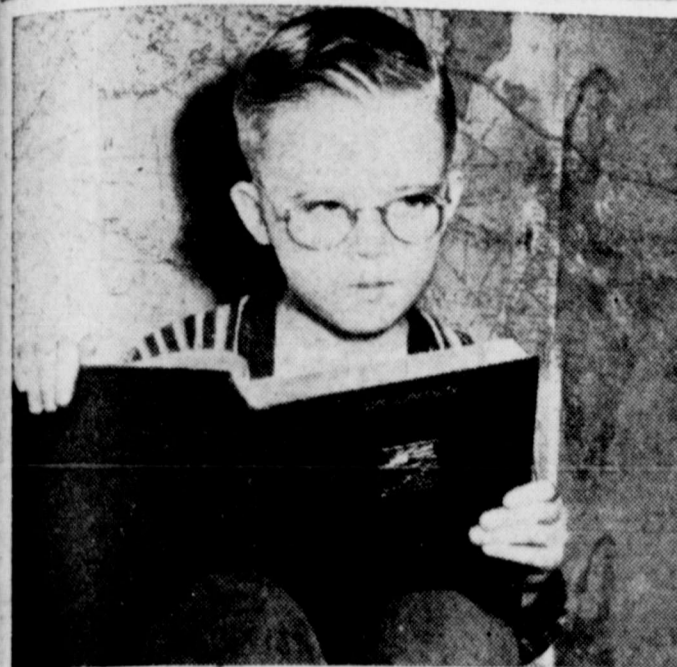

A different program has been arranged and the largest attendance in the history of the council is planned.

## Richard Donovan of Cisco Now at Calcutta, India

CALCUTTA, India. — First Lt. Richard Donovan, 705 W. Ninth street, Cisco, Texas, is currently serving with the 2472 Quartermaster Truck Co., which is busily engaged in the task of preparing soldiers for immediate return to the United States.

The unit is one of several companies operating from Camp Kancharapara, outside Calcutta. This is the last overseas stop for men and women of the India-Burma and China theaters, and it is here that much administrative processing must be carried out before "casuals and units can be returned to the states.

Troops arrive here by plane or train from all over India, Burma and China. The first step is to give them a hot meal and assign them to billets. Then comes processing, a speedy systematic check which requires about two hours. Records must be checked, clothing overages turned in and shortages made up. Each man receives an influenza shot, and may draw a partial or full pay as he desires. Lieutenant Donovan is a transportation officer with the unit that has won much praise and commendation for the rapidity and speed with which troops are processed and made ready for shipment.

**INFLUENZA STRIKES.** — SAN ANGELO, Nov. 27. — The Norton school in northwestern Runnels county was closed today because of illness. With 70 pupils out of an enrollment of 170 absent with influenza, trustees yesterday ordered the institution closed for a week. Four teachers were ill.

**PAINTERS STRIKE.** — FORT WORTH, Nov. 27. — Work on most union painting contracts in Fort Worth was halted today as the local unit of the Painting and Decorating Contractors of America (AFL) waited on a decision from Washington regarding a 20-cent-an-hour pay increase sought by the painters.

# 700,000 CIO Steel Men to Vote On Strike Tomorrow

## Karl Winge of Lutheran Community Died Early Sunday

Karl Ernest Winge, 68, respected farmer of the Lutheran community for many years, died at his home here at 1:30 o'clock Sunday morning and was laid to rest in the Lutheran cemetery at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon, following services at Christ Lutheran church. Rev. G. T. Naumann, Lutheran minister, officiated and burial was in charge of Thomas Funeral Home.

Mr. Winge was born in Germany, November 9, 1877. He was married to Miss Alma Spelken, Ruhr, Germany, November 14, 1903, the young people leaving for the United States soon after their marriage. They came direct to Eastland county and settled six miles from Cisco, where they spent their lives. The wife died November 8, 1943.

Immediate survivors are one son and six daughters, all of whom reside in the Lutheran community. They are: Charles Winge and Misses Martha, Erma, Olga, Freida and Louise Winge. Two brothers E. K. and Dan Winge also live in the Lutheran area and there are two half brothers and two half sisters in Germany.

Those who served as pallbearers were P. H. Eifer, Karl Weiser, Lee Leiske, Otto Wende, Will Ziehr and Abe Reich.

## Roy King Recovering From Accidental Rifle Shot

EL PASO, Tex. — Pfc. Roy T. King, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. T. King of Cisco, is here at William Beaumont General Hospital, one of the army's largest, for treatment of a rifle shot accidentally inflicted in Korea, October 2, 1945.

The veteran entered the army in September, 1944. He served nine months in the South Pacific as machine gunner with the 40th "Sunshine" Infantry Division. He was a farmer before he entered the army. Private King wears the Asiatic-Pacific Ribbon with one battle star and the Combat Infantryman's Badge.

**COATS EARNS CERTIFICATE.** — Frank Coats, 59, rural mail carrier out of Cisco, has completed written and flight requirements for a private pilot's license. Mr. Coats made his first flights three years ago, under the tutelage of Joe Coulter, now Cisco airport manager. Possession of a private pilot certificate, says Mr. Coulter, means the holder may carry passengers and fly anywhere within the continental United States.

# COURT MARTIAL FOR C. B. M'VAY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27. (AP)—The navy announced today that a general court martial has been ordered convened for the trial of Capt. Charles B. McVay III, commanding officer of the cruiser Indianapolis, which was sunk last July 30.

The Indianapolis, flagship of the Fifth fleet, sailed from San Francisco, July 17, 1945, on a special high-speed run to Guam, carrying atomic bomb material.

The ship delivered her historic cargo and was lost after departure from Guam.

The court martial for McVay will convene at the Washington Naval Yard, 10 a. m., Monday.

Charges against McVay will not be revealed, the navy said, until they are presented to him when the court martial convenes. The court martial will be public.

McVay, 47, one of a small group of survivors of the ill-fated ship, assumed command of the Indianapolis Nov. 18, 1944.

Loss of the Indianapolis was announced the night of Aug. 14 — just a few minutes before President Truman announced Japan's acceptance of the U. S. surrender terms. The announcement did not say how the warship was sunk.

Everyone of the 1,196 men aboard was either killed or injured.

## Cisco American Legion to Promote Auditorium

John William Butts Post of the American Legion will shortly announce plans for promoting a city auditorium project, including a Legion home, as a memorial to service men of world war two. A campaign is now on foot to raise funds for the Legion's share of this project. The Cisco chamber of commerce is cooperating in this program.

The idea in mind is to provide a meeting place for community gatherings and conventions and also to give the Legion a permanent home, as well as to provide accommodations for other civic projects or organizations which are in the public interest.

While the Legion is not ready to announce definite plans, the campaign is already under way.

The cooperation of every citizen in helping to put over this very worthwhile and certainly needed project is called for and will be appreciated.

As envisioned the auditorium will be dedicated to the service men of world war two and a suitable plaque or panel will be fixed in a most conspicuous place, bearing all names of the service men so honored, it was explained.

**SHELTON AT FT. SILL.** — FORT SILL, Okla. — Capt. James A. Shelton, Cisco, Texas, has been assigned to the staff and faculty at the field artillery school, here. Captain Shelton, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Shelton, is a veteran of overseas in the campaigns of Naples, Foggia, Rome, Arno, Southern France, Rhineland and Central Europe and wears the Air Medal and holds the Purple Heart with six clusters.

A conference between the leader of the United Auto Workers and Secretary of Labor Schwelienbach loomed today as plans were completed for a strike vote tomorrow of 700,000 CIO steelworkers.

Walter P. Reuther, vice-president of the UAW, said he planned to confer with Schwelienbach at Washington tomorrow on the system-wide G-M shutdown.

Reuther's announcement was followed by a report that U. S. conciliation service director Edgar L. Warren had asked union and company representatives to meet with him as soon as possible.

At the same time, G-M's nationwide system was hit by a new strike when 27,500 members of the United Rubber Workers Union CIO walked out at the Inland Manufacturing Co., a G-M plant at Dayton, O. Company officials said the strike was over the 30 per cent wage increase demand.

As the National Relations Board completed plans for polling the United Steel workers, Schwelienbach studied steps to be taken as soon as the poll is completed in an effort to prevent a work stoppage in the vital Steel industry.

The NLRB was proceeding with preparations for strike votes among more than 1,000,000 other workers before Dec 15, because it was uncertain whether congress would approve by that date a House committee's recommendation to abolish strike votes.

## Hull Assails Army Board Report; Infamous Charge

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27. — Cordell Hull today branded as "an infamous charge" the inference in an Army inquiry board report that the note he handed Japanese "peace" ambassadors on Nov. 26, 1941, touched the button that started the Pacific war.

The former secretary of state, testifying before a Senate-House committee inquiring into a Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, assailed in vigorous language the interpretations made by the Army board.

"I set under that infamous charge for months when every reasonable minded person knew that the Japanese were attempting at that time to get complete control of the Pacific," Hull declared.

"Somebody who knows little about what was going on and who cares less, says 'why didn't the United States make concessions and keep us out of war?'" he continued.

"Any reasonable person knows that the Japanese were bent on attack and knows that we could not have stopped them unless we had laid down like cowards."

## A CITY OF SORROW.

CHELAN, Wash., Nov. 27. — Chelan today was a city of sorrow, its town hall ready for duty as a morgue, its beautiful Lake Chelan an icy ogre which swallowed a community of children when an inbound school bus left the road Monday and carried 15 youngsters and its driver to death in the deep water. Six persons, five children and a woman passenger escaped.

## H. V. CALDWELL DIES.

BRECKENRIDGE, Nov. 27. — H. V. Caldwell, 67, one of Stephens county's early settlers and brother of Mrs. Kate York, A. E. Caldwell, and C. M. Caldwell of Abilene, died this morning from a heart attack at his home in this city.

## Indiana Soldier Killed at Dothan on His Way Home

Sgt. George Harrell Keesee, 24, member of the air corps and stationed at Biggs Field, El Paso, for several months, was instantly killed about 5:30 this morning when the car he was driving collided with an oil truck at Dothan.

The oil truck was driven by C. D. Suddarth of Brownwood and the accident occurred in front of the home of Roy Adams.

Sergeant Keesee, who was discharged from the service Sunday, accompanied by his wife and 11-months' old babe, was enroute to his home at Crawfordsville, Ind. The wife and child escaped injury.

The body was brought to Thomas Funeral Home in Cisco and prepared for burial. It will be shipped to Crawfordsville over the T&P railroad at noon tomorrow.

In the meantime the bereaved wife and her infant son are being cared for by Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Thomas.

Two other occupants of the car Mr. and Mrs. Clemens Earl Cope of Alton, Ill., are at Graham Sanitarium, badly shaken and suffering from shock and bruises, but are not thought to have sustained permanent injuries. However, Mrs. Cope, who probably has a broken jaw, was a very sick woman this afternoon.

## Greyhound Bus Strike is Now One Month Old

FORT WORTH, Nov. 27. (AP)—Federal conciliators dismissed Southwest Greyhound company officials from their negotiation meetings today to confer solely with labor union leaders in an attempt to settle the month old Greyhound bus strike, which has affected travel in a seven-state region.

The federal conciliators said: "We are here to develop the issues and get them settled, and it should not take so long to do that." Conciliators will meet with company officials tomorrow.

## LONG OCCUPATION.

FRANKFURT, Germany, Nov. 27. — Gen Joseph T. McNarney predicted today that Germany would be occupied at least ten years and probably longer. He spoke at a press conference as he assumed command of American troops in the European theater from Gen. Eisenhower, new army chief of staff.

Miss Mave Ann Branton, Ft. Worth, will speak concerning the children's division in the church school. Rev. Charles Lutrick will represent the young people. Mrs. T. E. Robertson will share in the program for the Women's Society of Christian Service. Jesse R. Smith will be the spokesman for laymen.

## GOP Opposes New Attacks on the Federal Treasury

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27. — Republican contentions of "pork barrel" today greeted a Democratic drive in the House to add \$128,475,000 in river and harbor-flooding control funds to a \$1,131,452,312 appropriation bill.

"It's worse than pork barrel," said Rep. John Taber of New York, ranking Republican member of the House appropriation committee which yesterday approved the deficiency supply bill without the river and harbor money.

Taber directed his remarks at a move launched by some Democratic committeemen to restore to the measure the \$128,475,000 knocked out by a close committee vote.

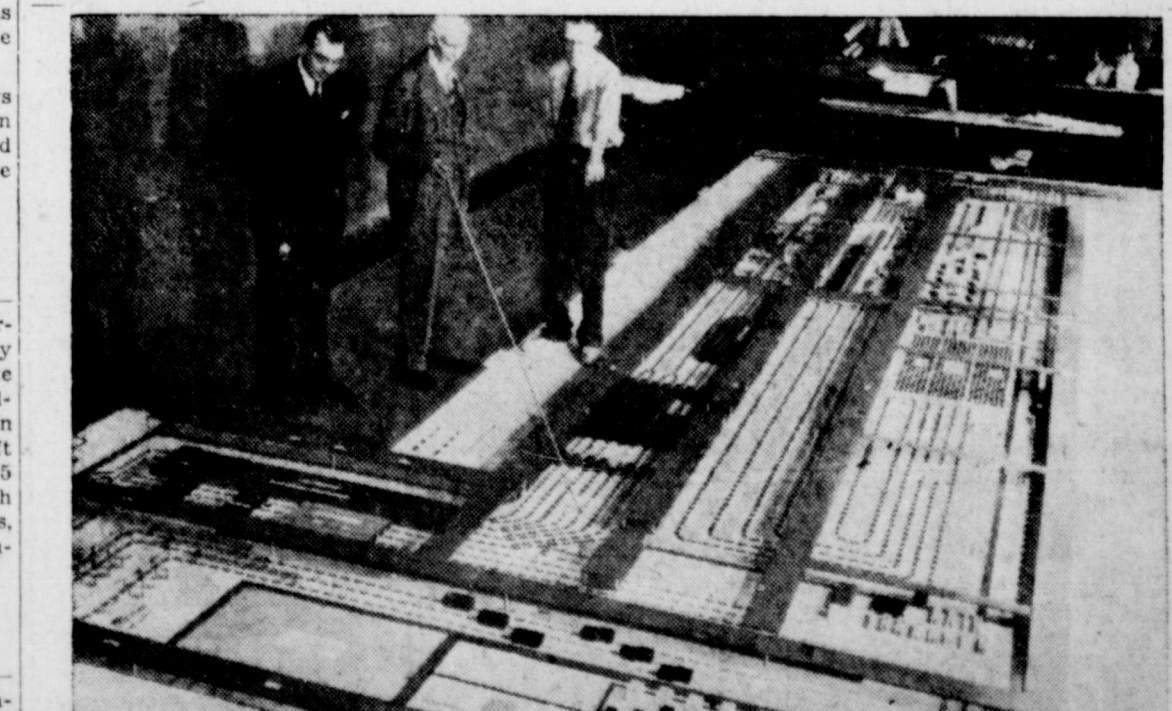

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## MILITARISTS, POLITICS HAVE FAILED.

John Foster Dulles, American advisor to the Foreign Ministers Conference in London, spoke recently in Philadelphia before the Commission for a Just and Durable Peace, made up of representatives of every Protestant denomination in the United States and Canada.

The burden of his talk was good will as a peace mechanism.

Mr. Dulles, an international lawyer and leading Republican of this country, urged that the United States — and all other nations — face the common threat of the atomic age by going to work against mankind's common ene-

mies, want, fear, disease and intolerance.

He urged Protestants to join with Catholics and Jews to launch a concurrent campaign for the well being of men of all nationalities. Such a plan would go far to counteract the present disruptive forces present in the United Nations and might be a guarantee of peace.

This idea of giving to the followers of these three religious groups — an impressively large segment of world population — the common goal of human betterment has at least two possibilities to recommend it. First, its effort to raise living standards everywhere is a tangible program of worthy human endeavor. Secondly, since men and women of many nationalities would be moving about the world on this altruistic mission, real international understanding and good will would result.

The world for a long time now has let militarists and politicians run its affairs.

Maybe it's time to see what a band of churchmen, Protestants,

Catholics and Jews could do at the job. Moslems and Hindus might later be added to advantage, in the interest of permanent peace.

Higgins Industries, Inc., New Orleans shipbuilders, shut down three big plants and began early in November to "farm out" forty million dollars worth of post-war business. In a tilt between two powerful labor unions, Andrew J. Higgins cast himself in the role of a bystander.

His story was that industrial disputes had made it practically impossible for him to operate at a profit.

I am not taking up a cudgel for Higgins or either of the labor organizations. The squabble has not been settled yet and some new factors may be introduced. The detail of the news that interests me most is Mr. Higgins' offer to sell his plants to the union. His proposition may have been seasoned with irony, but I am perfectly serious. I think it is a splendid idea.

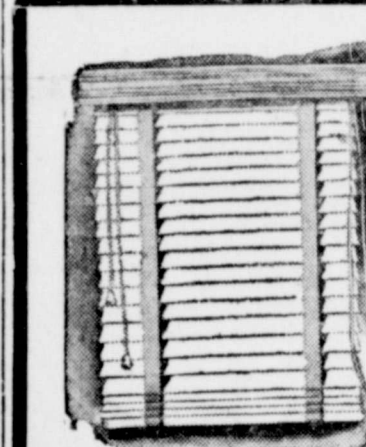

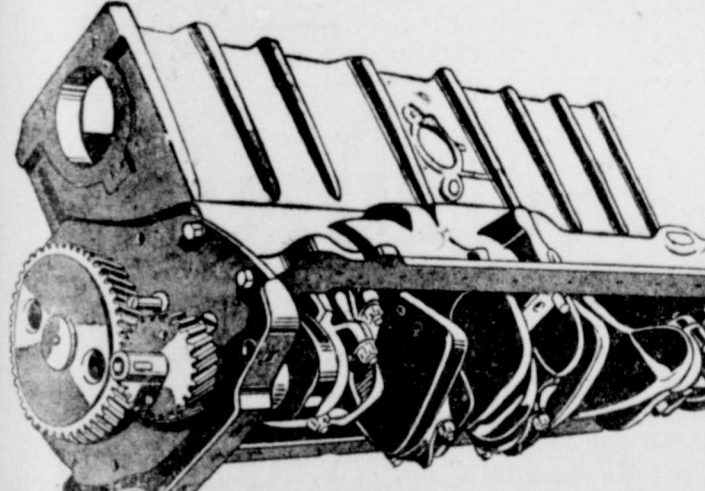

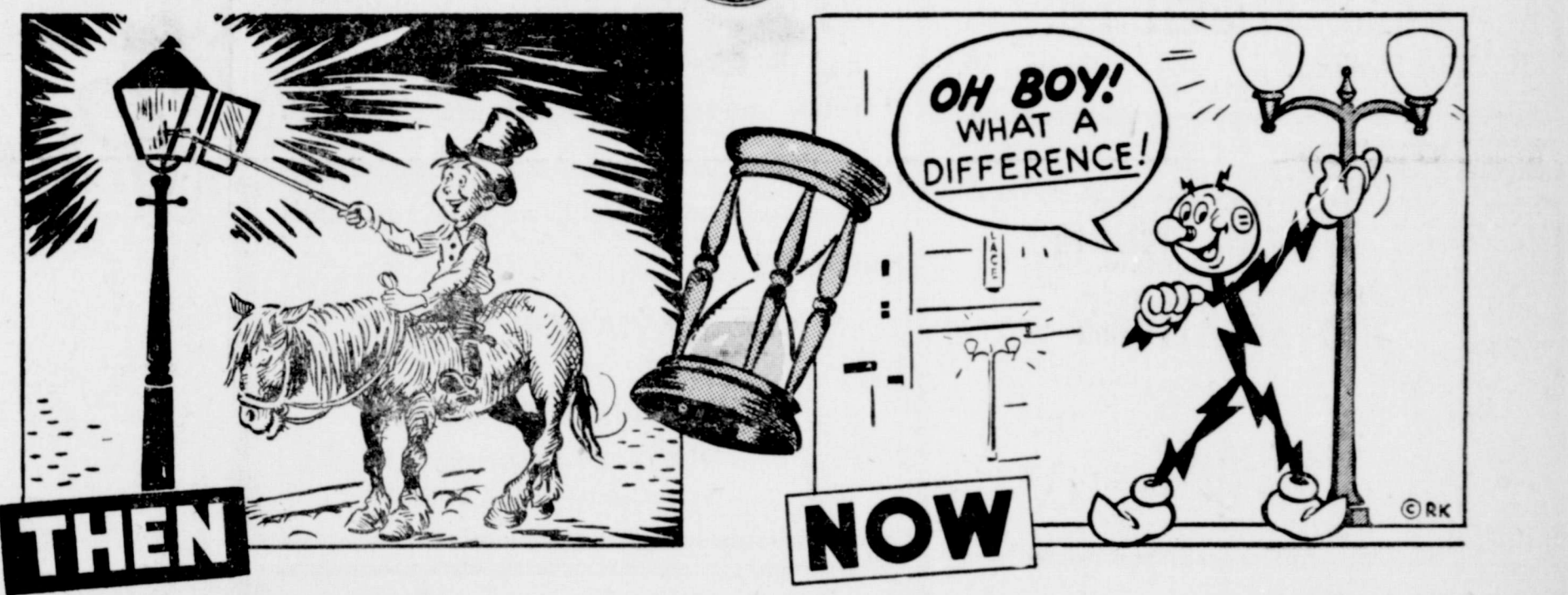
