CIO Asks the President to Make G-M Negotiate

Striking CIO auto workers appealed directly to President Truman today for intervention in the General Motors shutdown as CIO steel workers voted overwhelmingly in favor of a strike to back demands for a 30 per cent wage increase.

At Windsor, Ontario, CIO auto workers in a mass vote rejected the advice of their policy committee and turned down by a slight margin a Canadian government proposal to settle the 79-day strike against Ford of Canada.

Workers in 920 steel plants and aluminum iron ore pits and bauxite mines voted 370,984 to 73,362 in favor of a strike.

The United Automobile Workers union at the Ternstedt plant of GM's Fisher Body Division, Detroit, asked Mr. Truman to "use the power and forces at your command" to bring company officials into immediate negotiations over the union's demand for a 30 per cent wage increase.

"Your hands-off policy will only result in further stalling by General Motors and prolongation of the strike," the union said in a telegram to the White House.

C. E. Wilson, G-M president, said injunctions may be sought to restrain the union from alleged illegal picketing in the system-wide G-M shutdown.

In Washington, Mr. Truman told a press conference it would be a good idea for representatives of G-M and the strikers to get together and discuss their differences.

The President entered the strike at the Great Lakes Towing Co., Cleveland. He ordered the Office of Defense Transportation to seize and operate the struck company.

The number of workers idle because of strikes and shutdowns across the nation rose to 631,000, highest figure in many weeks.

Lobo B Squad Performed Niftily, Brownwood Game

Outweighed and outnumbered, the Cisco Lobo B squad won the admiration of the stands when it played the strong Brownwood B squad on even terms throughout their game at Brownwood Wednesday night, losing by one touchdown in the final two minutes of play. Final score was 13 to 6.

The game was the first for the B team this season and the boys performed splendidly. The team's defensive play was excellent and its offensive play better than fair.

The passing of Bill Johnson and O. W. Ford's left-footed punting and his pass catching were features, although every lad who went on the field gave a good account of himself, and moved at least one spectator—an army major at Brownwood—to declare that the Cisco team would certainly "go places" if they stayed together.

Both teams scored in the second quarter and the count was knotted until the final two minutes when a Lion-B back got loose for a scoring run after Cisco had been penalized 15 yards for infraction of the rules, setting the ball back against the goal line.

The Cisco touch down was scored when O. W. Ford took a pass from Bill Johnson and ran 40 yards for the count.

Next year a full slate of games for the "B" squad is planned, Coach Harold Fischer said.

The starting Cisco lineup was Durwood Smith, left end; Frank Steffey, left tackle; Rex Farley, left guard; Jim Cummins, center; Tom Pee, right guard; Ray Gene Riley, right tackle; O. W. Ford, right end; Bob Carrothers, wing back; Gene Milner, blocking back; Bill Tabor, full back; Russell Johnson, tail back. Bill Johnson and Tom Tipton were substitutes, Johnson throwing the touchdown-making pass while he was in.

During the business session the association voted to appropriate \$150 for the initial equipment of the ground and named a committee consisting of E. A. Butler, chairman; C. B. Midkiff, principal of the west ward school; Mrs. W. C. Hogue, Mrs. J. R. Deen, Mrs. I. A. Business, Professional Men Had Better Wake Up

WACO, Nov. 29. — Delegates attending the annual convention of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation were told by President Edward A. O'Neal of the American Farm Bureau Federation, Chicago, that business and professional men had better wake up unless they want to see themselves dominated and controlled by the labor group.

Inflation was cited by him as the gravest danger faced by the United States. And farmers are not responsible, he added.

Laws pertaining to agriculture are fine if they are rightly administered, he asserted. For the year ending June 30, he informed the group, there was a profit of \$45,000,000 to \$50,000,000 in the Commodity Credit Corporation.

"Anyone who tells you America can live without trading with other nations is just plain crazy," he said. "I've heard Will Clayton roundly criticized, and I'm not agreeing with all he says, but he's got guts and brains, and that's needed in world leadership."

O'Neal said he was unwilling to turn the destiny of the United States over to New York and other large cities.

Referring again to the strike situation, after stressing that he believed in a fair wage and collective bargaining, O'Neal said:

"If they don't stop pretty soon Congress will stop them. If they'll quit striking, we'll get along fine."

Vets and Wives Too Hasty About Asking Divorce

DALLAS, Nov. 29. — Dallas county's rising tide of broken romances led District Judge W. L. Thornton to offer returning GIs and their war-wedded wives a pre-divorce conciliation service.

Disturbed by November prospects of a new all-time record in number of divorces filed, Judge Thornton said he believed returning servicemen and their war brides could, in many cases, restore domestic peace by allowing a cooling-off period before taking action for legal separation.

"But it's going to take a lot more understanding on the part of reunited couples than normally required," he said. "War brides and their soldier husbands must cultivate mutual sympathies to stave off divorces arising from long separation thousands of miles apart."

Records in District Clerk Pearl Smith's office indicated November would exceed the October record of divorces. October's record was 730 suits.

Judge Thornton attributed most of the divorces to readjustment of returning servicemen, interference by well-meaning but misinformed relatives, mutual mistrust by both servicemen and their war brides because of long absences, and financial difficulties.

"War brides should take into consideration the mental attitude of returning soldiers who have seen long service abroad," he said. "It takes time for them to readjust themselves. Many wives don't stop to realize what their husbands have been through."

PIONEER RANCHER DIES.

SAN ANGELO, Nov. 29. (UP)—Funeral services were pending today for George Sutton Allison, 91, pioneer Texas ranchman, who died in a San Angelo hospital after a month's illness. For 60 years a ranchman in Sutton county, Allison owned more than 100 sections of land in that county alone at the time of his death. Besides his land holdings, he owned oil wells in the Sharon Ridge field.

Only Hawaiian Department Lax In Defense Measures

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29. (UP)—The army presented reports today indicating that its Philippines, Panama Canal and West Coast commands too greater defensive measures in the days just before Pearl Harbor than did the Hawaiian department, upon which the actual blow finally fell.

The reports were submitted to the congressional Pearl Harbor committee. They were replies by field commanders to a war department warning on Nov. 27, 1941, that "hostile action is possible at any moment."

The warning was sent out by Gen. George C. Marshall, then army chief of staff, who said that while the United States wanted Japan to "commit the first overt act," all defensive measures necessary should be taken without alarming the civilian populations.

US. Can't Tell Atomic Secrets Unless Others Do

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29. (UP)—The United States can remain permanently ahead of other nations in atomic development "provided the rules are the same for all nations," Maj. Gen. Leslie H. Groves, director of the army's atomic bomb project, said today.

"But if this country shares its knowledge while other countries keep their developments secret, the United States will lag," Groves told the senate Atomic Energy committee.

Another witness, Dr. Harold C. Urey of the University of Chicago, told the committee that "failure to control atomic weapons would create a world in which every ripple on the international scene will make us wonder whether the atomic bombs may not arrive before morning."

December 8 to Be Sister Kenny Day Says the Governor

AUSTIN, Nov. 29. — Gov. Coke Stevenson has proclaimed Saturday, December 8, as Sister Kenny Day in Texas. The 1945 appeal for the Sister Elizabeth Kenny Infantile Foundation fund is now underway throughout the nation and in Texas. George C. Francisco of Houston heads the state committee and has announced that the Texas campaign, quota for which is \$250,000, will officially end with Sister Kenny Day, but that due to lateness in getting organized the campaign will be extended in many counties.

Ultimate goal of the Texas committee is to build a clinic in this state. The immediate goal is to train sufficient Kenny technicians and nurses in Texas to make the Kenny treatment of polio available to every boy and girl who falls victim to the dread disease. There are now Kenny trained nurses and technicians in Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and Corpus Christi.

Kenny Day has been proclaimed by most states of the nation. Bing Crosby, national chairman of the polio campaign, will make a coast-to-coast broadcast, Monday, Dec. 5, in an appeal for support of the campaign.

State headquarters of the Kenny campaign at the Driskill Hotel in Austin will accept contributions direct from the donors. Each contributor to the campaign will receive a personal letter of thanks from Bing Crosby, national chairman.

UNCLE HAMLET.

It seems lately as if Uncle Sam is in danger of developing into what might be called a Hamlet Nation. That is to say, a brilliant nation without a purpose. We have had strong national purposes from time to time, but where are they now, when the world is in bad shape and rapidly getting no better?

Theodore Roosevelt had a political motto which sounded queer but usually worked well. It was "Speak softly and carry a big

stick." And this may be the most important time in American history for us to do so.

It isn't much use trying to get by with only half of that rule. And quiet strength is essential, whether it be in an office or a firing line.

Now, getting down to cases, how about those Russians, who are puzzling and worrying this country, at a time when we desire peace, friendship and cooperation and are ready to play our part?

Russia evidently knows what she wants. We Americans seem fat and satisfied with what we have. But fat satisfaction can't last forever. It just invites strong, purposeful nations to do what we are too lazy or sluggish or indifferent to do. Aren't we too much like Hamlet, who had brains, vision and brilliancy without purpose, and eventually went off the deep end for nobody's benefit?
