## Farm to Market Road Contract Let in January

Contract for the construction of the farm-to-market paved road from Cisco toward Scranton and Nimrod is due for letting in January, the Cisco chamber of commerce said today on information furnished by District Highway Engineer Leo Ehlinger at Brownwood.

The strip to be paved consists of a six-mile section from the Base Line road one mile west of Cisco to the intersection of the Scranton and Nimrod roads southwest of Cisco.

This section will be the first of the three projects in Eastland county to be let. Next to be let will be a road from Eastland toward Staff and third will be a road from Ranger south toward Staff. Future plans call for the extension of all these paved farm-to-market roads, which will be maintained by the state highway department.

On the agenda for cardinal road construction in this section soon is a part of the inter-regional, or "super" highway from Cisco west to the Callahan county line, the chamber of commerce was told. This highway project is due to be let about a year from now, following contract for a strip of this highway from Strawn Hill to Ranger.

The interregional highway will consist of two 12-foot lanes on a right-of-way 160 feet wide. It will be of limited access, with overpasses or underpasses at rail and highway intersections. Modified clover leaf approaches will be located at highway intersections and there will probably be two of these in Cisco, it was said.

Through Cisco the route of this highway will follow the Base Line road cutting through the southern part of the city limits, according to plans.

## John Zeiher of ATC Discharged at Wilmington

WILMINGTON, Del. — Corp. John W. Zeiher, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Zeiher of Cisco, Tex., has been discharged from the army at the New Castle army air base here.

Prior to receiving his discharge, Zeiher was stationed here with the second foreign transport group of the ferrying division, air transport command. This group flies the Crescent Caravan route from Wilmington to Paris.

Corporal Zeiher entered the army in October, 1942. He was overseas 26 months, serving with the ATC at Dakar and Casablanca. His duty assignment was duty worker.

He wears the following decorations: Africa Middle East, Good Conduct Medal. He attended Christ Lutheran school, in Cisco and in civilian life he was a farm worker.

## DRAFT BILL TO BE DISCUSSED NOW

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14. (AP)—The House Military Affairs Committee voted today to continue with immediate consideration of President Truman's request for a compulsory military training program of American youth.

The committee defeated, 15 to 12, a motion by Rep. Dewey Short, R. Mo., to defer consideration until next year, or until the Senate Military Affairs Committee approved a bill.

The measure before the committee would provide for a year's compulsory military training for all males upon reaching the age of 18, or at their option before becoming 22.

## England's Prime Minister Looks at Hopeful Side

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. (AP)—Prime Minister Clement Attlee told congress today that he believes the world has nothing to fear from powerful America and that America has nothing to fear from "Socialist" Great Britain.

The British Labor Party chief also told the House and Senate in an all-networks broadcast that civilization's only hope of surviving the atomic bomb is for nations to accept the Christian principle of man's brotherhood.

## OPA Says NADA is Greatest of All Pressure Groups

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. (AP)—Price Administrator Chester Bowles today rejected demands of the National Automobile Dealers' association for a more generous profit margin in the pricing of new cars.

He defended the OPA's price plan as highly advantageous to dealers.

Bowles told the House Small Business committee that the NADA had engaged in "the greatest single pressure group operation since OPA was established."

He declared that he favored price control resulting from "careful consideration," rather than by lobby pressure.

## Action on Murray Wage Resolution Postponed a Day

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. (AP)—The executive committee of the labor-management conference today postponed action on CIO President Philip Murray's controversial wage resolution at the request of industry representatives.

President Eric A. Johnston of the U. S. chamber of commerce said management delegates have had no opportunity to discuss the proposal in detail, but hoped to present a report tomorrow or Thursday.

This gave rise to speculation that management representatives may offer a substitute which would eliminate wages and confine the issue to that of collective bargaining.

## ROSEMAN TO RETIRE.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. (AP)—The White House announced today that Judge Samuel Roseman, special counsel to the president, will leave about the first of the year to take up private law practice in New York City.

## FBI KNEW WAR NEAR ON NOV. 26

(By United Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. — Rep. Bertrand W. Gearhart, R., Calif., said that Director J. Edgar Hoover of the FBI told him today that he "had information Nov. 26, 1941, that war was imminent" and that as a result he alerted his men in the Pacific islands.

"If the Army and Navy had done this there would never have been a Pearl Harbor," Gearhart told reporters.

Gearhart made this disclosure after he and Rep. Frank B. Keefe, R., Wis., the two house Republican members of the Pearl Harbor investigating committee, returned from interviewing Mr. Hoover at his office.

Mr. Hoover gave us very valuable information which I believe will result in startling disclosures," Gearhart added.

## Communists Busy Spreading False Stories About US.

CHUNGKING, Nov. 13. — American officials denied flatly today, amid increased reports of civil war, that the United States had gone beyond wartime commitments in military assistance to China.

An American embassy spokesman termed completely unfounded the Communist published report that China would get a \$64,000,000 loan for purchase of munitions from the United States.

## WIVES TO JAPAN?

YOKOHAMA, Nov. 13. — American authorities are studying the question of allowing wives to join service men in Japan, Lt. Gen. Robert L. Eichelberger said today, and "I feel that a bit later, if there are proper accommodations, some fair solution may be arrived at."

## NEGOTIATIONS HALT.

WINDSOR, Canada, Nov. 13. — A stalemate was reached today between company officials and representatives of striking workers at the Ford Motor Co. plant at Windsor, Ont., as both parties rejected proposals designed to end the 63-day work stoppage.

## KILLER CORNERED.

CLARKSBURG, W. Va., Nov. 13. (AP) — Police armed with rifles slipped silently through a woods 10 miles from here today seeking to flush out William Turner, 27, cornered killer of a 15-year-old girl, and his jail-breaking companion.

## POLITICS HINDERS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. (AP) — Two senators, a Democrat and a Republican, declared today that the Pearl Harbor investigation was doomed to failure because of political wrangling.

## US. Sailors Put TCU Will Spend on Riot in Honolulu; Retaliation 4 Million Dollars Expanding

HONOLULU, Nov. 13. (AP)—One thousand sailors of the Honolulu air station armed with bayonets, clubs, rocks and hammers rioted through the nearby residential section for two hours last night in what the sailors called retaliation for "unprovoked attacks" by local islanders.

The outbreak followed a period of increasing tension between military forces in Honolulu and local residents in which soldiers and sailors charged that they had repeatedly been attacked by "Gooks" — local residents.

At least one soldier, T-Sgt. Milton P. Kahn, was so aroused by the "Gook" attacks that he wrote letters to the mid-Pacific edition of the Stars and Stripes and to the Honolulu Advertiser.

Later he circulated copies of his letters to leading American newspapers asking that attention be called to the situation.

Kahn charged that "now that the war is over the riff raff element among the Honolulu civilian population feels as though they no longer need the service men around. They see how many they can 'gang up' on every night."

He claimed that service men had been attacked on buses, in parks, in restaurants and in other places where they were in the minority. He said that many men of his acquaintance had been beaten so badly that they required hospitalization.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. (AP)—With \$550,000,000 of an old authorization still hanging fire in the Senate, President Truman today asked Congress for an additional \$1,350,000,000 for the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation administration.

Some good scores were made at the bowling alleys last night, but in the whole it was an off night for a number of the tenpinners.

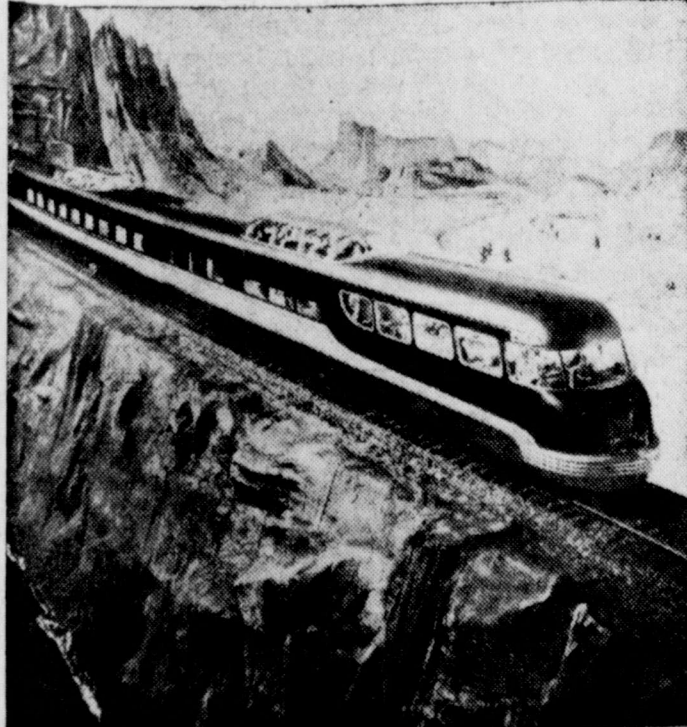

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## THE FORGOTTEN CONSUMER.

(National Manufacturers' Weekly).  
Perhaps management, as one of the immediate parties to the present wage dilemma, should simply accept official statements out of Washington and just sit still, say nothing, and cooperate. The trouble with that policy is that, although business will cooperate in any case, cooperation on the basis of the wrong formula cannot get the right answer. And when President Truman indicates, as he did in his radio speech last Tuesday night, that it is labor, rather than consumers, which must receive primary consideration in wage-price policies, we are dealing with the wrong formula.

Management can go along wholeheartedly with much that President Truman said. Management believes, along with the president, that whether, and how

much, wages can be increased must be determined on a company-by-company basis. And certainly management sees eye to eye with Mr. Truman when he says that "as rapidly as possible" we should "remove Government controls and restore collective bargaining and free markets."

**And the Consumer Can Take Hindmost.**  
But management cannot go along with many of the inferences in what the President said. Specifically, it cannot go along with him in his failure to say anything about the very heart of the problem — about encouraging productive efficiency, about reducing costs of production so prices can come down, about getting such a flow of goods that the danger of inflation will be removed — in brief, about policies which will make it possible for the consumer to buy more with his dollar.

Mr. Truman's position, as outlined in this speech, is that labor must come first, then investors come next with "reasonable profits," and consumers can take the hindmost.

In spite of the harshness of this statement, it is not an over-simplification of the policy outlined by the President. His whole argument was that wages should be increased to sustain adequate

purchasing power and to raise the national income," and that wages can be increased because of elimination of overtime, reclassification of jobs, increased labor productivity and the strengthened profit position of business because of the elimination of the excess profits tax.

### Should Labor Get All These 'Savings'?

In many cases, those "savings" are pretty dubious during the process of converting from war production to production for competitive markets, but let's pass that by. The important fact is that to the extent that such "savings" are real and represent something that could be passed along to labor in the form of higher wages, so they represent something that could equally well be passed on to consumers in the form of lower prices. And, granting full production and freedom from Government coercion, those savings would be passed on to consumer. But such is not to be under President Truman's policy.

His whole thesis is that labor must receive the full amount of these purely prospective "savings." And then, to make clear that this is not just a means for meeting present labor demands, he goes ahead to say: "What can be paid today when we are on the threshold of our postwar production

will be different from what can be paid next year or the year after, when markets have been established and earnings have become more apparent."

In brief, then, the President's position is that labor, and not the consumer, should get not only the benefit of any reduction in taxes or costs of production now resulting from business converting to civilian production, but that in years to come, if further economies of production are realized, these economies also should be passed on to labor in the form of higher wages, rather than to consumers in the form of lower prices.

Such a policy would undermine the welfare of the consumers of this nation. And in the long run it would undermine the welfare of labor and investors as well.

The only way business can pay good wages is by producing something which consumers want, at prices which they are willing to pay. Start tampering around with that basic formula, as the planners have been doing for a decade, and the inevitable result is one emergency on top of another that "requires" ever-increasing Government interference and control — with the consumer always getting the short end of the deal.

America has prospered, the luxuries of yesterday have become the commonplace of today, and American wages have become the highest in the world, because business has had the incentive constantly to reduce the cost of production in order to reduce prices and thereby expand its markets. Because of that policy, consumers

have had a larger and larger volume of goods of better and better quality at more and more attractive prices, and because of that employment has increased, wages have risen and investors have had good profits.

**There Will Be Jobs, Wages and Profits.**  
Business must continue that policy. This does not mean that wages cannot, or should not, be
