By United Press The United Automobile Workers Union (CIO) today sought the aid of an "impartial" group of persons from public life in settling the 10day strike that has halted car production in General Motors

Corporation plants. The announcement came as the number of American workers idle because of strikes and shutdowns rose to more than 638,000, highest figure in several weeks. Giraud.

UAW officials invited the persons to meet in Detroit next Tuesday and Wednesday to examine transcripts of union negotiations with General Motors and recommend a settlement of the strike.

Union Vice President Walter Reuther said Bernard Baruch, New York financier and adviser to presidents, was suggested as head of the committee. He did not say whether Baruch had accepted.

A break in the bitter UAW strike against the Ford Motor Company of Canada, at Windsor, Ont., was expected as 8,000 sympathy strikers prepared to return to work in 28 plants.

Their return would leave 2,000 other sympathizers and 10,000 Ford workers on strike.

Hess Says He Is Sane; That He Has Been Faking

NUENBERG, Ger., Nov. 30, (U.P.) The war crimes trial flared up dramatically today when Rudolf Hess told the court he had been faking a loss of memory and a Nazi espionage chief testified that the Germans plotted to murder Gens. Maxime Weygand and Henri

Toward the end of the session Hess himself strode to the stand to declare defiantly that he was mentally fit and ready for trial.

Putnam paid honor to the foot-His counsel, who had pleaded passionately that the charges against Hess be quashed, said "that proves the coronation held at Putnam Comyn. he's crazy." The court did not rule immediately.

Lord Justice Sir Geoffrey Lawrence, British member of the tribunal, proposed that Hess should go to the stand and tell the court how he felt.





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
