Mrs. Laura Kittrell, 88, Died Winters Today

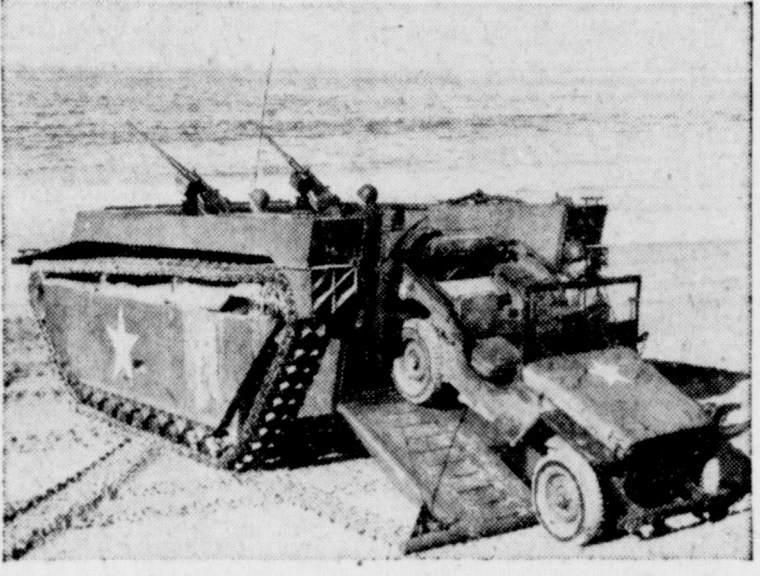

MEMBERS CONGRESSIONAL INVESTIGATING COMMITTEE SEE CAPT. KRAMER AT HOSPITAL

(By United Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9. — Two members of the Pearl Harbor Investigating committee today interviewed navy Capt. Alvin D. Kramer, a potential witness in the investigation, but declined to reveal immediately the results of their questioning.

Reps. Bertrand W. Gearhart, R., Calif., and Frank B. Keefe, R., Wis., succeeded today where they failed yesterday in talking to Kramer at Bethesda Naval Hospital, where he is a patient. Kramer was on the naval operations staff at the time of the Pearl Harbor attack.

They referred questions about the interview to Kramer, who saw reporters briefly after he had talked to the congressmen.

Kramer, a tall, thin, white-haired officer, said he would say nothing about the interview with Gearhart and Keefe, but that statements that he had been held incommunicado were incorrect and that he would testify at any time the committee members desired.

Meanwhile, Fulton Lewis, Jr., Washington radio newsman, is making nightly reports from Honolulu of his private investigations of the situation that prevailed at Pearl Harbor for weeks and months before the attack.

The Lewis reports allege that political "highups," both in the army and at Washington, have left little undone in their efforts to cover up and smother all attempts to make public the deplorable situation in Hawaii leading up to the tragic events of December 7, 1941.

President Truman has made it clear that the final report of the investigating committee should be full and complete, and apparently the showdown is near at hand.

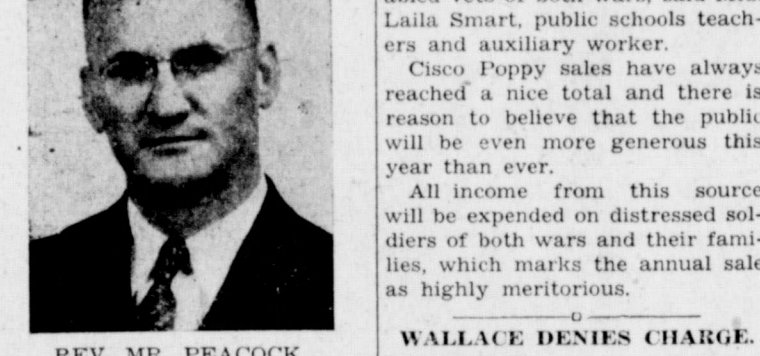
New Pastor First Methodist Will Preach Sunday AM

Gen. Eisenhower Leaving Germany Today for U. S.

FRANKFURT, Germany, Nov. 9. — General Eisenhower will leave for the United States within "a few hours" to testify before congressional committee, his headquarters said today.

The announcement did not state the nature of Eisenhower's testimony, but it is expected that he will support the stand of the U. S. Army chief of staff, General Marshall; for consolidation of the Army, Navy and Air Forces into one defense department.

While the announcement said Eisenhower would return to Europe by Nov. 23, authoritative sources predicted his stay then would be short and in the nature of a farewell to his command in Europe before assuming duties as Army chief of staff.

General Marshall reached the retirement age of 64 last Dec. 31 and is known to have expressed desires to retire around his 65th birthday. His tenure as chief of staff predates the outbreak of the war on Sept. 1, 1939. Rumors have been current since September that Eisenhower would succeed him.

But as recently as Oct. 25, President Truman declared in Washington that he needs General Marshall as chief of staff.

Right to Pray in Court Not Determined by Jurists

AUSTIN, Nov. 9. — Question of whether an attorney can request the jurors and spectators to pray with him for his client during a trial was not determined by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals Wednesday in affirming a death penalty case.

The point was an exception in the appeal of Edgar L. Dotson from sentence imposed by Dallas district court when Dotson was convicted of the Aug. 19, 1944, hammer slaying of his wife, Ruby.

Preston P. Reynolds, attorney for Dotson, in summing up his arguments during the trial requested the jurors, the court and the spectators to bow their heads and join him in prayer.

The state's counsel objected and his objection was sustained by the court.

The Court of Criminal Appeals did not rule whether it was proper to pray in court, because the defendant's attorney did not object to the ruling and took no exception to it at the time it was made. Therefore, the question was not a part of the court record and could not be reviewed by the appellate court.

President Truman Bishop Hits Ministers Who Dilate on Side Issues

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9. — The White House today announced that President Truman had signed the bill giving individuals and business a slash of \$5,920,000,000 in 1946 taxes.

Truman thus became the first president in 16 years to sign a general tax reduction measure. Not since Herbert Hoover put his signature on a "Christmas present" slash in 1929 has there been an overall reduction of pocketbook levies.

Congressional sponsors of the legislation said it would stimulate business in the reconversion period and create jobs.

The White House announcement said the bill was signed Thursday.

AUSTIN, Nov. 9. — Texas collected \$23,218,449 in registration fees on 1,656,940 motor vehicles in the fiscal year ended last Aug. 31, the Highway Department reported Friday. Registration increased 1.69 per cent and receipts increased 1.46 per cent over the previous fiscal year.

HOUSTON, Nov. 9. — The fires of evangelism were kindled anew at the Texas Methodist conference here when Bishop W. C. Martin of Topeka, Kan., made a challenging appeal for a self-effacing, world-relinquishing ministry, wholly devoted to the task of winning the lost.

"The ministry demands all," Bishop Martin said. "It has no place for those who want fame or riches. This is no day for marginal preaching."

This, the second year of Methodism's "crusade for Christ," is designated as the year of evangelism. A goal for 1,000,000 souls has been set.

The first year of the five-year crusade was devoted to the raising of \$25,000,000 for postwar rehabilitation and church extension. More than \$27,000,000 was contributed.

WALLACE DENIES CHARGE.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9. (U.P.)—Secretary of Commerce Henry A. Wallace asserted today that there was "no basis" for a charge that his department had "grossly misled" the public about automobile industry wages, prices and profits.

CIO CONTINUES BLATANT.

DETROIT, Nov. 9. (U.P.)—The CIO automobile workers today charged General Motors with fostering "a policy of runaway inflation" to support "economic imperialism" at the sacrifice of wage earners and consumers.

HOUSING PRIORITIES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9. (U.P.)—Rep. Wright Patman of Texas said after a conference with President Truman today that he plans to introduce legislation to give veterans housing priority.

WOULD AVOID BLOODSHED.

WINDSOR, Nov. 9. (U.P.)—Ford of Canada today offered to submit its two-month old dispute with the CIO Automobile Workers to an impartial arbitrator "in order to avoid bloodshed," and union leaders began immediate conferences on the proposal.

SEPTEMBER OIL.

AUSTIN, Nov. 9. (U.P.)—Texas wells produced 55,763,839 barrels of oil in September, while 4,378,019 barrels of the allowable was not produced, the Railroad Commission reported Wednesday. Under production averaged 7.29 per cent, ranging from 2.17 in East Texas field to 16.60 in the Panhandle.

FLIERS' GRAVES FOUND.

TOKYO, Nov. 9. — The heavily marked graves of 14 executed B-29 fliers, hidden in underground, have been discovered in Osaka, the U. S. 6th Army disclosed today. Nine of the 14 have been identified tentatively by names cut on pieces of plank stuck into the graves, but they are being withheld until next of kin have been notified.

POWER OF WOMEN.

Launched on the globe is another force potentially as revolutionary as the atomic bomb for good or for evil. Possibly more so, for this power can control the bomb itself. It is the ballot in the hands of the world's women. MacArthur opened the polls of Japan to its women. De Gaulle saw to it that his country-women voted in France's recent important election. Italian women are about to taste the franchise. Added to these radical developments is the startling declaration of Pope Pius XII that "women have the strict obligation to enter public life, at least as far as voting is concerned." The pontiff stresses the obligation as that of Catholic women, but the consequences will transcend such limitation.

Women will vote not as Catholics, not as French or Italian or Japanese nationals. They will not even vote as women, but as world citizens. With the ballot in their hands their voices will be listened to in world problems of which war is the worst. Women can stop wars. Lysistrata, who led her Greek sisters so long ago in a futile rebellion against battles, is vindicated at last.

Beyond all this, women can make peace pay. The world's creators of life, for ages its greatest consumers of goods, women have been an unorganized, inarticulate minority. This unique thing, dawning world democracy, is giving them a chance.

Woe be unto them if they remain merely daughters of Eve, playing in the garden. They have a stern duty—to make the world a fit place for the young they bear.

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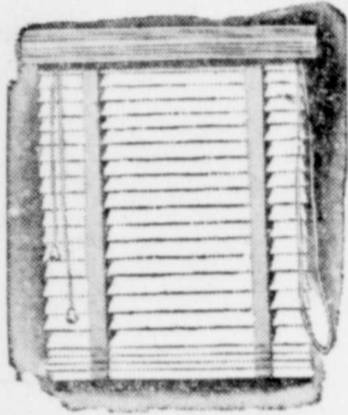

Mrs. Laura Kittrell, 88, Died Winters Today

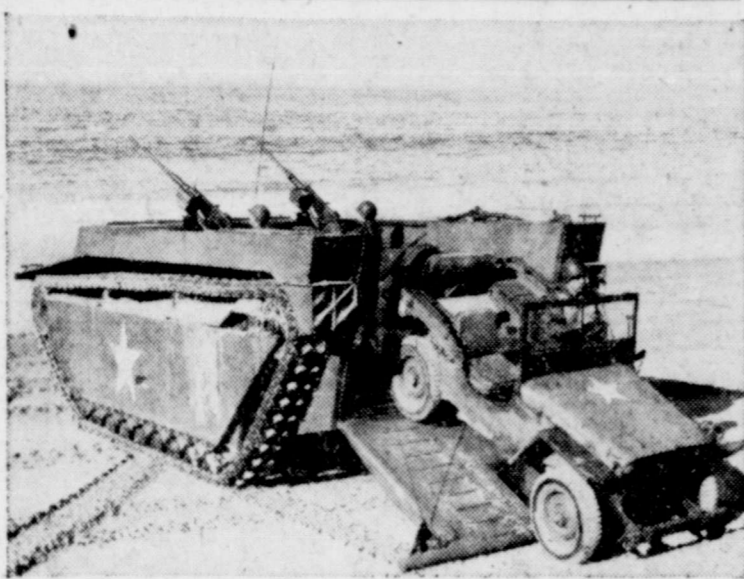

MEMBERS CONGRESSIONAL INVESTIGATING COMMITTEE SEE CAPT. KRAMER AT HOSPITAL

Prime Minister of England to Talk to U.S. Congress

LONDON, Nov. 9. (U.P.)—Prime Minister Clement Attlee left by plane today for Washington to address a joint session of congress at 12:30 p. m., Tuesday.

Meanwhile, the White House said it had no knowledge of any plans for Soviet Premier Josef Stalin to come to Washington.

(By United Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9. — Two members of the Pearl Harbor Investigating committee today interviewed navy Capt. Alvin D. Kramer, a potential witness in the investigation, but declined to reveal immediately the results of their questioning.

Reps. Bertrand W. Gearhart, R., Calif., and Frank B. Keefe, R., Wis., succeeded today where they failed yesterday in talking to Kramer at Bethesda Naval Hospital, where he is a patient. Kramer was on the naval operations staff at the time of the Pearl Harbor attack.

They referred questions about the interview to Kramer, who saw reporters briefly after he had talked to the congressmen.

Kramer, a tall, thin, white-haired officer, said he would say nothing about the interview with Gearhart and Keefe, but that statements that he had been held incommunicado were incorrect and that he would testify at any time the committee members desired.

Meanwhile, Fulton Lewis, Jr., Washington radio newsmen, is making reports from Honolulu of his private investigations of the situation that prevailed at Pearl Harbor for weeks and months before the attack.

The Lewis reports allege that political "highups," both in the army and at Washington, have left little undone in their efforts to cover up and smother all attempts to make public the deplorable situation in Hawaii leading up to the tragic events of December 7, 1941.

President Truman has made it clear that the final report of the investigating committee should be full and complete, and apparently the showdown is near at hand.

Right to Pray in Court Not Determined by Jurists

AUSTIN, Nov. 9. — Question of whether an attorney can request the jurors and spectators to pray with him for his client during a trial was not determined by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals Wednesday in affirming a death penalty case.

The point was an exception in the appeal of Edgar L. Dotson from sentence imposed by Dallas district court when Dotson was convicted of the Aug. 19, 1944, hammer slaying of his wife, Ruby Preston P. Reynolds, attorney for Dotson, in summing up his arguments during the trial requested the jurors, the court and the spectators to bow their heads and join him in prayer.

The state's counsel objected and his objection was sustained by the court.

The Court of Criminal Appeals did not rule whether it was proper to pray in court, because the defendant's attorney did not object to the ruling and took no exception to it at the time it was made. Therefore, the question was not a part of the court record and could not be reviewed by the appellate court.

YOUNG FARMERS WELCOMED.
COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 9. — Aggeland, home of Texas A. & M. College, made welcome Wednesday night twenty-six 4-H club potential farmers of Mexico and Texas who were guests on the campus Thursday as a high point in their twelve-day tour of the state under the joint auspices of the college and Sears-Roebuck Foundation. Twenty-three of the group will arrive in Chicago Dec. 2 for the national 4-H club congress.

SEPTEMBER OIL.
AUSTIN, Nov. 9. — Texas wells produced 55,763,839 barrels of oil in September, while 4,378,019 barrels of the allowable was not produced, the Railroad Commission reported Wednesday. Under production averaged 7.29 per cent, ranging from 2.17 in East Texas field to 16.60 in the Panhandle.

FLIERS' GRAVES FOUND.
TOKYO, Nov. 9. — The crudely marked graves of 14 executed B-29 fliers, hidden in underground, have been discovered in Osaka, the U. S. 6th Army disclosed today. Nine of the 14 have been identified tentatively by names cut on pieces of plank stuck into the graves, but they are being withheld until next of kin have been notified.

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President Truman Bishop Hits Ministers Who Dilate Tax Slash Bill on Side Issues

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9. — The White House today announced that President Truman had signed the bill giving individuals and business a slash of \$5,920,000,000 in 1946 taxes.

Truman thus became the first president in 16 years to sign a general tax reduction measure. Not since Herbert Hoover put his signature on a "Christmas present" slash in 1929 has there been an overall reduction of pocketbook levies.

Congressional sponsors of the legislation said it would stimulate business in the reconversion period and create jobs.

The White House announcement said the bill was signed Thursday.

AUSTIN, Nov. 9. — Texas collected \$23,218,449 in registration fees on 1,656,940 motor vehicles in the fiscal year ended last Aug. 31, the Highway Department reported Friday. Registration increased 1.69 per cent and receipts increased 4.46 per cent over the previous fiscal year.

HOUSTON, Nov. 9. — The fires of evangelism were kindled anew at the Texas Methodist conference here when Bishop W. C. Martin of Topeka, Kan., made a challenging appeal for a self-effacing, world-relinquishing ministry, wholly devoted to the task of winning the lost.

"The ministry demands all," Bishop Martin said. "It has no place for side issues. It has no place for those who want fame or riches. This is no day for marginal preaching."

This, the second year of Methodist's "crusade for Christ," is designated as the year of evangelism. A goal for 1,000,000 souls has been set.

The first year of the five-year crusade was devoted to the raising of \$25,000,000 for postwar rehabilitation and church extension. More than \$27,000,000 was contributed.

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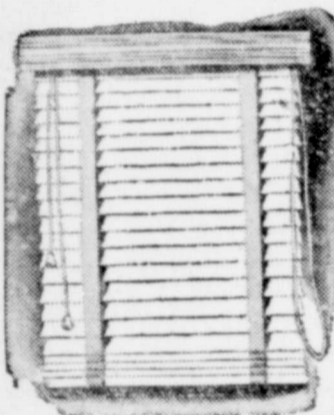
