINQUENT taxes collected during October, 1944, were \$5,043, while during October, 1945, delinquent collections were \$42,137, a gain of more than \$37,000 in one month."

UNION-MANAGEMENT SESSION AT NATION'S CAPITAL SEEMS HEADED TOWARDS BREAK-UP

Transit Workers At Capital Vote to Stop Strike

(By United Press)
Striking transit workers voted today to end their work stoppage which has tied up public transportation in Washington, D. C.

Four thousand bus and street car operators decided to accept the plea of their union leaders that they go back to work.

Elsewhere, there were these labor developments—

Striking CIO United Automobile Workers agreed at Windsor, Ont., to remove a barricade of automobiles from around the Windsor plants of the Ford Motor company.

Ford workers in 37 American cities began taking a strike vote. At Detroit, the UAW notified President Truman that the union would oppose the raising of prices on 1946 automobiles.

Hope for settlement rose as company officials for the first time entered the negotiations for ending the strike.

There were other smaller strikes called across the nation today which swelled the number of strike-idle American workers to 294,500.

WORLD AIR RECORD.

HERNE BAY, England, Nov. 7. RAF Group Capt. H. J. Wilson pushed his jet-propelled Gloster Meteor a measured course at 613 miles per hour today to establish an unofficial world air speed record.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7. — The Labor - Management conference headed toward a possible explosion today over wages.

The Congress of Industrial Organizations accepted the challenge from other labor forces which were prepared to battle against inclusion of the wage issue in the conference agenda.

At the same time, President William Green of the AFL reiterated AFL opposition to the proposal. He insisted that the wage question must be settled in plant-or-industry bargaining.

CIO President Philip Murray, however, said he believed current industrial disputes would end "if employers would meet with organized labor and proceed forthwith to negotiate in good faith settlements affecting wages."

RUSSIA "ACTING UP."

LONDON, Nov. 7. (UP)—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin, charging Russia "wants to go right across the throat of the British commonwealth," vigorously attacked several aspects of Soviet policy today and admitted he resented some of them. Debating Britain's foreign policy in commons, Bevin urged the great powers to put their cards on the table face up in order to dissipate uncertainty over the atom bomb. Britain is ready to do so, he said.

Fifty School Boys Form Jr. Future Farmer Club Here

Fifty boys formed a Junior Future Farmer club Monday at grammar school.

Club meetings will be held each week and subjects for discussion at the meetings will be agricultural problems of current interest.

The majority of the members have livestock as a project.

This club was organized under the direction of the vocational agriculture department of Cisco high school.

Lions Heard Good Boy Scout Program, Noon Today

Following a musical program furnished by Ray Judia today at Lions luncheon, Lion Austin Flint presented an interesting program on boy scout work. Scout executive G. N. Quiri and Assistant Executive Guy Smith of Brownwood made short talks concerning boy scout work in the Comanche Trail council.

A color-film was shown picturing scenes at Camp Billy Gibbons Scout camp, near Richland Springs, which is attended annually by Cisco Scouts.

The Scout program was especially timely, in that \$850 of the Community Chest fund now being raised will be earmarked for Scout work. Scout Edwin Jackson gave the Scout oath and law.

Attendance at the meeting was good and the group voted to present Rev. W. A. Flynn, former popular member and late pastor of First Methodist church, with a gift.

Harry Ashton Returns to Cisco After 38 Years

Harry E. Ashton, native Ciscoan and son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas E. Ashton has returned to Cisco as a permanent resident after an absence of 38 years. He has reopened the Magnolia service station on D avenue (adjoining the Daily Press). The family consists of Mr. and Mrs. Ashton and their 18-year-old daughter.

Mr. Ashton's parents lived in Cisco from about 1871 until their death in 1908. They are buried in Oakwood cemetery, together with a son and daughter.

During his absence from Cisco Harry Ashton was city engineer at Birmingham, Ala., for about 14 years. He also served ten and a half years as a member of the U. S. Marines.

Mr. Ashton possesses a Distinguished Civilian Service Medal of which he is very proud, which was given him for outstanding service to the U. S. navy. In commenting on the award, the Durham, N. C., Daily Herald of July, 1945, said:

"The Distinguished Civilian Service Award has been given to Harry E. Ashton of Carroboro, N. C., by the secretary of the navy for outstanding service to the navy

and heroic conduct in extinguishing a fire at the National Munitions Corporation at Carroboro, preventing a heavy explosion of munitions. By his cool thinking and heroic conduct in performance of service to the navy beyond that ordinarily required or expected of his position, Mr. Ashton has distinguished himself in a manner deserving of the navy's highest civilian award."

Arabs on Warpath Kill 74 Jews and Injure Many More

CAIRO, Nov. 7. — The British ministry of information announced today that 74 Jews and one Arab had been killed in anti-Jewish outbreaks in Tripolitania.

Troops and police in Tripoli, metropolitan center of the Italian colony in North Africa, were ordered to "shoot all looters and fire if necessary to disperse groups of more than five persons."

An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Cairo said the British had imposed a curfew throughout Tripolitania following the outbreak of violence, rioting and arson by Arabs against the Jews. Jewish quarters at Souk El Juma and Tejjura were declared looted and burned.

Eastland County Makes Good Start in Victory Drive

Eastland county's quota for the Victory and last loan has been set at \$470,000, \$230,000 of which is to be in Series E bonds. All series E bonds sold from and after October 29 through December 31, 1945, will be credited to the respective cities where purchased, as well as all other securities that are bought to make out our full quota.

Of course, any town can buy it's over-all quota by purchasing Series E only as they desire, but it has been the custom in the past for each town to buy some bonds other than Series E, which helps make up each town's over-all quota.

Eastland county is in the Fort Worth district and this district contains 59 counties. At the close of business Saturday night Eastland county had sold more than \$50,000 Series E bonds and \$45,000 of the other issues. In other words, we had sold nearly 25% of the total Victory Loan quota.

This is a wonderful start and if we keep up this speed we will have no difficulty in reaching the whole quota for the county.

Today I received a report covering the 59 counties and Eastland county stands 16th from the top. This is a good showing in itself, but let us work together, joining our efforts to lift Eastland county up towards the top of the 59 counties comprising the district.

The boys and girls have done their part to the four corners of the earth. They have completed their job. They have whipped the materialistic Hitler, and have absolutely pulverized the unholy Japan; they now need to come home; many will need to go to hospitals, many will want to take advantage of the G. I. Bill of Rights and, in order that all of these things may be done with dispatch, we must have the money to meet these bills.

It prompted Democratic leaders to see good things ahead for the party in the state and nationally. They saw in it a decline in the political fortunes of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey.

Claude Hammett, for the past two years and 10 months a deputy under Sheriff John S. Hart, has resigned and will manage a ranch near Okra for Will Tyler of Rising Star. He has already moved to the ranch. Sheriff Hart stated today he had not appointed a successor to Hammett, but possibly will do so within the next few days.

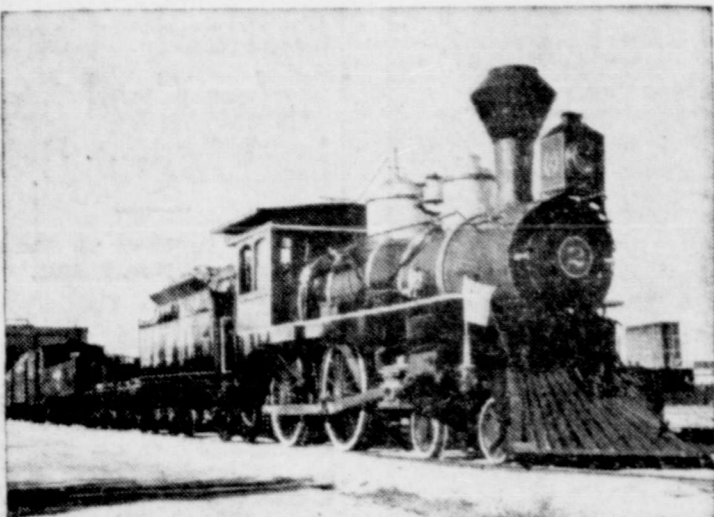

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KATY'S 70-YEAR-OLD WOOD BURNER.



PARSONS, Kan., Nov. 7.—The busiest train in America last week was a tiny, two-coach mixed affair pulled by a sputtering, wood-burning 1870-model locomotive. Upwards of 10,000 persons rode the train between the Parsons station and the yard limits—a round trip of only three miles.

It was all a part of the city of Parsons' week-long 75th birthday party for the Missouri-Kansas-Texas railroad — and thousands of persons from throughout the Southwest waited in line for hours for a chance to ride the exact replica of the first train to enter Parsons. Some 50,000 people watched a 3-mile-long parade depicting the history of the Katy, ending with the initiation of R. J.

Morfa, Katy board chairman, as a chief of the Kiowa Indian tribe.

Katy shop employees at Parsons didn't build the replica — they simply restored a vintage locomotive and cars to their original grandeur. The 70-year-old locomotive gave up its modern adornments for its original wooden cab, link-and-pin couplers, diamond-shaped smokestack, long cow-catcher and wood-burning fire-box.

The cars went through the same reconversion process. The tiny cars, converted into cabooses in more recent years, were returned to their original state as "palace" cars — complete to long sleeping bunks along the wall, brass kero-

sene lamps, and a pot-bellied stove. On the baggage racks were pieces of luggage marked to "Red" Hall, famed deputy sheriff at Denison, Tex., in the Seventies; to Kit Carson in the Indian Territory, and others.

In the freight car were simulated barrels of whiskey billed to the Indian Territory; military supplies destined for Fort Gibson; and other vintage freight. The cars were equipped with brakes made of wood — because air brakes were unknown when the first Katy train chugged across Kansas to open the Southwest.

Crew members were garbed in period costumes, as were hundreds of the thousands who rode the train.

Believed to be one of the two existing trains of its type in America, Katy officials have indicated that they will keep the locomotive and cars intact for future historical occasions.

Building Restrictions Are Being Lifted ...

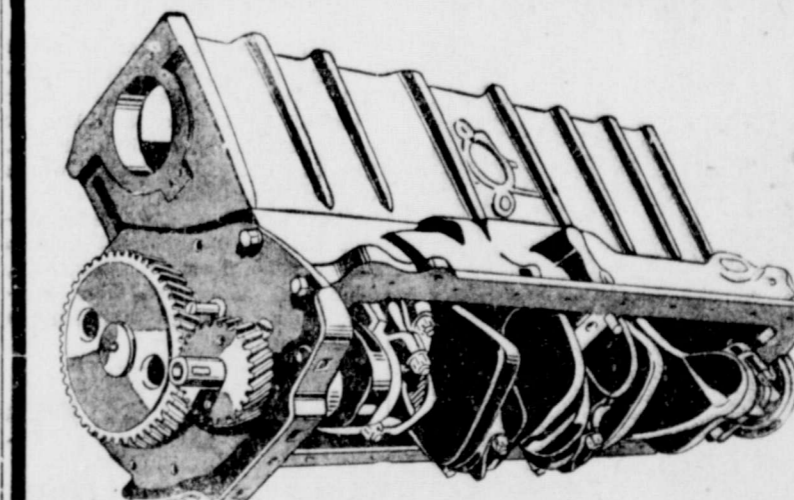

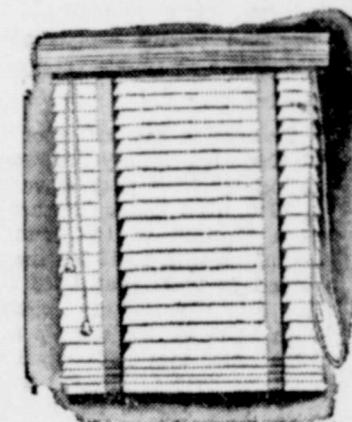
