CIO Auto Workers Quit G-M Plants at 10 A. M.

(By United Press)

DETROIT, Nov. 21. — A sweeping strike of CIO Automobile Workers paralyzed the giant General Motors Corporation across the nation today in labors bid for a 30 per cent wage increase.

Employees walked out at most of the 115 G-M plants under contract with the powerful UAW union at 10 o'clock this morning, the deadline set for a simultaneous shutdown of G-M's automobile production.

Company officials said 140,000 persons actually were employed in the 115 divisions in 20 states before today's strike. But membership in the UAW's locals for the same number of plants totals more than 350,000.

Both management and labor regard the G-M strike as a showdown test of the union's strength to force pay gains through strikes and maintain wartime wage levels.

Ouster By FDR Is Explained By Adm. Richardson

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21. — Admiral J. O. Richardson today quoted the late Secretary of Navy Knox as telling him he was relieved as commander of the fleet in 1941 because he had "hurt the feelings" of President Roosevelt.

Richardson told the Senate House committee inquiring into the Pearl Harbor disaster that Knox told him in Washington March 24, 1941 after Richardson was succeeded by Admiral Husband E. Kimmel.

"The last time you were here, you hurt the President's feelings," Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.) asked Richardson, who said he had argued previously with the President against keeping the fleet in Pearl Harbor, if he knew how he might have hurt Mr. Roosevelt's feelings.

Richardson said he had complained to Knox that in all his experience he never had heard of a commanding officer being relieved "in the same manner I was."

When he asked Knox why, the admiral said the late secretary replied that "the President would send for me and talk the matter over with me."

He added, in reply to questions that the President never sent for him and he never sought to see the President.

THIS MIGHT HELP.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21. (U.P.)—The House Rules Committee today paved the way for House consideration of a bill to impose heavy penalties upon any labor union which strikes in violation of a "no strike" provision in its contract.

LOVETT RESIGNS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21. (U.P.)—The White House announced today that President Truman has accepted the resignation of Robert A. Lovett as assistant secretary of war for air. The resignation will be effective Dec. 8.

DOESN'T REMEMBER.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21. (U.P.)—Adm. William D. Leahy said today he had no recollection that the late President Roosevelt said at a house luncheon in Leahy's presence that this country would not go to war even if Japan attacked the Philippines.

CIO Would Close Montgomery Ward In Twelve Cities

CHICAGO, Nov. 21. (U.P.)—Samuel Wolchok, president of the United Retail, Wholesale and Department Store Employees' CIO, today asked union members employed by Montgomery Ward & Company in 12 cities to strike for one week beginning next Monday.

Wolchok said the stoppage would be the first in a series of "demonstrations" to force the company to arbitrate the union's demand for wage increases and a union shop.

Navy Point Score Cut to Release Many Men Jan. 1

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21. (U.P.)—The navy announced today further reduction of critical point scores of male enlisted personnel which make an additional 150,000 men eligible for release by Jan. 1.

On Dec. 1, the critical score for the majority of male enlisted personnel, previously set at 39, will be reduced to 38. On Dec. 15, the score will be reduced to 37 and on Jan. 1 to 36.

Permanent Body Might Help In Labor Disputes

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21. (U.P.)—The Executive Committee of the Labor-Management conference today took up a proposal to create a semi-permanent body to assist in carrying out any program devised by the conference to settle labor disputes.

The proposal was made by President Eric Johnston of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce.

Johnston proposed also that another purpose of this body would be to consider the advisability of various types of machinery to which parties could voluntarily refer in efforts to settle disputes.

Estimates of the amount of gas carried from Texas by pipelines range from 15 to 20 per cent of the total production. Applications pending before the Federal Power Commission would increase the proportion considerably.

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TURKEY FOR PRESIDENT TRUMAN was presented by Sen. Henrik Shipstead of Minnesota. The 41-pound fowl, which will provide Thanksgiving Day dinner at the White House, was raised on the farm of H. Williams, of North Mankato, Minn.

Texas' Natural Gas Industry is Union Service at Growing Rapidly 7 A. M. Tomorrow

AUSTIN, Nov. 21. — A 20 per cent increase in the number of producing wells this year reflects Texas' rapidly-growing natural gas industry.

Although some former war industries have decreased their consumption of natural gas, chemical and other industries will more than offset the loss.

When 1945 began, the state had 825 reservoirs which produce gas principally. These contained 3,962 gas wells. Through Nov. 17, operators reported 707 new gas wells, fifty-nine of which discovered new pools or extended limits of existing gas fields. By the corresponding date a year ago only 279 gas wells had been completed.

How much has been added to the state's known gas reserves this year has not been computed. The recoverable reserve of Jan. 1, 1945, was estimated at 64,153,782,000,000 (trillion) cubic feet by Jack K. Baumel, director of production for the commission.

Natural gas is one of Texas' most valuable resources. Of 2,434,718,000,000 cubic feet produced last year in Texas, 41.53 per cent went to pipelines which took 1,011,000,000 feet, more than half the 1,699,323,000,000 sweet gas produced.

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First Christian Church Be Dedicated Sunday AM to See Football Game Tomorrow

Cisco First Christian church members anticipate a great day Sunday, when they burn the mortgage on their imposing building and officially dedicate it to the Lord's service.

The dedicatory and mortgage-burning service will be held at 11 a. m. Rev. Patrick Henry, secretary of the state missionary society, will preach and Rev. J. R. Wright, church pastor, will conduct the dedication ceremonies. At the conclusion of the morning service the women of the church will serve a turkey dinner in the basement of the building.

The First Christian church of Cisco was organized in 1884 and the first church home was located at Tenth and D avenue, where the Norwell-Miller grocery now stands. The church building was destroyed by the cyclone of 1893 and was rebuilt at the corner of Eighth street and F avenue, on the site now occupied by the Simmons apartment house and just across the street from the church home that is to be dedicated Sunday.

The present church building was begun in the early part of 1922, was completed in 1923 and the first service was held therein on October 7, 1923.

The original charter members of Cisco First Christian church were J. J. Winston and his mother, Mrs. Isobel Winston; Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Pulley, Jane Pulley, Mr. and Mrs. T. M. Taylor, Miss D. Bacon, Mrs. Lizzie Rivers, Mrs. Tom Blake, Mrs. L. E. Brannin, Miss Sallie Bacon, Mr. and Mrs. S. G. Hines, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bacon, Mrs. R. M. Whiteside, Mrs. J. E. Rev. James R. Wright, who is admired and respected by all Ciscos, came here as pastor on July 15, 1941, from Stuttgart, Ark. Under his leadership the congregation has prospered, both spiritually and financially, and is now regarded as one of the outstanding churches of Cisco and this area.

Letters have been mailed to former pastors and members, asking that they be present Sunday if possible. In addition, all resident members, as well as all friends of the church, are cordially invited to attend the dedicatory services Sunday morning.

Cisco Schools to Get \$56,460 on Scholastics

EASTLAND, Nov. 21.—With a total of 6,350 scholastics, Eastland county will receive for the school year of 1945-46, under the per capita plan of state apportionment, \$190,900.

This is \$30 per capita as compared to \$25 per capita last year. The figures are taken from the records in County School Superintendent Homer Smith's office.

From the total apportionment Cisco gets \$56,460, Ranger \$43,560 and Eastland \$22,980.

A jury commission appointed by Judge Geo. L. Davenport of the 1st district court and composed of W. W. Paschall, Ranger; J. E. Spencer, Cisco, and Frank Lovett, Eastland, to draw a list of Eastland county citizens to serve as petit and grand jurors for the December term of 1945 court, recently completed its labors, reported and was discharged.

Representatives of the State Liquor Control Board and members of Sheriff John Hart's office yesterday made a raid on a number of places in and near Eastland which netted several pints of whiskey and resulted in the filing of complaints against three persons. 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HEROES.

One of the finest examples of old-fashioned Americanism observed lately is the farmhouse now rising like a benefactor on the "Thank You Farm" of Pvt. Gene Atkins at Spartanburg, S. C. He is a winner of the famous Congressional Medal of Honor, which comes to few men, and his proud neighbors are building the house for him free.

It would do no harm for some other communities in various parts of the country to show similar appreciation in their commu-

nities for distinguished war heroes.

However, the Daily Press makes this suggestion: Since there are large numbers of soldier heroes in practically every community, wouldn't it be better to build a serviceable community house and dedicate it to all men of that community who served their country with honor, either in World War One or World War Two?

The Press would like to see this idea carried out in Cisco, and in a substantial manner. One tenacious-minded man could organize such a movement and put it over. Let's quit talking and go to work.

RUSSIAN WATERWAYS

The canal connecting the Arctic ocean with the Baltic has been repaired, the Russians announce. Bombed early in the war, this canal would have permitted boats plying between Leningrad and Archangel to travel only 140 miles. Its destruction required them to go all the way around Scandinavia, with consequent liability to attack.

Canals are far more important in Russian life than here. Russia is blessed with many large rivers, so construction of a few short canals makes it possible to sail from the Baltic to the Caspian and from the Arctic to the Black Sea, besides making innumerable other combinations. Also planned is a waterway joining the Caspian and Black Seas. This, it is estimated, would require 10 times the explosives and effort needed to dig the Panama Canal. Yet it does not deter the Russians from contemplating the project, and in time it will probably be undertaken.

American canals had their heyday before the railroads got really going. Many have been abandoned, but those that remain carry far less than their capacity. Yet there is much bulky freight in no need of quick delivery which might probably go by water.

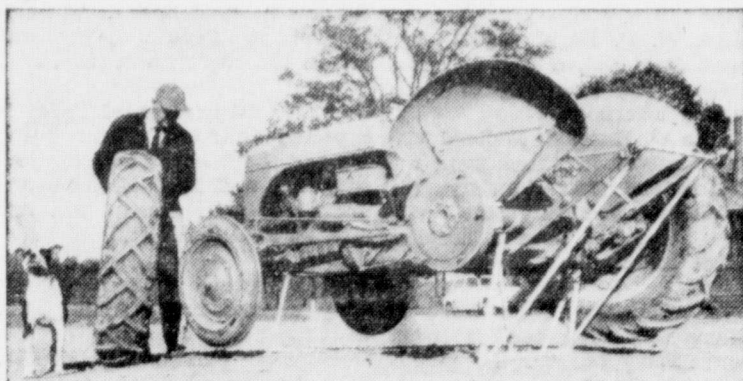

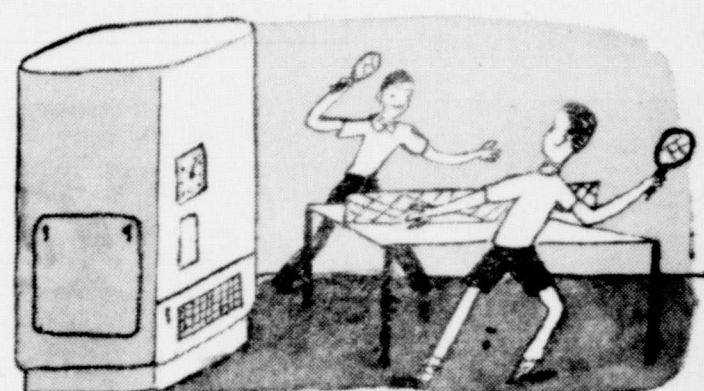

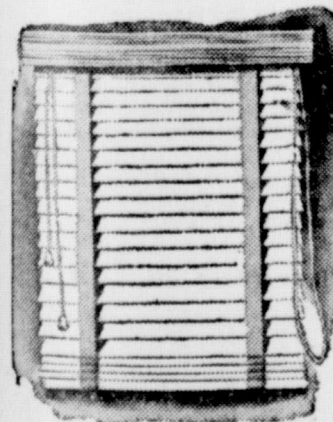
